

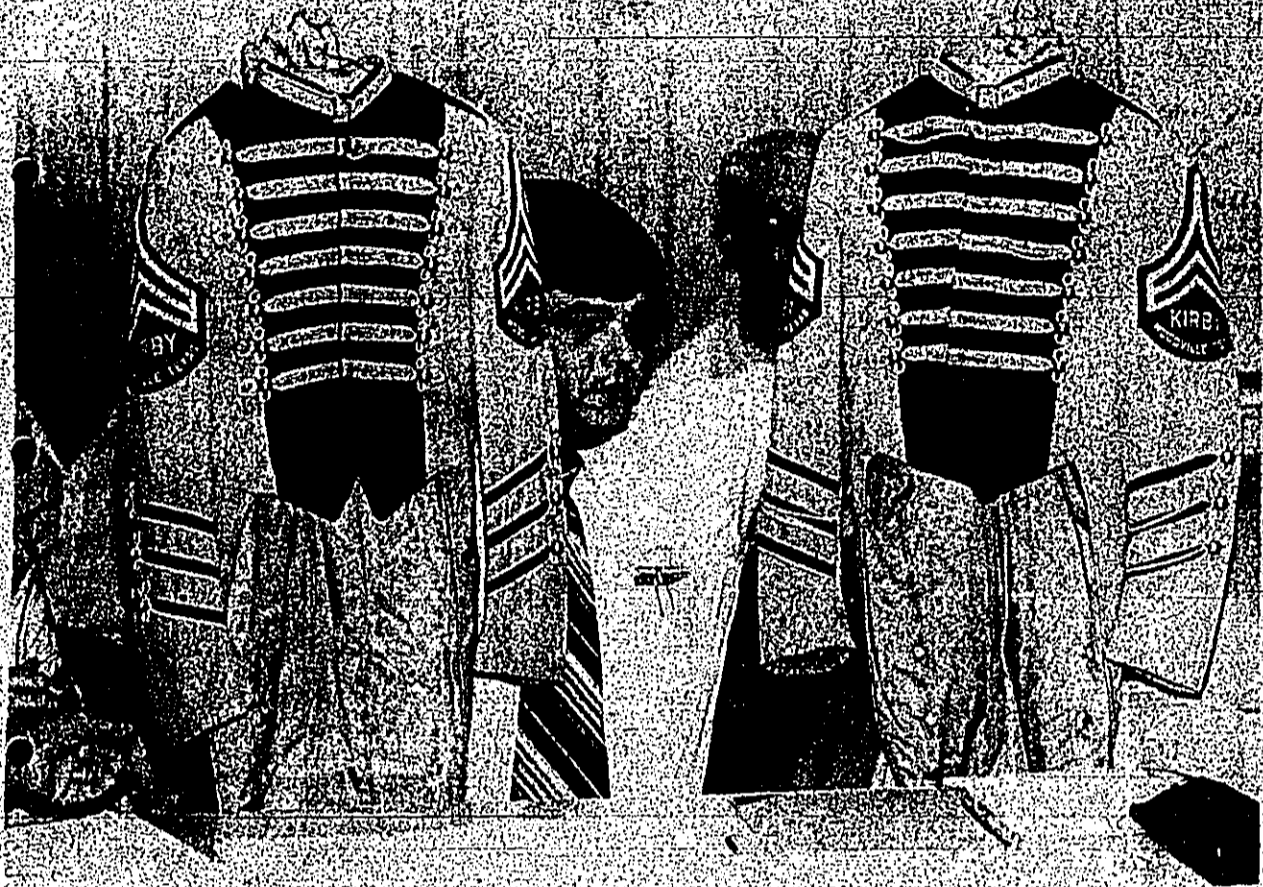

NEED NEW THREADS - Band Director Barry Johnson brought some examples of the Woodville Marching Band uniforms that are in serious need of repair. Johnson suggested

to the board that they consider replacing the 10-year-old uniforms with new ones and the board agreed to solicit for bids for new uniforms for the "Top AA Band in the State."

Board Adopts Budget

The Woodville Independent School Board of trustees met in regular session Tuesday, August 19, and voted to adopt both a new and amended school budget for the coming year.

