A whole new look has been achieved at the Reservation with extensive lush landscaping at the entrance and throughout the complex with a variety of native plants and flowers.

Colorful newly refurbished tour buses will take visitors on Indian-guided tours thru the 4600 Reservation in the heart of the famous Big Thicket, with weatherprotective see-thru roofs for a etter look at the lush greenery and surroundings.

Other major renovations include the Inn of the 12 Clans, popular Reservation restaurant which now features wholesome daily luncheon specials and a hearty Sunday buffet for less than \$5. Restaurant hours during the spring are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and 12:30 to 5 p.m. on Sundays.


