## For Hurricane Evacuees County Readies Disaster Plan

"We're the ones that are doing the begging," said Jefferson County Disaster Coordinator L.D. Farrow who was invited by Austin Fuller, civil defense coordinator, to attend a meeting last Thursday called hurriedly as a result of the near-miss Hurricane Allen which prompted county officials to call in experts to help Tyler County serve as a "host" county in case of a mass evacuation.

With some 32 Tyler County people in attendance, Fuller asked Farrow to attend in order to describe what the impact of a mass exodus from the Jefferson County and lowline coastline area would be. Fuller said

he wanted the Tyler County community to be prepared. As the meeting was in progress, persons were reminded that tropical depression "Bonnie" was currently forming in the gulf.

"We're way past due for another big one," said County Judge Allen Sturrock, "and this time we're going to be ready. We don't want it, we don't like it, but it's just about due."

Representatives from the County Firefighters Association were present and volunteered to help direct traffic in each of their communities and would also make available their radio communications systems to form a voice network during a storm, according to Paul Massart, of Spurger, president of the county-wide group.

Farrow called Jefferson County an "exporting" county, while Tyler County would be an "importing" county. He said that main roads north would be converted to double-lane one-way north at the third stage of the evacuation process.

Farrow said that persons were not running from the wind but were running from the water. He said that 99 percent of the death rate in a hurricane is due to drowning.

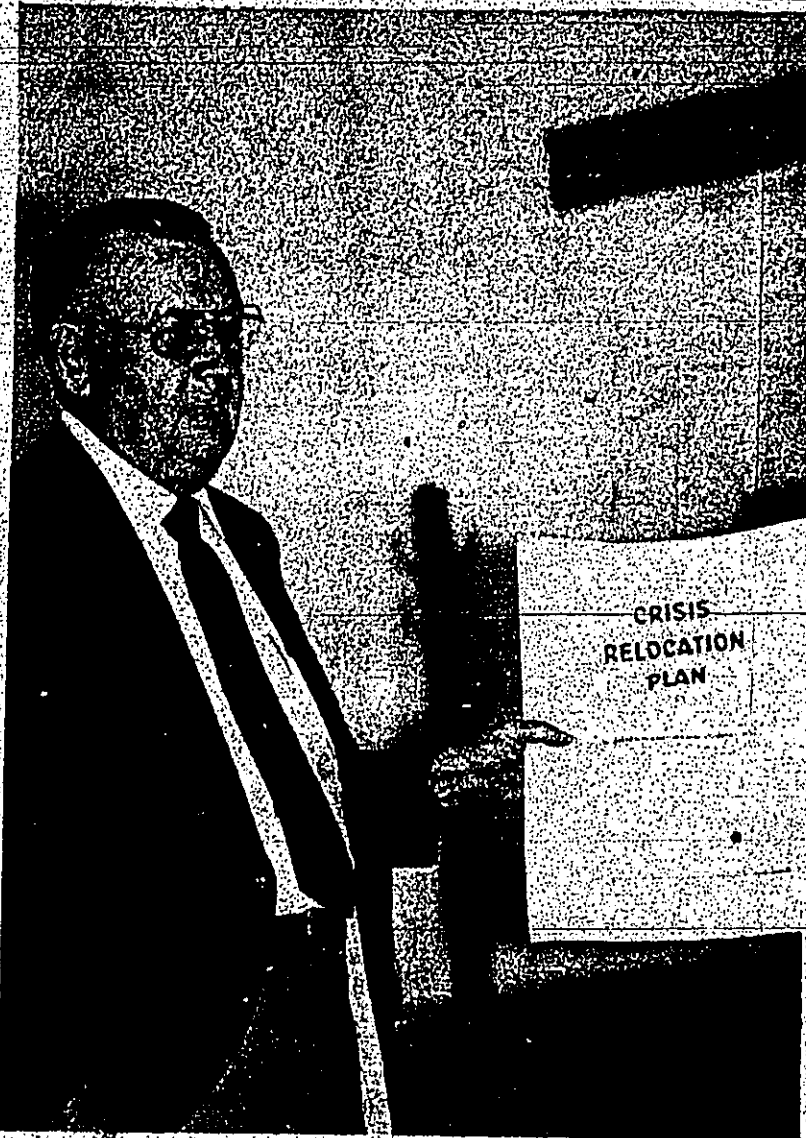
Farrow said that there was basically one plan which emphasized evacuating persons at Sabine Pass first and then there was only one route north, he said. They'll use buses and trucks along with shelters where, he said, "We expect you to be uncomfortable but we expect you to be safe."

