## IRS Conducts Property Seizure

Agents from the Houston Internal Revenue Service seized the property of a local furniture repair shop owner Thursday, Jan. 28 brandishing several shotguns and sidearms in the "lawful" seizure.

Repair Shop Owner Dorman Taylor, 41, who has been waging a strong individual effort against IRS claims against him said he expected the seizure and began informing the agents when they entered his property that "They were violating my rights and were subject to fines of up to \$10,000 for conspiracy to threaten or oppress or intimidate me in anyway."

Agents who mustered at the courthouse square while coordinating their seizure activities with the County Sheriff's office were seen readying themselves with bullet proof vests and loading their weapons.

Taylor, who said he had no gun of any type in the store said he "wasn't scared of them..."

An idea hundreds of years old is being updated by ceramic artist and historian Clyde E. Gray of Woodville, Texas.

Gray is taking an idea that goes back thousands of years and putting it to modern use. The eruption of Mt. Vesuvius in AD 79 covered the city of Pompeii. Recent excavations uncovered the floors and walls exposing the beautiful tiles in perfect condition after being buried for centuries without damage.

The tiles that are used by Mr. Gray in the Memorial Wall for counties and churches are the same type of material.

Gray has finished a wall for the Historical Commission in Tyler County. Walls that are now in progress are in Polk County, Orange County, Jefferson County, Trinity County, Garland County in Arkansas and the city of Port Arthur.

Nancy Robinett-Weiss, Director of Nutrition Services with the Texas Department of Health, suggests giving a beautiful red rose, a good book, a red apple, or a beautiful card expressing your special feelings.

She warns you may not be doing your loved ones any favors by adding more calories to their diet, as many may still have a bulge from over-indulgence during the holiday season.

Obesity is a major factor in heart disease, diabetes, and hypertension (high blood pressure). If you are over the age of 40, the battle of the bulge may be well underway. According to the Public Health Service, 20 percent of the adults in this country are overweight to the extent that it may interfere with optimum health and longevity. After age 40, this rises to 35 percent.

Ms. Robinett-Weiss says that dietary guidelines encourage eating proper foods to obtain your ideal weight, and this includes reducing your sugar and salt intake. Limiting your sugar helps reach and maintain your ideal weight while reducing the possibility of (tooth decay, blood pressure, can sabotage a diet or encourage tooth decay.

### HEALTHY ADVICE

Questions for the Doctor

Q. Recently, I have experienced some hoarseness. Should I be concerned?

A. Two common causes of hoarseness are a cold and smoking. As a symptom of a respiratory illness, hoarseness may linger after the cold is gone.

If hoarseness is not associated with smoking or a cold, a physician should be consulted. Persistent hoarseness may be caused by polyps, or growths, on the vocal chords. While cancer may be a cause, it is a rare occurrence.

Normally, hoarseness is best treated by rest. Making the air more humid and taking fluids may help. Resting the vocal chords, by not talking is also helpful.

Q. I am plagued by dandruff, particularly in the winter. What can I do?

A. Actually, almost everyone's scalp flakes and itches somewhat after shampooing. But dandruff becomes a problem when it is severe or annoying.

Regular washing of the scalp with any good shampoo will help. Special dandruff shampoos may help even more. However, too frequent shampooing and some shampoos may dry out the scalp and cause the flaking.

If you have a more serious problem such as psoriasis, which has some symptoms of dandruff.

Q. What can I do about fever blisters?

A. Fever blisters usually found on the lips, are caused by a virus and are accompanied by fever. They also can be found inside the mouth. After the blisters rupture, the remaining scab is usually severe.

Fever blisters generally heal themselves, but the fever, for sores and blisters inside the mouth, one of the phenol or camphor preparations (Blistex or Camphor Phenique) is recommended. Nonporous or Bakracran Ointment may be applied to the external sores to protect against secondary bacterial infection.

