# Home In-transit

Professional housemovers worked feverishly Tuesday in jacking up and moving the rear of a frame home which when connected to the front half will become the home of the Tyler County Youth Development Center, Inc. A facility run by Tyler County citizens for the benefit and protection of delinquent, neglected and dependant children between the ages of 10 and 17.

Homer Booth of the B&S Construction Company of Livingston said he would route the house to a location some four miles east of Woodville to a tract of land donated to the TCYDC by H.B. Waddell of the Woodville Ready Mix Company.

The members of the TCYDC were also excited this week about the \$500 donation by the First Baptist Church of Woodville to help defray the moving cost. Dr. Raymond Parker was an early supporter of the project and indicated then several months ago that he would do what he could to pledge the support of his congregation.

Fund raising goal of the organization has been set at \$4,000 which includes the cost of a water well installation and the actual cost of the housemoving.

The house will offer emergency custodial care for children between the ages of 10-17 who are not being provided adequate supervision.

The organization plans in the next few months to open the Center with licensed capacity of six children which will be given parental type custodial care while in residence. Houseparents for the Center will be certified and licensed by the Texas Youth Council and the Texas Department of Human Resources. All state standards necessary for providing this type of care will meet or exceed state requirements said John Morrison, President of the organization.

The next meeting of the Tyler County Youth Development Center will be Thursday, Feb. 4 at 7 p.m. at the Tyler County Courthouse.

According to Morrison new fund raising initiatives will be discussed as well as a possible fund application availability will be presented to the group. Membership and facilities reports will also be given as well as recognition for the donors who have stepped forward in behalf of the program.

Currently the TCYDC is actively soliciting donations of household furnishings for the house including all furniture items, kitchen utensils, linens, and all other necessities for the home.

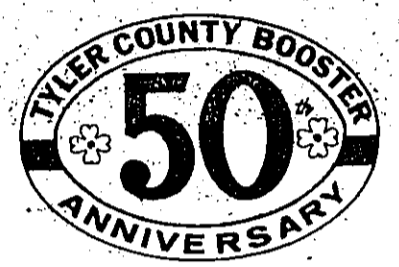

Either American business sucks it up and says we can be competitive, or there will be more than cameras and cars coming from Japan and under wear from Taiwan.

