## From Across State Funds Alternative Help Solicited

"We're not just spitting in the wind," said County Judge Allen Sturrock as he reviewed a final copy of a letter sent to other County Judges and Commissioners in calling for support of 11 specific alternatives to ad valorem taxes. Judge Sturrock hopes will become priorities of the Governor as he looks for ways to work with local county governments. Sturrock said, "If we're going to continue to deliver the kind of services the people of Tyler County and others like it need and want... then we've got to find other ways to obtain the money to do it." Sturrock said he didn't expect the selling job on the proposals to be an easy one. "But we've got to try." The burden of county funding is dependent on the Ad Valorem tax. The counties should find alternative sources in lieu of increased ad valorem taxes. Sturrock, under his signature as President of the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, and Maxie Riley, as President of the County Commissioners and Judges Association, are making this appeal on a state-wide basis with a letter which follows setting forth specific alternatives Sturrock and Riley hope will serve as alternatives. Judge Sturrock said that as a recent comment by Governor Clements in which he instructed his staff to work with local elected officials in seeking solutions to our local governmental funding needs. Sturrock said, "We should take advantage of the Governor's offer to work with local Governments." The following is the text of the letter sent to each of the other counties in the state and their elected officials: October 1, 1980 DEAR COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AND COUNTY JUDGES: Along with most of you, the County Commissioners and County Judges of Deep East Texas are deeply concerned with the eroding ability of counties and local entities to generate enough funds to maintain the services required by your citizens. ## Zoning Hearing, Oct. 7

Woodville City Fathers will be seeking public comment on Tuesday, Oct. 7, at 7 p.m. regarding a proposal to zone the city of Woodville following a request from Duane Gilchrist, asking the city to consider such a move. The request, which came several weeks ago in the form of a prepared speech, resulted in the council calling this extra not-required preliminary "open" hearing to get ideas from the community on the subject. Council's idea several weeks ago was to ask the media to solicit ideas on the subject through which the council would react. To date, the only authoritative comment on the matter has come from City Attorney Joe Wheat, who produced for media and public consumption a brief on the zoning process. The only Councilman who has openly said he was "for" such a proposal has been Alderman John Gilchrist, who is the son of the zoning advocate Mrs. Gilchrist. Other councilmen say they are reserving their opinions on the matter until the public gets a chance to speak. According to Zoning Committee Chairman Jim Jinnette, "I plan to attend the meeting Oct. 7 with an open mind." City Attorney Wheat said at an earlier council meeting that "We're giving them the chance to tell us what we want to want," and Mrs. Gilchrist said herself, "I agree that everybody needs to want it." Council is expecting many of the proposals to be opposed at the Tuesday meeting, after which those who are opposed will surface after the actual ordinances are drawn and formal public hearings are held. Councilman Kenneth George reported to the council at its last meeting of the possibility of possible grant funding for a formal zoning study. George indicated that he would report back to the council his findings on the subject. George represents the City of Woodville in the DETCOG group.



## Dollars Available In Late Spring

(From Page 1A) of funding county government is dependent on the Ad Valorem Tax. The counties should find alternative revenue sources. Alternative revenue sources: Restoration of lateral road funds. Retention of more auto registration fees. State pay costs of capital felony trials of indigents. County imposition of one percent sales tax by local option. Tax on gasoline and diesel fuel.

be exempted. State pay 25% 50% of right of ways for farm to market roads. Allocation of 35% of federal. District Retirement System be increased to 10%.

The above have been adopted by the Deep East Texas County Commissioners and County Judges Association (DETCACJA). The Deep East Texas County Commissioners and County Judges Association (DETCO) for your consideration at a Statewide hearing. Adequate screening and diagnosis should be given to the counties having some share of the gasoline tax to maintain county roads upon which most of the gasoline is used.