"We'll have emergency traffic going south."

Farrow identified the Warren bridge overpass as a great hindrance and bottleneck in case of a mass exodus.

In referring to previous storms, "We don't have more people this time but we have more cars."

No date was set for a future meeting of the group, but according to Fuller, a comprehensive plan will be written for Tyler County as the "host" county for disaster evacuees. "Just keep the plan simple as you can," Farrow said, "during a crisis there's not a lot of time to read."

## Elevator: \$100,000 & Up!

Tyler County Commissioners wrestled with the problem Monday of how to convey elderly and handicapped persons to the second and third floors of the county courthouse.

With projected costs for an elevator system of \$100,000, commissioners are faced with again the problem of waiting to act on the matter with construction costs rising daily or proceeding with the project, if they can find the dollars.

According to Don Cole of A/E Project Management Services in Woodville, who illustrated the possible location of an elevator with preliminary drawings, found the commissioners differing in preferences as to where the elevator shaft should be located.

Cole said, "I don't think a band-aid approach is going to be acceptable for the future." He also said that some aspects of the project were like "trying to stuff 10 pounds of potatoes into

a 5-pound bag."

The court, which recessed for several minutes while Cole took them on a walking tour, discovered some of the problem areas and the solutions which would result with the installation of an elevator.

Cole indicated that once rough preliminary drawings could be agreed upon by the court that bids could be solicited for the project as early as October.

## Airport Terminal To Be Completed

Tyler County Commissioners met in special session Friday and agreed to finish the airport terminal at the Tyler County Airport, closed the bid process on renovation for the handicapped restrooms for the tax assessor-collector's office and heard a presentation from a representative of a Lufkin certified public accounting firm seeking to perform the county's audit work.

Commissioner Maxie Riley said that only a few items remained to be completed at the airport, including

installation of a septic tank, water lines and bathroom facilities. On a motion by Riley and seconded by Commissioner Kenneth Lowe, the court decided "to spend whatever was necessary to complete the building."

Representing the CPA firm of Alex and Rod of Lufkin Lynn Mootes presented to the court a \$16-\$18,000 estimate of costs for an outside audit which has to be performed to qualify for revenue sharing requirements. The court tabled action on hiring the firm until the next regular meeting.

The court formally closed bidding, since no bids were received, and will "go out and negotiate" with a contractor to convert a restroom for the handicapped in the tax assessor-collector's office.

In other business, the court approved paying of bills for the month of July.