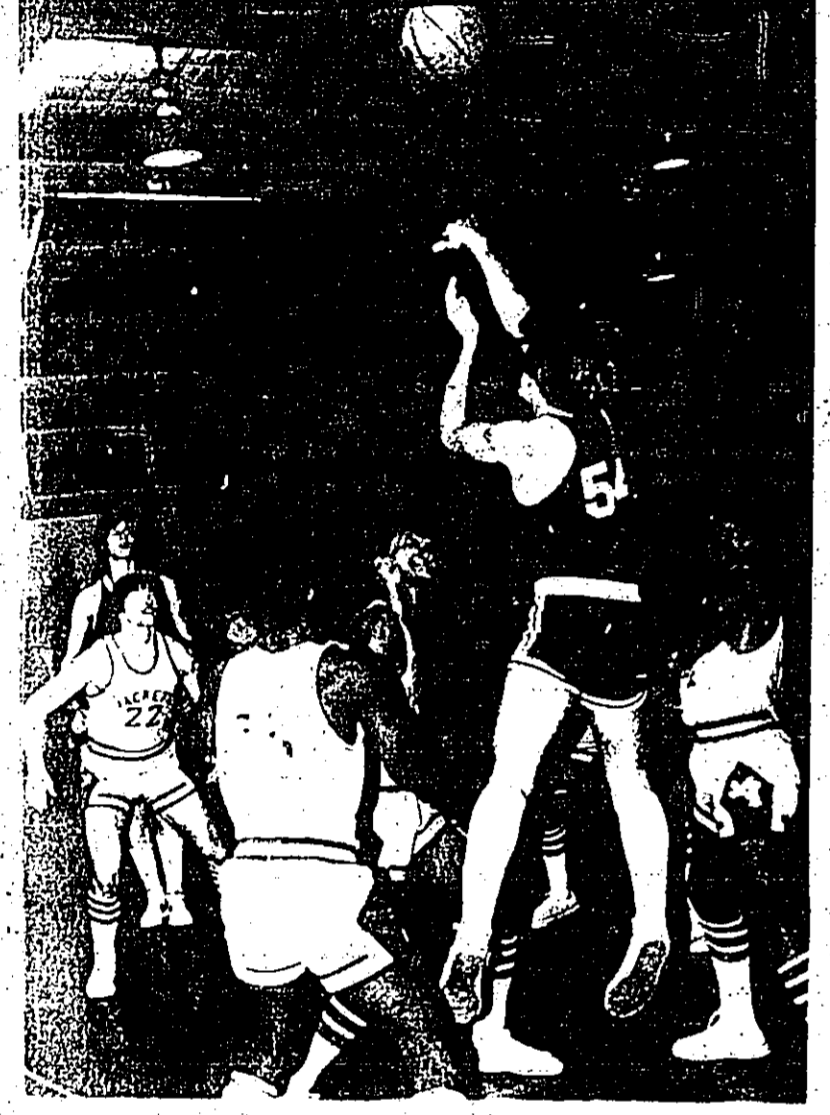

because I've read too much of what they do. I had sense enough not to do anything except to use my freedom of speech. I was not scared," he said. "You feel in a helpless position when you can't get any help from the local law enforcement, when your due process of law has been violated."

Precinct 1 John Spanhans said "The agents were acting within the law in their seizure activities."

The Internal Revenue Service used some seven agents in the seizure and brought three helpers and a wrecker's driver used to haul Taylor's truck away.

Agents on the scene said "We never make a seizure unless the value of the assets are worth considerably more than our trouble to conduct a seizure."

Taylor, who reopened the City Upholstery Shop Monday morning using borrowed tools from area upholstery shop friends said he planned to pay the nearly \$5,000 as soon as possible, but will be acting under a deadline of February 10 in order to get all of his property returned. Taylor said he expected fully to remain in the furniture upholstery business here in Woodville.

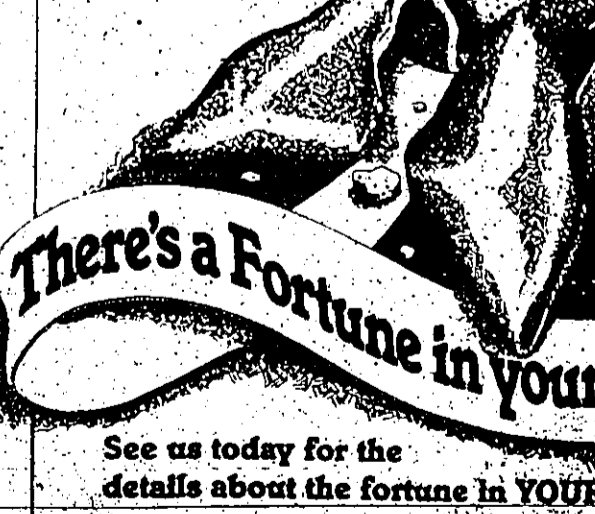

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# Plea Bargaining Tied To Jury System: Criminals Do Not "Get Off Scot Free"

What is plea bargaining? It is the method of disposing of the vast majority of criminal cases in every state and federal court in the nation. It is not a system separate from the jury system in which criminals are let off scot free. Plea bargaining is directly tied to what juries are doing in criminal cases.

