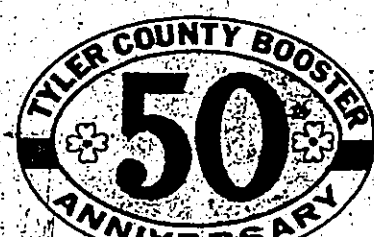

Woodville Blood Drive Scheduled Soon

The Fourth Annual Woodville Community Blood Drive is scheduled for Thursday, Jan. 15, and Friday, Jan. 16, in the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall, according to Carol Weatherall, Recruiting Coordinator.

Donations will be accepted on Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., and 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Friday donation times will be from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 to 3 p.m. All area residents are urged to donate a pint of blood and help save a life.

Woodville residents have enthusiastically supported their blood drives during the past three Januaries by giving a total of 447 pints of blood. Again in 1981 The Blood Center will be counting on 150 pints of blood from Woodville.

January is historically the month of greatest blood need both nationally and locally. In January of 1980, 1471 pints of blood were donated and used in our area and an even greater need is anticipated for the same period in 1981. Victims of holiday accidents and patients who have postponed elective surgery until after the holidays put a tremendous strain on blood centers throughout the country. Patients at Tyler County Hospital and 17 other hospitals in the seven-county area supplied by The Blood Center of Southeast Texas need your donations.

"Your personal decision to give blood can mean so much to those in need," said Ms. Weatherall. "Individual donations may be broken into component parts and used to help two patients. Giving blood not only helps the person currently in need, but

must have written consent from their parent. Donors over the age of sixty-five must have written consent from their doctor. Donors must not have had hepatitis or "yellow jaundice" or have coronary artery disease or diabetes requiring a prescription drug. They must not have had close contact (have eaten or drunk after or lived with) with someone who had hepatitis, have had ulcers or a prescription for them, or have been in a medical area for six months. They must not have been pregnant in the last six weeks or have had an allergy shot in the last 72 hours.

Many people do not realize that they ARE eligible to donate. Hypoglycemia is not a cause for being turned down, and prospective donors may take the following medications and still be acceptable blood donors:

hormones (i.e. thyroid), tranquilizers, sleeping pills, weight reduction and birth control pills, antibiotics used for dermatology problems, most blood pressure medications, and all gout medications. Donors who have had malaria at least three years ago may donate. All donors are required to have proper identification and social security card and driver's license are acceptable. Donors SHOULD EAT within four hours before donating and SHOULD NOT DRINK ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES within four hours before donating.

also provides each donor with Blood Assurance for himself and his family. Give blood now — before you or a loved one need it," she added.

The Blood Center offers donors a choice of different blood assurance plans. Individual donors may receive Family Blood Assurance. A family of the donor's choice will receive free blood under most circumstances for a year. Blood costs fifty dollars a pint so a significant savings may be realized. A variety of group plans are available to schools, churches, businesses, industries and civic organizations. Some of the Woodville groups who have participated in a group blood plan are the employees of Tyler County Hospital, Livingston Industrial Products, and Keller Aluminum Products; and members of The Woodville Lions Club. To be eligible to

participate in a group program a group must have a minimum of ten donors.

Donating blood is safe and simple and prospective donors are screened carefully. A person may be turned down for many reasons, either for his own protection or for the protection of the patient who will receive his blood. Most prospective donors who are turned down may be eligible to donate at a later date, and many prospective donors who have been turned down in the past are now eligible because of changes in the eligibility requirements. People who are uncertain of their eligibility are urged to try to donate.

Requirements for giving blood include that the donor weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good general health. He must be at least seventeen years of age and seventeen-year-olds

Two Killed In Wreck Near South Tyler County Line

A preacher supplementing his income by moonlighting as a truck driver and the daughter of two South American missionaries were killed and a third person injured in a head-on collision between an 18-wheel truck and a pickup truck on U.S. 69 early Saturday, said a Department of Public Safety spokesman.

Dead at the scene was the driver of the 18-wheeler, the Rev. William T. Argabright, 32, of Fred, and a 19-year-old passenger in the pickup, Danna

Ruth Mines of Woodville, a Lamar University student whose parents are missionaries to Argentina, officials said.

The second driver, Dennis Earl Warren, 21, of Woodville, was listed in stable condition in the intensive care unit at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Beaumont with a dislocated hip and facial injuries, a hospital spokesman said. He is due to be transferred out Tuesday.

The Rev. Argabright was hauling

wood chips for the E. & L. Lumber Co. of Woodville to a southbound location when the 4:30 a.m. accident occurred.

