## Highlights And Sidelights From The State Capitol

**AUSTIN**—Texas voters have been promised a lot of attention from candidates, and last week they received a big dose of it.

President Jimmy Carter last week made a stop in Beaumont, Texas, and Waco to appear with Texas Democrats and strengthen his program. He captured the state on Nov. 4.

Meanwhile, GOP nominee Ronald Reagan met in Austin with Gov. Bill Clements and conservative leaders of several farm and ranch groups to discuss ways to promote his election.

Their endorsements, however, were clearly made by industry and farm-ranch-and-farm group members.

Not to be overlooked was Massachusetts Sen. Ted Kennedy, who courted voters for Carter in blue collar areas of Beaumont and Hispanic areas in McAllen.

**RURAL TEXAS**—As political polls continue to indicate a neck-and-neck horse race, rural Texans find themselves more and more the object of attention.

Clement's said he is pushing Reagan to pick a new secretary of agriculture from Texas, an incentive which no doubt helped to fuse the above-mentioned endorsements.

**CHINA GRAIN DEAL**—And from China, Texas farmers gained assurances they will sell millions of tons of grain at market prices to China in a treaty signed Wednesday for more than 9 billion dollars.

Republicans have charged the grain deal signing near election day is a political ploy, but administration officials explained the signing was delayed by China's displeasure over U.S. news leaks and potential market fluctuations.

As if to underscore that point, last week a 410 million class action lawsuit was filed against the nation's largest grain company and a former Nixon agriculture official by 294 farmers in 25 Panhandle counties and two New Mexico counties.

The suit alleges that Continental Grain Co. and a former federal official conspired to keep U.S. wheat prices artificially low prior to the controversy.

## Speakers

**AUSTIN**—For many reasons legal problems have increased concerning property matters, especially those involving spouses. Proposed Constitutional Amendment 9 attempts to relieve this situation by providing for the conversion of marital community property into separate property.

Under this proposed legislation spouses would be allowed to agree in writing that the income or property arising from one spouse's separate property will be separate property of that spouse. This agreement could effect present property and property acquired in the future. The amendment would permit individuals to partition property before being married, and it creates a presumption in the constitution that the scope of a gift of property from one spouse to the other includes all income or other property that might arise from that gift.

This amendment provides Texas with new means of deviating from the Texas marital community property system. This system is basically that all property acquired during a marriage, other than property specifically exempted by law, becomes the community or shared property of both spouses.

**AN ACTIVE CHAIRMAN**—Newly installed Texas Democratic party chairman Bob Slagle, accompanied by former U.S. Agriculture Committee chairman Bob Poage, completed his first week of scattered, rural, courtoiseous speeches in the state's largest urban center, clarifying President Carter's support and building the Democratic party in rural Texas.

At Carter's request Slagle flew to Texas to appear on the program where he reportedly advised the President to let more Texans know about the administration's endorsement for reform of the Windfall Profits Tax.

Known as the Bentsen Bill, after the authorship of U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, the reform would include an annual \$1,000 tax break for small oil and gas royalty owners.

Latter's windfall profits program, much retolared by Congress before final passage, has proved to be a sore point for the small royalty owners, particularly the elderly on fixed incomes.

With Carter's support the Bentsen Bill, if passed, will provide relief for some 75 percent of the royalty owners now affected, especially those who collect \$200 or less a month.

Slagle then returned to West Texas to throw himself back into the breach of political battle, using personal contact to combat the massive and active Republican phone banks.

SECOND RAIL LINE—Texas Atty. Gen. Mark White said the line is built from the coast to the River Basin in Wyoming of this state, wish to negotiate at this time, transported by Burlington Northern Railroad, which separates the only rail line from the basin.

White, long upset with the high prices of Wyoming lignite, said rail competition may drive down the cost. A federal judge has given approval to Chicago and Northwestern Railroad to build a second line to transport Wyoming coal to Texas.

The ruling will become final unless it is appealed to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

## Around The Clock Bank Services On Amendment

A constitutional amendment to provide Texans with around-the-clock basic banking services at convenient locations has gained the backing of a 1,500-member statewide organization.