In other action, the board formally adopted the same tax rate for the coming year as in 1979 at \$1 per 100 valuation with 65 cents of that dollar used for maintenance and operating funds while 35 cents would be used to retire the district's bonded indebtedness.

The other discussion, the board heard school architect Jack Stansbury report with a detailed estimate of the damage by fire of the Woodville Elementary School. Stansbury estimated the replacement value to be around \$913,145.

The board acted to remove the insurance coverage on the old Scott School campus excepting the coverage on the Canada Gymnasium which the district will still use for auxiliary sports events and activities. The remaining portion of the campus is in the process of being leased to a group which will use the facility for a Nutrition Center.

Band Director Barry Johnson requested and received approval for the district to go out for bids for new uniforms for the 130 band members in

the Woodville High Marching Band. The uniforms which will cost approximately \$200 each, and when included with other band member requirements, the district price will be approximately \$27,750. Companies who specialize in fabrication of the ornate uniforms will be solicited for bids "as soon as possible" so the band can attend a special Texas Musicians Educators Association Contest in February.

Johnson asked the board to approve the band's excursion to San Antonio to perform in the gala event and invited board members to attend.

The band was recently selected as the best AA Band in Texas.

Johnson's request for uniform replacement was based on the fact, he said, that they were "over 10 years old, ill fitting and close up they look real bad."

The board approved the solicitation of bids for the new uniforms and the extended trip to San Antonio for the band to participate in the state concert.

In other board business, the trustees acted to hire J.D. Spurlock to serve as a night watchman for the district campuses at \$4.75 per hour. This action was taken as a result of the recent fire to the Woodville Elementary School.

The board also voted to continue participation in the Region V Media Center and hired the firm of Weaver and Smith as the District's Certified Public Accounting firm.

The following is the text of a letter complimenting the district on its band:

I am sure by now you have heard that your Woodville High School Band, directed by Barry Johnson and Russell Cronin, has been named the best AA Band in Texas. This is the highest honor that can be awarded a musical organization in Texas. This would be the same in the football scene as winning the Class AA State Football Championship.

How fortunate you are to have directors of the quality as Barry Johnson and Russell Cronin. I understand that there is no private teaching in your school system. To have won this honor in competition with many schools that do enjoy private instruction only proves that a program of an unusually high quality is alive and well in your district.

Linam Quits School Post

Woodville Independent School Board Trustees accepted the resignation of School Superintendent Tom P. Linam August 23 at 7 p.m. in a special called meeting and in related action voted to "turn over school board investigation materials" to the district attorney's office for further study.

The board, which was unanimous in all three motions which included the naming of Aubrey Bradley as Acting Superintendent, say they are not under the gun to hire a new man immediately.

Board members would not comment on the nature of material which "was to be referred" to the District Attorney's office by W.I.S.D. Attorney John Kinney.

Linam was called Tuesday by the Booster for comment on his resignation, and he said, "I don't have any plans right now. I've been offered several jobs. I just made up my mind to resign Saturday night."

According to Dr. R.E. Swearingen, "We couldn't be at a worse time hunting a superintendent, but we've got a good man in the position now, we are fortunate to have a man with Mr. Bradley's experience helping us out at this time."

According to Swearingen, Bradley has been with the W.I.S.D. for the past six years, as Director of Special Services. Prior to that, he was employed by the Chester Independent School District from 1961 to 1974 as Superintendent and before that he served as principal, teacher and coach.

Bradley has earned his Bachelor of Science Degree from Sam Houston State University along with his Master of Education Degree from the same school.

"I wasn't expecting this," Bradley said. "I'll do whatever I think I can to fill this job until the board finds the person with the right criteria for the position."

Col. Jim Adams, director of the DPS, said Labor Day, the last holiday of summer, becomes the most powerful storm ever to enter the state during this 78-hour period.