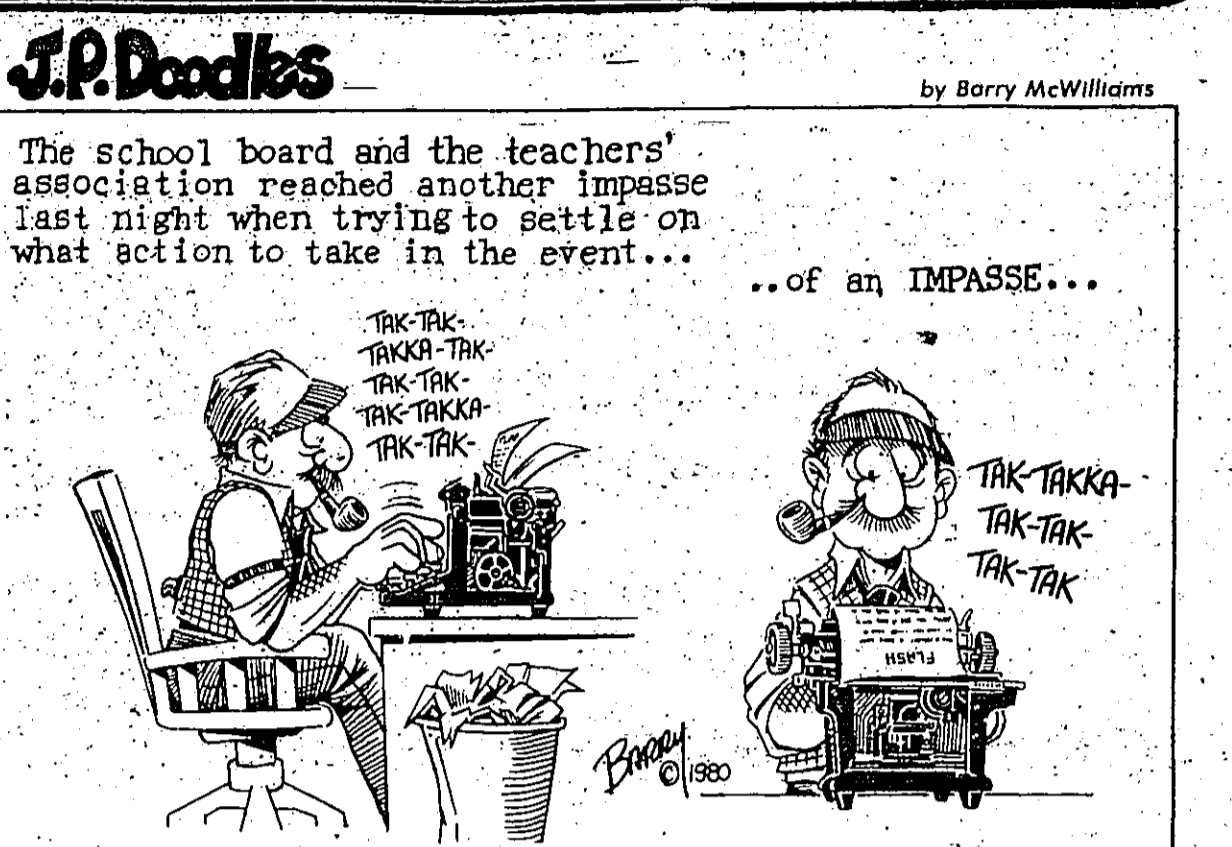

# State Property Tax Board Reminder: "Pay Taxes Before End Of January"

Austin—An important deadline occurs this month for property owners in Texas. Kenneth Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, today reminded taxpayers that local property taxes assessed for 1981 by cities, counties, school districts and special districts must be paid by the end of January. "Taxes not paid before February 1 are delinquent and penalty and interest begin to accrue," Graeber said. The state tax administrator noted that delinquent 1981 taxes will incur a 6 percent penalty and 1 percent interest charge on February 1. Combined penalty and interest charges will total 9 percent in March, 11 percent in April, 13 percent in May, and 15 percent in June. Total penalty and interest on delinquent taxes reaches 18 percent in July, 19 percent in August, 20 percent in September, 21 percent in October, 22 percent in November, and 23 percent in December. If not paid until January 31, delinquent 1981 property taxes would be subject to a combined 24 percent penalty and interest charge. And, Graeber noted, the interest would continue to increase by 1 percent per month. In addition, if a taxing jurisdiction or appraisal district has contracted with a delinquent tax attorney, a city's delinquency date for its 1981 taxes may differ from the delinquency date of a taxing jurisdiction. Graeber pointed out that some home owners may have different delinquency dates for 1981 taxes. "The Property Tax Code does not allow a delinquency date for 1981 taxes to be later than January 10, the delinquency date is postponed to the first day of the next month that will provide a period of at least 21 days after the date of mailing for payment of taxes before delinquency." Taxpayers, with questions, are encouraged to contact local government tax offices.

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**Strake Against Gun Control**

**Hobby Position Unclear**

Beaumont—Former Secretary of State George Strake came out strongly against gun control as a measure to combat crime here today and accused Lt. Governor Bill Hobby of sympathizing with the liberal Texas Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, which is in favor of gun control.

Strake, who is a candidate for the Lt. Governor spot, claimed, "Crime in Texas has risen 131 percent during the Hobby years and the public outcry is reaching epidemic proportions."

"A tough judicial system is what stops criminals and crime," Strake said. "It's time Hobby stands up for what he believes in."

Strake delivered his remarks at a morning press conference here concluding a three day sweep of campaigning in the east Texas area.

