Candidates File For Demo Race

Candidates filing for the May 1st Democratic Primary election number eight thus far with races shaping up in the Tyler County Judges office, the office of County Treasurer and in the County Clerks office.

Filing thus far is Incumbent County Judge Allen Sturrock, 62, who has held elective office in the county for some 11 years.

Tommy Latta, 51, a painting contractor of Hillister filed before Sturrock for the judges post when the Democratic filing office opened briefly Saturday morning. Latta who filed the \$300 application fee has been in the paint contracting business for some 25 years in the Golden Triangle area and currently serves as a paint contracting consultant. He has served as

pastor of two United Methodist Churches in this area for the past four years. During the past year Latta organized the Ivanhoe Volunteer Fire Department and presently serves as Chief of the 15 member organization.

Janie Pate DuBose, 37, who currently works as Assistant County Auditor has filed for the County Treasurer seat currently being held by Austin Fuller who is expected to file Wednesday, Jan. 6. Fuller has held the office of County Treasurer for two terms and said he would make a statement soon regarding his candidacy.

DuBose is the daughter of Lillie Mae Pate and the late Sam Pate, is married and has three daughters.

She is a graduate of Kirby High School and has five years experience in the Tyler County Hospital Accounting Department and has been the Assistant County Auditor for 6 1/2 years. Mrs. DuBose said she has qualifications in both County Government and Accounting and has attended several accounting seminars sponsored by the State County Auditors Association at the University of Texas at Austin. "I have the capabilities and ex-

perience in handling all the duties of the County Treasurer including Certificates of Deposit to earn the highest interest on county monies.

The Fifth Annual Woodville Community Blood Drive will take place Thursday and Friday, Jan. 14 and 15 in the Fellowship Hall of the First Baptist Church.

Prospective donors will be welcomed: Thurs. 9:30-11:30; 1-3; and 4-6 and on Fri. 9:30-11:30; and 1-5.

Because of the tremendous need only groups who consistently conduct successful blood drives are scheduled in January and patients in 17 area hospitals including Tyler County Hospi-

tal, will be depending on the generosity of Woodville citizens for a significant amount of the blood they need in January. About 600 dona-

tions have been made during Woodville blood drives since 1978. Blood use increases dramatically during January. The reasons for this increase are that elective surgeries are scheduled so heavily that it seems as if every operating room is busy 24 hours a day. Everyone, including the patient, doctor, and hospital staff, wants to enjoy the holidays so everything except dire emergencies are scheduled "after the holidays."

The first week in January it seems like heart surgeries are more common than tonsillectomies or even toothaches and that everybody's stomach ulcer bleeds.

Unfortunately this situation prevails all across the United States and each blood bank finds it almost impossible to borrow from other blood banks. Each blood bank must do whatever is necessary to maintain an adequate supply for patients in the hospitals it services.

Most of us think in terms of someone else needing blood and do not seriously consider the likelihood of our

using blood, or a member of our family using blood. Surprisingly statistics show that we each have a 98% lifetime chance of being a blood recipient.

Almost everyone of us wants a good supply of blood available: the day we need it, so asking those who are physically able to donate blood is a reasonable request.

Besides helping make blood available a blood donor receives Blood Assurance for himself and his immediate family. Unlimited free blood used in hospitals serviced by

The Blood Center is available immediately upon donation when needed for accidents or childbirth and after a three month waiting period for other conditions. Credits worth up to fifty-five dollars per unit used will be sent to hospitals outside our area. The blood used for the following conditions, if pre-existing, is excluded from coverage: hemophilia, leukemia, aplastic anemia, or other hereditary or acquired blood disease, ulcers of the gastrointestinal tract, pulmonary tuberculosis, cancer congeni-

tal or acquired cardiovascular diseases. Woodville residents who currently have Family Blood Assurance are not subject to the 90 day waiting period if they renew their Blood Assurance.

Past President Jimmy Carter, who has donated several gallons of blood, said "A donation of blood is an unequalled

expression of concern for one fellowman and a source of deepest satisfaction to both donor and recipient." January is such a time of concern that it has been designated National Blood Donor Month by President Ronald Reagan. Let us all join with our President and give the gift of life.

