One Killed

A fiery one-car collision into a group of pine trees Saturday, Aug. 2, claimed the life of a 20-year-old Splendora man and injured severely a Colmesneil man and another Bridge City passenger.

According to Department of Public Safety Officer Gary Hennigan the one-car accident occurred three-tenths of a mile south of Colmesneil on U.S. Highway 69. The black 1978 Trans Am was owned by the driver who was killed, Steven Howard Daniels.

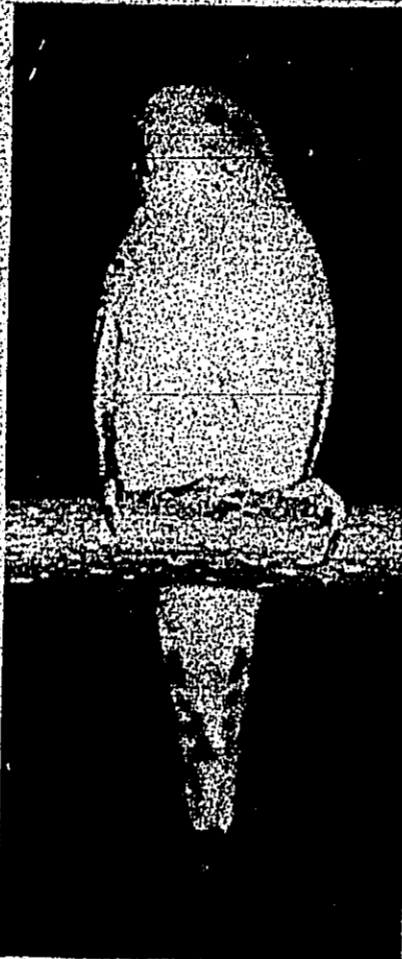
The incident occurred at 7:50 p.m. According to officers' reports

the Trans Am crossed the center stripe, then over to the left side of the road and hit four pine trees and burst into flames.

Officers indicate that the three were then pulled from the burning vehicle by travelers passing by the scene.

Critically injured and sent to St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Beaumont was Harold Norton, Jr., 29, of Colmesneil, and also treated for substantial injuries was Clint Harris, 17, of Bridge City.

The accident victims were rushed to the hospital by the Tyler County Ambulance Service.



Arson Reward Forming

The July 26 arson-suspected fire which destroyed the Woodville Elementary School has prompted the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce to begin soliciting funds for a "Chamber of Commerce Reward Campaign" which Chamber officials hope will help flush out the person or persons involved.

Goal established by the Chamber is \$5,000.

Deadline to reach that goal will

be August 31.

The money will be posted for the arrest and conviction of persons who may be involved in such a crime, said Jerry Tolbert, Chamber Director in-Charge of the project and who is also a Woodville Fire Department volunteer.

According to Alva Cook, Woodville Fire Marshal, "This project comes completely under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce and the

Woodville Fire Department will help in every way possible.

According to Chamber President Tom Knapp, "We wanted to make sure the timing of the reward being posted didn't interfere with officers investigations into the fire."

Knapp said that persons and businesses will be asked to contribute to the fund in the form of cash donations

Superintendent Royce W. Whiteley reports that the school taxes for the Chester I.S.D. taxpayers will remain basically the same in 1980 as they were for 1979. Even though Chester I.S.D. raised the assessed value from 50% to 100% as required by state, the tax rate has been lowered from 32.10% to 1.07% leaving the tax levy (the amount paid by taxpayers) about the same dollar amount.