The following includes a number of items that would assist your community. Mental Health Retardation Centers in delivering better services to your citizens. MHMR Community Center Boards authority to purchase and own real property. MHMR authority to construct facilities on land donated to State. Adequate screening and diagnosis prior to institutionalization. Adequate follow-up in communities on discharged clients. Mandatory inclusion of community MHMR Centers in screening and after-care delivery system. State appropriations to Centers consistent with institutions. Rider attached to appropriations bill stating not to exceed 10% of any item transferred with advance approval of State Board. Emphasize local community services to insure being delivered at the least possible cost. The County Judges and County Commissioners Association of Texas should develop a plan to introduce legislative actions to provide alternative revenue. We urge you to take whatever action necessary to support the passage of these priorities or other legislative assistance to local government at this Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association Conference.

The State Legislators from Deep East Texas have agreed to support the above priorities. However, to insure state-wide support, we seek your assistance in asking your State Legislators support of local government funding bills.

At the recent Texas Association of Regional Councils Conference in Austin, Governor Clements told his staff to work with local elected officials in seeking solutions to our local governmental funding needs. We should take advantage of the Governor's offer to work with local government.

Local government can best be served through the united and cooperative efforts between County Judges and County Commissioners Association of Texas, Texas Association of Counties, and Texas Association of Regional Councils. These organizations should be the clearinghouses whereby local elected officials can be notified when appropriate action needs to be taken. Representatives from local county government should meet with Governor Clements to find solutions to local governmental funding needs.

The County Commissioners and County Judges of Deep East Texas are ready and willing to work for these priorities, many of which you have been working on for several years. The common good of local government can be achieved during the forthcoming legislative session by working together.

### Consumer Alert

AUSTIN — Texas legislators have recognized that door-to-door sales transactions deserve special attention in order to protect the consumer. This special treatment is needed largely because of the psychological effects and the resulting opportunities for high pressure sales that are present when the consumer is approached in his own home.

The Texas Home Solicitation Act provides that a door-to-door salesperson must tell the consumer that he has the right to cancel any agreement to purchase for more than \$25.00 within 3 business days after the sale. The salesperson is required to give the consumer a copy of any contract in the same language which he used in the sales pitch, and a written Notice of Cancellation that the consumer can use to mail to the business in order to void the agreement if he changes his mind.

If you, as a consumer, do cancel any sale, your contract must be cancelled, all payments refunded, any trade-ins returned, and any property returned to original condition.

Consumers should be aware, however, that it is much better to avoid having to exercise these rights by knowing in advance how to deal with home solicitations. Our lawyers suggest that you follow these guidelines:

Remember to comparison shop before buying from a door-to-door salesperson. The very act of going from door to door to make a sale is an expensive operation and this high cost in sales expense is often reflected in a higher price for the product. Our office is aware of one situation in which vacuum cleaners have been sold door to door at prices in excess of \$450 while the exact same vacuum with legitimate first sale is in the neighborhood of \$250 at local retail stores.

Always ask for identification and, if it looks suspicious, call the firm to be sure it exists and that the salesperson actually works there. Some "counterfeit" print contracts on stolen letter heads with legitimate first sale is an illegal and should be reported to our office.

If you should also ask yourself if you need or want the product that is being sold door to door. Unless you do, it is a waste of your time and that of the salesperson. To go any further, it is a good idea to remember, too, that a well trained salesperson can sometimes convince you to buy an item even if you don't need it. If the individual indicates that he or she is conducting a survey, taking an opinion poll, or soliciting for a worthy cause, get proof of identity, the sponsoring organization, and sometimes used as a means to getting into your home to begin a sales presentation. Use of these tactics to gain entrance into your home is illegal and should be reported to our office.

### State Capital Highlights

AUSTIN — In a surprise move that voters would probably like to see more of in state government, the State Board of Insurance commissioners Tuesday voted against a hike in auto insurance rates.

The insurance industry had requested a rate hike that would raise consumer premiums by close to \$2 million in Texas. And since the state board staff had recommended a \$257 million increase, almost 19 percent, most observers thought the industry would come away with some gains.

But board chairman William P. Daves said the industry has enjoyed steady income increases from investments, and proposed to deny the rate increase. He was joined in the vote by Lyndon Olson Jr. and Durwood Mansford.