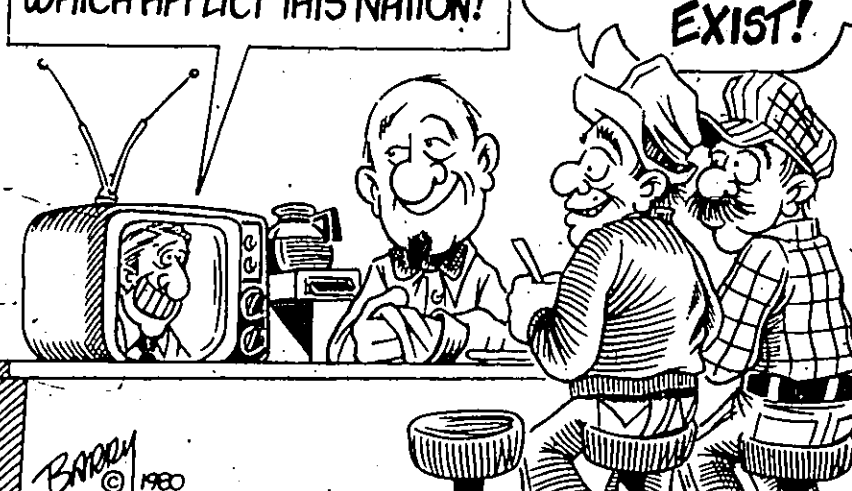

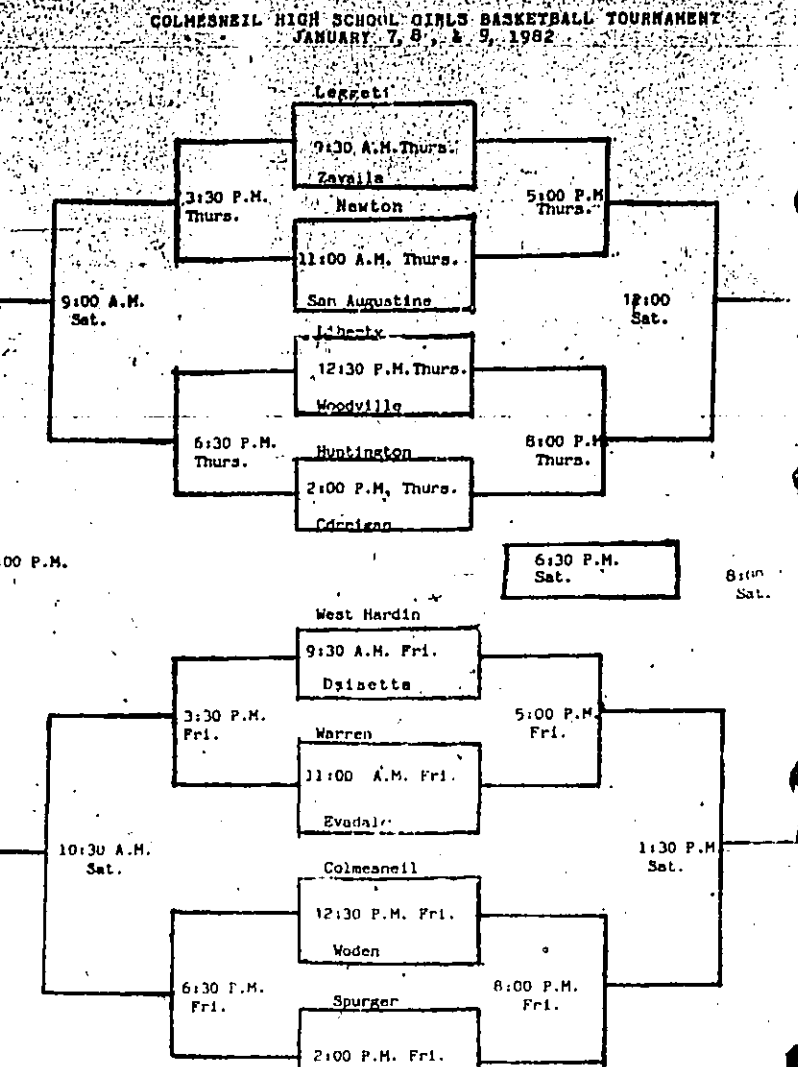

Q: If a bank customer has evidence to prove that a check was made in error in calculating his account, what action can the customer take?

A: As a general rule, the law provides a remedy only if there is an injury. Therefore, if the bank makes an error but you catch it before any harm is done, you have no legal remedy - you can only complain to the bank.

If, however, the error causes you loss by dishonoring your check, the bank can require the bank to compensate, including damages for an arrest or prosecution.

Sometimes a bank mistakenly honors a check which was forged or altered and reduces the customer's account accordingly. In such a situation, it is the customer's duty to exercise reasonable care to spot the error and notify the bank. The bank must then credit the amount back to your account.

