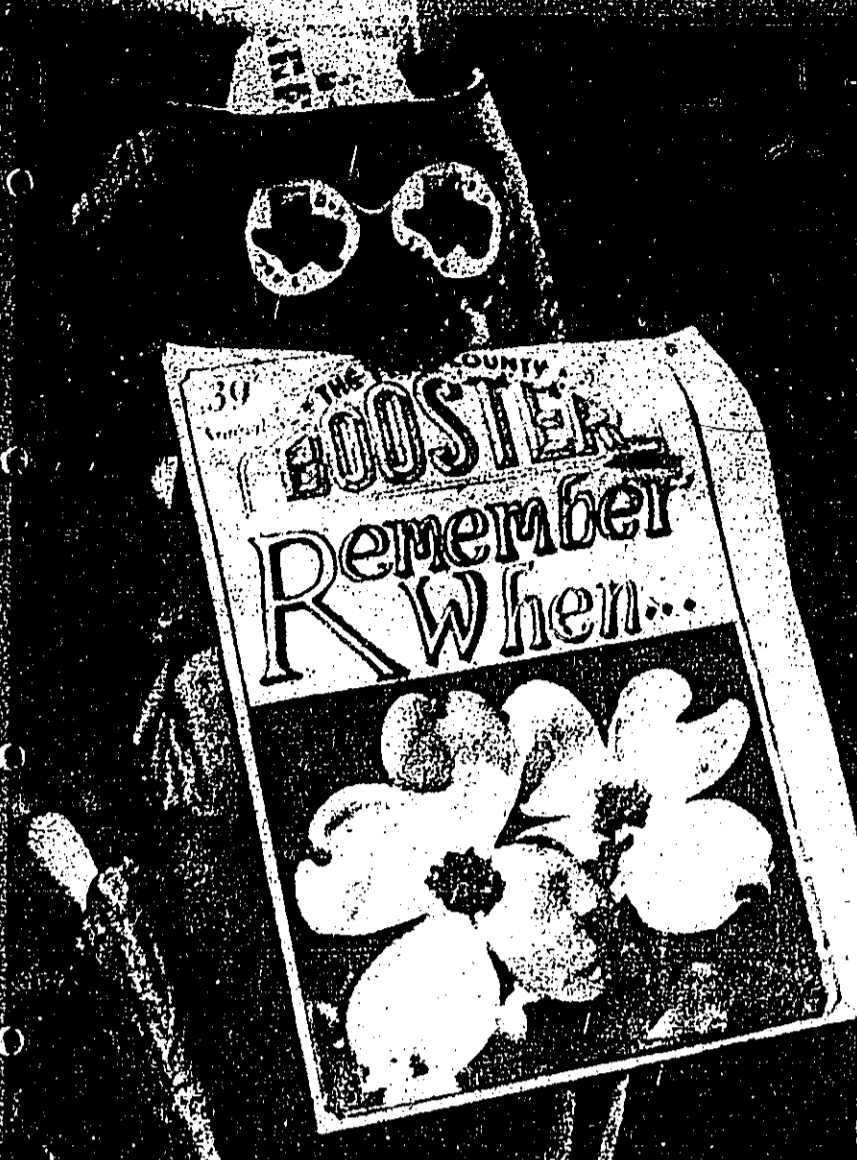

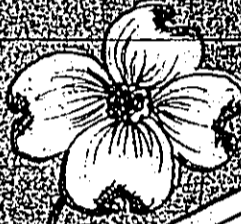
Western Week 'Wet But Fun'

Woodville Walking Tour

Depart from the Woodville Inn after visiting the art and Indian displays in the lobby and enjoying the courtyard landscaped with dogwoods;

Alton Shivers Museum north on Charleston at Dogwood Streets provides guided tours (adults \$50, children 25¢) while the adjoining library has a cozy magazine section and interesting patio walled with pictorial history on tiles by artist/entrepreneur Clyde E. Gray.

