Reservation Takes On New Look

The East Texas Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation will have a fresh new look when it opens its 1982 Spring Season on March 13. A whole new look has been achieved at the Reservation with extensive lush landscaping at the entrance and throughout the complex with a variety of native plants and flowers.

Colorful newly refurbished tour buses will take visitors on Indian-guided tours thru the 4600 Reservation in the heart of the famous Big Thicket, with weather-protective see-thru roofs for a better look at the lush greenery and surroundings.

Other major renovations include the Inn of the 12 Clans, popular Reservation restaurant which now features wholesome daily luncheon specials and a hearty Sunday buffet for less than \$5. Restaurant hours during the spring are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and 12:30 to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

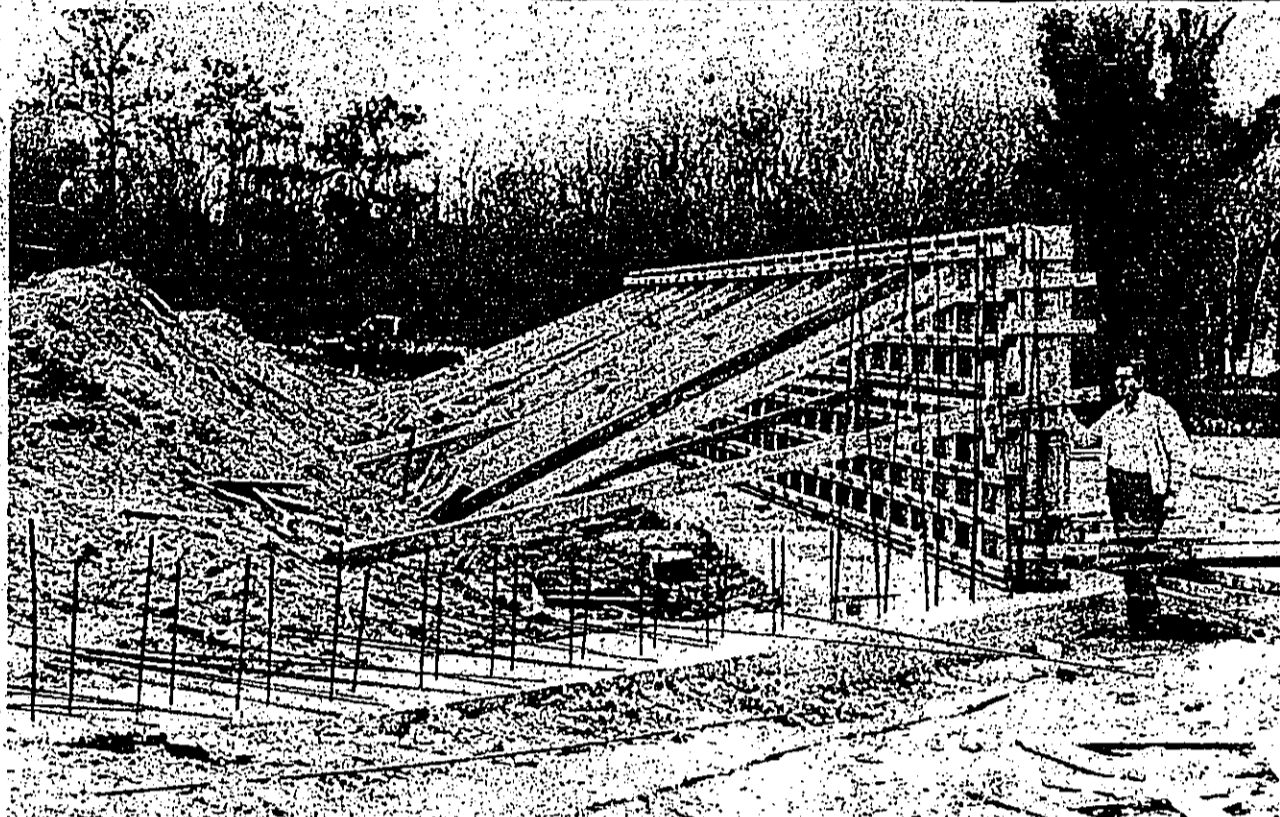
Several of the fences at the complex have been removed and the former reptile garden is now an open entertainment and arts and crafts exhibit area with plenty of space for lounging or picnicing on the grass.

The Spirits, award-winning square dancers, will perform on Saturday, March 13, to salute the grand opening and other entertainment is being planned. A special exhibit of Indian head-start children's art will be shown at the Inn of the 12 Clans, and the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Lone Star Chapter, will be on hand to greet visitors and display their early Americana arts and crafts.

The newly opened pottery, newly refurbished Arts and Crafts Gift Shop and the Reservation Trading Post which offers picnic and fishing supplies and is the registration headquarters for the campgrounds will also grand open. An additional tour of the Sundown Amphitheatre, home of Beyond the Sundown, will also be offered.

On Saturday, March 27, the Reservation will premier the Sundown Theatre's Sundown Jamboree, a traditional country western show in the Nashville Grand Ole Opry manner, featuring some of that show's former stars including Tex "Cherokee" Cherry and the Cherrypickers, who will perform March 27, April 3, and April 10, followed by champion fiddler Leon "Pappy" Selph, composer of the classic Orange Blossom Special who recently released his New Orange Blossom Special album.

DPS Candidates Substitute Experience

Colonel Jim Adams, Department of Public Safety director, announced today that effective with the June recruit class, DPS trooper candidates may substitute law enforcement-related experience for the current educational requirement of 60 college hours. Thus, applicants with two years of commissioned law enforcement experience or two years of honorable active military service would be eligible for a waiver of the two-year college requirement. Likewise, one year of such qualifying experience could be substituted for one year of college work.

"This temporary modification is intended to increase the reservoir of qualified applicants yet ensure a continuance of the high personal standards which have been the hallmark of the Department's success."

"An evaluation of the results of the temporary modification of educational requirements will be conducted to determine whether a continuation is justified."

Colonel Adams said the DPS hopes to recruit 268 new troopers this year, including the 92 who presently are in training.

Recruits live in the DPS law enforcement academy in Austin during the 18-week training course. The starting monthly salary for recruits is \$1,223. Upon graduation, the officers are paid \$1,347 per month plus allowances for uniforms and equipment. These salaries will increase Sep. 1, 1982.

"The Department continues to emphasize the recruitment of minorities consistent with our philosophy that a law enforcement organization must be representative of the community it serves," Adams pointed out.

Of the 92 recruits scheduled to graduate from the law enforcement academy on May 14, 1982, 35 members of minority groups. There are six women in the class.

Fifer Elected To Commission

Edd Fifer, a 37-year old El Paso resident, was elected Chairman of the three-member Texas Indian Commission at its first meeting of 1982. Fifer was appointed to the Commission by Governor William P. Clements to replace Jack Stallings, also of El Paso, who completed his six-year term.

Victor Fain, of Nacogdoches, and Frank Hildenbrand, of Selman, members of the Indian Commission which was established by the Texas Legislature in 1965 to assist Texas' two existing Indian Reservations, the Alabama-Coushatta and the Ti-guas.

The Alabama and Coushatta Indians live on a 4600-acre Reservation between Livingston and Woodville in East Texas where they originally settled in 1654.