Daves' denial was shock enough for the industry representatives attending the hearing, but chairman Daves, the former president of a bank and insurance company, had more to say.

Using his own calculations, he argued companies have benefited from a steady increase in income from investments, and that because of drastic inflationary changes, a thorough review should be made of the approach to the methods of insurance rate-making.

Daves recommended creation of an advisory committee to study the subject of increased insurance company investment income.

**REDUCTION BLOCKED**

If consumers stand to gain on that front, they stand to lose on another one.

In the same week, a state district judge blocked a 14 percent reduction in credit life insurance rates, granted by the board last March.

Officials put the potential drop in rates to consumers at between \$20 and \$40 million in Texas.

But Judge Jim Dear ruled the insurance board violated the Administrative Procedure Act last spring by not conducting the hearings as a contested case. He also said the board lacked the authority to regulate credit life insurance commissions.

**PLITZKIN LEAK?**

State Sen. A.R. Schwartz, D-

Galveston, asked the State Health Department to look into reports of a plutonium leak at Todd Shipyards in Galveston.

The shipyard is the storage site for controversial low level nuclear waste that has been building up in Texas for the past two years.

Schwartz has consistently urged the shipyard to transfer its waste, but the removal has been slow. He called the plutonium report "the last straw" in a series of environmental funding bills.

One of the toughest issues before the next Legislature will be reduction of local property taxes and finding other ways to raise revenue.

Governor Clements and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby have considered raising the five cents-per-gallon fuel tax, currently the lowest tax in the nation, but last week Hobby rejected a tax hike on motor fuels.

"He said he doesn't believe it will be needed because of unforeseen revenue increases in the sales tax and oil and gas severance taxes," said Schwartz.

More than one reading of the mood of taxpayers at the same time he is reading tax reports. Motor fuels are always subject to price increases, especially at times of crises in the Middle East, and consumers are already angry enough at the rising cost. If the state were to add the burden of increased taxes, more than one political head would fall to outraged voters.

Clements has yet to back off of the idea, but some observers expect him to follow Hobby's example.

**CONTROL OVERSIGHT POLL**

A poll released last week showing President Jimmy Carter eight points ahead of Ronald Reagan in Texas has been praised, heard, respected, and scoffed by many.

Clements says Reagan's own poll shows him leading Carter. The Carter folks say Reagan is dropping and the President is rising in their.

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### Accent On Health

Many homeowners are using and buying chain saws to cut in-law wood but unfortunately, many owners don't know how to use saws correctly, says the Texas Department of Health.

"About 24,000 serious injuries from 'kickback' alone were reported in 1979," said Mackie Lawrence, with the department's Product Safety Division. "Kickback is the sudden, swift movement of the turning saw blade toward the user. Kickback can happen when the saw chain around the tip of the guide bar strikes an object. It can also occur when wood being cut closes in and pinches the saw chain in the cut," said Lawrence.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), the chain saw injuries are serious enough to require hospital emergency room care increased from 29,000 in 1976 to 53,000 in 1979. There were, however, an estimated 105,000 chain saw injuries that required medical attention during that year.

The CPSC is currently exploring ways for the entering of the safety chains for new saws, and safer replacement chains for old saws. "If the guide bar of the part of the saw the chain revolves around is much longer than the thickness of the wood, the tip of the guide bar could strike the ground or some object and cause a kickback injury."

On the other hand, Lawrence says, if the guide bar is too short, it will be necessary to bury the tip of the saw in the cut. This could also result in a serious kickback injury.

For frequent log cutting and the felling of trees, the recommended guide bar length is 14 to 20 inches, he said. For the occasional cutting of small limbs, logs, and trees, the recommended guide bar length is eight to 12 inches.

Lawrence says to check safety features when shopping around new saws. These include the safety tip, which covers the chain as it passes around the tip of the guide bar. The safety tip reduces the chance of kickback by keeping the chain from contacting anything at the tip of the guide bar.