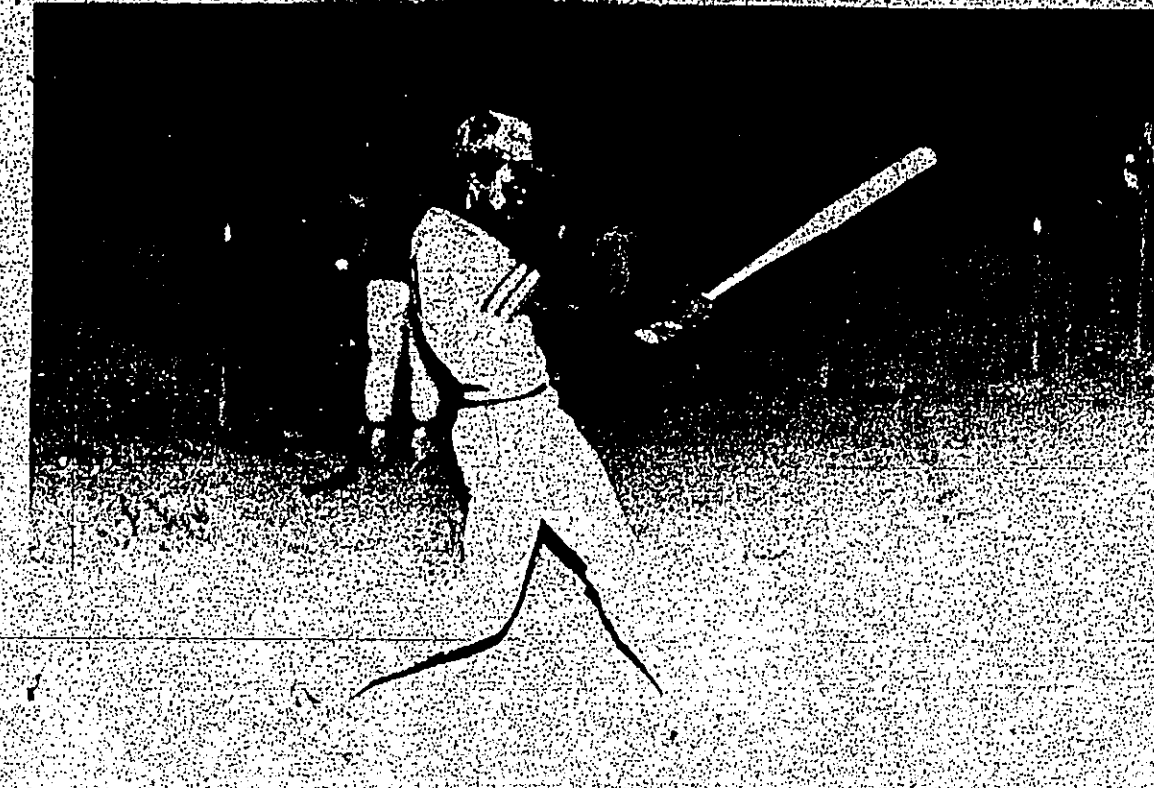

## Crepe Myrtle Perfect For East Texas

so long, and demand so little.

Like watermelons to the East, crepe and homemade ice myrtles have been a Southern tradition since colonial days. Signals of summertime are thousands of harvested out of homesteads.

Across the South, and overgrown cemeteries, crepe myrtle is "back country roads" are marked for full beauty and Southern charm to the long specimens of this hot summer flowering tree can offer so much for.

The crepe myrtle is possibly the most popular small flowering tree for a landscape use in our area. It is the case of propagation long flowering period freedom from most insects and diseases, and its ability to grow under color to the landscape. The crepe myrtle stands alone with its abundance of colorful blossoms.

Early records on the crepe myrtle date back to the mid-1700s. The plant first became known to English gardens, then made its way to our country about 1800.

Older varieties are generally red, pink, lavender or white. Red color is known by most every gardener. Today, however, there are many new varieties that enhance landscape plantings. Plant breeders have developed many new colors: brilliant red, pale pink, bright pink, and even bicolors like one named "Peppermint Stick".

Resistance to powdery mildew is also being inbred into the new varieties.

100 days as it bears its colorful blossoms for a period of some three months. During the hot, dry days of summer when most plants are barely stretching to 12 inches. Some of these new miniature types are ideal for hanging baskets and containers.

Crepe myrtles belong in every landscape. They provide a long season of color, but don't forget their colorful fall foliage.

And then there is the unusual peeling bark so distinctive in the winter when the plants are bare.

The needs of the crepe myrtle are few indeed. The crepe myrtle needs a sunny location to flower well. Because it flowers on new growth pruning in late winter prior to new growth will insure more blooms.

Water it generously and deeply. Fertilize it once or twice a year with a balanced fertilizer. Prune off old flowers if you want to encourage new flowering shoots for late summer. And, finally, water it for the occasional powdery mildew problem.

So, you see, you really can't lose with crepe myrtles. They are a tried and proven friend in our garden.

If you don't have crepe myrtle enhancing your landscape, stop by your local nursery now while the plants are in flower, and pick out several in containers for immediate planting.

They will reward you for many years to come.

## Nearby Cities Featured

Nacogdoches, and San Augustine, the oldest cities in East Texas, are featured in the September Historic Homes section of "Texas Homes." The article is part of a series focusing on the state's rich historic heritage, and both these towns contain homes exemplifying the three main categories of 19th-century East Texas architecture: Greek Revival, Victorian and early East Texas.

Architecturally, the wealth of antique buildings that sprinkle the town create a living history dating from the late 18th century. "Texas Homes" focuses on two outstanding restorations: the Adolphus Sterne Historic Zone and the Roland Jones house.

San Augustine, 35 miles to the east, has dramatic, sophisticated architecture influenced by Southern heritage. "Texas Homes" selected the Matthew Cartwright home as an outstanding example of Greek Revival architecture.

Because the area was the major port to Texas for many years, it abounds in historical and architecturally significant structures.

