This should include law enforcement agencies, hospitals, doctors, Red Cross, personnel and representatives from area churches and schools.

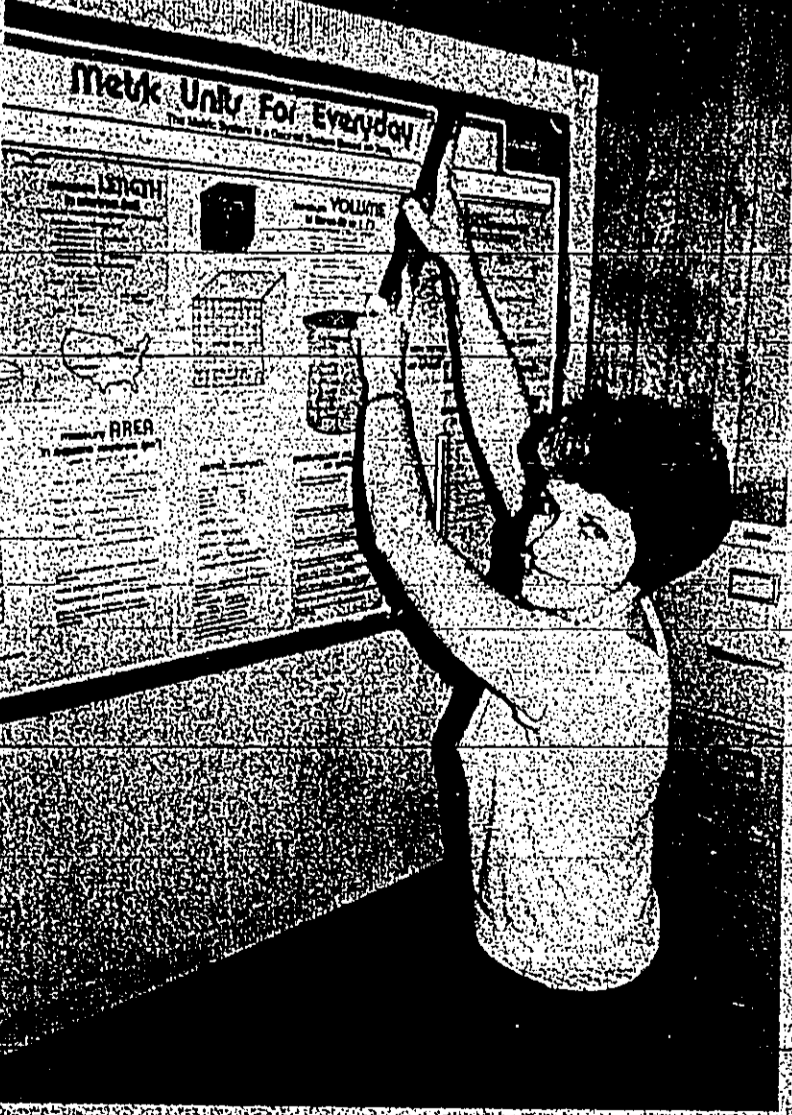

In other business, council agreed to have City Attorney Harry Stafford write a letter, to be signed by Mayor Doug Tolbert, to landowner Dr. R.B. Zoning Sought For City Growth

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the text of a prepared statement given by Doretta Gilchrist to Woodville City Council Monday, August 11.
 Your Honor, the Mayor, Members of the City Council:
 Those of us who are here in addition to those who could not be present but have indicated their support request that you pursue a proposition for zoning the City of Woodville. This request is not idly made. We are concerned because residential property in our areas, having been directly threatened just last year by low rent housing, is still open to threat from the intrusion of business.

It has been argued that the solution to this is restrictions written into our deeds. We submit that this is not a solution. It is no deterrent to the surrounding or adjacent properties, vacant or otherwise; for no restrictions are written into those deeds, nor is there a guarantee that there will be.
 In my immediate area, 4 1/2 years ago, N. Nellius was the only street, with approximately 10 houses and a small area of land leased to Bell Telephone Co.
 Today, this same area of the city has a new cross street, Timberland Dr., some 30 new homes, and several vacant areas of land upon which anything could be built if the owners so desired; even though our deeds have written restrictions.

