## Open Hearing Set On Zoning

"We're giving them the chance to tell us what we want to want," said City Attorney Josiah Wheat at Monday's City Council meeting in considering the upcoming open public hearing on Tuesday, Oct. 7, at 7 p.m., designed, the council said, to glean public preferences "for or against" a comprehensive zoning ordinance here.

A report by the zoning consideration committee, headed by Councilman Dr. Jim Jinnette produced a two-point statement, which Jinnette read, indicating that the committee would: 1 - attempt to use the media to educate the public about zoning; then, 2 - after the material is presented to the public, then reevaluate the need for zoning.

Jinnette said his committee conducted an "open and thorough" meeting on August 21 and came up with those two proposals.

In the meeting Monday, however, council acted more specifically by actually setting a formal pre-hearing date on Oct. 7. "Plugging in, in advance an extra hearing to the other two that will be required by law," Wheat said.

According to Councilman Kenneth George, Woodville's DETCOG representative, the city may be entitled to state and federal grant money to conduct a formal zoning study.

According to City Engineer Dave Purrell, "I would strongly suggest

that the city draw a tentative ordinance and base it on the suggestions of real estate people in the community and civic and business leaders."

"The question to be asked of the public," according to Mayor Doug Tolbert, "is would you generally be in favor of zoning in the city of Woodville?"

City Attorney Wheat told the council that it was his recommendation that if the city did adopt such a zoning condition that a Zoning Board of Adjustment be appointed to handle the

various appeals which might arise. Councilman John Gilchrist, who said Monday night that he was in favor of the zoning idea, initiated the motion to call the open hearing on Oct. 7. That action was seconded by Councilman George who said he "wasn't sure just yet."

According to Doretta Gilchrist, who first presented the proposal in the form of a written prepared statement which she read before council at the last regular meeting, said at Monday's meeting "I agree that everybody needs to want it."

## Budget Increase Sought

Woodville City Fathers soon plan to adopt a proposed budget for 1981 which calls for a \$20-\$30,000 increase over the previous years budget total of \$1,201,000.

According to City Manager Wall Davis, who reviewed the proposal for council Monday night, the last required budget hearing for next year's budget adoption will be held at the next regular meeting set for Monday, Oct. 13.

Davis said the new plan called for a 50 cent increase in residential garbage pick up and putting garbage crews on a 40-hour work week.

According to Davis, the new budget does not provide for an additional police officer for the City of Woodville, which had been requested earlier by Chief Grady Ray.

Council seemed concerned about the need for another officer and have asked Ray to appear at the next regular meeting to describe the department's need for an additional officer. According to Mayor Doug Tolbert, "We all know that Chief Ray runs a tight ship."

In other business, Dave Purrell, representing Chas. Haile and Associates, submitted the final funding requirements for contractor work for two miles of roadway and curbing completed in the city. The streets which have been newly paved are: Elm, Sweet Gum, Griffin, Willow, Railroad and East Live Oak. Dollars used in completing this street work totaled \$55,710. The work was completed in 1979.

## High Speed Chase

A high speed chase Sunday night involving three law enforcement agencies resulted in the road block arrest of a 21-year-old Woodville man, Robert Ray, who led officers on a lengthy 15-minute high speed chase resulting in combined city and county traffic violation charges amounting to several hundred dollars in fines.

According to officer reports, the chase started when the subject apparently bolted from the Tyler County Hospital after a domestic incident and was followed first by City Policeman Roger Byars, Department of Public Safety Patrolman Gary Hennigan and Officer Thomas Selman and Texas Parks and Wildlife officer Huey Hancock then joined in the chase.

## Smith Asks Court For Indigent Assistance Funds

"We're not looking for thousands of dollars," said Brad Smith, the coordinator of the Concerned Citizens for Indigent Persons and an organizer for the Tyler County Cancer Fund, as he appealed to Commissioners Court Monday for financial support for both charity organizations.

Smith, who was complimented by Commissioner Maxie Riley, who said

"We thank you for what you were doing," reported to the court that the request rate for indigent help during the past year had decreased 80 percent because "the repeaters stop coming back for a free handout after awhile."

Purpose of the indigent care program, according to Smith, is "to provide food and transportation and to guide and get the proper help for in-

digent persons." "I hate to see young children go hungry," he said.