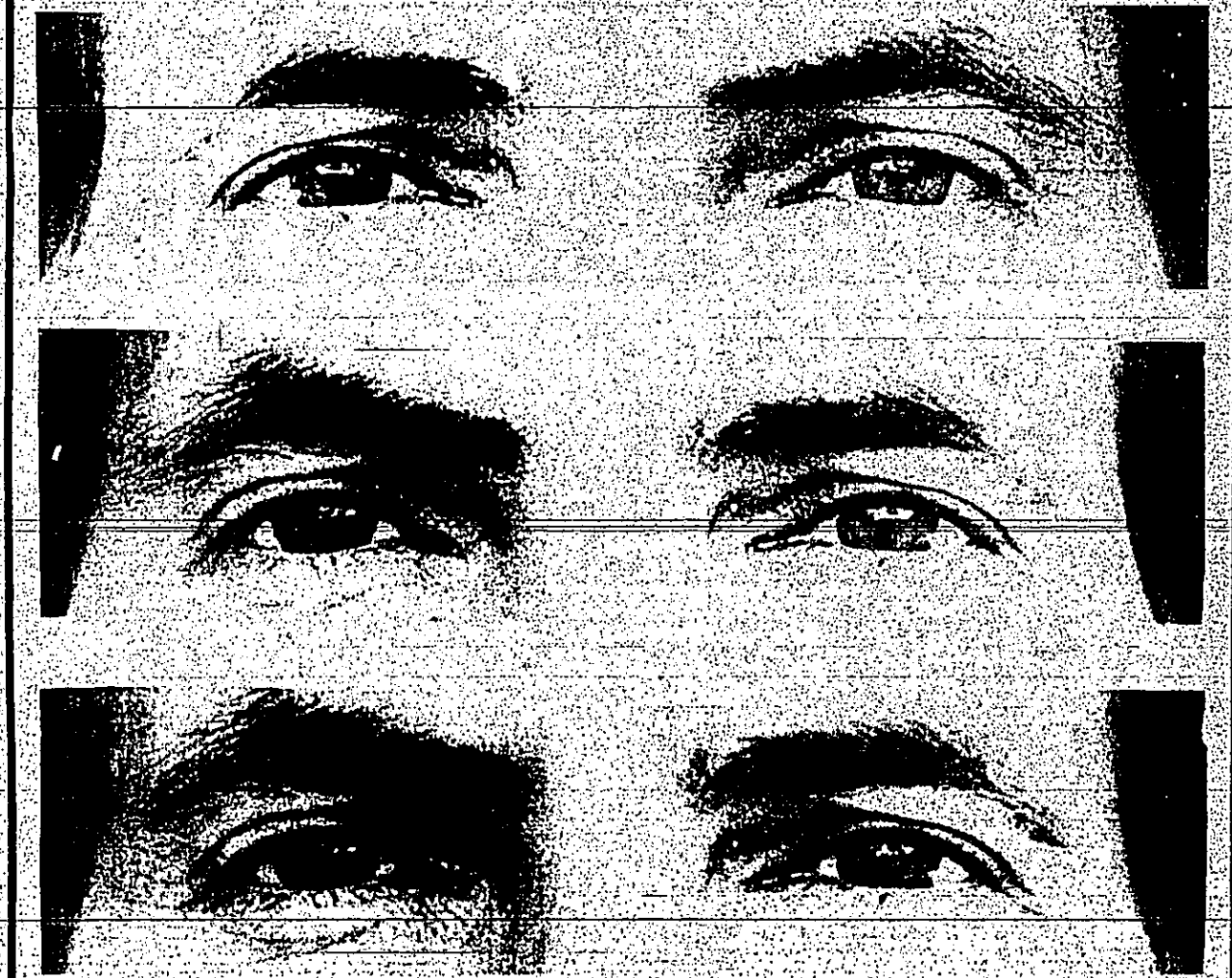

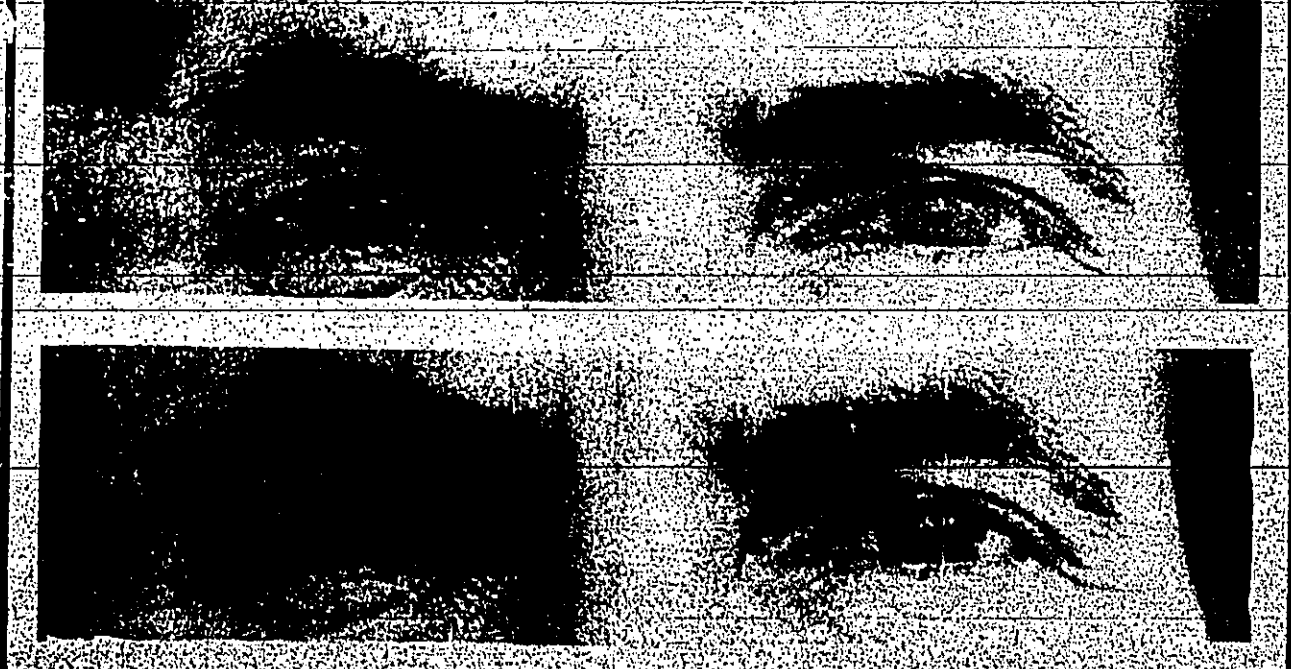

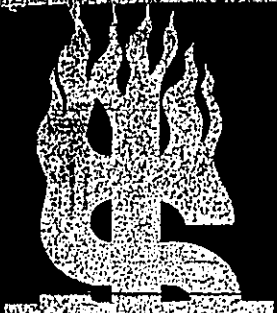

CONROE, Texas landowners purchased almost 26 million trees from the Texas Forest Service for planting during the 1979-80 planting season. Landowners bought the one-year-old seedlings for use in reforestation projects in the commercial timber producing regions of Texas and for windbreak plantings in Central, South and West Texas.

The Texas Forest Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System, doesn't sell trees for ornamental or landscaping use. Most of the 25.5 million pine seedlings sold by the Forest Service last year were used to convert idle or understocked land into productive forest and to replant recently harvested land.

In Southeast Texas, landowners in Newton County purchased the largest number of pine seedlings, some 1.1 million. Tyler County landowners bought 626,000 seedlings, and Hardin County landowners purchased 533,000. Montgomery County landowners led South Central Texas in pine seedling sales with 138,000, while Grimes and Waller county property owners bought 94,450 and 74,050 seedlings, respectively.

In the Lost Pines region landholders in Colorado County led the way with 24,100 seedlings purchased. Windbreak seedling sales last year totaled \$199,525. These seedlings were used by landowners to establish natural wind barriers around their homes, pastures and crops.

Although production at Indian Mound Nursery has been drastically reduced for 1980-81 to improve soil conditions, more than 28 million pine and 250,000 windbreak seedlings will be available to private landowners from the Texas Forest Service this winter.