Walking uphill on Dogwood Street, enjoy trees in bloom to Village Street (one way for autos), The Rhodes' gray house on the corner was built in the late 1800's and has been continuously occupied by a member of Reverend Jeff Rhodes' family. Next is the House of 7 Gables or Wickline-Rock House which has been restored and is occupied by the Domains.

Turn east on West Bluff Street noting the number of business structures dating back to the 1800's—an earlier post office occupied the present Mann Sheep Shop;

Stop at the Yum Yum Factory where Hubert Brown may often be seen making his famous Tiger Butter candy variations (building was the original grocery of Charlie Dismuke around 1900); enjoy an ice cream cone or candy in the French decorated Yum Yum Outlet;

Proceed to the north side of the Tyler County Courthouse rebuilt after the original wooden structure burned in the late 1800's. Catch up on history while resting on a bench before the Wall of History; first to be built in Texas; then stop and say hello to the domino players in their famous domino building on the southwest corner of the courthouse square;

Across from the courthouse is the Phoenix Theater which has been restored from the former Pines Theater (the subject of the 1982 Dogwood Pageant). Next door is the historic Josiah Wheat home with its historic marker;

Traveling west is the First Baptist Church formerly the Bethel Baptist organized in the mid 1800's (see marker for photo history);

The Post Office displays outstanding samples of local artists' work besides performing its regular duties of selling stamps and delivering the mail with warm Tyler County friendliness. Surrounding the post office are a number of homes built in the late 1800's and 1900's and enhanced by colorful landscapes.

One may return by way of West Bluff Street to the Inn or retrace walk east on Wheat Street to South Magnolia (Hwy 69) where a friendly person can stop and enjoy the old fashioned soda fountain in Jarrott's Drugstore and then continue north to the Inn for the noon buffet or evening menu.

To hear the national news network tell it, there is nothing much going on in the world but federal budgets, the "New Federalism" and El Salvador.

Never has the country been bombarded with events that will be years in their resolution. Yet they persist in being the headline stories day after day.

The "budget" as we've mentioned here is going to be with us for months. Caterwauling from all sides, and nothing much to show for it probably, except the politicians jockeying for position for the November elections.

Certainly none of us were naive enough to think that a 25 percent income tax at the federal level meant we were going to have an extra bit of our own money to spend. The needy, the elderly and the disadvantaged are still there. And frankly we are a little annoyed with the states aren't we keeping hearing that the states aren't qualified to handle those programs, or that money for good deeds, or that we need professional money changers in Washington to make those decisions?

And if those people we elected to represent us in Washington because they said the federal government was too big, now have second thoughts about it, let's get another team.

Now for the need for money to live in the way they'd like to be accustomed to that's OK, just don't make it mandatory that those monies are our tax dollars.

"New Federalism?" We don't know. Our current opinion is we'll be like Scarlett O'Hara in "Gone With the Wind" if we don't get it by tomorrow, at the latest until 1984 when the whole concept would be activated.

We appreciate the politicians' dilemma on that one. They're looking at a federal system that has been in

'Spontaneous Demonstration'

One of the most amazing occurrences of contemporary American politics are the so-called spontaneous demonstrations. How do they come about?

During the recent Salvadorian elections there were several such demonstrations held in major U.S. cities, all on the same day. The number of participants in Washington, D.C. ranged from 8,000 to 20,000 demonstrators.

H.K. Pitts is news source/journalist for 200 people every morning and say to themselves, "this is a beautiful spring day, I think I'll participate in a demonstration!"

How does it happen that there is always major TV news coverage for these events? It is really "news" when there is a demonstration in Washington? What would be real news is if on any given week end there were no demonstrators parading in front of the White House.

Demonstrations usually occur in metropolitan areas, never in "South Suckatash", but cities like Chicago, Boston and New York. These cities have in common, a high rate of unemployment and many college campuses (i.e., college students by the thousands).

These two factors mix up and explain how these crowds can so easily materialize at a moment's notice. Those who have jobs and must keep regular hours can't just take off on a whim to join in marches, riots and demonstrations.

