Youth, 17 Drowns

Accidental drowning was ruled in the death of a 17-year-old Woodville youth who was reported by authorities to have "overextended his swimming capability" Friday, July 4 when trying to reach the Cherokee Park swimmers barrier then return to shore.

The victim was only able to return half the distance to the shore. Pronounced dead at the scene was James Preston Powell, a junior at Woodville High School, who was on a holiday outing with a group including his family when the incident occurred.

Powell was first reported missing around 2:15 p.m.

Officials from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Service and the U.S. Corps of Engineers cooperated in dragging operations which were called off when a professional diver was brought in to search for the body which was recovered at 5:05 p.m. in approximately six feet of water about 50 feet from the shore.

According to Peace Justice Frank Grimes, who ruled in the death, the victim had been swimming within the designated swimming area of the old bar pit located on the north side of Hwy. 190 in the Cherokee Park area.

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Tuesday, July 8 at the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church with Pastor Bryant Hubert officiating. Burial followed in the Town Bluff Cemetery.

Survivors include a mother, Earlene Johnson Dearmon; father, James Powell; six brothers; five sisters; grandmother, Mrs. Freddie Nolan; five uncles; 10 aunts; eight nephews and five nieces.

Bell Rate Hike Said 'Basic'

Inflation and the continuing need to pour billions of dollars into Texas telephone growth are prime factors in Southwestern Bell's request for \$326.3 million in new rates filed recently with the Texas Public Utility Commission.

"Our need for new rates is basic," said Doyle E. Rogers, the company's vice president for Texas. "As a utility company, we have no choice but to stay up with Texas' rapid growth. Billions of dollars are essential to meet that growth. We cut expenses. We gain revenue through increased sales. But soaring double digit inflation eats up all the gains we make. We're at

the point where a request for additional rates is our only alternative.

"The \$326.3 million is our full financial need," Rogers said. "Our case presented to the Commission supports that need."

If the request is approved, Southwestern Bell would net an overall increase of 11.65 percent in intrastate revenues. "Percentage increases for individual services will vary," Rogers said. "The 11.65 percent increase applies only to the overall revenue increase for the state, and not to specific services."

Rogers said Southwestern Bell has spent about \$3 billion in construction in Texas during the past three years, and will add more than another billion this year.

"We have an investment in excess of \$6 billion in Texas," he said. "It is imperative that we earn at a reasonable level on that investment in order to secure the additional huge sums necessary to continue growing with Texas."

In 1979, the PUC authorized Bell to earn 10.17 percent on its Texas operations. "We need to earn in the range of 12.5 percent in Texas to provide the incentive for investors to pour in the dollars necessary to provide continuing good phone service for the state."

Houston Peddlers Here

About 15 members of the Houston Bicycle Club journeyed to Woodville this past three-day holiday weekend to get a closer look at country living in the Woodville area while riding atop shiny colorful 10-speed English racer bikes.

The group converged on Woodville in their private cars early Friday morning to begin a three-day, three-ride trip branching north, south and west of Woodville, one trip on each day of the long holiday weekend. To get closer to nature and experience

According to Young, one of the biggest problems that confronts the riders is coming in contact with dogs along the route. "Problem is," he said, "dogs just seem to cause accidents."

Young said the riders usually carry a spray deterrent, which usually takes care of the problem.

Young, who listed his age as over 37, said that 95 percent of the automobile drivers on the road are

courteous. "People away from Houston are especially accommodating."

Young, who said he averages about 100 miles a week, said the basic investment for a beginning biker is about \$200 and up for a bike which weighs 19-20 pounds. Hardest thing to get used to when learning to ride is the riding position leaning over onto the handle bars. He said that was mainly to reduce wind resistance. He said that even on hot days like this past weekend, that generally "You don't feel it while you're riding," only when you stop. He indicated that the group planned to stop at as many small country stores as they could to "gas up on orange juice and gatorade."

According to Young, the group is considering coming to Woodville during Dogwood Festival time next year and will ask to be included in the parade activities and take a chance to tour the woodlands around Woodville as the dogwoods blossom.