**Use Fire Resistant Boxes, Safes**

**COLLEGE STATION**—Buy fire resistant boxes and safes to protect valuable papers in case of fire, advises Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist. The typical lock box for filling cabinets won't burn, but the paper inside will char at 400 to 420 degrees F. and burn to ashes at 450 degrees F., she explains.

Mrs. McCormack is with the Texas agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Fire-resistant lock boxes and safes are designed to prevent such losses, she points out. However, they won't stop a burglar since some are easily carried, but they will safeguard valuables against any home fire.

**How They Work**—These resistant containers protect their contents with steam essentially, the specialist explains. Water is incorporated in the insulation which turns to steam when exposed to high temperatures of fire, an action that

absorbs a tremendous amount of heat. As steam forms between the walls of the container, it is released through seams or holes to the outside, forming a protective halo around the box. The contents are kept well below the charring point, Mrs. McCormack continues. All fire-resistant boxes and safes are effective for only one fire because the moisture is used up and cannot be replaced. Besides, the door or top is usually jammed shut by heat expansion and must be pried open.

**Selection**—U.S. manufactured fire-resistant safes and insulated

record containers carry an Underwriters Laboratories (UL) label, indicating they have been tested and results verified as to withstanding extreme temperatures for fire endurance and stress. Models are also on the market from other countries that do not carry the U.L. label, the specialist adds.