According to County Judge Sturrock, "The program really helps people that need the help and prevents the ripoff."

Smith said that county dollars were also needed to help support the Tyler County Cancer Fund, but that

anybody who wanted to make a contribution could do so.

"Both these organizations help cut the red tape in getting help to these needy people," Smith told the court.

Smith told the court "We're operating on a zero level, but we're still operating, and anything you can do to help will be greatly appreciated."

## Reimbursement Still On 'Hold'

Tyler County Commissioners Leon Fowler, Sheriff Lewis Craven to pay some \$4,000 in legal fees in connection with questioned handling of the Charles Lee rape case ruled on several months ago by the 88th District Court here.

Commissioners indicated that Craven had inappropriately contracted for the legal work without first obtaining the permission of the court for expenditure of those dollars.

"I want to hear what the attorney general's opinion is first," said

Bids were submitted in time for the Monday regular meeting, but commissioners tabled action on the matter until the Friday meeting.

## 'Bust Drugs' Meeting Set

Billed as not "A Rock Throwing Contest" or a "Who Did It?" meeting, the Concerned Citizens Against Drug Abuse will hold a "gathering" simultaneously in the First Baptist Church and in the Our Lady of the Pines Catholic Church at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 11.

Initiated by Dr. Harold Herrington, the meeting will feature films and literature about drug discussion among the participants about the characteristics of drugs in Tyler County.

According to Herrington, who reportedly experienced a personal drug abuse trauma recently within his family, "The people don't know about drugs, but the kids do." Herrington emphasized that the meeting was not

being called to condemn anyone. "In fact, the sheriff's department and the county school officials have been asked not to come," he said.

Herrington said that information specialists from Fort Polk, The Texas Alcoholic and Narcotics Education group and representatives from the Governor's War on Drug Abuse will be in attendance at the meeting. Herrington said also that Joel Lambright of the Corrigan Police Department was invited because "He is considered foremost in the fight against drug abuse advocacy."

Herrington said "We already have too many people who want to publicly tell their story about drugs. The meetings will help to educate people about drugs," he said.

**Tax Burden Suggestions Given**

Dear Editor:

I have probably received more letters, phone calls, and comments about S.B. 621 which was passed in 1979 than any other single bill which has passed since I have been a member of the legislature. Although I do not support the bill and in fact voted against it, the bill did pass and the governor signed it into law. It is not my intention to defend the bill but to explain it and to suggest one way to ease its burden on local taxpayers.

The bill establishes a single appraisal district in each county for the purpose of providing uniform appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes by using standard guidelines. The bill was designed to insure that all properties are appraised fairly and equitably so that each property owner pays no more and no less than his fair share of property taxes. Each taxing unit in a county is required to join the central appraisal district and is required to furnish its share of the funds to support the district. Tax county assessors, constitutional officers, they are accepted, although their governing bodies may elect to join. Two hundred fifteen counties have joined voluntarily, and if Constitutional Amendment No. 3 is approved by the voters in November, all counties will be required to join.

As a matter of history, the author of the bill had filed a lawsuit seeking to enjoin the collection of state property taxes. The tax revenues were used to support construction for upper level colleges and universities. His argument was that the tax violated Art. 8, Sec. 1 of the State Constitution which states: "All property in this state whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law."

A \$40,000 house likely does not appear on any two tax rolls in a given county at the same appraised value and varies even more across the state. For example, if a \$40,000 house in Henderson County is appraised at \$20,000, the Anderson County owner would pay twice

**Zoning Background Statement Offered**

A Brief Written by CITY ATTORNEY JOSIAH WHEAT

When a municipality elects to adopt a zoning program, the City Council may elect to create a zoning agency itself or to delegate that responsibility to a Zoning Commission. In some instances, the Council may elect to first create a Planning Commission to draw up the master plan for the City Council and thereafter convert the Planning Commission into a Planning and Zoning Commission.

