Grimes Resigns

Justice Frank Grimes stepped down from his office Thursday while submitting his resignation to the Tyler County Commissioner's Court with regret.

Grimes has been in the midst of a controversy in recent months over missing funds from his office. However, no charges have been filed in the matter.

An investigation by the Texas

Judicial Conduct Commission has been underway, but ceases according to officials, as Grimes leaves office.

County Auditor Ann Fonden has contended that funds still unaccounted for will amount to about \$400.

In a letter submitted to Tyler County Commissioners, the following statement was made by Ann Fonden: "As of this date, they still have the books and my records, so an itemized account cannot be made until the

books are returned. A rough estimate of proven shortages would be between \$300 and \$400. The original shortage reported to you almost a year ago was \$800, which included some fines which have been reported to the county, but were withheld at least a year.

Grimes has been living in Amarillo for the last 45-60 days with Precinct Justices Grady James, John Spanhanks and Roy Drake taking up the slack in Grimes' absence.

Farm Bureau To Work For Rural Balloting

The president of the Tyler County Farm Bureau said the local organization is joining other county Farm Bureaus across the state in an effort to get out a large rural vote in the coming November 4 general election.

Milton Durham of Woodville said members who do not have valid voter registration cards are reminded to get them soon. The deadline for having the application for the card in the registrar's office at the Tyler County Courthouse is Oct. 3, he said.

The farm leader said that although Farm Bureau is strictly non-partisan, the organization encourages its members to become active in contributing money, time, and work to the candidate of their choice.

Mr. Durham said the membership in the local county Farm Bureau represents a possible 6 per cent member vote that the Texas Farm Bureau has more than half a million potential voters, and that the American Farm Bureau Federation represents a potential of almost seven million votes nationally.

DETTA To Meet In Silsbee Friday

Members of the Deep East Texas Development Association will enjoy a rare treat on Friday, September 26, 1980, at 10 a.m. when they gather for the regular monthly meeting of the multi-county association at Kirby's Bear Man's Bluff Lodge in Hardin County. The lodge is located 4 1/2 miles north of Silsbee on Highway 92, then approximately 4 miles east off of Hwy 92.

The principal speaker for this monthly meeting will be Thomas M. Orth, President, Kirby Forest Industries, Inc. Orth, attended the University of Washington, South Texas Law School, University of Southern California, Institute of Business Economics, and the Stanford University Graduate School of Business. He began work in the Sales Department of Kirby Lumber Corporation in 1950. In 1961 when all U.S. Dept. of Commerce commercial structural plywood was produced on the West Coast, he initiated studies in 1963. Now over one-third of all wood production tests in a small hard wood plywood and veneer mill at Liberty, TX. In 1962 he directed the first full-scale production tests in a modern softwood plywood mill in Oregon and

proved both the technological and economic feasibility of manufacturing Southern Pine plywood. To assure market acceptance of the new product, he served as Chairman of the 5-firm industry group that established the standard for Southern Pine plywood in 1963. Now over one-third of all structural plywood is now being produced in the south, pumping approximately one-half billion dollars of new money into the area's economy.

Orth served in the U.S. Navy

Air Corps in World War II as a flight engineer. He is a member, deacon and Sunday School teacher in the Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church in Houston. He is married to Jacqueline Ann Farrar of Kansas City, Missouri and they have five children.

