Block Grant Proposal Awarded To Waxman

Woodville City Council Monday awarded the administration of a third-year Community Development Block Grant program to the Jasper firm of Waxman and Semetko, Inc., who in competition with the Deep East Texas Council of Governments, underbid that agency by \$8,747 for the project.

Waxman cited his firm's record in dealing with the City of Woodville for the first two years of a \$150,000 total block grant consideration.

"We've always been right on the target ... and right on the money," Waxman told the council, who issued a bid for the council to consider totaling \$45,000 for the third-year administration rights.

The Council of Governments, which was represented by Director of Regional Services, Ron Willis, DEICOG Planner Randy Blanks and Engineer McNeal Adams, submitted an overall third-year project administration bid of \$57,747.

Council did, however, allow the Deep East Texas Council of Governments agency to make application for a new 1981 Community Development Block Grant, which according to competitive bidder Waxman at an earlier council meeting, "could range as high as \$2,220,000." DEICOG was awarded the pre-application bid proposal rights at the Monday meeting.

Other action by the City Council included formally acknowledging a \$5 increase for each of Gulf States Utilities residential customers. On a

motion by Dr. Malcolm Radford, the rate increase was installed even though it has already been assessed for each residential user since October 1, according to Wyatt Bell, local utilities manager here.

Council tabled a request presented by Bud Byram seeking financial assistance from the City for improvements he said were needed at the Tyler County Airport.

Byram called the airport "a central point of tourism growth in the county."

Byram said the "central point location of the airport and the fact that it's the first thing that air traffic visitors see when they arrive ... we need to make those improvements."

Byram suggested that the City might utilize tourism funds in making the improvements. Council indicated they would study the plan.

Council was also addressed by Dr. Harold Herrington of the Tyler County Industrial Finance Corporation, who was seeking city encouragement in drawing to Woodville possible outside investor interest in locating a chain motel and a chain movie theater here.

Herrington asked the city outright for them to consider expanding the city's boundaries one half mile to the North, West and South and one mile to the East.

Herrington also asked the City Council to consider using Block Grant funds in creating a study and for use in the possible implementation of such a project.

Herrington, who did not name the investor said that if the city made the proper moves it's going to be easier for us to function in making people interested in coming to our community.

Deer Hunt Cancelled

Foster Homes Shortage 'Serious'

The Texas Department of Human Resources reports a serious shortage of foster homes in our area, especially those who will care for adolescents.

According to Marie Green, Foster Home Worker for Tyler County, "fostering a troubled child is a real challenge. It requires a willingness on the part of the foster parents to work closely with the child's worker, as well as a commitment to 'hang in there' when there are problems. We are looking for people who genuinely like children, who have a sense of humor, who can work on a team with social workers, who are good listeners and who have a real desire to help a child. Single people as well as couples can qualify."

For persons interested in foster care, the Texas Department of Human Resources will conduct a program at 7:00 p.m., Thursday, Nov. 20 at the Woodville Department of Human Resources Office, 109 Live oak.

The program will include a slide show and brochures. If persons are interested, there will later be a group orientation and discussion, but persons are under no obligation if they attend the first meeting.

Airport Road Improvements Asked

Tyler County Commissioners met in regular session Monday and heard an appeal from Chamber President Tom Knapp for County assistance in needed road repairs at the Tyler County airport.

"We have a nice airport but the access road leaves a negative reaction on visitors flying in," Knapp said.

Knapp informed the Court on the benefits which a new road would allow including, from the Chamber of Commerce point of view, "The attraction of new industry to our county."

Knapp told the court that a new road surface would enhance the rodeo arena and become more attractive to those out-of-town visitors who visit us."

Commissioners indicated they had no funds to accommodate the plan at the present time, citing more pressing road repair problems currently facing them.

Knapp reported to the court that the Chamber of Commerce, Industrial Development Committee and the Tyler County Industrial Finance Corporation had held a meeting recently and identified the airport road as one which needed attention soon.