Don Cavness, Austin business man and coordinator of the public education campaign for the Proposition 1 on the November 4 ballot, announced today that the citizens group has been formed to assist the three statewide banking associations in support of the amendment.

Cavness said, "Proposition 1 has only one purpose, and that is to provide unattended teller machines at locations more convenient to bank customers so that they can withdraw or deposit money whenever they wish without going to their bank. It is the most important time-saving and energy-saving development in Texas banking in recent history."

The Texas Bankers Association, Independent Bankers Association of Texas, and Texas Association of Bank Holding Companies representing more than 1,400 banks have united in support of Proposition 1 by forming the Convenience Banking Committee.

"While there is no organized opposition to Proposition 1," Cavness said, "we want to be certain that Texas' realize that the amendment will benefit them directly by offering a convenient banking choice for those who wish to use unattended teller machines from their banks."

He pointed out that bank customers will have full control of their own accounts and strong consumer protections under federal law if they use the unattended tellers. Proposition 1 also provides that off-premises unattended tellers must be shared by banks within a county on a non-discriminatory basis. The tellers may also be shared with credit unions and savings and loans.

"The Constitution at present does not permit banks to install unattended tellers except at banking locations," Cavness explained. "Credit unions and savings and loans institutions do have this privilege, and Proposition 1 merely extends the same opportunity to state and national banks in Texas for competitive equity in convenient choice."

A state law has already been passed, subject to approval of the constitutional amendment, which limits unattended tellers to five functions: cash withdrawal, deposits, loan payments, and bill payments. **'Major Mistake'**—Editor, THE BOOSTER Woodville

Your story on the recent City Council meeting dealing with zoning contains a major mistake.

You say that when we bought our property on the north hill, we knew where it was going to happen there in the valley.

Wrong—as I thought I pointed out during the Council meeting.

In April 1976, when we looked over the property, we were told that the City owned the tract in the valley below. That was enough assurance for us, at the time, we had just moved to Woodville from the whitening madness of 25 years in Houston, and were full of fresh air and implicit trust. We bought the property in May 1976. It was not until about 17 months later, in October 1977, that we were told the city government was going to build a sanitary treatment facility down there, just across the slope from the cottage where a retired and much-respected citizen lives. From our home, it wound up two or three football fields distant.

The news came, not from the city but from a banker.

You were correct in quoting me as saying the city government is a bad neighbor, simply because it refuses to acknowledge its errors and take simple, considerate steps to rectify them to the benefit of taxing citizens and neighbors. It is an attitude that seems to afflict many forms and levels of government, institutions, and even corporations. I suspect that it is actually a malady called Bacterium bureaucrat.

I hope to identify some of these errors and offer specific and positive suggestions to the Council at future meetings.

Families are important. Homes are important. Neighborhoods are important. That's why zoning is important.

Bingo as a fund-raiser for churches and charities

United Charities of commercial bingo operator in Fairfax County, Virginia, took in more than \$1 million a year, paid out only \$24,000 to its three sponsoring charities. In Dayton, Ohio, the Hamilton People First fund-raising outfit raised \$725,000 for itself, less than \$4,000 for charity. In Baltimore, Pullaski Mart Bingo earned them \$20,000 in charity, but \$100,000 in profits. Only \$3,500 for the four charities that justified its existence.

## Duck Blind Policy Told

The Corps of Engineers has clarified the duck blind policy for Sam Rayburn and Town Blinds. Projects for the 1980/81 duck hunting season, which prohibited permanent blinds. Duck blinds, such as self-contained boat blinds, that are removed after each hunt are permissible. Natural blinds result of loose grass, weeds, or dead wood not fastened together with wire, nails, or rope and not comprising a navigational hazard with a rise in the lake are also allowed. Blinds must be located at least 200 yards away from parks, boat ramps, and boating areas. No permits are necessary for these blinds.

## Football Fans Have Competition

UVALDE--Football fans may soon have serious competition.

In a few weeks deer hunters all across the state will relinquish their roles as archer-quarterbacks to renew their annual quest for freshly stocked freezers and handsome wall mounts.