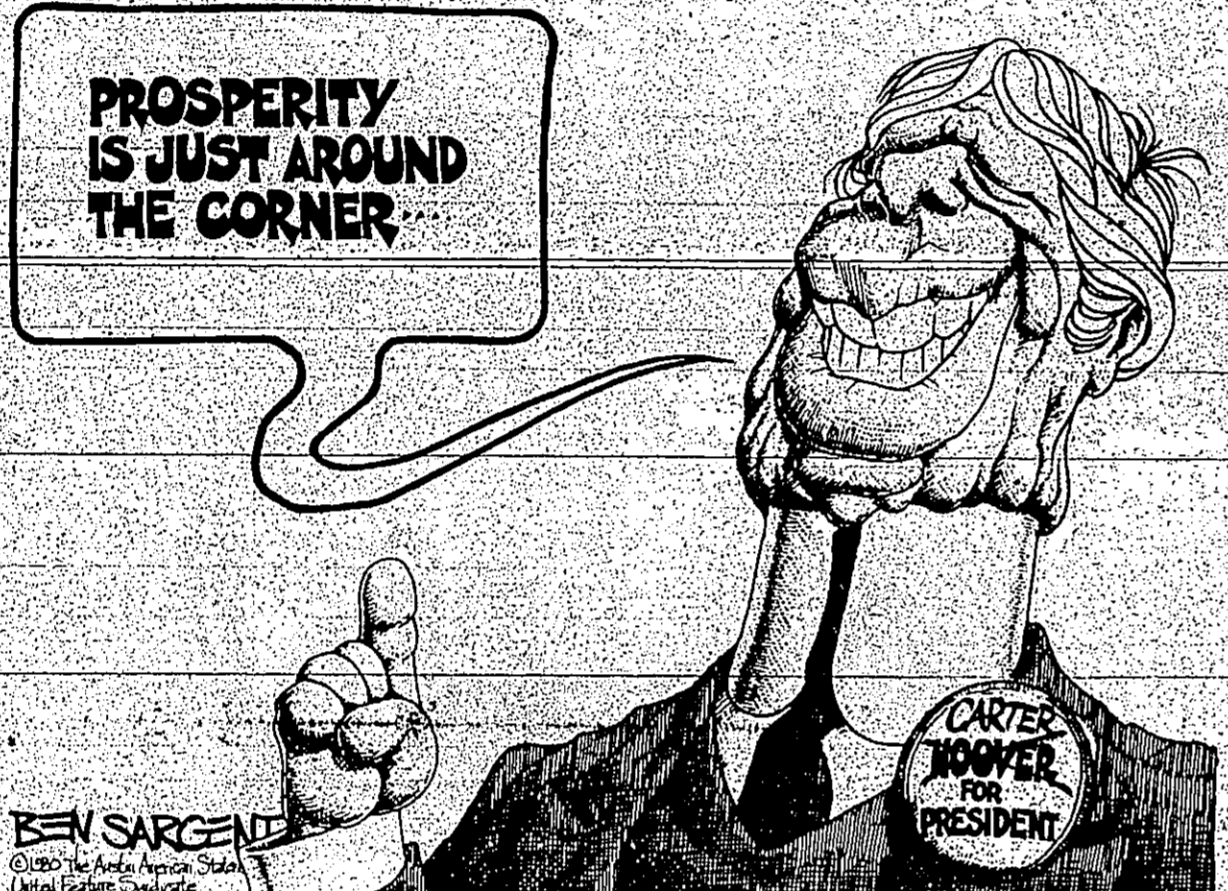

Sitters Need Help From Parents

Baby-sitting is a job with a lot of responsibility, and the Texas Medical Association (TMA) urges parents to take steps to help baby-sitters face any problem. Medical emergencies may be physically threatening but they pose little problem for the baby-sitter seeking treatment for a child since the law says a physician can give treatment without parental consent if there is an emergency. To help the sitter know what to do in an emergency, the parent should provide a list of emergency phone numbers and a note saying where a parent can be contacted.

If a child needs medical treatment that not an emergency, a doctor must have permission before treating children under 18 in most cases. If a parent or guardian is not available, an adult brother, sister, aunt or uncle or a grandparent can give written consent. Or a parent or guardian can give written permission to an adult or school to permit non-emergency treatment.