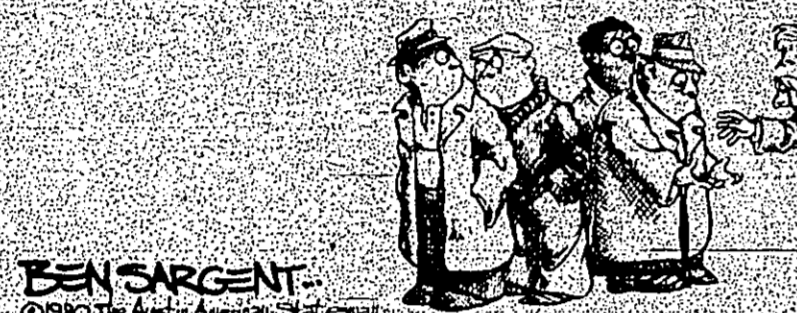

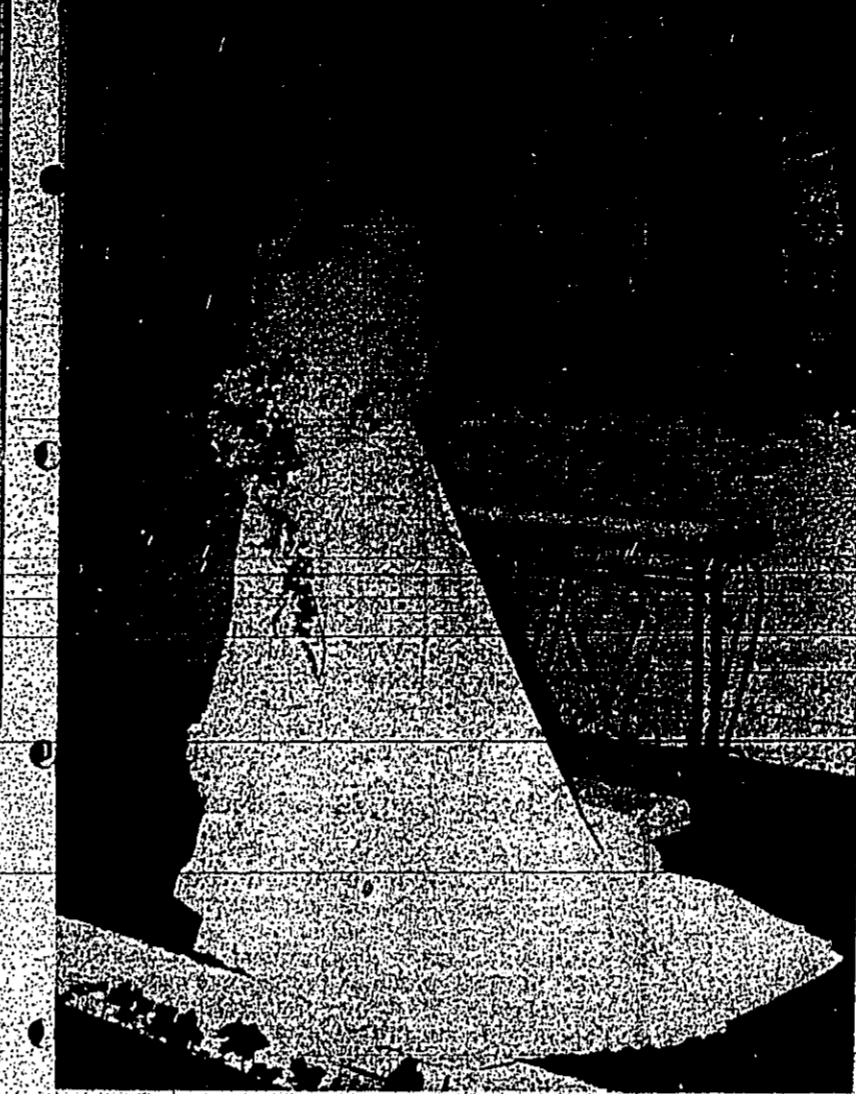

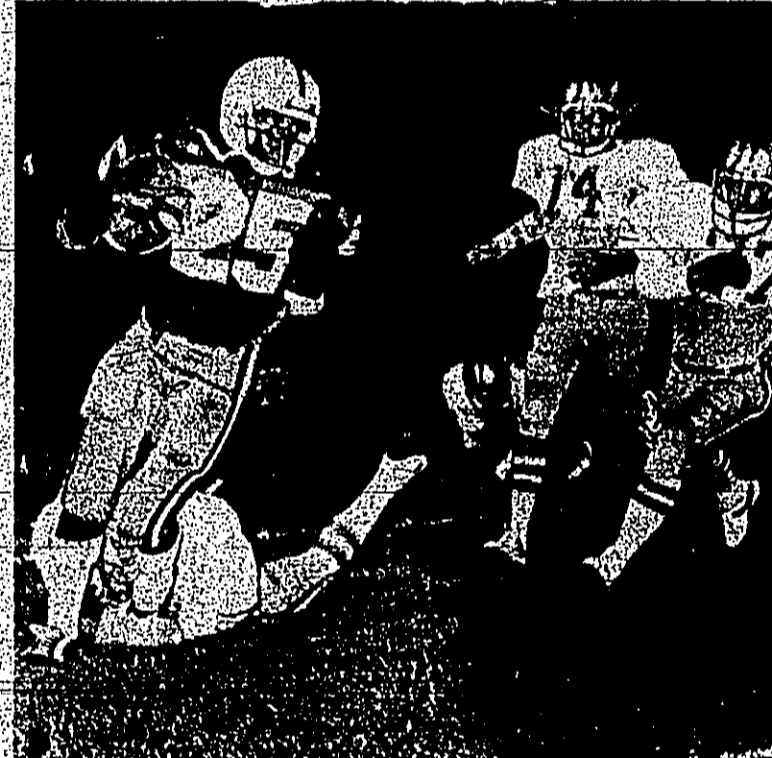
Warren Over In 27-0

The game Friday put Chester in a three-way tie for second place with Goodrich and High Island.