Today's demonstrators are well-organized and well-equipped with signs, slogans and songs which they play to play upon the emotions of bystanders and news cameras. One woman speaking before the Washington crowd was using a prepared script, which she sprinkled liberally with party-line cliches. I'm not suggesting Communists are behind every demonstration but it is one of their most effective means of bringing political pressure to bear on Congress and making it appear a grass-roots effort. All the group in Washington needed Sunday was Jane Fonda, Ed Asner and Vanessa Redgrave.

If anyone believes that these so-called spontaneous demonstrations are not sometimes orchestrated by the Communists, they are also looking forward to the Easter Bunny laying all those colorful eggs.

One of the most frustrating and irritating factors about these demonstrations is that the mass media gives them, far more coverage than they deserve. If NBC and CBS news think they can take this off on the American people as "newsworthy" then they are less perceptive than the majority of people to whom they report.

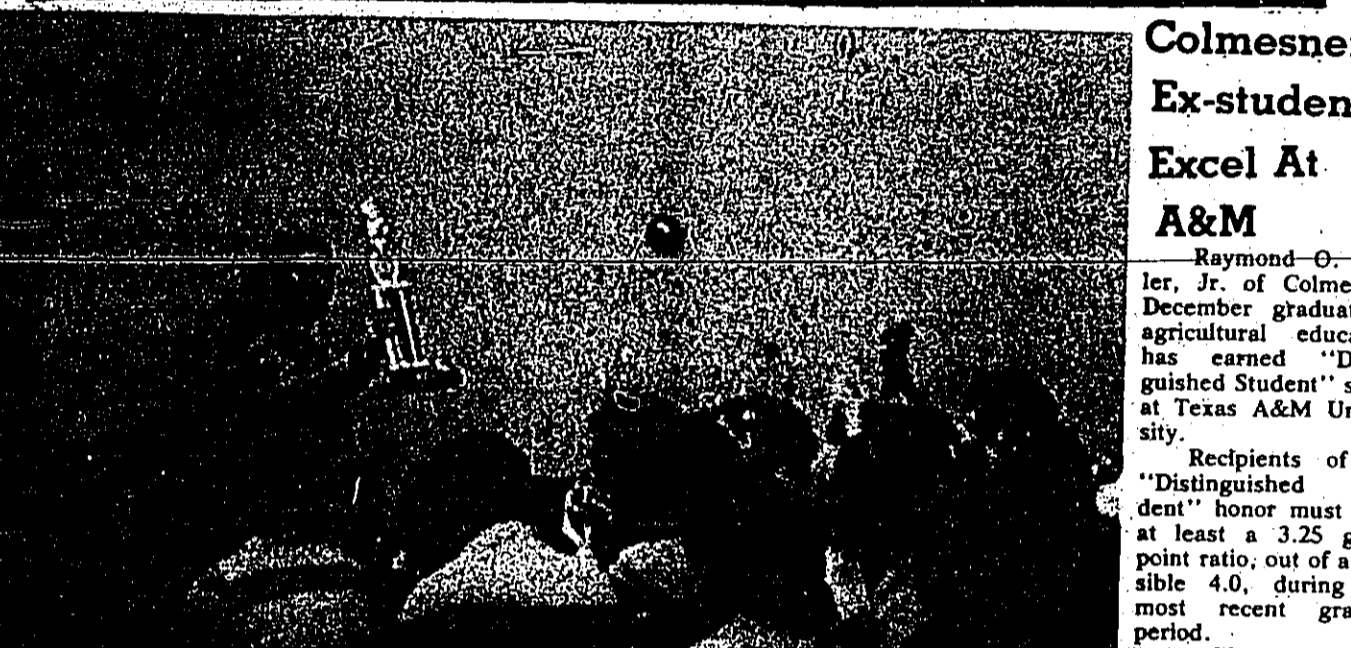

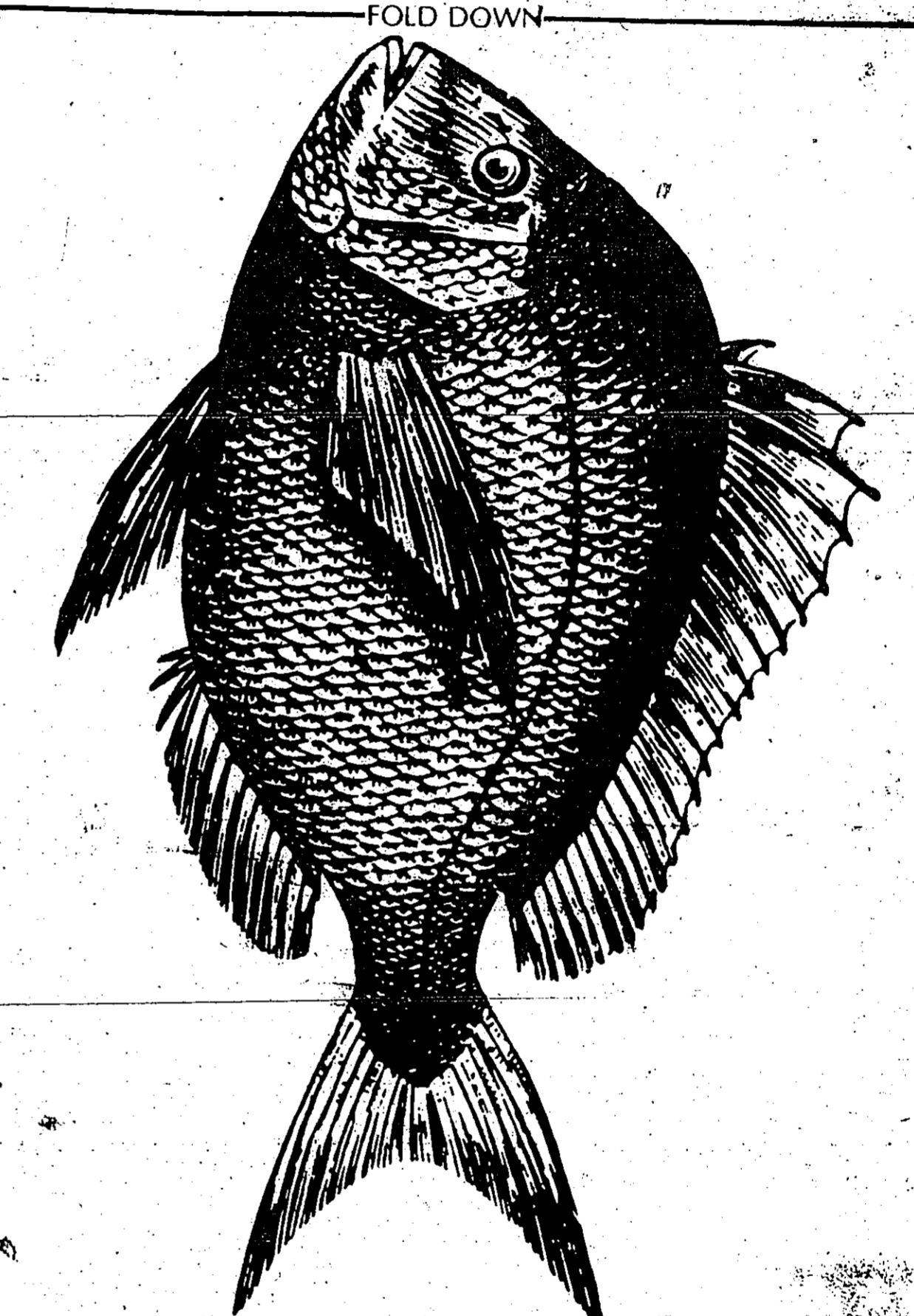

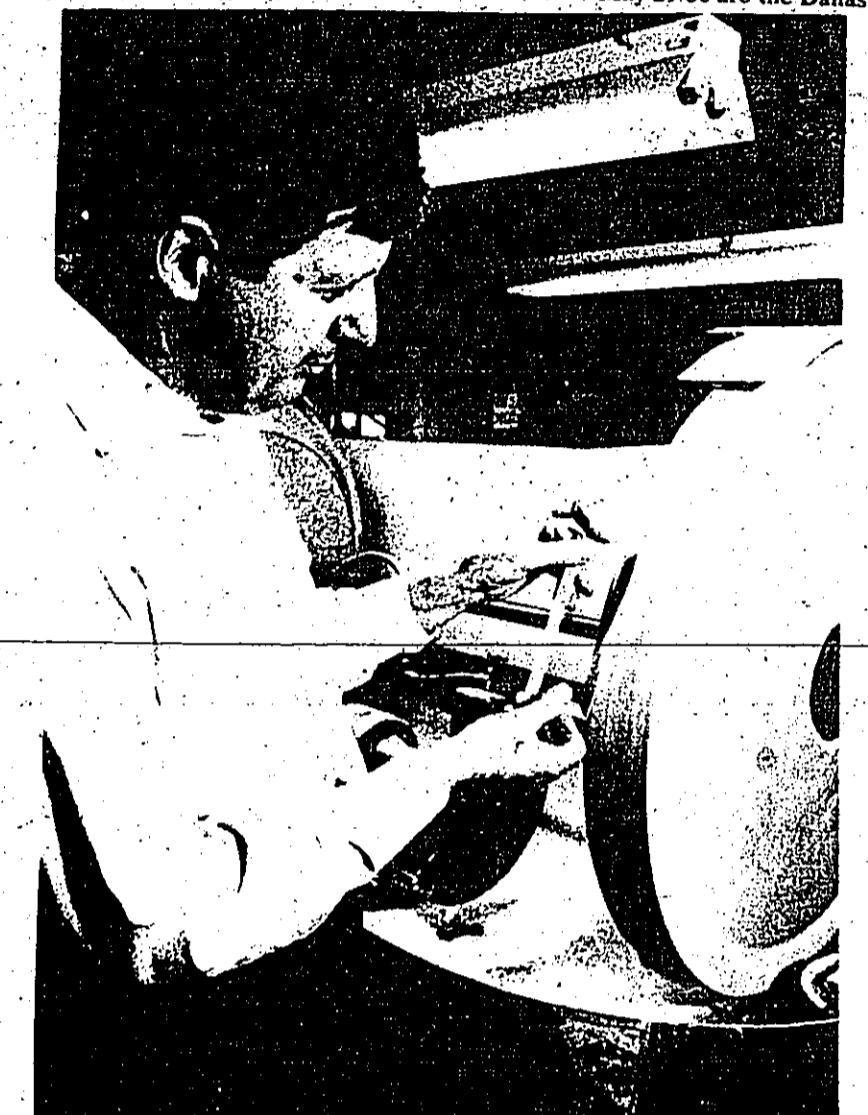

Free Planting Time Is Now

Tree planting time is here. With an early spring and plentiful rain, now is the best time to take advantage of the full, first-year growing season," says Mark Hill, urban forester with the Texas Forest Service in College Station.

Normally the best time to plant trees is in the fall, but for better survival and growth, late winter or early spring is recommended.

The planting hole should be slightly larger than the root ball and deep enough so the top of the ball is slightly higher than the existing soil grade. This prevents water from standing around the base of the tree after the tree is established and growing.

Local nurseries can recommend species for your neighborhood or yard. The Texas Forest Service also has information on the best tree species for the various soils and different climates found in Texas.

There's no secret formula of special skill required to be a proud tree parent. Just dig a hole, place the tree in position, refill with soil and water. A little tender loving care and periodic watering should produce a beautiful tree to your yard," said Hill.

Trees purchased will be packaged in one of three ways - bare root, balled-and-bur-lapped, or containerized. All three can have excellent survival if planted following suggestions for each:

Bare Root: Normally the best bargain, bare root means there's no soil or growing media around the roots. Soak the tree's root system for several hours in water before planting. The tree then must be planted as soon as possible. If the roots dry out or are exposed to freezing air for more than a few minutes before the planting operation, damage will be fatal.

