



NACOGDOCHES-State Senator Roy Blake of Nacogdoches has introduced a bill that would keep people-who quit their jobs from collecting unemployment benefits. Blake's bill would deny benefits to "voluntary quits" until they returned to work and vorked for at least six weeks.

Blake said last week he was out raged that a Cuero teacher who quit his job to "seek other employment" was awarded \$2520 in unemployment

Nolan Ward, Chairman of the three-member Texas Employment Commission, opposes the Blake bill, citing the fact that it would eliminate the discretion of the Commission in awarding benefits to persons who have quit their jobs and need the money to live on while they start over. Under existing law, a person who has volun-tarily quit his job can be disqualified for from 1 to 25 weeks. Ward commented that experience

rates of employers in Texas have not suffered from the minimal disqualifications that have characterized unemployment cases in recent years. Average disqualification for benefits for "voluntary quits" is less than three



"I've got information about who set the Woodville Elementary School Fire." Those words would seem like pearls to County and State investigating officials who have been working for a considerable period of time trying to solve what are believed to be a string of arson fires costing the Woodville Independent School District along with many county retailers, residences

and insurance companies a lot of money.

According to State Fire Marshall G.L. Harper, who works out of his Huntsville office, "Spite, profit and remodeling fires are the most common in arson cases. ""Spite' fires are self-explanatory," he said, "'Profit' types are those where a person, for instance, would buy a place for \$10,000, insure it for \$20,000, then burn it down for the money."

Remodeling fires are where someone will deliberately let the grease burn in the frying pan to destroy, by smoke, the drapes, curtains, carpets and wallpaper; allowing them to claim against an Harper is currently working seven arson cases in Tyler County. He said the county is typical f those across the state but is becoming sort of a hub of activity.


With the Woodville school cases tops on his list Harper suggested that the people of Woodville know more than they think they know. "Someone had to have seen something from 12 midnight till the fire was discovered at 6 a.m. on the morning of July 26 when the Woodville elementary school ourned completely to the ground in approximately one hour."