The pickup truck was apparently northbound on the highway when the two vehicles collided about three miles south of Warren in Tyler County, the DPS Spokesman said.

The impact of the collision apparently forced the 18-wheeler out of control when a wheel was knocked off. The truck traveled about 200 yards southward before slamming into

a tree, officials said. The pickup truck reportedly flipped over and landed on the shoulder of the northbound lane, officials said.

Funeral arrangements for both victims are being handled by Edwards Funeral Home of Woodville.

Funeral for Argabright was at 4 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 4, at Oak Grove Assembly of God church near Fred with burial in Argabright Cemetery in Bandy, Va., under the direction of Tazwell County Funeral Home of

Cedar Bluff, Va.

A native of Bandy, he had lived in Fred four months and was pastor of Oak Grove Church. He was also an Army veteran of the Vietnam War.

Survivors include his wife, Henrietta Argabright; a daughter, Shaune Argabright; and a son, Gavin Argabright, all of Fred; mother, Virginia Argabright of Bandy; and three brothers, Noah Argabright of Portsmouth, Va., Roy E. Argabright of

Bandy and Buddy Austin of Richmond, Va.

Funeral for Danna Ruth Mines, a Beaumont native who had lived most of her life in Buenos Aires, Argentina, is scheduled to be held at the First Baptist Church in Woodville at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 7.

Survivors include her parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Donald Mines of Buenos Aires; and two brothers, Steven Mines and David Mines, both of Buenos Aires.

Indian Reservation Completes Self Scrutiny Action

LIVINGSTON, TX.—Following six months of self-scrutiny and financial reassessment the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation administrative structure has been totally revamped, according to Superintendent Roland Poncho. "We have set definite goals for the Tribe and the success of these goals will largely depend upon the efficiency of our management team. I believe we have assembled a group of men and women capable of meeting the challenges ahead of us."

Poncho was appointed superintendent of the 4,000 acre reservation last May following a bitter nine month struggle between the Alabama-Coushatta Tribal Council and the Texas Indian Commission. At that time Poncho was issued a ninety-day probation period by Jack Stallings, Chairman of the commission.

In the intervening months Poncho has interviewed and selected the key personnel for his new administration. Sam A. Lettimore was hired in July as Business Manager of Tribal Enterprises, the revenue-generating department of the reservation. Originally from Luling, Texas, Lettimore is the former City Manager of San Benito. "We've got a tough row to hoe," he admitted, "but the bottom line is profit and we mean to stick to it."

Poncho and Lettimore jointly stressed the importance of placing the reservation's Camping, Recreation and Tourist Complex in its proper

perspective. "We are desperately lacking adequate social services for many of our people," Poncho explained. "Medical care is minimum at best and our employees have no retirement program whatsoever. Except, of course, for state employees."

J. Truett Powers of Livingston has been named the new Manager of

Housing, Education and Social Services. Assisting Powers in administering the reservation's Head Start program is Thelma Jo Lang. Lang is a resident of Rockland, Texas. Margaret Taylor, formerly of Houston, is serving as lead teacher for Head Start.

Jim Taylor has been appointed financial director, according to Poncho.

Some 600,000 Texas households will divide \$33.8 million this winter under the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), Martin W. Johnston, acting commissioner of the Department of Human Resources, said today.

The program, which is now in place at the Tyler County Courthouse, was established by Congress and is designed to assist low income households meet the increased cost of energy for heating their homes. Johnston said the case assistance will be one-time payments, and will range from \$20 to \$140, based on family size, income, primary heating

energy used, and county of residence. Payment will begin in January and continue through March, 1981, Johnston said.

About 400,000 households will receive the energy payment automatically, and do not have to apply for it. These are households now receiving benefits from Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income or Food Stamps.

The remaining 200,000 households are low-income families and individuals not already receiving public assistance. Members of these households will be required to apply for HEAP benefits beginning Jan. 5, 1981, and not after Feb. 28, 1981.

Each county in Texas has a designated location for members of these 200,000 households to apply for the energy assistance. These locations may be determined by calling the local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources. If certified as eligible for the assistance, applicants should have their payments within 30 days.

Household gross monthly income cannot be more than the following figures for eligibility. Number of people in household, in parentheses, precede income figure:

(1 person)—\$296; (2)—\$446; (3)—\$613; (4)—\$756; (5)—\$893; (6)—\$1044; (7)—\$1195; (8)—\$1346; (9)—\$1498; (10)—\$1649; (11)—\$1800; (12)—\$1951.
