Garbage Is Issue

The subject of garbage seems to be moving its way forward as a political issue. What are commercial haulers saying about county politicians forcing that group into a fight of their own as the politicians can benefit?

Following a Commissioners Court meeting last week the court formed a committee. It hopes will solve the debris along the roads problem which is the focus of the county commissioners court in addressing the problem.

A result of the courts discussion was a committee meeting held Monday night comprised of representatives

of the Commissioners Court with Kenneth Lowe and County Attorney Joe Smith; three representatives of the County Garbage Haulers including James Henry, Craig Smith and Walter Eugene Bally and Woodville City Manager Walt Davis.

The group discussed solutions to refuse falling of the trucks and decided that each truck would have to be covered with wire mesh to alleviate the debris spill problem.

One hauler told the committee that there are some citizens who consider major haulers and some minor haulers and single family resi-

dences themselves that are dumping the garbage along the roads and we're getting the blame when they are the ones.

The committee will present a proposal to Commissioners Court on Friday, Feb. 26 in which the group is asking that: 1) all trucks be covered; 2) that all commercial haulers pay a permit fee of \$40 per month; 3) that all commercial businesses will be required to have a permit based on the following classes: a-\$10; b-\$20; c-\$30 and d-\$40 and that the class designation will be determined by the bulk of the solid waste; 4) that there will be no dumping or use of out-lying dumps in county for anything but single family residences; and 5) any commercial hauler utilizing out-lying dumps will be subject to permit forfeiture and \$500 fine.

According to County Attorney Joe Smith, the committee will reconvene on Wednesday, Feb. 17 and agree on the final terms of the resolution to be brought to Commissioners Court on Friday, Feb. 26.

\$25,000 Bond Set In Drug Case

An alert deputy with the Tyler County Sheriff's office turned up what may prove to be several thousand dollars of uncut marijuana in the seat of a vehicle stopped on what started out to be a routine driving while intoxicated suspicion, following a 9 p.m. arrest, Sunday, Feb. 14.

According to Sheriff's Deputy Roger Byars, suspect Thomas Lee Tippit, 30 of 106 East Broadway in Longview was finally charged with driving while under the influence of drugs (DUID).

Tippit was also charged for "unlawful possession of marijuana"

with bond set at \$25,000 by Justice of the Peace Grady James. According to Officer Byars, while investigating the suspect's car he found the suspected marijuana in seven breadloaf size, saran wrapped bundles.

Two other drug related cases were filed by the Tyler County Sheriff's office. They include: Kevin N. Swineham, 23, of Leesville, Louisiana, who was fined after a guilty plea to Precinct Justice John Spanhanks and was released; and David Lynn Farrell, 26 of Dam B, after a search warrant of his residence produced a plastic bag containing what officers believe is

marijuana and two hand rolled cigarette butts otherwise known as "roachies" or "dobbies". Arresting officers in the Feb. 13

incident were Officer Byars, DPS Trooper Scales and Deputy Wade Skinner.

Bank Charter Arguments Soon

Organizers of the proposed South County State Bank of Warren will know "in about a month" about the success or failure of their bank charter application filed November 18 with the State Banking Department with the final board meeting on the matter set for mid-to-late March.

According to Hearing Officer for the State Banking Department, O. A. Cassidy, the board will meet Thursday, Feb. 25 and decide on a meeting date in March.

A hearing was held Feb. 8 on the validity of the bank charter application, Cassidy said.

The \$750,000 bank which would be capitalized at \$750,000 with \$300,000 held as reserve and with a surplus of \$300,000 is meeting opposition from the Citizens State Bank of Woodville and the First Security Bank of Kountze. The Attorney for the Citizens State Bank and the First Security Bank of Kountze is Larry Temple of Austin while the South County State Bank group is being represented by Joe Peck of Austin.

The State Banking Board is made up of the Banking Commissioner, Robert E. Stewart; the State Treasurer, Warren G. Harding and the Governor, Appointee Citizen member, Bob Perry of Houston.

Organizers of the proposed bank are: Harold Allison, Jr., Woodville; Harold T. Davis, Warren; Adolph Hryhorchuk, Warren; William Motley,

Warren; Don Schautest, Woodville; and W. T. Taylor, Warren.

According to Cassidy there are five criteria which are examined by the State Banking Board. They are:

- Good faith directors;
- Adequate volume of business;
- Adequate capitalization; and,
- Business and banking experience of organizers and proposed directors.