Since trying every case by a jury is not economically possible, let's look at how plea bargaining functions. For example, in order to try each of the 5,000 plus felony cases each year in a large urban county, the county would need about 45 additional judges, with all their courtroom and staff requirements, and at least 135 additional prosecutors. By the same token, instead of summoning about 600 jurors per week, the county might need to call in 6,000 per week.

evidence and estimates based upon his experience with the defense attorney on what experience indicates that a jury would be likely to assess, and (3) negotiates with the defense attorney on what experience indicates that a jury would do.

When harsher or lighter verdicts than expected are given, they are taken into account in future negotiations. In the process of plea bargaining, if juries begin coming down hard on armed robbers, for example, longer sentences are recommended for that crime. Thus the punishment imposed by a jury in one trial actually will affect the disposition of many other cases in which a plea bargain is ultimately reached.

There is a popular misconception that plea bargaining means that a defendant always gets probation or that a felony case is always reduced to a less serious misdemeanor. This is not true.

It is not uncommon for a defendant in the plea bargaining process to plead guilty in return for a punishment of 20, 30, or 45 years in the penitentiary, or occasionally even for "life" in prison. In 1980, approximately half of the felony cases disposed of resulted in a punishment of confinement in the penitentiary, but only about 5 percent of those cases were the result of jury trials. Therefore, many criminals are going to prison because of plea bargaining. Our jails are evidence of how often criminals are sent to prison through plea bargaining, since that is how most cases are disposed of.

In our state courts, there is also a check and balance in the plea bargaining system because all the prosecutors can offer in the bargain is to recommend a certain punishment to the judge. It is the judge who makes the final determination, and he may reject the agreement if he finds it unfair either to the people or to the state.

Finally, there is a major advantage to the prosecution, and that is to safeguard the public. "Stay guilty" and serve his time. A sentence that is imposed, if at all, some "stay down" the line and that is imposed as near as possible to the time of the crime will be carried out. Unless someone comes forward with the financing for a system in which each case can be tried by jury, there is no alternative to some form of plea bargaining.

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### Wilderness Supporters Open ET Office

Texas Committee on Natural Resources has opened a temporary headquarters in Nacogdoches to give out information on clearing and potential wilderness areas in East Texas national forests, announced TCONR special assistant Beth Johnson on Feb. 1.

"We invite any organization or group of individuals with questions about clearing and pine farming or potential wilderness designations on national forest lands to contact us," said Johnson. "We can schedule slide shows and discussion sessions and make literature available. If people are concerned about the extent of clearing and pine conversion on national forest lands, or if they just want to hear our viewpoint, we'd like to hear from them."

The group is also seeking volunteers to help with mailings and other activities in their own towns, said Johnson. Johnson began full-time duties in Nacogdoches on Jan. 4. The statewide non-profit citizens' organization plans to continue the East Texas forestry education project in an 18-county area through the first week in April.

TCONR can be reached at (713) 569-1558, P.O. Box 4653 SFA Nacogdoches, TX 75962. The group is operating on a shoestring budget, said Johnson, and their East Texas project headquarters is in her apartment.

TCONR members and others in East Texas are helping carry out the project. The group has done mailings to citizens and the media and has given speeches in Nacogdoches, Lufkin and Huntsville. Two dozen appearances have been scheduled so far for February and March.

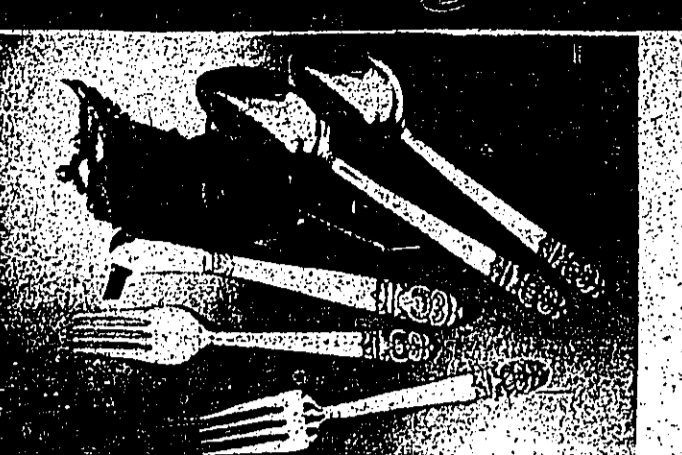

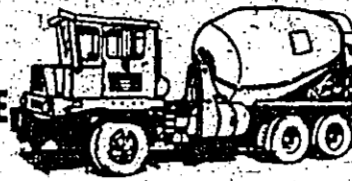
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