If parents plan to be out of town or unavailable for awhile, they may want to leave a note authorizing someone to permit non-emergency treatment. TMA suggests the note say, "I hereby authorize (in the name of an adult who can be responsible for the children) to act as my agent in consenting to medical treatment needed by my children (list the children's names) during my absence." A parent should sign and date the note.

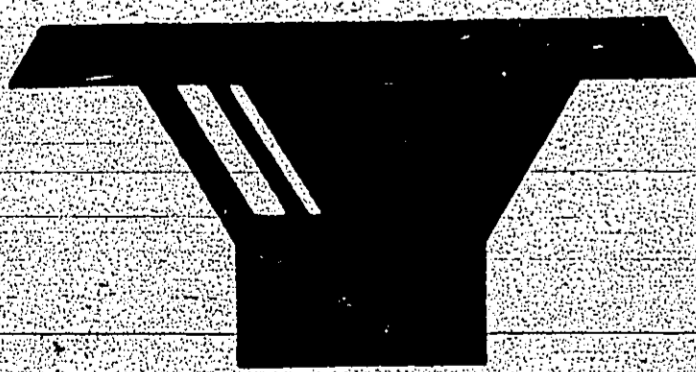
Other instructions also are important for the baby-sitter. TMA suggests supplying a permanent fact sheet and one for each occasion when a baby-sitter works. The permanent fact sheet should have emergency phone numbers, doctor's department, police, relatives, utility companies and others. The sheet also should note location of first aid supplies for very minor problems.

The other fact sheet should tell where parents will be and for how long and a phone number where they can be contacted. It also should have instructions on meals and snacks, sleep habits, deliveries and calls expected, medication to be given, the child's current medical condition and other

Proposed Rate Increases Outlined By SW Bell

Southwestern Bell's proposed rate increases for flat rate basic local service, Centrex service, private line service, TELPAK, Other Common Carrier rates, telephone instruments, Touch-Tone service, custom calling services and miscellaneous equipment.

The company's proposal also includes changes in charges for moving or connecting telephones, modifying the existing optional residential and business measured service plans and reducing the call allowance to Directory Assistance and increasing the charge for calls over the allowance.

No increases were requested for coin telephone calls, in-state long distance calls and WATS service.

Southwestern Bell proposes across-the-board increases in access line charges for flat rate services in all 10 Texas rate groups. As approved by the PUC in the company's 1979 rate request, basic local exchange rates now specify only the charge for an exchange access line for connection to the telephone network. Every customer pays an access line charge.

A telephone instrument is not now included in the rate quoted to a customer. The customer has the option of using a Southwestern Bell instrument or providing his or her own instrument. If the customer chooses a Bell provided instrument, the appropriate monthly equipment charge would be added to the monthly access charge.

The proposed flat rate access line increases include: One Party Residence: \$1.25 per month; Two Party Residence: 80 cents per month; One Party Business: \$3.75 per month.

The proposed monthly access line increases for measured service include: Residence, a range from 65 cents per month in the smallest city where it is now offered to 95 cents in the largest city and Business, either \$2.40 or \$2.45 per month, depending on the location.

Proposed increases in telephone instruments include: Standard Rotary Dial Set: 50 cents per month; Standard TouchTone Set: 60 cents per month; Rotary Dial Princess: 40 cents per month; TouchTone Princess: 75 cents per month; and Rotary and TouchTone Trimlines: No change.

In addition, TouchTone line charges would increase 20 cents per month for residence service and 25 cents per month for business service.

For a flat rate one party residential customer using a Bell standard rotary dial set, the increase would total \$1.75 per month; \$1.25 for the access line and 50 cents for the instrument. A one party, flat rate residential customer using a standard TouchTone set would have an increase of \$2.05 per month; \$1.25 for the access line, 60 cents for the TouchTone instrument, and 20 cents for the TouchTone line.

Under the proposal, measured service customers would continue each month to pay a specific rate, depending on location. However, instead of the 25 or 100 calls, residential customers would receive \$1.85 monthly usage allowance, while business measured customers would receive \$3.80 monthly usage allowance.