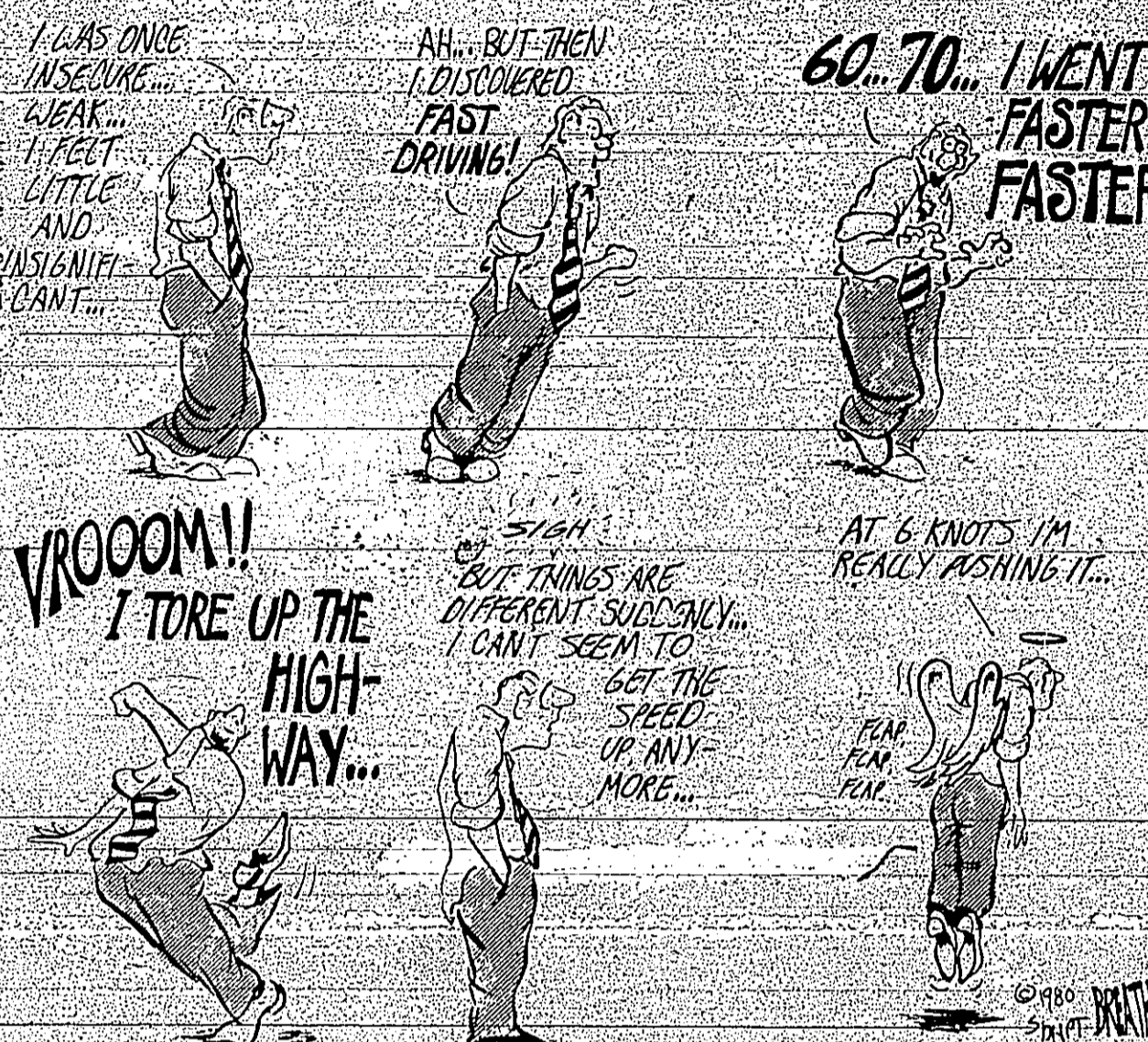

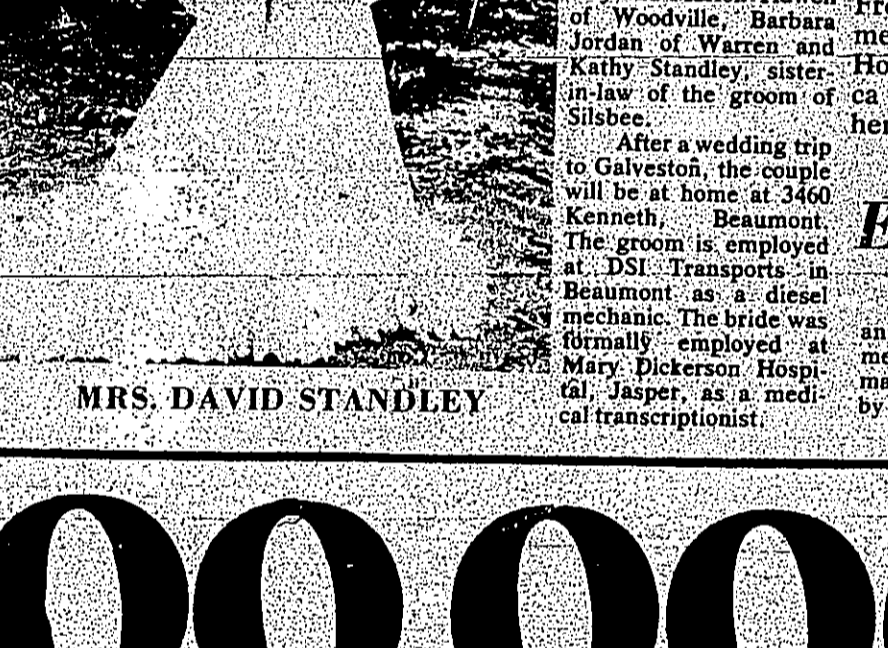

Chester Schools Release Texas Assessment Skills Test Results

Texas Assessment of Basic Skills was developed in response to several directives of the State Board of Education. The State Board of Education has the responsibility under Texas law to develop the educational needs of the state, adopt or promote plans for meeting these needs. School districts are required to conduct a documented assessment of student achievement as part of the accreditation process. More recently, Senate Bill 350 passed by the Texas Legislature amended Section 16.17a of the Texas Education Code and was ranked nationally during the 79-80 year.

and during each year thereafter, each school district shall administer tests designed to measure minimum basic skills competencies in reading, mathematics and writing.

Chester's 5th and 9th grade scores were well above national norms and high in comparison to other counties in this state.

In Chester's 5th grade, out of 15 students tested, ten mastered the learned objectives and was ranked 75th nationally in reading. Twelve out of 16 mastered the reading objectives and was ranked 75th nationally in writing. Twelve out of 16 mastered the mathematics objectives and was ranked 88th nationally in mathematics. Chester's 9th grade scores were also high in comparison to other counties in this state.

During Hot Weather Ornamentals More Subject To Heat

COLLEGE STATION -- During present heat and drought conditions, homeowners may want to develop a priority system to aid in deciding which plants should receive water and other care first.