Q: I have a check of sales and utility receipts dating back several years. I'm afraid somebody will challenge me as to whether or not I've paid certain bills from years ago. How long should I keep receipts for charges for purchases, promissory notes, utility bills and etc? Isn't there a statute of limitations?

A: Yes, there is a 4-year statute of limitations which applies to contracts such as those shown by your receipts. No suit to collect the debts could be brought after that time.

Some of your bills are, however, so small enough that keeping the receipts showing their payment is really unnecessary for more than a few weeks or months. During these four years, you may also offer substitute forms of proof of payment, such as cancelled checks.

Q: I have no chance of restoring my rights to vote, own a handgun, or get a passport after being convicted of a felony. I've been out of prison for about seven years and have a good job. I've kept my record clean. What can I do?

A: There is no restriction in federal law that prevents your obtaining a passport after a felony conviction.

Texas law governs the other two privileges you mentioned. Your voting rights, along with other civil rights, can be restored to you when a pardon is granted by the Governor. If this pardon also states that you were not guilty of the crime for which you were convicted, you can possess a firearm. However, under a general pardon, you will be restricted to keeping a handgun only at your residence.

Q: My brother and I own adjoining land. I don't want my brother's grazing on my property. Do I have to build a fence to keep the cattle out or can I make him build the fence? Can I make him pay grazing fees?

A: Although your brother's cattle legally cannot graze on your land, you cannot force him to build a fence. Your brother will be responsible for any damage that his cattle do to your property, but this damage will be difficult to measure. The most practical approach is to agree to let the cattle on your land for a set grazing fee.

Q: I am considering hiring an attorney to represent me, but before doing so, I want to find out more about her. How can I check on an attorney's credentials?

A: As a minimum, make certain that your attorney is licensed in Texas by examining her law license and permanent law card. Talk to friends and acquaintances who may have used this particular attorney and ask about the service they received. If an attorney has been publicly disciplined for some violation of the Code of Professional Ethics, a record is available from the Office of the General Counsel, State Bar of Texas. Basically, however, the choice will be based upon your personal reaction to the attorney and the services you need.

Q: My wife died suddenly. We had some property which we had accumulated during our marriage, but I realized recently that the deed does not contain my name, only hers. Is there a way I can have this deed transferred to my name?

A: There is really no need to "transfer" the deed. If your wife's will leaves you her estate, the executor will transfer the property from her estate.

Q: If your wife died without a will, and you have not offered the will for probate, you should hire an attorney to assist you in settling the estate and establishing title.

Q: My parents gave the County an acre of land over thirty years ago for the express written purpose of making it into a park. At all of this time, the land has not been touched. My father wanted to get the land back, but before he could get the necessary papers and information together, he died. Can the heirs to his estate get the land back, and what would be involved?

Q: Yes, your father's heirs can get the land back if your father had that right at the time he died. The deed must be carefully reviewed as to whether a "reversionary interest" exists. If the deed was properly prepared and worded, the County may deed it back when the provision in the deed is explained. Otherwise, a lawsuit will be required to regain possession of the land.

Q: I want to give my married daughter some of our land. Will the land become community property since she is married, or can it be considered her own separate property?

A: The Texas Constitution defines separate property to include a gift received during marriage to the land will be regarded as belonging to your daughter. Give the deed to her using the words "to her sole and separate property," and advise her to maintain the land from her separate funds. Evidence that the land was a gift plus careful bookkeeping will maintain the land's character as separate.

Q: If an atheist is summoned to testify in court, is his testimony considered valid? Also, can the court make him take the oath? For that matter, does an atheist have to show up in court at all?

A: An atheist may be required to testify in court, and his testimony may be considered by the jury of court in the same way as the testimony of any other witness. The difference is that an atheist may not be required to take a religious oath before testifying. He will, however, be required to take an oath or affirmation that is most binding on his own conscience. Adherence to particular religious or ethical code does not excuse a witness from answering a subpoena. Failure to appear and testify may result in arrest, fine and jail for contempt.

Q: My neighbor grows hedge and honeyuckle on his side of our common fence. I planted running roses which I can't even see because of his hedge and vines. The fence belongs to me but I don't want to cause hard feelings. What is the law on this problem?

A: If your neighbor's activities interfere with the condition of your property, or with your use of the property, it may be shown that he has created a nuisance. You could bring suit under this theory. The case would focus on the duration of his interference with use of your property.

Q: I've rented an apartment on a month-to-month basis but I signed no rental agreement. The landlord now says he is going to raise the rent. Can he do this, and how much advance notice am I entitled to have?