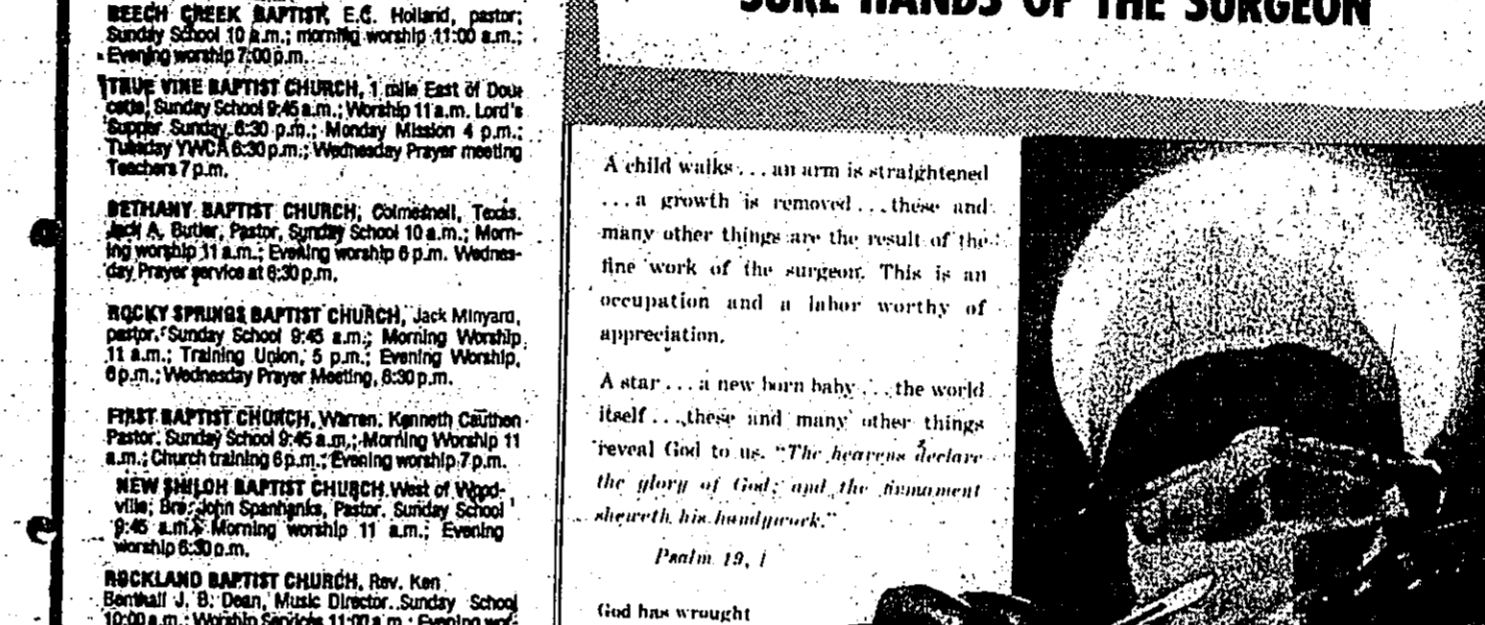

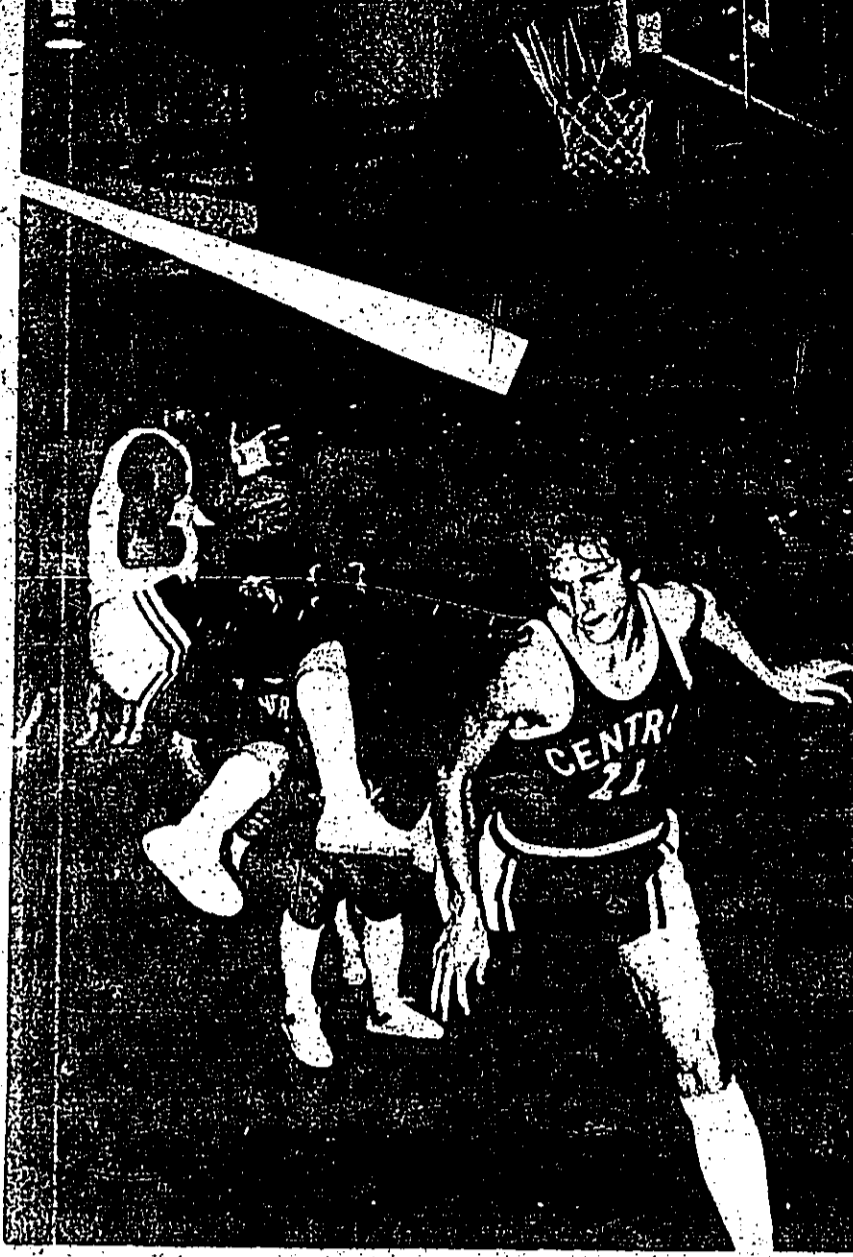
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Eagles Down Central Newton

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U.S. Forest Service Seeks Volunteers

The U. S. Forest Service is accepting applications for volunteers to work in various jobs on the National Forests in Texas throughout the summer months; however, some volunteers are needed before and after the "peak" season.

Lannan said, "Our volunteer program is an opportunity for people to occupy their spare time in a useful and productive way.

Those who enjoy camping and serving the public would probably be good prospects for the program," Lannan added.

Volunteers may work full time, a few hours each week, or contribute a "one-time" service. Dependence on location, housing facilities, and recreation are limited and range from tent pads to one small trailer in the past, especially in such areas as recreation and trails management.

Specific needs of the National Forests and Grasslands in Texas include campground maintenance, trail construction, wildlife habitat improvement, and clerical.

Don't Leave Selection Of Nursing Home To Chance

With some 1.3 million Texas residents age 65 and over and the nursing home population rising, Texas should leave the selection of a good nursing home to chance.

Choosing a facility for yourself or a loved one may start with recommendations from your physician, Jerry W. Bryant, director of the Quality Standards Division of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Long Term Care. You may want to consult friends or relatives with loved ones in a nursing facility, or even make a list from the yellow pages of the telephone directory, said Bryant.

It's important to determine if nursing homes on your list offer Medicare of Medicaid or other particular services which are needed, says Bryant. "Medicaid pays the expenses for some long-term, medically needy people, while Medicare helps pay some of the costs for those age 65 and over."

Nursing homes are classified according to two types of service. "A skilled nursing facility is staffed to meet around-the-clock nursing available to residents," Bryant said. "An intermediate care facility provides some nursing supervision in addition to help with eating, dressing, walking, or other personal needs.

The next step is to visit at least two or more facilities in order to draw comparisons. Bryant suggests a visit during mealtime to see if the food is wholesome, if there are adequate portions, and if the residents enjoy their meals. You should notice if patients who need help eating are receiving proper assistance, advised Bryant.

Another excellent idea is to ask patients, relatives of patients, and volunteers if they like the home. The home itself should be in a geographical area to allow frequent family visits. He also suggests determining what types of activities are offered to the residents.