Hobby of "hiding behind his no-vote record" to disguise his real views. "The fact that Hobby helped raise \$60,000 for the ACLU in November of 1980 is a firm indication of where Hobby's real sympathies lie and they don't lie with the average Texan who fears for his life and property," he added. Fort Worth If Jesus were alive today, he probably would not preach on television, says one of the Southwest's best known TV preachers.

Instead, Jesus would probably teach in an elementary school, or work with the Boy Scouts, or relate in some way to children and youth. H. Barry Bailey, Methodist Church here, whose sermons are televised into nine states and whose Sunday morning worship service holds the highest audience rating of any regular religious program on television in the Dallas-Ft. Worth area.

The statement provides an insight into a master modern communicator of the Christian message who, he says, must be more than "cheerleading."

Inspiration is to preaching as seasoning is to a salad, Bailey says. "Important, but not the main ingredient. Ideas which transcend the particular culture and ideas like peace, love, compassion, mercy, forgiveness, are the stuff of reality," he claims.

"We need a better idea of God if we are to have a better world," he reasons. Teaching is the intellectual part of preaching. A good preacher will do some teaching, and a good teacher will engage in some preaching, he says.

True to his conviction as a teacher, Bailey recently presented to his congregation a series of sermons on the lives and teachings of five major Protestant theologians of the 20th century: Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Rudolf Bultmann, Karl Barth, Reinhold Niebuhr, and Paul Tillich.

"The average Christian needs to know the thoughts of those giant religious thinkers," Bailey says in explaining the reasons for the series. "We need to know something about where certain truths we hold came from. When you forget your past you destroy your present."

He says he decided to take a chance on his congregation. "People are smart. Why not compliment them by presenting the ideas of these great thinkers? Today we seem to be in a dry period of intellectual ferment. One good thinker can create an atmosphere of thinking, and we all can learn. Since these theologians deal with critical issues of their day creatively and much of what they said is quite relevant today, I was drawn to them."

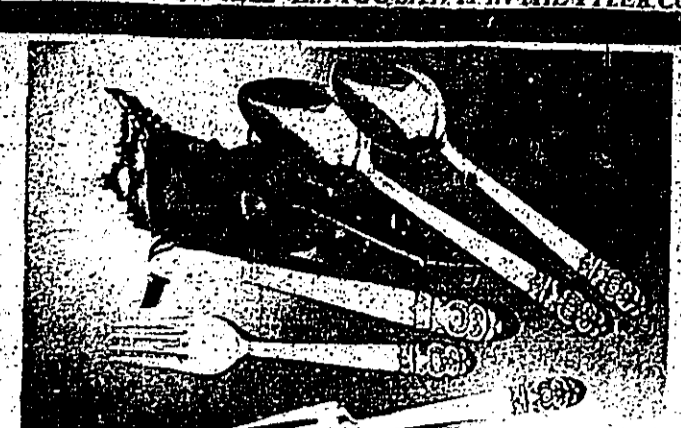

### All Systems Go At Birth

A baby is born with all systems go. But it takes a while to get all those systems working together as one. This, then, is the first major educational objective: to get several systems seeing, reaching, feeling, tasting, working together on a single object. At this point an object begins to be something real and permanent. Baby, apart from his own self, is something that exists.

The crosspiece should be a length of rubber hose or a cardboard tube like the ones on clothes hangers-but sharp ends or sticks, in case the mobile breaks, and no long dangling strings or anything else the baby could possibly hurt himself with. From each end, dangle another length of string. Tie an object small enough for Baby to grasp on each one. For instance, on one side might be a small square of round block, and on the other side a short rubber bone to balance it.

Other objects to use as a teaching ring, squeaky toys (especially those which have humanlike heads and faces-babies love these), a bottle, rattle or small plastic bottle. The objects can be changed once a week or more often if Baby loses interest. By using fewer things at a time and changing them fairly often, you will avoid overstimulating the baby. This is important because loading a baby up with too many things can kill curiosity just as too scanty an environment can.