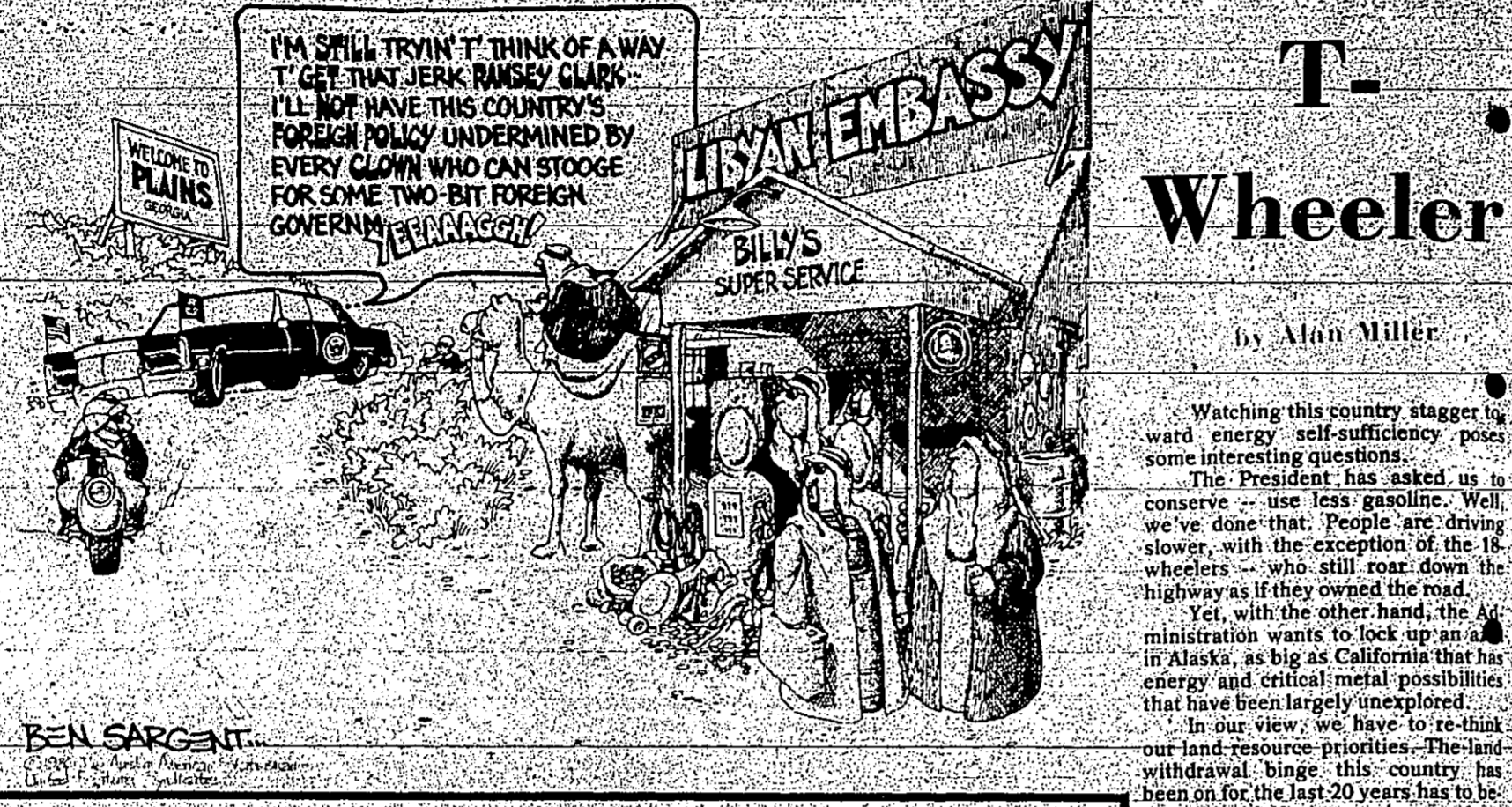
Bell Telephone has moved, but the property upon which it stood could, at any time, become a "hot" something, with the resultant traffic and business intrusion even worse than before.
 Which brings us to the matter of RIGHTS. Our Constitution is founded on the premise that good government provides the means whereby all citizens may exercise their rights of liberty and the pursuit of happiness.
 ZONING a town helps provide these rights by categorizing, so that the Homeowner has the right to live peacefully, unhampered by business, his vehicular traffic, and all the ills pursuant thereto, including danger to children at play.