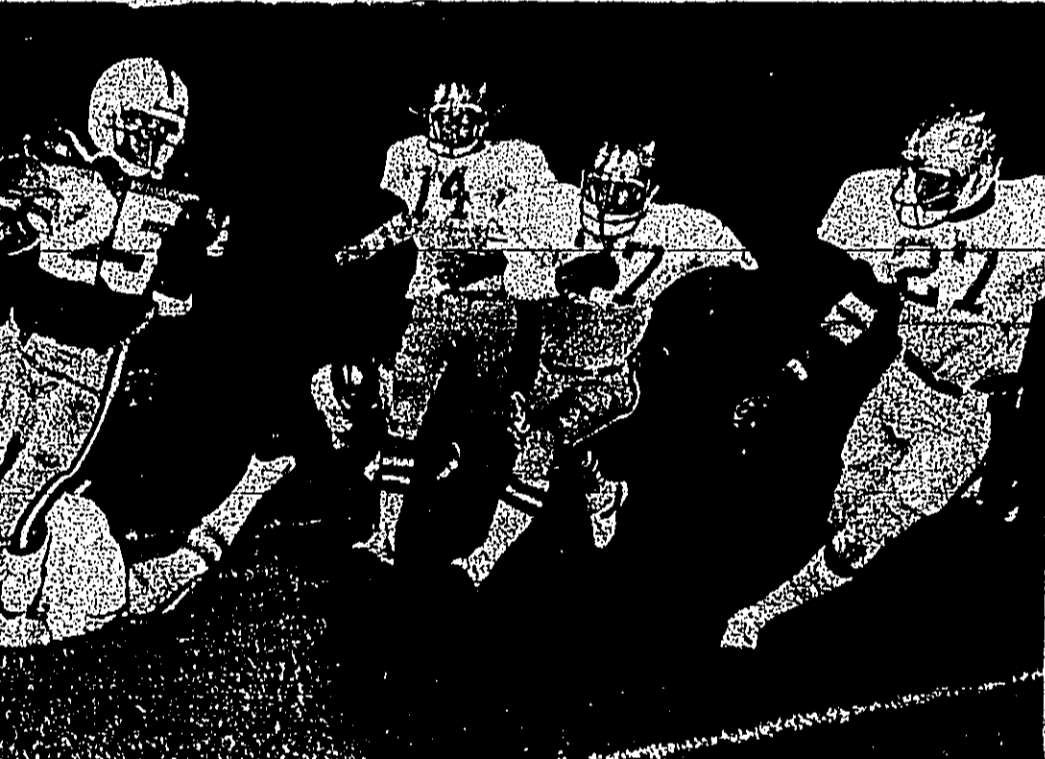
Gazaway said the first thing he needs to get back in the winning column is to get all of his players back. He said that in the High Island game that five starters were out the second half.

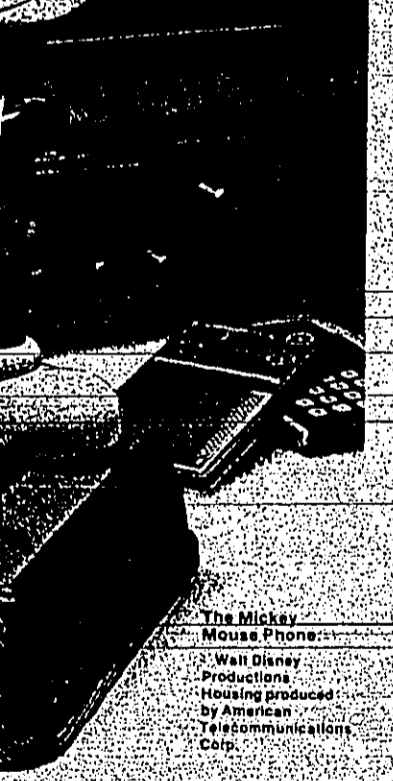
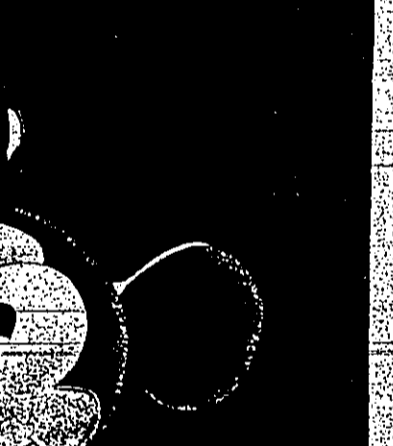

Small Grains Need Fall Nitrogen

By CLYNTON CURRIE
County Extension Agent

Applying nitrogen for small grains this fall will be important. Here is a list of four important reasons why wheat and other small grains need nitrogen at planting, or a short time afterward.

Of course, fall nitrogen fertilization is also affected by the amount of straw from the previous crop. The bacteria and other microorganisms needed to decompose the straw require nitrogen and use that already in the soil as well as that applied, thus reducing the amount available during the fall.