The dollar allowance means that a measured service customer would be billed only monthly usage which exceeds the allowance. For example, if a residence customer's monthly usage was \$2.55, the customer would be billed 70 cents for usage over the amount over \$1.85.

Also, Bell proposes to begin charging for each measured service local call on the basis of how far the call travels, the duration of the call and the time of day the call is made. For measured local calls from 0 to 15 miles, the rate would be 4 cents for the first minute and 1 cent per each additional minute. Calls from 16 to 30 miles would be billed at the rate of 5 cents for the first minute and 2 cents for each additional minute. Calls for 31 miles or more would be at the rate of 6 cents for the first minute and 3 cents for each additional minute.

The cost-recovery concept also applies to the proposal to change one-time charges for moving or connecting telephones. Under the company proposal, the maximum one-time charge to install one new residence telephone would increase \$2.25 to \$56.50. Meanwhile, a customer utilizing Phone Center service could save more than \$20 of the \$56.50 under the company proposal.

What Effect Will Heat Wave Have?

What effect will the heat wave have on your electric bill?

Gulf States Utilities officials say it is impossible to predict that exactly, but they can point out the trends. And the trend is obvious that most bills received in July will be higher than normal.

While there are many factors that affect the home use of electricity, heat is certainly one of them. GSU monitors the climate across its East-Texas and southern Louisiana service area through weather stations at Houston Intercontinental Airport, Jefferson County Airport near Port Arthur, Municipal Airport at Lake Charles and Ryan Airport in Baton Rouge.

The trend for the last half of June was exceptionally hot weather which comes as no surprise to anyone. But the degree of heat is startling. In June, 1979, the Houston airport recorded only four days with temperatures reaching 94 or above. The others recorded none.

Increases for other types of services, such as dedicated private lines, are designed to cover the cost of providing the services.

What Effect Will Heat Wave Have?

Comparing this June to last June on a scale that averages the daily temperatures shows June, 1980, to be 19 percent hotter in Baton Rouge than the previous June. Lake Charles 14 percent hotter, Beaumont 19 percent hotter and Houston an incredible 36 percent hotter.

Joseph E. Bondurant, GSU executive vice president of operations, reiterates that temperature is just a contributing factor. Humidity, personal habits in using electricity and how long it stays hot each day and night all can be factors in how much electricity is used.

"We know most residential bills are going to be high this month," Bondurant said, "and I want to point out that for a long time it has been a standing policy with Gulf States that we will help customers whenever they are faced with real and proven financial crises. This heat wave is just one form of emergency that may create a serious financial problem for a customer.

Selling your home and thinking of marketing it yourself instead of obtaining the services of a real estate broker?

Before you embark on such a venture, be aware of the advantages of each alternative.

Avoiding the usual commission paid to a real estate broker is the primary advantage most people think of.

Yet there are some invaluable services that a real estate broker can provide which earn him his fee.

knowledgeable about financing and can make these arrangements yourself, you may be able to handle this aspect of the sale.

Often financing sells a house. If you have several financing options available for a prospective buyer, it is more likely you can sell your home yourself than you would without them.

Correct pricing is crucial. Your broker can assist in appraising or determining the market value of the property. Or you may hire an appraiser, or you may be familiar enough with the market to know what comparable homes are selling for.

If you overprice your house, it may remain on the market too long. When this happens, people begin to think something is wrong with it. To sell, you may have to reduce the price drastically.

On the other hand, if the house is underpriced, you will lose money needlessly.

After weighing the advantages and disadvantages, if you want to proceed with the sale, prepare yourself in every possible way.

Be ready to spend some money to help the sale. Sunday newspaper ads are most beneficial. Most newspapers have special weekly or monthly rates, so check on these before deciding what size ad to run and how long you wish to run it.

A "For sale" sign in the yard will catch the eye of house hunters driving by. Weekends are probably the best times for these shoppers.

Keep your lawn well-groomed. The exterior often determines whether the prospects will want to look further. If you do some painting to freshen the interior, use neutral colors in keeping with the more popular schemes.