The right of having his residential property values unencumbered by the lowering of these values were business to intrude in his area.
 The businessman has the right to conduct his business in an area unhampered by an intruding residential property owner.
 The right to conduct his business in an area where there is no constant worry over the safety of small children at play.
 The right to expand and enlarge his growing business, given the room to do so, without constant battles with surrounding residential property owners.
 Those who OPPOSE zoning will argue:
 A Homeowner who wishes to use his home for a business should be able to do so.
 The Businessman should have the right to set up his business anywhere he desires, having found a place.
 But, these arguments of the opposition destroy the rights of all, even the Homeowner.

The Homeowner wishing to use his home for a business must remember that the collective individual rights of those in his neighborhood supersede those of any one individual.
 The businessman's right to intrude into a residential area since thereby he destroys the rights of those around him as well as his own, he cannot possibly conduct his business without constant worries about safety, legal suits, rate owners, and the like.
 The City Government in the past has argued that zoning is not politically feasible.
 OR
 that it has been advised against zoning because it would be too hard and too expensive to do.
 OR— and reasons against, on and on.
 We submit that we must build on what we have.
 We cannot change what is there, but we can by zoning now, guarantee the area a chance for future growth by a more effective zoning ordinance.
 We submit that Woodville is not other towns, Woodville is itself, unique to itself in its needs and its people. Therefore, the success of such a project for Woodville.
 EITHER we desire strongly enough the best possible place in which to live, surrounding all odds to achieve it.
 OR we resign ourselves in apathetic complaining bitterness. And, someday hear our grandchildren ask: "But why on earth didn't they care enough to do something?"

Texas 2000 Plan

Early this year, Governor Clement announced a plan for the Texas 2000 Project. The purposes of the Texas 2000 are: (1) to address critical economic and population issues which will affect the future of the state; and (2) through state-wide cooperation to propose state responses to those issues. Part of the Texas 2000 plan is the commitment to a bipartisan effort to ensure an accurate 1980 census count for Texas.
 An accurate count is more than a matter of pride for Texans; millions of dollars in federal aid and new construction seats are at stake, said Clements.
 A state strategy, coordinated by Texas 2000, has been developed to strengthen the case for a good count at the local level and therefore for all of Texas. The main thrust of the coordinated state strategy rests on the legal right for the State of Texas to be

 Watching this country stagger in wars, energy, self-sufficiency poses some interesting questions.
 The President has asked us to conserve — use less gasoline. Well, we've done that. People are driving slower, with the exception of the 18-wheelers — who still roar down the highway as if they owned the road.
 Yet, with the other hand, the Administration wants to lock up an area in Alaska, as big as California that has energy and critical mineral possibilities that have been largely unexplored.
 In our view, we have to re-think our land resource priorities. The land withdrawal, being this country, has been on the books for 20 years, but has not been fully re-examined. We are sincere about creating a resource self-sufficiency in this country.
 And if we fail for the doomsday in Washington who admonish us to prepare for harder times, getting along with less, and accepting a rocky economic future for decades ahead, that is just what we're going to have.
 We should not accept the premise that things will be worse for our children and their children. This country still has great potential for economic development. We still have the latent brainpower to extend our technology into areas not yet explored, but if the restraints are lifted to let all of us get on with the job.
 The rest-of-the-world perceives us as a paper tiger, and we seem to have all but accepted the fact that we are powerless to do anything about it. It just isn't so. There are 220,000,000 of us here, and we can do anything that the only way from here is downhill.
 There is a solution to the energy crisis. We don't know what it is presently, but wringing our hands over it is not going to resolve it. Sure, they're a bunch of crazies over there. But surely there are sanctions we can impose that our allies would support, that will make them see that prolonging the hostage crisis is a no-win situation. The Cuban situation and the affairs of so many nations in Latin America has to be stopped. For too long we have treated that area of our hemisphere as a bunch of banana republics with no governmental stability. Why not make their needs and concerns a top priority of American foreign policy for a change, instead of worrying whether Indira Gandhi in India is cozying up to the Russians?
 The energy and resource potential of North and South America is boundless. Yet, we want to lock up half of Alaska, and wring our hands over our neighbors to the South.
 Even in the Western United States, federal policy is stalling exploration for natural gas and petroleum, as more and more acres (billions of acres in fact) are being sold, and locked up.
 The government owns the majority of standing softwood timber in the West; yet their out-dated management policies permit it to die on the stump, denying its use as a fiber resource, and preventing the re-planting of those areas to keep them in perpetual production.
 Solar energy, synfuels, galactation — they're all buzz words that the Administration offers as our hope for the future.
 We would be a heck of a lot better off utilizing the resources we have now, which are available, so that available, and let the people in the search and development labs work out their exotic formulae for our energy sources in the next century.
 Frankly we can't wait for the buzz word energy sources — our energy problems are right now.