A: The nature of a month-to-month rental agreement is that it renews itself each month on the same terms as the preceding month. Either you or your landlord may terminate the lease upon one month's notice. You are entitled to a month's notice of a rent increase. If he does give you notice, you can either pay the increased rent or tell the landlord that you will vacate, again in 30 days.

Q: My husband and I have a home that is paid for. If I move out and wait several months to obtain a divorce, can he sell the house and keep my share of the proceeds?

A: Since the deed bears both your names, the property will remain one-half yours. Your husband will not be able to sell the home without your joining in the sale. Actually, most real estate agents will not even list community property for sale unless both spouses sign the listing contract. During separation and divorce, community property continues to belong equally to both, and even during your divorce, your interest cannot be disposed of.

Q: Recently a lawyer agreed to defend me but he never stated the exact amount of his fee nor did we ever agree on an amount. I received an enormous bill. I don't believe I was charged fairly. What is my recourse now?

A: First get an itemized statement of the services and charges and go over the bill with the attorney. If the problem is not resolved, you may refuse to pay the bill, inviting the attorney to sue to determine how much you owe. In addition, an attorney may be professionally disciplined for charging an excessive fee. To determine whether your fee violates the Code of Professional Responsibility, you must file a written complaint with the Grievance Committee in your area. Finally, and only if both you and your attorney agree, you may submit your dispute to a Fee Arbitration Committee if one exists in your area.

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Mental Health Drug Abuse Block Grant Totals Given

Austin-Although final dollar amounts have yet to be awarded at the national level, percentages have been worked out for Texas in regard to the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Block Grant.

The Texas Department of Mental Health/Mental Retardation will receive 40 percent of the federal funds under the block grant, the Drug Abuse Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs 36 percent and the Texas Commission on Alcoholism 24 percent, according to Jim Clipson, chairman of the over- sight committee, administering the block grant.

Clipson is TCA chairman. Other committee members are Gray Beck, chairman, TDMHMR, and Sid Weisen, executive director, TACA.

"Whatever the amount of the block grant, we are concerned that Texas is not getting its fair share," Clipson noted. He said Gov. William P. Clements had written Richard Schweiker, secretary of Health and Human Services, pointing out that, though Texas is the third state in population, and is experiencing one of the greatest rates of population increase in the United States it ranks ninth in percentage of the 1982 allocation.

Clipson said he believes increased federal taxes on alcohol, which have not been raised since 1951 - a decrease in terms of inflation - could help pay for alcoholism programs.

Clipson also noted that there has been a decrease in federal funding for alcoholism programs.

"There is no corresponding decrease in our problems," Clipson said. "From 1970 to 1980 the population of Texas increased a little over 27 percent. Per capita alcohol consumption in the same time period increased 77 percent."

From the earliest days of our history, Americans have competed aggressively and successfully in world trade. By the middle of this century, we unquestionably led the world in exports because of the quality of our goods and the productivity of our workers.

Unfortunately, this situation has changed. For the past two years, we have seen a slight trade surplus, but this year a substantial deficit is projected. What happened?

American workers are still productive, and the quality of our goods is still high - although other Western industrialized nations have "caught up" with us in many respects. But in fact, in many industries American companies are not able to compete on an even footing with their foreign counterparts because of differences in trade policy from nation to nation.

Japan and Western European nations often subsidize their export industries, enabling them to sell goods in the U.S. much cheaper than even our own manufacturers. On the other end of the trade balance, these same nations set up trade barriers to restrict American companies' ability to sell abroad. The U.S. has rejected the idea of setting up comparable barriers, because we believe truly free trade is the best path to prosperity for us and for the rest of the world.

Some of our problems have been the result of restrictions which stem from our own laws. For instance, the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, designed with the noble intention of outlawing attempts to bribe foreign officials, has had the effect of making foreign trade more cumbersome and expensive because of certain meaningless restrictions and red tape.

Similarly, our tax structure has penalized Americans working abroad: I am pleased to note, however, that one of the provisions in the tax relief package passed this summer will bring relief on that score.

Our government also has neglected to take actions which could help our industries be more competitive in the world market without setting up trade barriers. For example, the Export Trading Company Act of 1981, which was passed by the Senate, but is held up in committee in the House, would help small- and medium-sized businesses combine their marketing and promotional activities so they can compete more effectively.

Yet, even if we overcome all of our internally imposed barriers to effective competition, we will still face problems dealing with countries which provide direct subsidies to their own industries and restrict ours.

