Mobil Exec To Speak At Chester Lions Club

A clean environment is a national goal for all Americans, but so is economic growth. How the nation balances its energy needs with its wish for a clean, healthy environment will be the subject of a talk by R. (Bob) J. Schweikhardt, Environmental & Regulatory Manager of Mobil Producing Texas & New Mexico Inc., when he addresses the Chester Lions Club at the Lions Club Building on Thursday, June 18, 1981, at 7:00 p.m.

In particular, Schweikhardt will discuss the need to open up public lands for energy development. He also

will explain how some raw energy resources are developed, but their use in the marketplace is stymied by environmentalists and legislators. Uranium for nuclear energy plants is one case of energy development, but environmental and political roadblocks limit its potential. At present, at least 100 nuclear reactors, which could increase energy sources by the equivalent of nearly 3.2 million barrels a day of oil, are bogged down in red tape.

Schweikhardt will address how society ultimately pays for environmental controls—either through higher taxes or higher prices. Consequently, it is society that must decide on the relative benefits and costs, taking into consideration not only ecology, but also social and economic factors. According to the energy spokesman, it's not a question of energy versus environment, but energy and environment.

Court Stalls On Appointment

The Tyler County Commissioners held off till Thursday, June 25, at 8 a.m., a decision to appoint a Constable for Precinct 1, vacated by Jack Burns who gave up the post to join the Tyler County Sheriff's office nearly four months ago.

Some eight candidates for the position were interviewed by the Commissioners in closed session Monday including: Elton Johnson, Tommy Latta, John Kelly, Brenda Carr, W.B. Baily, Scott Gilchrist, Sonny Fowler, John Joyce and Jerry Carruth.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jerry Mahan who initiated the motion to put off the decision process explained that "My head is filled with roads and bridges and I really need more time to think this one over."

Several observers close to the Courthouse say they can't understand why the court has taken three months to fill the position and why Precinct 1 Commissioner Maxie Riley hasn't initiated action as yet to fill the post. Riley remained silent throughout the entire discussion Monday.

"If you ask me, 'It's taxation without representation,'" said one Ivanhoe resident. "It's up to the court to fill these vacancies when they exist and if you ask me they are all failing to deliver the services that we pay our hard earned taxes for."

Several weeks ago, Tommy Latta of Ivanhoe had presented a petition bearing some 160 names of persons indicating support for his candidacy for the Constable position. Latta said he had essentially no response from the court. Latta was the




Navy Mate David Waddell Serves In Japanese Waters

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



Ricky 'Sticks' Barlow Signs Contract With Detroit Tigers

Last week, Eagle pitcher Ricky "Sticks" Barlow was drafted by the Detroit Tigers and all ears have been waiting to hear the outcome of the contract negotiations. Saturday, Barlow signed a one year contract with Detroit and all that has been learned about the agreed amount of money is

that it is a five-digit number which Coach Lewis Hilliard described as a "sizeable bonus." Both Barlow and the Tigers are pleased with the resulting contract of over a week's negotiation. From here, Barlow will go into the rookie league with the Appalachian League at Bristol, Virginia. The

After completing this league's training, Barlow will play in the minor league of the International League or straight into the 1-A League of baseball.

After drafting Barlow, Detroit was limited to 25 days within which to make an offer to him. All concerned and Detroit waited for Barlow to make a decision to sign. In 15 innings this past year, he faced 416 batters, struck 217 of them out, walked 74 and only allowed 34 runs made with Barlow playing only 6 of them were earned. That makes the average of 0.099. When the Major League Scouting Bureau ran Barlow's records and other information through a rating computer, the final number put up was 52.9. Nothing over a score of 50.0 is considered definitely pro material.

Hens With Cool Heads Can Increase Egg Production Significantly Aspirin Can Often Cause Problems

A low-cost, energy caged-layer has boosted production by 11 to 30 percent in tests at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the inventor of the new energy-efficient cooling system.

Calculations on power consumption and installation costs indicate that this system is cheaper than comparable standard padlocked cooling systems.

To determine the total

impact that this energy saving cooling method could have on the poultry industry, a full-scale test will be made during the summer of 1981.

"Heat stress causes a production drop in egg production, the annual loss by the Southeastern Egg Industry members in laying houses without cooling," according to Dr. Richard Cain, environmental physiologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

In the first test in 1980, daylong heat stress was simulated in an environmental chamber by raising the temperature and 16 hours of 75 degrees F temperature.