Either the City Council acting as the zoning authority or the Zoning Commission, if one has been appointed, must first draw up a map dividing the city into zoning districts, the property in each of which districts is to be zoned. The zoning plan may call for only two types of districts, that is residential and commercial, or, as is normally the case, the City may be broken down into many different zoning districts, Multi-residential Districts (apartment houses, duplexes, etc.), Residential Districts (single-family residences, professional offices and music or dance instruction in private homes, etc.), Commercial Districts; Light Industry Districts; Heavy Industry Districts and so forth.

Contemporaneously with the preparation of the map, a Zoning Ordinance is drawn up which sets out the mechanics for the operation of the zoning system, the exceptions to the general requirements, penalties for violation, and other provisions which govern the program. When the map and proposed ordinance have been completed, a public presentation is made by the Council or the Commission to the voters. Following this meeting, the ordinance and map are put in final form for submission to the City Council. The City Council holds a formal public hearing following fifteen (15) days notice and a zoning ordinance is adopted. Following this formal hearing, the Council may adopt the map and ordinance as submitted or may adopt an amended map or ordinance or may reject the ordinance. If a zoning ordinance is adopted, the ordinance is made of any property in a district which does not comply with the use for which the district is zoned EXCEPT that any contrary use in existence at the time the plan is adopted shall be permitted for the life of a parcel of land in a district for a purpose different than the purpose for which the district is zoned is referred to as a "non-conforming" use. A non-conforming use is not allowed at the time the zoning plan is adopted, may continue without charge but cannot be enlarged or interrupted. Thus, a store in operation in a district zoned "residential" at the time the zoning plan is adopted may continue to operate as a store but cannot be used for a carpentry shop or some other different use and if the use of the property as a store is interrupted for some period of time, the store must be discontinued. In the ordinance, usually six (6) months, the non-conforming use exemption is extinguished and thereafter the property can only be used for residential purposes. The one may be required to discontinue using his property for the purpose for which it is being used at the time the ordinance is adopted, however, it cannot be used for a different purpose or discontinued in the future without loss of his exemption. Another example would be a person operating a music studio in his home or operating a business out of his home may, after the adoption of a zoning ordinance, continue to use his home for such purpose.

After the zoning program goes into effect, the City Council may from time to time amend or change the regulations or the zoned use, either on its own motion or upon request by an affected land owner. In the alternative, the Council may either continue the existing zoning regulations or appoint a Board of Adjustment to hear such proposals with the Council hearing appeals from the decisions of the Commission or Board at the case may be. In some instances, zoning progress may be from time to time adjusted to meet necessities or problems not anticipated in the beginning. The law simply requires that zoning regulations be made with reasonable consideration for the interests of the district and its peculiar suitability for particular uses and with a view to conserving the value of buildings and encouraging the most appropriate use of land throughout the municipality. It is pursuant to a comprehensive plan designed to protect the safety and health of the community and to prevent the over-concentration of population in the city. The law provides that zoning regulations shall be made with reasonable consideration for the interests of the district and its peculiar suitability for particular uses and with a view to conserving the value of buildings and encouraging the most appropriate use of land throughout the municipality.

**Cut Credit Card Costs**

Cut credit card costs and maximize spending power by managing credit card use in three specific ways.

Efficient credit card use depends on payment methods, date of purchases and number of different cards used.

Plan purchases according to the closing date on an account.

