A TRIBUTE TO EMMETT RHODES

Emmett R. Rhodes, a true pioneer in the Rural Electrification program, was a major force in bringing electricity to rural homes in East Texas. The system he helped develop brought light where there was darkness in the Pineywoods of ten East Texas counties.

Throughout his 36 years of service to Sam Houston Electric Cooperative, Inc., he dedicated his strength and determination, his knowledge and his leadership to building one of the finest rural electric distribution systems in the country. He gained experience in all areas of the Cooperative's operation. From his early days as an office employee, he moved into the line department where he spent many years working as a lineman.

As a young man he dug the holes, framed and set the poles and strung the lines. He worked with crews that carried poles on their shoulders to locations which otherwise were inaccessible....but where a need existed for a line to serve people.

His dependability and leadership were recognized many years ago as he was given increasing responsibilities in survey, right of way acquisition, engineering and distribution operations. In his position as Assistant Manager he planned and coordinated the construction of distribution lines and substations throughout the entire system.

Because he was involved in all the construction from the earliest lines to the newest substation, it has been said, "Emmett Rhodes knew every mile of line in the system." His knowledge of the system and its distribution operation was unequalled.

During destructive storms or hurricanes, when it was necessary for employees to work around the clock for days at a time, he faithfully coordinated the efforts to restore power to consumers. He refused to rest as long as crews were still working and consumers were without electricity.

Emmett Rhodes was a patriot whose distinguished military record included service in World War II and the Korean Conflict and promotion to the rank of Master Sergeant.

His manner and actions earned respect from all who came in contact with him. Employees, consumers, power company representatives, city, county and state officials; engineers, developers, contractors, builders, businessmen, salesmen, industry representatives, all respected Emmett Rhodes as a man who was fair and honest in all his dealings.

Even during trying situations, he maintained a calm sense of patience and his actions reflected a professional manner. His position presented situations that sometimes required difficult decisions. He made those decisions with courage and reasoning that considered what was right and fair to all involved.

A great compassion for his employees and a sincere concern for the consumers are characteristics recognized by those who knew him. In a manner that did not require public attention, he was helpful to a countless number of people.

His life had a dynamic effect on the people who knew him and on Sam Houston Electric Cooperative Inc.

Throughout Texas and our nation, Emmett R. Rhodes is respected as a leader in the field of Rural Electrification.

Some Shoplifting

You may be a criminal if you have ever slipped a tipnick into your purse without paying for it because the line at the checkout counter was too long; or stolen a candy bar from a store shelf on a dare. That's no big deal," a juvenile mind might say. "After all, everybody does it."

But both of these acts are actually considered shoplifting—and shoplifting is a crime with penalties that are no laughing matter!

Shoplifting is not just a legal problem. It is an economic problem, because for every \$100 worth of merchandise stolen, a store must sell \$5,000 to make up the loss—and eventually the consumer pays the tab. It is also a moral problem, because it violates the commandment, "Thou shalt not steal."

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