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Early Childhood Class Geared To Disabled

In an effort to improve the quality and scope of services offered to disabled children and their families, the Early Childhood Class of the Tyler County Special Education Cooperative is providing preschool educational services for three to five year old children that are found to be developmentally handicapped.
 This program strives to help children who have not acquired developmental skills compatible with their chronological age due to one or more of the following: handicapping conditions; autism; mental retardation; visual handicap; deaf or severely hard of hearing; physical handicap; emotional disturbance; learning disabilities; or speech handicaps. Observation of such a child might reveal characteristics such as awkward body movements; slow development of speech; protruding tongue; abnormal drooling; or an inability to play with toys. Parents who suspect that their child may be developing differently from other children may refer them to the Special Education Co-op office in Colmesneil at 837-2225. Referrals should be made by calling the Tyler County Special Education Superintendent.

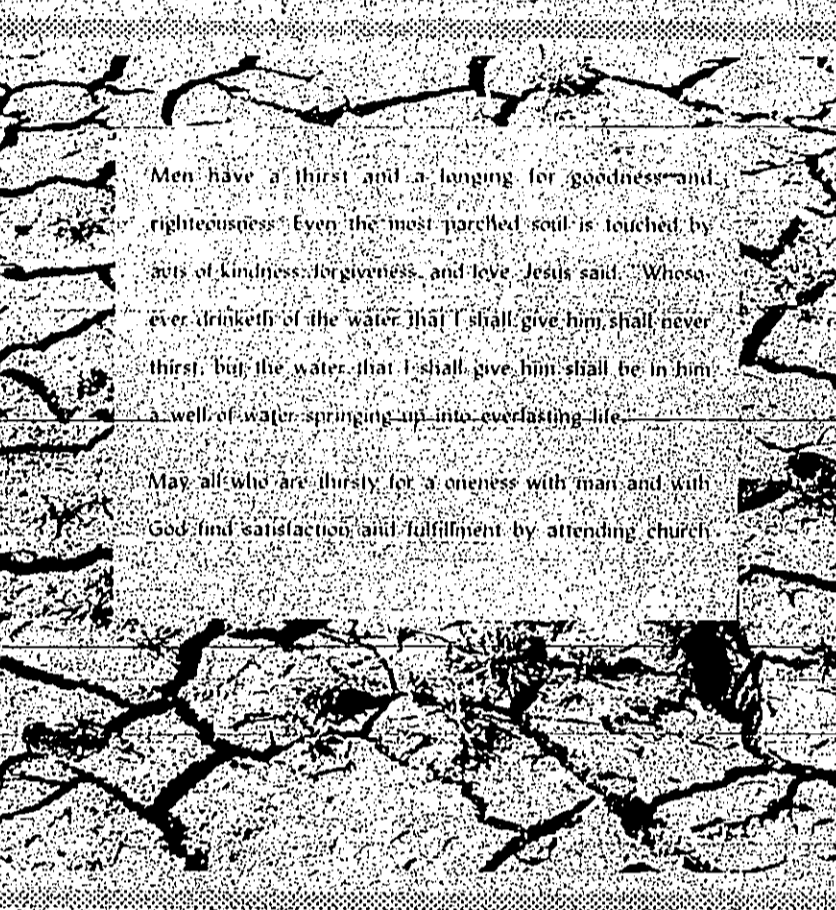

Linnam, school superintendent. Pre-school registration for all senior high school students new to Woodville Public Schools, or who attended Woodville schools last year but failed to register before the end of school in May, should register now at the principal's office in the Woodville High School Building, Junior high school students new to Woodville should register the week of August 18-22 at the junior high principal's office on the high school campus. Students in Grades K-3 who are new to the Woodville schools may enroll August 25 at the principal's office at the Wheat school building. Grades 4-6 may enroll at the old Kirby Annex, 505 North Charlton. All new First Grade students and all Kindergarten students should also report to the Wheat school building for enrollment on Monday, August 25, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Wednesday, August 27, will be the first day school buses will operate. Pupils who register in Kindergarten or First Grade will be given birth certificates in order to establish eligibility for registration. Pupils new to the Woodville schools should have grade and credit records, as well as vaccination and health information from previously attended schools, ready at registration.