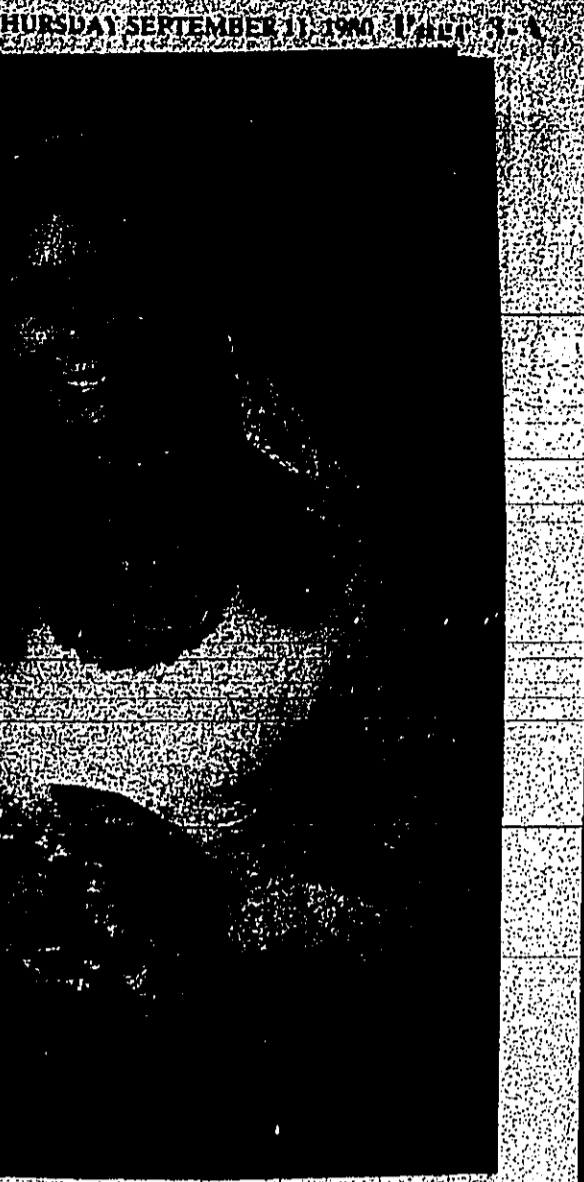
Make purchases just after the closing date to extend the time between purchases and payment.

Also, if it will be a "must" to pay a finance charge computed under the average daily balance method, try to plan purchases to lessen the number of days any purchase is on account.

When possible, always pay the full amount due rather than the minimum. This will mean no finance charges added to the bill.

Also, extend credit by writing to pay a bill until just before the due date -- but be sure to allow enough time for the post office to deliver the payment and for the company to process it.