The objects on the mobile should be at the distance of the baby's outstretched palm, and the swing of the crosspiece should be enough so that when the baby finally grasps the object, he can get it just into his mouth.

A baby will be more interested if the objects have bright colors and contrast of light and dark. For instance, if a block is a solid color, paint a bull's-eye on the bottom with black non-toxic marker; infants at this age find such a design most interesting. Reflecting a national trend, the number of women enrolled in Texas medical schools increased during the 1980-81 academic year by nearly 9 percent over the previous year, says the Texas Medical Association.

And the number of graduates from the state's medical schools rose by 26 percent during the same period. The statistics were tabulated from nationwide figures compiled by the American Medical Association. Nationally, the number of students enrolled in medical schools during 1980-81 increased slightly over the previous year from 64,195 to 65,497.

In Texas, medical school enrollment increased from 1,811 in 1979-80 to 1,944 in 1980-81. Statistics for 1980-81 show that women comprised 24 percent of Texas' medical school enrollment and 26.5 percent of the nation's medical students.

Texas continued to rank third in the number of residents entering medical school-1,044 when something else catches his attention-at which time the object with 1,228.

# Texas Winning Battle To Properly Immunize Kids

A state health official says Texas is winning its battle to have very young children immunized against the potentially dangerous or deadly childhood diseases.

A survey of two-year-old children - those born in 1978 who had not reached their third birthdays - shows that 82 percent had received a complete series of immunizations, reports the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

Faust Smith, director of the TDH Immunization Division, said 91 percent of the children surveyed had received three or more doses of the diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (DTP) vaccine; 89 percent had received three or more doses of polio vaccine; 87 percent had received one or more doses of measles vaccine; and 86 percent had received one or

more doses each of mumps and rubella vaccines. Smith said 82.4 percent had received all needed immunizations.

The survey, now in its third year, has seen a rise in immunization levels in two-year-old children, according to James W. Drake, director of programs in the Immunization Division. "This gives us much-needed information and fills in the gaps between children in this age bracket and those enrolled in day care centers and schools," said Drake.

Legislation passed in 1971 made complete immunizations mandatory for those attending public or private schools and child care facilities. Since 1970, said Drake, Texas has had about a 92 percent reduction in morbidity (cases) and an 89 percent reduction in mortality for immunizable diseases.

immunization levels rose sharply for school-age children and those attending day care centers when immunizations became compulsory. The danger areas were the preschoolers, and emphasis was given to the younger children.

Dr. C. E. Alexander, Chief of the Bureau of Communicable Disease Services, urged parents and physicians to assure that every child in need of a basic series of booster immunizations receives them at the recommended time.

Dr. Alexander emphasized that if a child isn't immunized completely before the third birthday, there is a tendency among parents to wait until time for school enrollment. During this period, disease can strike the unimmunized, he said.

Collection of data on two-year-olds began with 1976 births under a

United States Public Health Service requirement which asked for a sampling of 600 children. The first year, only 484 of the targeted children were located to gain the information, which showed that 78.8 percent were fully immunized.

From 1977 births, the number rose to 506

children actually surveyed with a complete immunization record of 79.6 percent. In the 1978 births, records were compiled on 544 of the 600 children, with the 82.4 percent immunization completion.

"We worked awfully hard to trace all of the children, since the families were so mobile.

Some had moved out of state," said Drake.

"As a last resort, we contacted birth attendants and found eight or 10 this way. One person was contacted in another state after we contacted a doctor, who said the mother had just written for an immunization record," Drake said.

cooperation is good with other states.

The Immunization Division currently is working on a survey of babies born in 1979, and the program is being expanded to include 1,800 newborns - 150 for each of the department's 12 Public Health Regions. Of this number, 600 will be selected randomly for inclusion in

the Centers for Disease Control, Atlanta, Ga., nationwide survey.

Drake said the regional data will be extremely helpful in fine tuning immunization programs for preschoolers in the 12 Public Health Regions in Texas. As immunization needs are identified in

each region, efforts will be more productive in immunizing all Texas preschoolers, said Drake.