Grid Tickets Now On Sale



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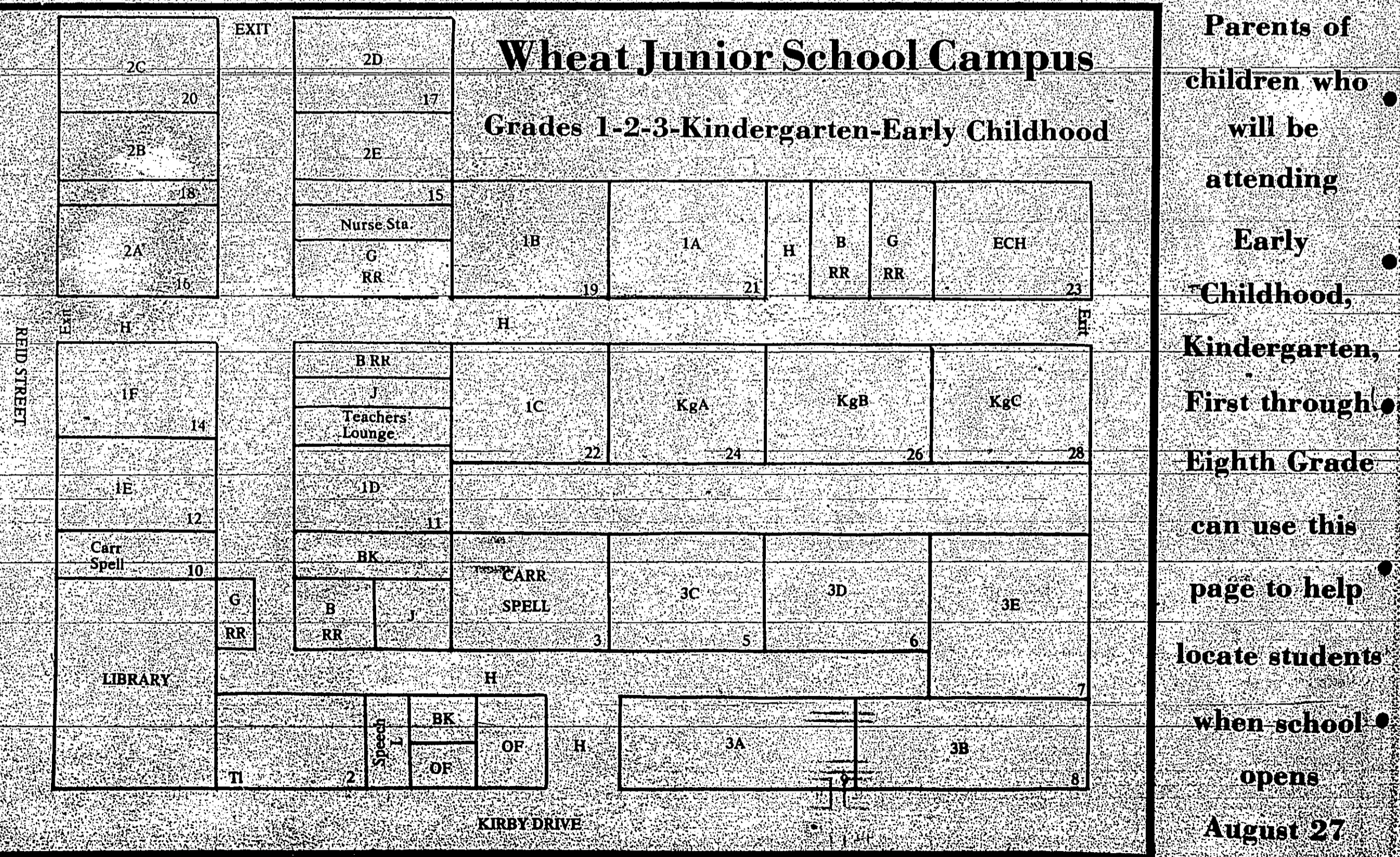
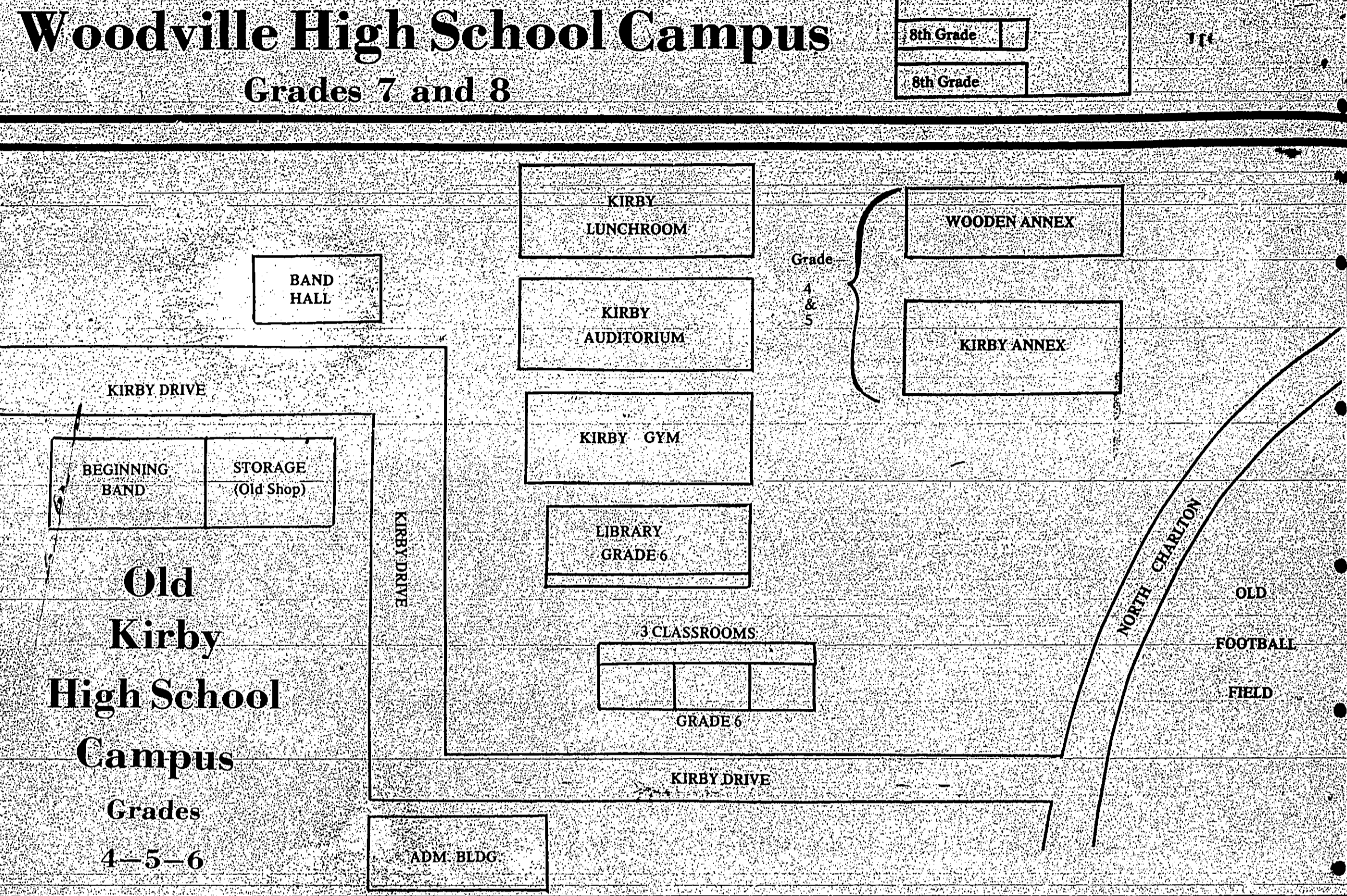