The planting hole should be slightly deeper than the root system and wide enough to accommodate the roots when spread out. Place the tree in the hole, and replace the original soil.

After a great mess, root ball, wood chips or tree parent. Just dig a hole, place the tree in position, refill with soil and water. A little tender loving care and periodic watering should produce a beautiful tree to your yard," said Hill.

Earnings Report Due April 15

People who received at least one Social Security check in 1981 and who earned more than the annual exempt amount last year have until April 15th to file an annual report of their 1981 earnings. David Bennett, Social Security District Manager in Lufkin, said recently.

The 1981 annual exempt amount was \$5,500 for people 65 or over and \$4,080 for

people under 65 all of 1981. A person who was 72 or older all of 1981 does not have to make a report. Neither do people who receive benefits because of disability, since different rules apply.

A person who did not receive any checks in 1981 because of expected earnings does not have to make a report of his or her earnings. But, Bennett

said, if those earnings were less than expected, it would be in that person's best interest to make a report.

This is because just \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 of earnings above the annual exempt amount. It could be that some benefits may be due. If they are, they will be paid after the annual report is reviewed.

Most people who

have to make a report of their 1981 earnings have already received a form for this purpose in the mail. Those who did not receive an annual report form or those who misplaced the one they did receive can get a copy at any Social Security Office.

Financial Activity Report Given

According to the Deed of Trust Records of Tyler County loan volume in February of 1982 amounted to \$1,603,638.57, an increase from the level of \$997,949.02 for February of 1981.

The largest loan in Tyler County last month was in the amount of \$470,000.00 for a commercial building followed by a rural real estate loan in the amount of \$252,112.00. Thirty-eight loans were made in February, of 1982 as compared to twenty-eight loans in the same month of 1981.

Chicago Title Insurance Company reported that a poll conducted by it indicated that first time home buyers increased their share of the new home market in 1981. The survey revealed that first time

buyers represented 39.4% of the market in February of 1982, up from 32.9% the previous year. Back in 1978 almost half of all homes sold were purchased by first time buyers.

A study indicated that more and more first time buyers are "salting away" savings making the down pay-

ment. 63.8% of all such purchasers made the down payment from personal savings and investments in 1981 as compared to only 51.1% in 1980.

Records at the City Hall of Woodville reflect that the City Sales tax collections for the month of February were \$10,083.68. Sales tax for the same period in 1981 was \$14,860.08. However, 1982 payments to date have increased to \$49,876.37 from \$48,503.34 over the same period of 1981, a net increase of 2.83%. In comparison February payments in Jasper increased to \$52,714.70 from \$39,403.66 in February of last year; in Kountze the figure increased from \$2,811.99 to \$5,558.93. In Livingston sales taxes collected decreased from \$35,996.58 to \$35,221.49 while in Silsbee collections fell from

\$31,287.18 to \$28,153.83. Across the state sales tax collections in 1982 to date increased by 16.93% over the same period last year.

In other Tyler County cities Chester has collected \$1,080.47 in 1982 a 26.69% decrease. Colmesneil experienced an increase of 75.25% for the same period.

While Houston experienced an increase in February from 8 million to 10.3 million, Dallas, with a 5.2 million dollar check, increased by 32% over the same month in 1981.

During the last week of February the yield on commercial paper in the United States increased by 2/10ths of a point. As the prime bank loan rate follows the commercial paper rate with an approximate two week delay time, the slight

increase in the prime now being experienced comes as no surprise. At March 5 the commercial paper yield had increased from 13.53 the previous week to 13.59. On the same day the prime had fallen slightly reflecting the prior action of the commercial paper rate.

The total checkable deposits in the nation's banks has fallen steadily since January 6. At the same time total time deposits continued to increase from just under \$760 billions of dollars to almost \$770 billions of dollars.

Business loans for the four week period ending February 24, 1982, the last week for which figures are available, had increased by 16.1% over the same month last year and almost 27% over the four week period ending December 23, 1981.