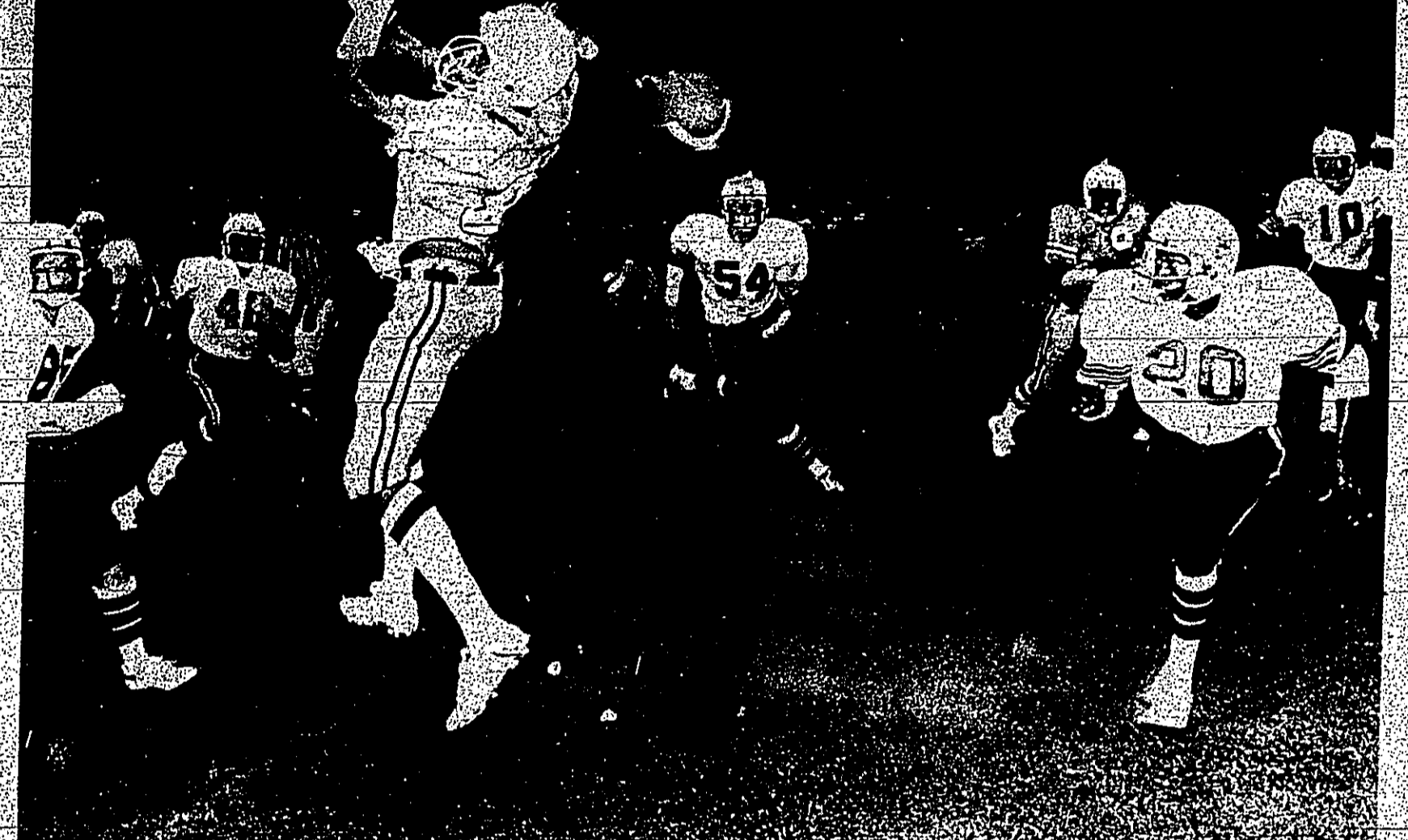

Keeping dogs and other animals from soiling your lawn and yard is a problem for many of us. Can you imagine the cans of another? The following shows an effective way of safeguarding the cans.

When you lift the handle frame, the chain carries the lid down. You could set up this arrangement either at an outdoor site where cans are required, or near your property line. If a fence fronts your property, you might combine the two ideas with a bit of modification. A short length of fence matching the regular fence and parallel to it, a section of heavy pipe will take two cans. Place it twenty-four inches from the main fence, either in front or behind it. 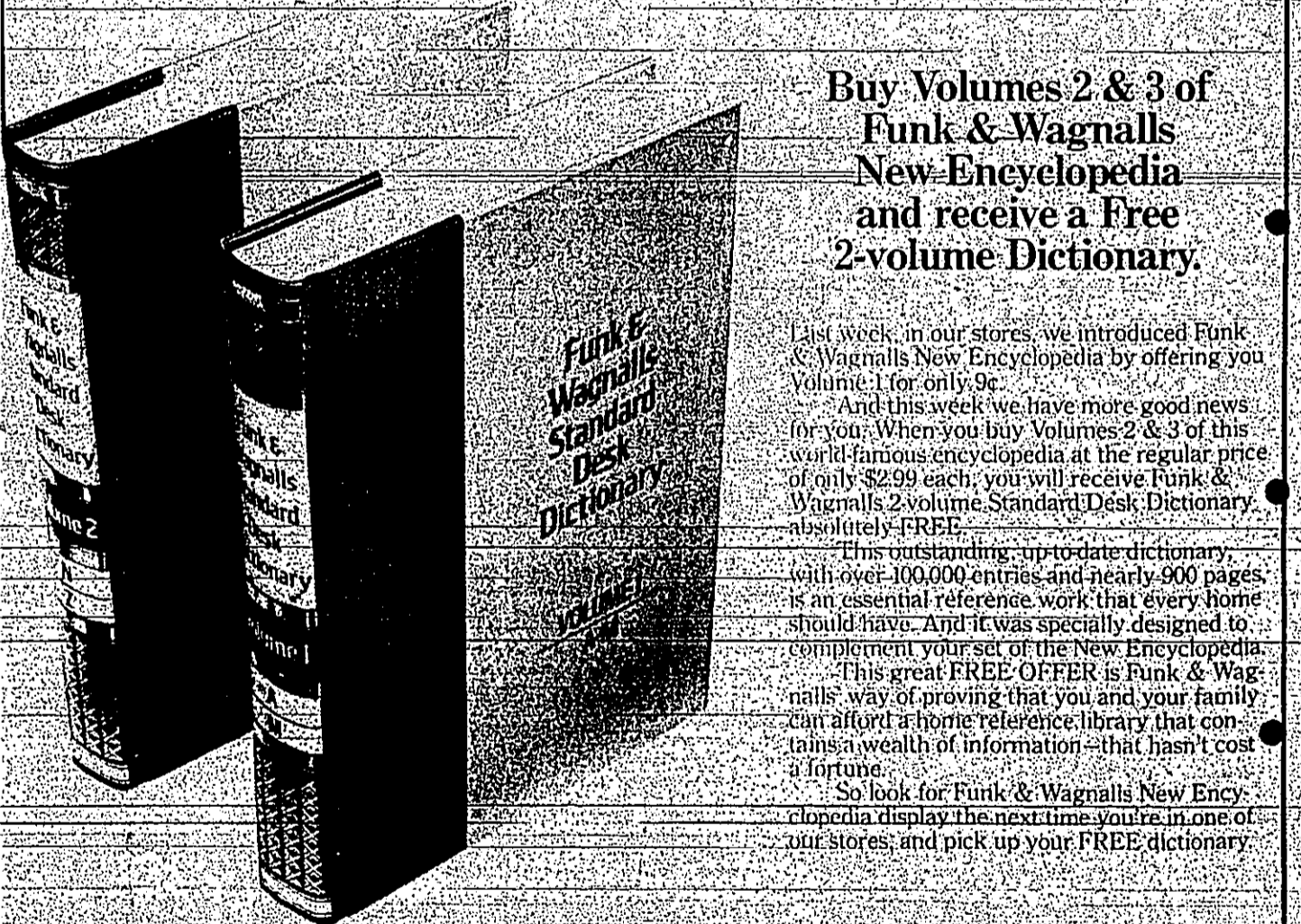