Contracts Needed On Hunt Leases

DALLAS - With hunting season drawing near, many Texas hunters are trying to find a hunting lease. For those interested in a place or hunt deer, turkey, quail or dove, it is not too soon to locate a lease. In fact, it may be too late for some choice areas. According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, a hunter should not assume he can hunt the same place he hunted last year without a written lease. Many will be looking this year, and they will be willing to pay the price for a good lease. Generally, there are four different types of lease agreements: landowners protection, year-round, limited duration, and limited duration with privileges. On all what is leased along with species and are made by the name and address a group of hunters, of the landowner or his devisee. The lease should also be included in the agreement as well as the provisions spelled out. The document should also cover any game reports the landowner may require. In some instances, the landowner may furnish extras like cabins, electricity, water, vehicles, blinds, guides or other services. The contract should be recorded in county records and is binding on the landowner should he decide to sell his property. To carry protection a step further, an agreement should be signed by all hunters before the lease. Although this need not be a legal document, it should include the names and addresses of all hunters in the group and guidelines for the safety of the group and proper conservation of the wildlife. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recommends that all hunters complete the Texas Voluntary Hunter Safety Training Program. It is an eight-hour course instructing proper handling of firearms, hunter ethics and basics of first aid, survival and care of game.

Dove Season Dates Set

AUSTIN - The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at a public meeting in Austin Wednesday adopted hunting seasons and bag limits for mourning and white-winged doves under a two-zone arrangement as in the past.

The North Zone mourning dove season will be Sept. 1 - Oct. 3, 1980. The straight 60-day season represents a change from the split season used last year.

For mourning doves in the South Zone, the season dates will be Sept. 20 - Nov. 2, 1980 and Jan. 3-18, 1981.

The white-winged dove season dates are Sept. 6-7 and 13-14 in Brewster, Camerton, Culberson, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Kinney, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy and Zapata Counties.

In South Zone counties having an open season on white-winged doves, the fall season for mourning doves will end Oct. 29, 1980. In counties which have days with concurrent white-winged and mourning dove hunting in either zone, the legal shooting time for those days is noon to sunset.

In all other counties in both zones, shooting hours are one half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Dove hunting Program Leader Jim Dunks advised the commission that the split hunting

season, for mourning doves in the North Zone has received opposition from some hunters who contend that they are penalized by having the winter season. The winter season in the North Zone will remain controversial, but it appears that the straight season will appeal to the majority of hunters, Dunks said.

In adopting the two-zone alignment, the commission set aside a proposal to establish a three-zone setup after reviewing written and verbal objections. The three-zone plan would have set a later than Sept. 1 opening for a large portion of North and Central Texas and would have combined the Trans-Pecos region with the Rio Grande Valley in the same zone. Objections to the three-zone plan were strong from sportsmen in San Antonio and El Paso areas.

As was the case last dove season, one fully-feathered wing must be retained on all dressed dove carcasses in all of the South Zone at all times, and counties of the North Zone which have a concurrent white-winged and mourning dove season.

The North Zone is comprised of Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches and Shelby Counties, and all coun-

ties to the north and west. The South Zone includes all counties to the south and east.

Bag limits for mourning and white-winged doves will remain unchanged from last year at 10 per day, 20 in possession. Hunters may take a limit of each species during the white-wing season in counties offering a white-wing season.

The commission also set the early teal duck season for all teal species for Sept. 13-21, 1980, with shooting hours from sunrise to sunset. Bag limit will be four per day in the aggregate. The possession limit eight in the aggregate.

The rail and gallinule season will be Sept. 1 - Nov. 9, 1980, with shooting hours from one half hour before sunrise to sunset. The daily bag limit on large rails (king and clapper) will be 15 in the aggregate per day, possession limit 30 in the aggregate. The daily bag limit on small rails (sora and Virginia) will be 25 in the aggregate per day, possession limit 25 in the aggregate. The gallinule limits will be 15 per day, possession limit 30.

County Extension Report

By CLINTON CURRIE, County Extension Agent

Keeping the yard and garden in good shape during the hot summer weather while at the same time keeping the water bill in check can be a challenge for any homeowner. Using proper watering techniques helps.

While watering depends on many factors, such as weather, soil condition, plant type and rate of growth, and the method of application, the key is to get water to plant roots and to keep it there.

To begin, don't try to follow a set schedule for watering, such as every two days or three times a week. Instead, learn to recognize soil and plant conditions which indicate dryness and the need for water.

Also, when you do water, water thoroughly until the ground is wet several inches deep. This promotes deep rooting and increases drought tolerance. Sprinkling the garden every evening is usually not adequate since most people don't have the patience to stand in one