Don Cole, a local architect, suggested that the commissioners join with the Woodville Independent School District in a road project which would lead to the rear access of the school.

Cole reported that the Industrial Finance Corporation was currently studying a site for a "non-polluting" industry which might consider a location near the airport and that the new road would enhance that idea.

Score by quarters Friday saw the Bulldogs Matt England rack up two TD's, one on a 14-yard run and one on a 20-yard pass.

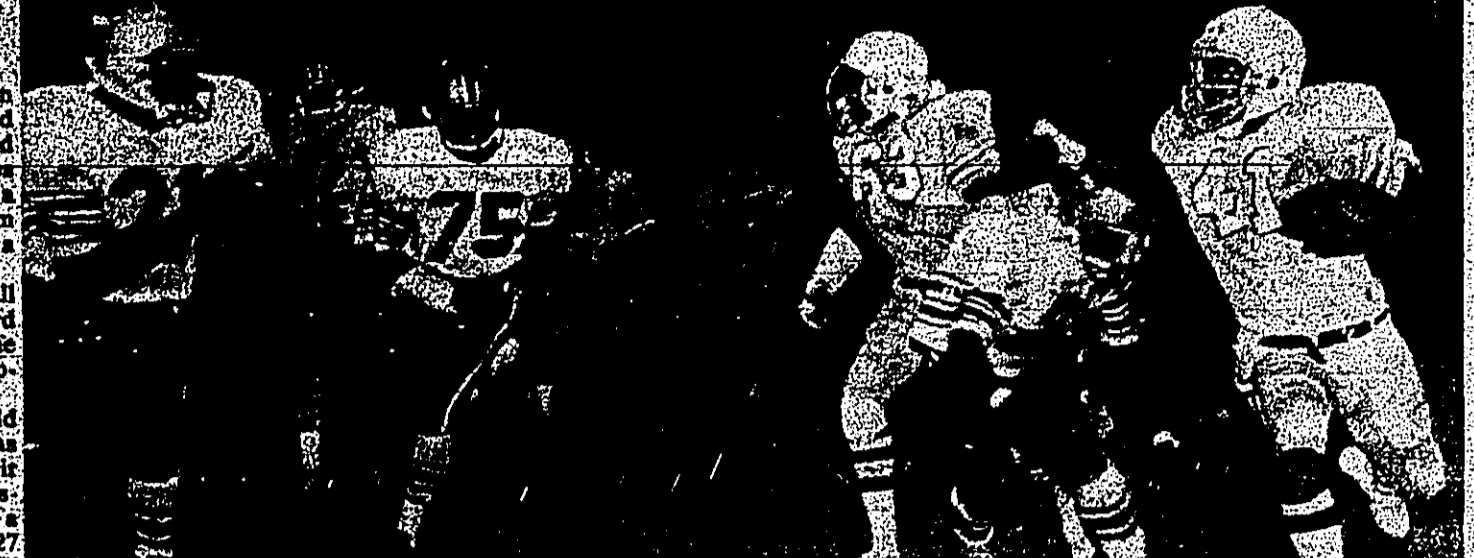

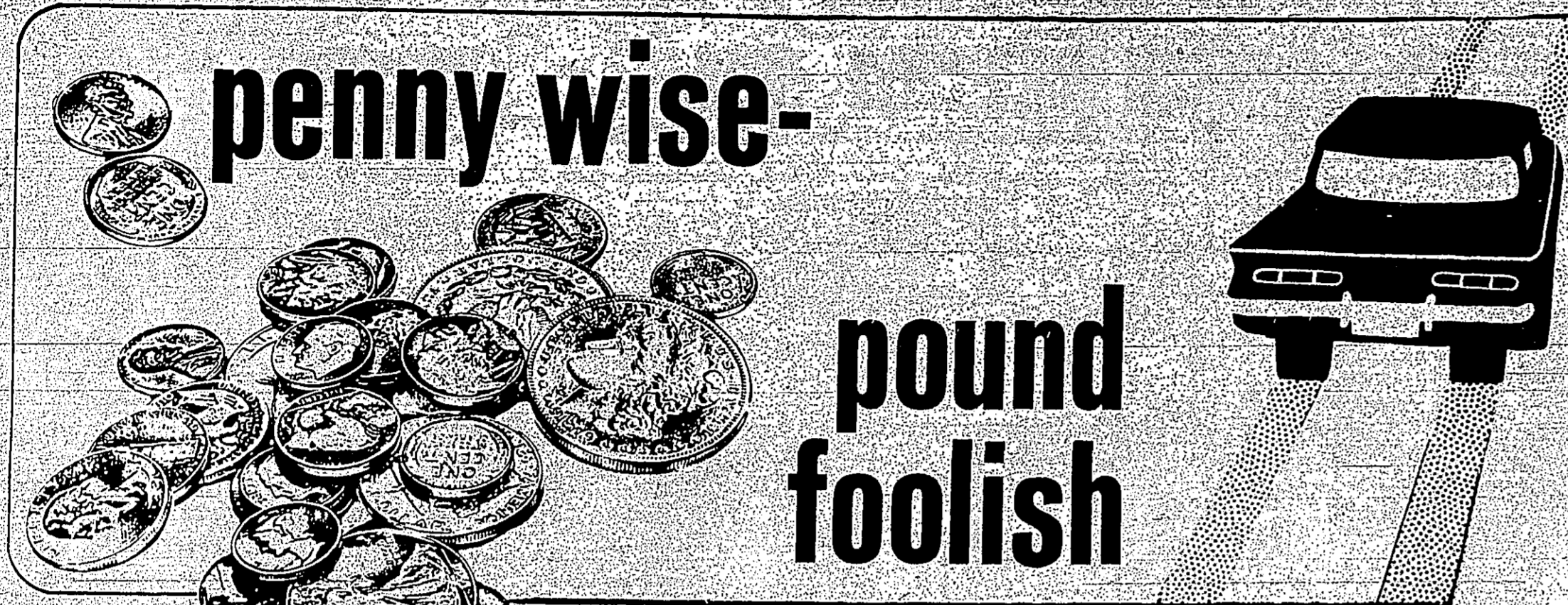

Shot Placement Key To Successful Deer Hunt

UVALDE... Sunup... cool, crisp autumn morning as the hunter waits patiently, perched on a deer stand somewhere in the Lone Star State. As the sun's rays begin to flicker across the eastern horizon on this somber Saturday morning, 1980 deer season officially begins.

Somewhere, directly ahead, the hunter hears brush crackle and a twig snap. Out of a mesquite thicket, less than 100 yards away, a magnificent 12-point buck emerges into the open field.

Beads of sweat begin to pop out across the hunter's forehead as a chill crawls quickly up his spinal column at the sight before him. He draws a deadly aim and fires, watching in tense

exhilaration as the tremendous beast falls in its tracks.

True, this situation may seem more like one of "Fantasy Island," but segments will be reinjected in varying degrees thousands of times this fall. Some hunts will end successfully; others will result in sheer frustration and disappointment.

Regardless of the situation, accurate shot placement is mandatory for a quick, humane kill.

COLLEGE STATION — Develop friendship to enhance feelings of warmth, love, trust and affection between two people, says Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist. Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "A friendly relationship grows out of free choice rather than out of necessity. "A friend is not necessarily an extension of yourself, your interests or your work. Friendships allow different races, sexual preferences, religions or cultural backgrounds to come together on mutual terms because of trust." Friendships have different degrees of commitment — from casual to close friendships. When building friendly relations, most people look for the same qualities, such as someone who keeps confidences, loyalty, warmth, affection, supportiveness, frankness, a sense of humor, willingness to spend time and easy to talk with. Age, physical attractiveness, personal accomplishments, similar income or job appear less important to friends than personal traits, the specialist continues. Friendship varies over the stages of the life cycle.