All nursing homes should display their licenses and rating certificates. If a facility has a "Superior Certificate" from the TDH, you can rest assured that it is one of the better ones, said Bryant. The TDH inspects each nursing home at least once a year to determine if it meets health and safety standards. Open hearings also are held annually to receive complaints or compliments on the facility or its services.

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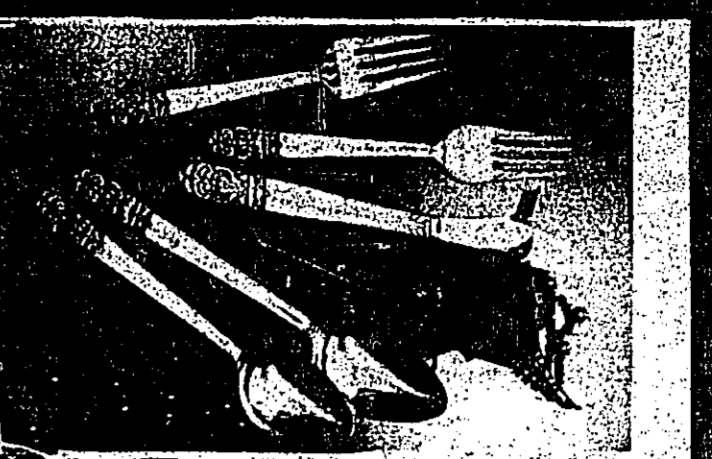
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Collins Against FTC 'Used Car Rule'

Washington—The Federal Trade Commission's Used Car Rule is another example of unnecessary regulation and judgment which would take its toll on car dealers and consumers alike, warned Texas Congressman Jim Collins.

In response to a rule released by the FTC on January 28, 1982, Collins introduced H. Con. Res. 254, disapproving the rule which becomes effective unless both Houses of Congress adopt a concurrent resolution of disapproval within 90 calendar days of continuous session.

Collins blasted the rule which would require dealers to post a window sticker on all used cars, noting "known" defects in the cars if they had "reason" to conclude that a condition in the vehicle could be caused by one of 52 listed defects. Because of the ambiguous wording of the rule and poor definition of "known defect," Collins said that dealers in effect be required to inspect all used cars -- which the FTC has no authority to require. "This is an outrageous example of the FTC overstepping its bounds. If a dealer's judgment is wrong, he would be subject to a penalty of up to \$10,000 per violation.

"We should not place this burdensome

FTC regulation on car dealers. The regulation singles out dealers, because 50% of the used car sales are person to person and not subject to this FTC warranty. Car sales are down 40% in our country," Collins stated. The Congressman from Texas explained that this rule would force more car sales into the private market which is totally unregulated.

"This is a completely illogical and unnecessary regulation. If a dealer drives a used car, he plans to sell and notices it pulls to one side, he concludes the car contains a defect. This pulling could be caused by one of six listed defects according to automotive experts. Yet, to find the defect, the dealer would have to spend up to \$250 per car for inspection. This extra cost would be added to the consumer's higher prices," asserted Collins.

H. Con. Res. 254 has been referred to the House Energy and Commerce Committee. As a member of that committee, Collins will push for passage of the resolution during the Congressional review period. "Defeat of this regulation will send a clear signal to the FTC that Congress disapproves attempts to increase Federal regulations on the American public," Collins said.

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The reason is that hypertension is a "silent" disease. It has no symptoms, and the person does not feel sick. But it is the major cause of strokes, heart failure and kidney failure. Each year in the U.S., high blood pressure is the primary cause of about 60,000 deaths and plays a role in the more than 1.5 million heart attacks and strokes. It also can lead to vision loss.

Arteries carry blood away from the heart to body organs, and capillaries then deliver the blood directly to the tissues. The arterioles regulate the blood pressure. When an arteriole contracts, the pressure of the blood against the vessel walls increases behind it. The higher the pressure, the harder the heart must work.

High blood pressure usually begins in people about age 30 and becomes increasingly more common in higher age groups. To control the disorder, the doctor may prescribe medication and urge the patient to lose weight, reduce salt consumption, cut back on smoking and alcohol, and adjust his lifestyle to reduce emotional strain.

High blood pressure occurs more often in men than women, more often in blacks than whites, in obese people and in relatives of people with high blood pressure. Nonetheless, it can occur at any age and in anyone. The disorder

usually is detected during a routine examination by a physician. To control the disorder, the doctor may prescribe medication and urge the patient to lose weight, reduce salt consumption, cut back on smoking and alcohol, and adjust his lifestyle to reduce emotional strain.

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