Unrelenting Drought Hot Weather Hurting Wildlife

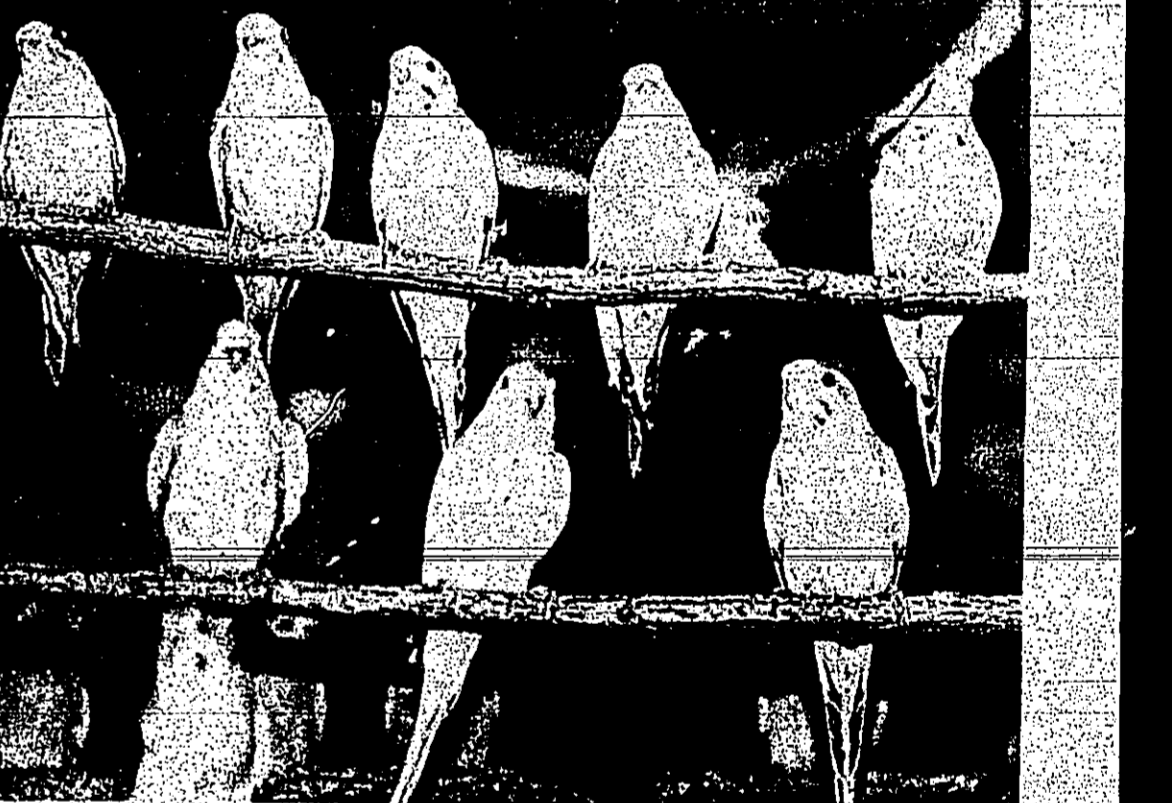

Windfall Profits Tax Charges Aired

AUSTIN, Texas (AP)—The Railroad Commission Tuesday called for testimony on the "fair and equitable" tax treatment of small royalty owners at both sessions.

The royalty owner, no matter how small his or her interest is subject to the same tax treatment structure as the major companies (under the Windfall Profits Tax), said Nugent.

In many, many instances across Texas, the small amount of in-

come derived from a royalty interest is essential in maintaining even a subsistence life style.

Accepting testimony at the tax hearing were Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas; and David Boren, D-Oklahoma.

The hearing was held at the Special Events Center on the University of Texas campus and drew a turnout of more than 2,500 people.

"Our state has supported approximately one-third of the oil and natural gas produc-

tion in this country, and risks of energy development," he described. Californians who blocked construction of the Long Beach to Midland pipeline, "those in the West who oppose drilling in their wilderness areas, and those on the East Coast who have blocked construction of even one major refinery in the last 30 years as people who suddenly are greedy for Texas energy at bargain basement prices."

"For years they took Texas natural gas at less than replacement cost," Nugent related.

"It may surprise you to know that 50 percent of the natural gas that leaves Texas today is sold at less than 70 cents per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) while we pay Mexico and Canada over \$4.50 for the same product," he explained.

Furthermore, he cited, "Texas oil is sold today at approximately one-half of the world market price."

Nugent maintained that Texas energy consumers and small Texas oil and gas royalty owners have been dealt a "double-whammy" by rising energy costs, streaking increases in the cost of transporting coal to Texas power generating plants converted from gas, and severance taxes of coal producing states.

"While Texas resources are sold at less than market value, Nugent said, "our utility bills have been inflated by the greed of every special interest that seized this as the moment to extract their pound of Texas flesh."

The oil and gas regulatory official observed that Texas royalty owners have invested their money, land, and borne the risks and costs without seeking favors.

"But they have been caught in a net that was not intended for them, and the exemption of a modest but necessary portion of their incomes from this additional tax is reasonable and just," maintained Nugent in supporting exemption for small royalty owners.