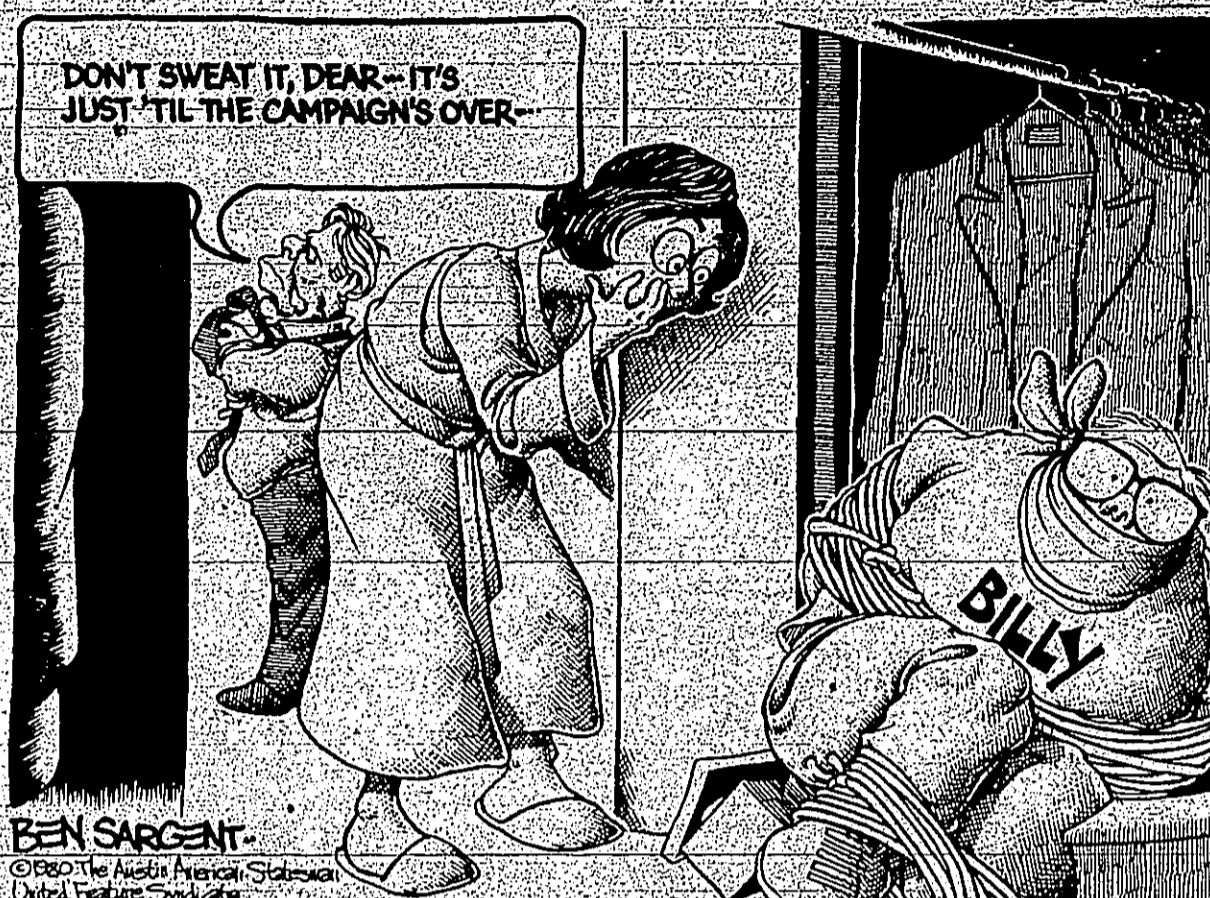
Consumer Alert

The second reason price gouging was not widespread is that the few who might be tempted to engage in such practices know that under Texas law the penalties are stiff for those who are caught. The Deceptive Trade Practices and Consumer Protection Act prohibits unconscionable acts or practices, one of which is price gouging. Anyone found liable under this statute not only is subject to a \$10,000 fine, but also must pay back any money in excess of the amount normally charged for the goods sold. Furthermore, the persons found liable are liable for the costs of the suit, and in some cases, attorneys' fees.

The fact is, however, that royalty owners are taxed under the windfall profits legislation exactly like the major oil producers, with no regard for the size of their holding or the source of their oil.