The general rule in applying nitrogen has been to increase the rate about 20 pounds per acre for each ton of undecomposed straw. However, a portion of

Snuff Epidemic

A small, harmless looking circle on a hip pocket is the first symptom of a major, escalating epidemic that is absorbing through the mouth lining or swallowing snuff as a replacement for smoking. But they merely are trading one set of health hazards for another, TMA says. About 6 percent of people with leukoplakia get oral cancer and everyone who dips or chews can suffer other bad effects. Chances of gum and tooth disease increase and users' teeth wear away quicker than non-users' teeth. Tobacco juice chemicals may slow wound healing, especially in the mouth. The juice also can irritate or cause stomach ulcers.

Other unhealthy effects come from the drug nicotine that is absorbed through the mouth lining or swallowed. Nicotine makes arteries smaller and speeds up the heart rate, pumping more blood through a narrower opening may increase blood pressure which heightens the risk of stroke or heart attack. Pressure may increase even more because tobacco users may use too much salt since nicotine can dull taste buds. Too much salt and users' blood pressure may increase because pressure.

All these and other effects mean that dipping and chewing are a risk. Even though they are not sending up bad health smoke signals by puffing on a cigarette, they still are risking their health, TMA says.

Campers Limited To 14-Day Stays

Campers using the National Forests and National Grasslands in Texas will be limited to a maximum of 14 consecutive days at any one campsite under the authority of recent closure orders signed by Forest Supervisor W. Mike Lannan at the headquarters of the National Forests in Texas at Lufkin.

According to Lannan, the camping limit is necessary to protect the natural resources of the forests in preventing the accumulation of debris and litter often left behind by those who camp for lengthy periods.

In addition, he said that the two-week limit constitutes an added safety measure for forest visitors by preventing a limited number of campers from "squatting" in certain areas during the approaching hunting season.

"While it is not our intent to discourage anyone from using and enjoying the public forests and grasslands," Lannan said, "we do hope to encourage the cooperation of those who enjoy the great outdoors in keeping the environment clean, safe, and litter-free for everyone's use."

The restriction is posted at the entrances to all developed campgrounds and applies as well to those who camp in the general forest areas. Violation of the federal rule carries a maximum penalty of a \$500 fine, or imprisonment for six months, or both.

The 14-day limit applies to all outdoor camping on the Angelina, Davy Crockett, Sabine and Sam Houston National Forests, and the Caddo and Lyndon B. Johnson National Grasslands, located in Angelina, Fannin, Houston, Jasper, Montague, Montgomery, Nacogdoches, Newton, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, Walker, and Wise Counties, Texas.

Get The Most From Coupons

COLLEGE STATION—Organize to get the most from food coupons, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

Develop a simple, concise storage system in order to locate coupons quickly, she suggests.

For example, arrange an expandable accordion file alphabetically by product categories — bakery goods, breakfast foods, frozen foods — or use a series of envelopes kept in a shoe box or drawer.

Mrs. McCormack is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

specialist recommends **REFUND FORMS**. Keep refund forms and qualifiers in an organized system, also, she continues.

File UPC codes, proof-of-purchase seals, inner seals and cash register tapes in separate envelopes, alphabetically by brand name.

BOXES, LABELS. To save space, collapse all boxes so they lie flat. Remove some outer labels from boxes cutting and peeling them off the cardboard backings. The specialist says:

REFUNDING. Some manufacturers offer a refund to all customers who have bought a particular product.

The shopper can take one of the refund forms, fill it out and mail it to the address given, accompanied by whatever proof-of-purchase is required.

It often takes four to six weeks to receive the refund, so keep a log listing the companies.

Mrs. McCormack advises **REFUND FORM SOURCES**.

If refunds require forms, or required blanks, the request will not be honored without them.

The principal sources of these forms are grocery stores, newspapers and magazines or the companies themselves, she points out.

Grocery stores offer two types of forms. One called the store form is found attached to shelves in tear-off pads. Another type appears on the products themselves or in the form of a hang-tag.

If the forms are not available, write to the address supplied on the cardboard backing of the form display or ask at the courtesy booths.

Newspapers and magazines often contain forms not only for cash refunds, but for free samples of the product or for coupons worth free samples.

Also, write to companies directly to the customer service department.

OTHER SHOPPER'S SECRETS. Smart shoppers can save grocery dollars in

other ways, Mrs. McCormack says.

Make a list and stick to it. Check the sales. Use coupons and Sunday papers to prepare a shopping list, and clip any coupons.

Remember, a far

gain is not always a gain, even if an item is featured in a weekly end-of-aisle display. Check the prices and signs.

Shop with open eyes. Compare prices scan the shelves up and down as well as across.