Save Indian Mounds!

A citizens group recently requested the Forest Service to withdraw from a pending clearcut sale in Indian Mounds, proposed wilderness east of Hemphill, Texas.

Save Indian Mounds, comprises of more than a hundred citizens, primarily East Texans, recently discovered thousands of trees freshly marked for sale in Compartment 82, part of an area which would be designated wilderness under two bills authored by Congressman Bob Eckhardt.

The Forest Service seems to be trying to override the request of a Congressional com-

mittee, dated April 1, 1980, not to impair any more of our proposed wilderness," said Martha Eistrup, Edgar, spokeswoman for Save Indian Mounds.

The Forest Service agreed several years ago to honor such requests. The sale of the marked trees in Compartment 82 would breach that agreement.

After Congress- man Eckhardt filed H.R. 4203 to designate Indian Mounds as wilderness, but before the Congressional letter of April 1, the Forest Service made two big clearcut sales in the area. That is all we are going to put up with,"

said Ms. Edgar, who lives across a road from the proposed wilderness. "We must not let them whittle our wilderness into pieces. There are plenty of other stands outside our wilderness proposal where they can clearcut their timber."

"After removing all the trees in a stand, the Forest Service plants them to pine which wipes out the oaks, hickories, and gums of the natural forest. Any more clearcuts would jeopardize the hunting, hiking, and camping values of Indian Mounds," said Ms. Edgar.

At 10,700 acres, an Indian Mounds wild-

erness would constitute less than one-tenth of one percent of the timberland, and less than two percent of the national forest land of East Texas.

"To stop timber harvesting on this small area would hurt the timber industry a bit," Ms. Edgar stated.

"Wilderness designation by Congress would attract thousands of tourists to Sabine County. Besides, wilderness seems to be the only place around here that the timber industry would not clearcut. It won't be long before they've converted the rest of our hardwood forests to pine plantations."

Children Must Have Vision Checked

According To New State Law

Children entering school for the first time in Texas this year must have their vision checked.

The Sixty-sixth Texas Legislature passed the Children's Vision Screening Act of 1979. The purpose of the Act is to identify children who are in need of a professional eye examination to determine whether they are visually handicapped.

The statute requires that all children enrolling in any public, private, parochial or denominational school for the first time must have an eye examination by a licensed eye specialist or an approved vision screening test. The primary target group includes young children entering kindergarten or first grade, and students transferring into Texas schools from another state.

An advisory committee composed of ophthalmologists, optometrists, and public members

with children's visual problems has recommended, initially, that screening consist of tests for visual acuity. Basic recommendations were approved by the Texas Board of Health.

As a part of their preschool examination, a number of children will have already been visually screened; therefore, visual acuity tests that were used will be acceptable for first entry into school this year. After September 1, 1980, it will be expected that the basic visual acuity test and referral criteria will be utilized.

BEAUMONT—The Texas Real Estate License educational requirements will increase beginning Jan. 1, 1981, according to Alice Carter, Real Estate Coordinator at Lamar University.

For those interested in obtaining a salesperson license, the educational requirement is 12 semester hours and the broker's educational requirements is 15 semester hours," Carter said. "The increased requirement will be 21 semester hours for the salesperson and 36 semester hours for the broker's license. Every two years the requirements will increase until 1985 when the requirement will be 60 semester hours to satisfy the educational requirement for a license to sell real estate."

To earn a salesperson license, one must have a basic real estate course while approved courses and related courses may be accepted toward the requirements. For a broker's license the requirement is one basic real estate course and other real estate or approved business or related courses.

A three-hour seminar in Fair House is required for both licenses.

The Real Estate program at Lamar offers both day and night classes for those interested in a career in real estate. Day classes for the fall semester are Estate Principles and Practices, Marketing, Law and Appraisal, Investment, Current Trends and Problems and Development.

Night classes are Real Estate Principles and Practices, Marketing, Finance, Appraisal, Investment, Current Trends and Problems and Development.