In my mind there are two reasons why price-gouging was not as widespread as initially feared: First, a good school board and a town that during our investigations of the county, we found repeated instances of south Texas merchants lending a helping hand to those who were pre-paring for the storm by keeping their stores open on a 24-hour schedule, hiring additional personnel to handle the crowds of purchasers, and in some instances, selling goods at cost to insure that all who needed supplies had them. In other words, we found the Texas tradition of being a good neighbor alive and well.

CETA Plan Will Provide New Jobs

AUSTIN -- The Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) announced recently that it will launch a major campaign this fall promoting a partnership between business and government to create employment opportunities in over 100 Texas counties of which Tyler County is scheduled as a participating county.

The campaign is part of a new collaborative effort known as the Private Sector Initiative Program created by Title VII of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). Since 80% of all jobs lie in the private sector, TDCA executive director Sid Wieser noted in making the announcement, "business support is crucial in helping solve employment problems."

Using the theme "Workin' Partnership CETA's Enterprising Idea for Texas Employers," the TDCA campaign will encourage business and industry to hire and train eligible workers. "The goal of the program," Wieser said, "is to bring unemployed and underemployed into the mainstream of the work force. Equipping workers with marketable skills will allow them mobility in the private job market and the chance to become self-sufficient."

"This can mean less reliance on government support systems, which in turn benefits all tax-paying residents of Texas," Wieser continued. The partnership is also designed to be responsive to business needs in training and jobs programs, according to Bud Harris, director of TDCA Manpower Services Division.

If a CETA employee qualifies under certain guidelines, Harris explained, the employer can be reimbursed up to 50 percent of the worker's wages for training costs. In addition, if the employee qualifies under one of seven specially targeted groups, such as Viet Nam veterans or the handicapped, the business could qualify for additional tax credits.

"We want to make businesses aware of the local nature of this program," Harris said. He explained that the federal funds are locally administered in the 100-plus counties under TDCA sponsorship. The counties are divided into 15 geographic areas each with a local entity to administer funds.

"This allows more efficient use of the monies," he said, "since a local body has good knowledge of its area's needs." "Moreover, private business has a lot to do with the use of these funds," he continued. "A state Private Industry Council, composed in the majority of business people, creates the major link between government and business. And each area has its own Private Industry Task Force to represent the business community."

"This is one of the few times," Harris added, "that business can have a direct say in how a federal program is run which affects them."

"What makes this program really viable," Harris said, "is that workers are trained according to local business standards for real work situations in the marketplace. The ultimate goal is long-term unsubsidized employment in the competitive job market."

"This is one program that is not just a stop-gap measure," Harris stated. "It is a real opportunity to prepare a great many people, from the school drop-out to the displaced homemaker, to be permanent, tax-paying members of the working community."

"Our sponsorship, one of several in the state, covers counties and towns with populations of less than 100,000," Harris concluded. "There are hundreds of businesses in these areas, ranging from small retail opera-

tions to large manufacturers. We hope to express the program's benefits to as many as we can."

The "Workin' Partnership" campaign kicks off in September with print and film materials to reach local employers and business leaders, and community wide public service announcements.

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Hot Weather Controlling Beetles

LUFKIN -- While the hot weather is causing untold damage to crops and livestock across Texas, there are some beneficial side effects. High temperatures are controlling the southern pine beetle, a major destructive pest of the East Texas pine forests.

"The prolonged high temperatures are keeping the southern pine beetle at very low levels this summer," said Dr. Ron Billings, principal entomologist for the Texas Forest Service. "No beetle spots have been reported on privately-owned forest and during aerial surveys over East Texas in June and July. Some beetle activity has been reported on the Day Rocket National forest near Ratcliff and the Four Notch Wildlife area in the Sam Houston Forest near Huntsville."

"Even if we do get enough rain to lower the daytime temperatures, we won't see much of the beetle until late fall," Dr. Billings said.

In 1976, the southern pine beetle killed more than 50 million cubic feet of pine tim-

ber in East Texas. It has a 6- to 8-year cycle. "We are apparently in their down, or non-active cycle," but the was reported in 1978 and will be back," he warned. "Historical data indicates that pine bee-