A chain brake is also a sensible idea because it is designed to stop the chain in a fraction of a second if kickback occurs. Special saw chains and guide bars are also designed to reduce injury caused by kickback.

Lawrence suggests these general safety tips: Let the chain saw do the work. Don't try to force the saw through the cut. Be aware of the downward or outward path the saw will take after the wood is cut. Keep your legs out of the path. Take your hand off the trigger between cuts. Start all cuts at top speed (full throttle) and continue to cut at top speed. Before making any adjustments or repairs, turn off the saw and be sure the chain has stopped moving.

### Suckling One-A-Day Speeds Rebreeding

Beef cattle producers have difficulty maintaining a 12-month calving interval with first-calf heifers might consider the "once daily suckling" technique.

Once daily suckling means that calves are allowed to nurse only once a day. This eliminates a lot of the stress on first-calf heifers, allowing them to start cycling earlier, so that they can be rebred.

This practice has been demonstrated on the Sartwell, Brahmans Ranch at Sealy and has proved highly successful in reducing the interval between calving and first post-calving heat.

The demonstration was based on research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station which showed that once daily suckling when calves were 21 to 30 days of age dramatically decreased the interval between calving and first post-calving heat in first-calf heifers.

The practice includes separating first calf heifers from their offspring and then allowing one daily suckling exposure for about an hour from 30 days after calving until the heifers show heat. After first heat, heifers are allowed to rear their calves with normal suckling until weaned.

If the demonstration on the Sartwell Ranch, the usual rebreeding problems with first-calf heifers were reduced by using the once daily suckling method. In addition to getting the first heifers back in heat rapidly, (73 days for first-calf heifers and 67 days for second-calf heifers), the conception rate shot up to 91 percent compared to 83 percent for the rest of the cow herd.

Extended intervals from calving to first post-calving heat are responsible for large increases in production costs. This is due to increased costs of cow maintenance, increased length of calving season, and increased numbers of open cows at the end of the breeding season.

The biggest problem in rebreeding comes with first-calf heifers. This is largely due to nutrition, so the once daily suckling technique allows first-calf heifers to get back on their feet more quickly and get ready for rebreeding.

Once daily suckling not only shortens the interval from calving to first heat as effectively as early weaning, but also reduces the major management problems associated with early weaned calves.

In addition, the technique during an artificial insemination breeding season eventually save labor as the animals to be checked for heat and penned for breeding readily come in to suckle their calves each day.

Although once daily suckling can improve rebreeding performance in heifers and young cows, it is no substitute for sound management program of herd health and nutrition.

## Baptist Conclave

### Is October 28-30

The 56th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Texas will meet in Houston Oct. 28-30 to deal with matters which affect two million Texas Baptists and other Texans.

Therefore We Speak is the theme of the convention which will focus on the achievement of "Bible Mission Thrust," a Southern Baptist Convention (SBC) campaign to allow every person on earth the opportunity to hear the gospel by the year 2000.

A major facet of the convention will be consideration of a record proposed \$37.4 million Cooperative Program budget for Texas Baptists, share of the world-wide mission efforts of 15 million Southern Baptists.

An "On to Houston" campaign is being conducted to assemble 6,000 messengers to deal with a wide range of issues that might include problems of the local church and convention agencies and institutions, as well as issues of national, state, national and world.

The largest number of messengers, registered at a convention, is 37,777 in Fort Worth in 1954.

Stop Nosebleeds Fast

Stop nosebleeds using simple first aid measure.

The simplest first aid measure is to sit with the head leaning slightly forward and apply pressure at the site of bleeding by pressing the nostrils together.

Keep the pressure steady for about five minutes; then release to see if the bleeding has stopped.

If there is blood in the throat, spit it out to make breathing through the nostrils easier.

Apply a cold cloth may help stop the flow of blood.

If the first five minutes are not successful, repeat the process.

Most nosebleeds will respond to this procedure.

Try to remain as calm as possible. Panic, however, tends to direct the blood into the throat which causes gagging difficulty in breathing and may result in fainting and anxiety.