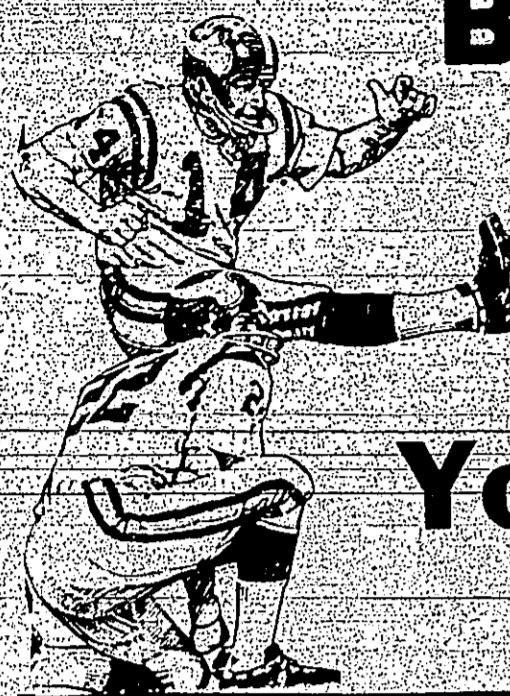

# Hardin County Aviation Gets Cessna Dealership

Two additional services will be available at Hawthorne Field for area pilots, Joe Bell, manager of Hardin County Aviation announced recently.

Hardin County Aviation has acquired a Cessna Dealership. The Dealership begins operation in mid-September and will include Cessna warranty work and parts.

East-West Air Services, a full line

maintenance service shop is now located on the premises. Earl West of Beaumont and Don Smith of Orange County have opened this shop. West, well known area pilot and Agricultural aviator has his A & P Inspection Authorization and is pilot for OCB Aviation, Inc. In addition he has numerous other credits in the field of aviation. Smith, also a commercial pilot, is a retired Navy Chief Ra-

darman and has worked as an Air Traffic Controller for the Federal Aviation Administration. Hawthorne Field, located on Hwy 327 between Kountze and Silsbee, has the newest, most modern facilities of any airport its size in Texas. Some of those facilities include: 3800 feet of hard surface runway, 800' x 150' ramp space, large hanger and offices. Hardin County Aviation has tie-downs

available, aircraft rentals, fuel and is a Cessna Pilot Training Center.

This has all been possible for Hardin County due to the determination and dedication of five men: Don Hawthorne, H.A. Thomas, Robert L. Griffin, W.K. "Bill" Hillard and Russell Wilson. These men became the airport commissioners, with Don Hawthorne the chairman and driving force of this

project that began in late 1974. The project: A modern airport for Hardin County.

For three years these men were the "laughing stock" of the county. By the fourth year few were laughing, because people could see that the airport was going to become a reality. These men had done their homework!