This situation will require improving our trade posture through world negotiations. While we should avoid the temptation to throw up counter-productive barriers in the name of protection, we must let our trading partners know we expect fairness and equity in our dealing with them.

I am pleased that the Administration is working toward this end through efficient, timely and certain enforcement of the fair trade provisions of U.S. trade laws and the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). GATT is the multilateral agreement subscribed to by 85 governments which together account for more than four-fifths of world trade. Substantial reduction of tariffs and other barriers to trade is its principal aim. This Administration has aggressively and efficiently pursued U.S. trade rights under GATT.

Of particular interest to Texas will be negotiations with the European Economic Community with regard to alleged unfair trade practices in the citrus and poultry industries. Exports in these areas have been greatly diminished by European import subsidies to their industries.

I also hope that the Congress next year will look at legislative recommendations for putting our own industries on a more even footing in the world market.

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DPS Recruit Training Starts Soon

The Texas Department of Public Safety will conduct an additional recruit training school starting March 9th, 1982 and is in need of qualified applicants to fill State Trooper vacancies, according to Major A. J. Mladenska, Regional Commander of the Department of Public Safety in Houston.

"The qualifications an applicant must meet are between 20 and 35 years of age, of good moral character, excellent physical condition, a citizen of the United States and have a minimum of sixty college hours." Major Mladenska continued, "Among the benefits that a Department of Public Safety Trooper enjoys are: two weeks annual vacation, all holidays provided for by the Legislature, modern liberal retirement system, group hospitalization and life insurance plan, traveling expenses, longevity pay, and uniforms with all necessary equipment to perform their duties."

A State Trooper receives eighteen weeks of training in all aspects of modern law enforcement at the Homer Garrison Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. During training the recruit will receive pay of \$1,223.00 dollars a month and upon graduation the new Trooper will be assigned to one of the uniformed services of the Department.

Major Mladenska said, "The Department has been very successful in its search for recruits from minority groups of both sexes and encourages persons who think that they would qualify to contact Caroline Ybarra, DPS Recruiter in Region 2 at 713/681-1761."

"Region II is most interested in being well represented by the qualified persons available," Major Mladenska stated.

Pentagon Figures

Misleading On

All Volunteer Forces,

The Pentagon reports "good news" for the all-volunteer force. For the 1981 fiscal year just ended, all of the armed services met their recruiting goals, the rate of reenlistment was up, test scores were better and the proportion of high school graduates volunteering was higher than it has ever been.

The Army, which has had serious difficulties attracting volunteers with high school diplomas, reports that 78 percent of its male recruits last year were high school graduates, up almost 30 percent from the year before. According to the Pentagon, 60 percent of those eligible for reenlistment last year signed up for additional hitch, up about 6 percent from 1980.

But, as you probably know, I have been skeptical of the all-volunteer system since President Nixon ended the draft in 1973, and I am convinced that our manpower weakness is at least as serious a threat to national security as weaknesses in our weapons systems.

Of course, we should applaud any improvement in the caliber of our military personnel and the Pentagon's report probably should make us all sleep a little better at night.

But we are misleading ourselves if we accept the Pentagon's new statistics as proof positive that the all-volunteer force is a success, that it is the best way to run an army.

The Administration says improved recruitment and reenlistment are the direct result of higher military pay and improved educational benefits. I certainly don't begrudge our men and women in uniform enough money to keep them from having to live off food stamps.

But a factor the Administration has not mentioned is the effect economic conditions have on recruitment. A high unemployment rate makes military service a more attractive option to young people who might otherwise end up pounding the pavement looking for jobs that aren't there.

If the economy takes a turn for the better, we can count on recruitment and reenlistment taking a turn for the worse.

The Pentagon also left out the fact that we are still having problems filling the ranks of the National Guard and the reserves, both obviously critical to military preparedness.

The goal is readiness, to be prepared to mobilize our armed forces literally at a moment's notice. Yet when 25 percent of the young men reaching the age of 18 don't even register with the Selective Service, it's clear that we have a serious mobilization problem.

Critics of the peacetime draft generally contend that we can always

return to conscription when we need to. I suppose what they are talking about is war. Certainly, then military mobilization will be a number-one priority.

But it is foolish to wait until the last minute to deal with an issue that speaks to this country's very survival. Doesn't it make more sense to reestablish the draft before we face an emergency of such proportion?

It is one of those peculiar ironies that President Reagan, who is as committed as any president in recent history to strengthening our national defense, is a champion of the volunteer army. Personally, it's a position I cannot comprehend.

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