Since the volume of air required for cooling is small, the operation of air ducts blowing 62 degrees F air through the house during the summer of 1981.

"This drop in egg production represents a 19 to 22 million dollar egg production loss by the Southeastern Egg Industry members in laying houses without cooling," according to Dr. Richard Cain, environmental physiologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Cooling unit is able to handle 10,000 chickens.

Following the pilot experiment in the chamber, a similar system was installed in a commercial layer house. This house had both young and old hens in cooled and non-cooled cages.

The experiment covered a 12-week period. Cain says, "The potential of the system for economically producing more eggs is significant." The comparable value for the older hens getting cooled air was 14.3 percent better than the counterparts getting no cooling treatment.

These figures are significantly higher than the 1.25 percent improvement between cooled and non-cooled hens, although shell

cubic feet per minute were available during the hot period only and the other half of the cages did not get any cooling treatment.

An average of 31 percent better egg production was recorded for the 50 cooled hens.

There was no significant difference in egg weight between cooled and non-cooled hens.

HERE'S HOW!

FITTING ELECTRIC CORD TO BASEBOARD

When fitting electric cord to baseboard or around door frames, use plastic clips that are designed for the exact width of the cord used. Fit the clip on one end of a long length of cord, to the baseboard or plug point, at least 12 inches from the end of excess cord for fitting in the clip. Then running the cord between the thumb and forefinger pull the clip tight for about a second, clip 30 centimeters along the baseboard. Continue like this, clipping every 12 inches until the cord is in its position. This usually leads to unsightly bulges between each clip because the cord is not reached.

CORRECTING A BREAKING STAI'R TREAD...

A simple way of correcting a strong metal angle bracket to the underside of the tread and the riser below it. Fit one bracket each side of the tread, and then fit a stirrup bracket in the center of the tread and riser.

Weed Free Garden Saves Time And Labor

Weeds can be just as big a problem to the spare-time home gardener in Texas as they are to commercial producers of vegetables, according to Dr. Sam Cotner, State Horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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garden, not only compete with the desirable plants for water, fertility, sunlight, and air," Cotner says. "But can also harbor many different types of insects, as well as numerous plant diseases."

Experimental gardeners are aware of the time-tested and proven methods of weed control, which include hoeing and mulching.

For many gardeners, hand hoeing is still the best answer to controlling troublesome and pesky weeds. It is inexpensive, obviously selective, very accurate, effective, and for some, even enjoyable.

It is obvious that exercise is also involved,

which is one of the added rewards of growing vegetables at a home. However, many gardeners simply don't have time to spend more time to spend that they will work well in their vegetable gardens.

Mulching around existing garden vegetables helps control weeds and grasses by keeping light away from the seedlings and providing a mechanical barrier to their emergence.

Most herbicides are selective which means that they will work well in some crops but may damage more sensitive vegetables.

There is also the problem of applying the chemical evenly to the seedlings and providing a barrier to their emergence application or mis-

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states that it can be used around the vegetables you intend to plant in the garden.

One plan that he says works well on larger gardens is the grubbing of vegetables which have a tolerance to Dacthal so the herbicide can be used to control weeds in that area. But be prepared to use a long-handled hoe in untreated areas of the garden.

Perhaps the best chemical weed control now available to the home garden is a pre-plant treatment with Vapam. Vapam can be used in home gardens to rid them of weeds as well as nematodes and several types of fungi.

Since it is a soil sterilant, it must be applied to a totally bare garden soil.

Vapam can be easily applied to 'well-worked-up' garden soil, using a commonly available hose-on-type sprayer. After applying the chemical at the recommended rate, water the garden surface enough to soak the surface. This acts as a water seal and prevents chemical loss to the atmosphere.

On sandy soils, Cotner says, the Vapam treatment can be made more effective if the garden is covered with plastic sheeting immediately after applying chemical.

Vapam works extremely well but has the disadvantage that it must be applied several

weeks prior to planting, to allow the chemical to completely dissipate in the soil.

It also does best if applied when soil temperatures are above 55 degrees F. Consequently, best results are obtained when Vapam is applied during late summer or early fall, in anticipation of a relatively weed-free fall garden.

Cotner says Vapam will greatly reduce weed and disease problems in the garden for 9 to 12 months if it is applied by the recommended methods.