Don Hawthorne got Sutherland Paper Company to give 45 acres,

Kirby Lumber Company gave 57 acres plus John and Joe Blair gave 20 acres for the airport project. Then they got special House Bill 1510 passed and the FAA to agree to do all of the engineering at no cost. Next came the problem of obtaining land for the necessary easements surrounding the airport. For this, Moody Williamson gave a small strip, willis had to be probed and one small

piece had to be condemned. In addition \$15,000 has been given by companies and individuals to provide a parking area, finish work on the hanger and install air conditioning for the terminal building. Transient traffic will not be charged for parking since this will be maintained courtesy of First Security National Bank of Kountze, First National Bank of Silsbee and Silsbee State Bank.

After six years the transition is complete for this airport that was once known to area pilots as "a small strip tip the road." The million-dollar airport that Har-

din County now has will never be considered that "look forward with pride again, not with the ser-

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## Wise Up, Tighten Up, Save Home Energy

One of the easiest energy-saving measures a homeowner can take is the installation of weatherstripping and the application of caulking to tighten up the house.

At least that's what the experts say.

Install weatherstripping and apply caulking to prevent heat loss in the winter and heat infiltration during summer months.

First, find the "trouble spots" in your home where air moves in and out - wasting as much as 37 percent of your heating or cooling money.

Usually these unwanted openings are made of a variety of found around doors and

windows, electrical and plumbing connections, and where different materials are joined together.

Weather stripping and sealing materials can be applied easily and economically by the homeowner. Only a few common tools are required.

For the job, you'll need a hammer, screwdriver, caulking gun, steel measuring tape, weatherstripping and sealing material.

Weather stripping is available by the foot or in handy kits complete with the seal and suitable fasteners for a single door or window.

Weather seals may be made of a variety of materials.

Some are surface mounted and will be clearly visible after installation, while others will be concealed when the door or window is closed.

Four basic types of weather stripping are available for application by the homeowner: pliable gaskets, rigid strip gaskets, spring metal strips and threshold weatherstrip.

Pliable Gaskets: Flexible gaskets of vinyl, rubber and felt are attached with adhesive, brads or staples to the door and window stops.

When the door or window is closed, the edge presses lightly against the gasket.

Pliable gaskets are highly visible. Don't try to paint them away, either! Painting gaskets may cause them to harden.

Rigid Strip Gaskets: Rigid strip gaskets usually are made of tubular vinyl attached to a metal strip, or they're made of a felt-type material glued to a wood strip.

Attach both types with nails or screws to door and window stops.

Rigid strip gaskets are visible, too. You can apply paint to the wood or metal strip, but don't paint the gasket itself.

Spring-Metal Strips: Attach strips of bronze, aluminum or copper with brads to door and window frames.

Use this type weatherstripping on either double-hung or casement windows. Spring-metal weatherstripping provides good draft control, but it may make doors hard to open and close.

Installation is not difficult, but take care not to kink or bend the metal strips.

Threshold Weatherstrip: You can stop drafts and blowing moisture at the bottom of outside doors by using door bottom weatherstripping. It's usually packaged in easy-to-install kits along with fasten-

ers and complete instructions.

Among the most common types of threshold weatherstripping are metal and felt or vinyl strips attached to the bottom of the door.

These strips of felt or vinyl compress against the threshold to keep drafts and moisture out.

This type of weatherstripping is inexpensive and easy to install.

If that still doesn't solve the draft problem underneath a door, check the threshold itself.

A badly worn threshold may be the problem. If so, replace the worn one - and consider a metal unit if the old one was wood.

Some metal units have a raised vinyl inset that will compress against the bottom of the door to form a seal, making weatherstripping unnecessary.

Metal threshold units are available for doors of varying widths.

Follow these pointers for successful application of caulking or sealing materials:

Apply sealing material only to a clean, dry surface.

Remove old, dried sealing materials and clean the area with a solvent to remove grease or other substances that would prevent a tight bond.

Deposit sealing material at the bottom of the seam, so it fills with out bubbling.

Never apply sealing material to a porous surface alone - prime before application.

Never skimp: Use enough sealing material to fill the crack or seam.

If sealing material shrinks during drying, reapply.