Many, however, will be on their first big game hunt and may be somewhat confused over the inordinate amount of hunting paraphernalia to choose from.

So, before taking to the countryside, it's a good idea for all hunters to make sure they have acquired adequate equipment and found it working properly.

Dr. Dwight Guynn, a wildlife specialist based in Uvalde, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

First and foremost, Guynn suggests, is to choose a rifle with sufficient caliber (firepower) for a quick, humane kill. He says, it's important to match caliber with one's physical size and shooting experience.

Hence, Guynn suggests a rifle with "pump," lever action or semi-automatic may be appropriate.

Guynn says a bolt action rifle is most often considered for open country requiring long accurate shots.

Scope selection, Guynn says, is usually all that's needed for the successful hunt, is influenced significantly by the terrain. For open country with long distance shooting, Guynn suggests a six-to-eight power scope.

Under heavy cover with close range shots, an open sight or two-power scope is usually all that's needed.

A four-power scope is popular because of all-around versatility. Variable power scopes such as the 2x-7x and 3x-9x are also versatile.

Binoculars are a highly underrated item in the hunter's gear.

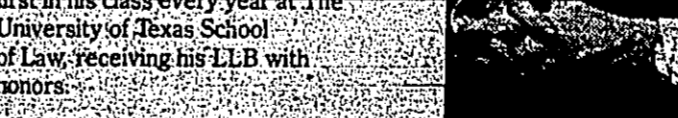

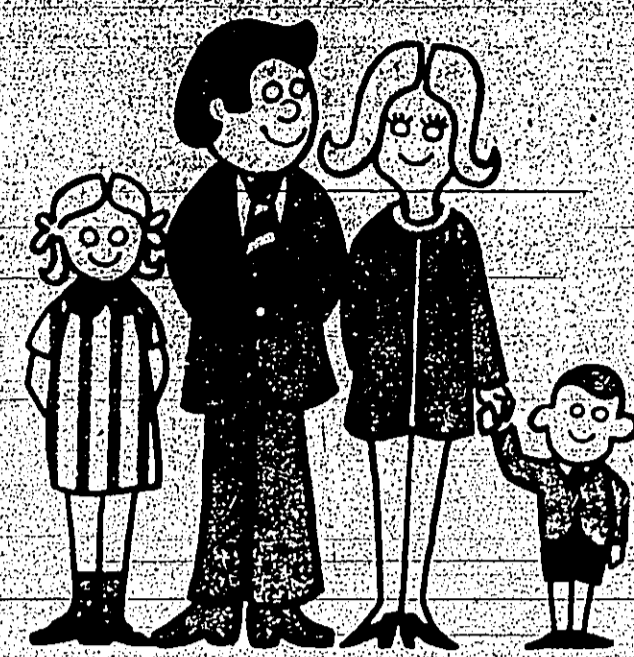

Don't let Halloween haunt your children this year—use some health safety precautions to prevent their trick or treating from turning into tragedy.

"Put a lot of young eyes on the streets in dark neighborhoods and accidents can happen," says Harold R. Ray, Director of the Product Safety Division of the Texas Department of Health.

"But planning the Halloween excursion can resolve some of the pitfalls which may befall children. And parents, children, the best idea is for parents to go with their children. And parents, or the children themselves, will be spotted easier if they carry flashlights.

In addition, Ray says, flashlights provide better vision, and perhaps save falls which could happen on uneven ground or while going down curbs. Lights are also helpful in spotting and keeping unfriendly dogs at bay.

For most children, Halloween is a time for dressing up in a costume or mask in order to put fear into the homes they visit. The mask and costume can cause trouble.

For one thing, says Ray, a mask will limit vision considerably unless the eye holes are large. Many of the costumes are dark, which may hamper motorists or other revelers from seeing the wearers in the dark.

"It's not too impractical to sew reflector strips onto arms and legs or costumes," Ray says. "This adds to the probability of a child being seen by a motorist or others on the street. Also, bags shouldn't be so large as to block the child's vision and clothing shouldn't be loose."

Many children borrow their mother's wig and care should be taken to see that these are fireproof, and this can be dangerous," Ray said.
