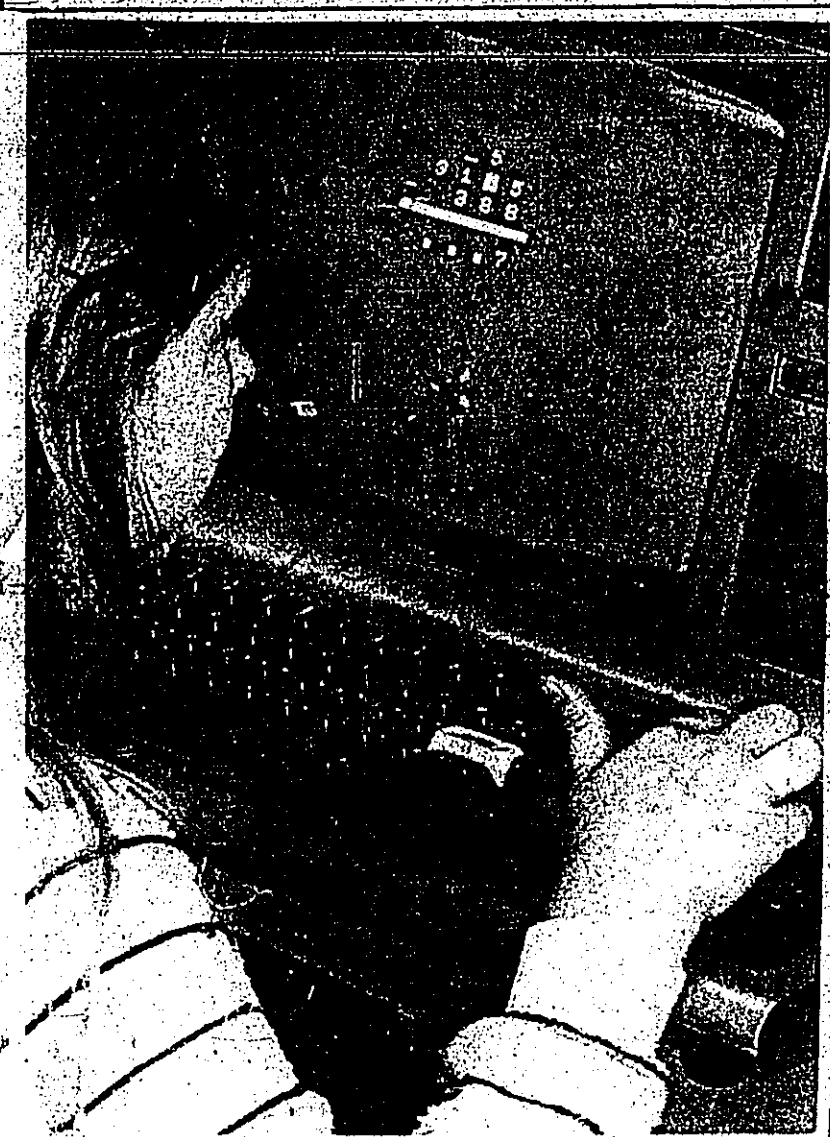

509 Vote Early

As absentee voting closed at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday, some 509 persons have cast their ballots nearing the fast election totals in 1980 which netted a 578 absentee votes but which was an election with more hot issues than the present election offers.

In the 1978 election for the same offices the turnout was light with only 239 voters going to the polls.

Races for the County Treasurers offices seem to be heating up as challenger Janie Pate DuBose has stated that the office should be run with one less employee than the current two while candidate Kathryn Hanks offers "honesty and dependability" as the premise for her campaign. DuBose has been close to the courthouse for a number of years working under County Auditor Ann Nichol. Hanks has also had some courthouse experience.

Incumbent Treasurer Austin Fuller claims "high interest earning for the county along with statewide recognition for "good bookkeeping" as recognized by the State County Treasurers Association. Fuller runs the office with the help of Assistant Clerk Joan Phillips. Fuller, while County Treasurer, has also held the office of President of the Deep East Texas Development Assn.

"Silver Tea" May 2

The Order of Rainbow for Girls, Assembly used to send the Rainbow to Woodville. There are many types of reasons for at least one. Do you enjoy fresh herbs for cooking, or just for fragrance? Maybe the challenge of growing them or the enjoyment of watching the birds, bees, and butterflies collect nectar, pollen, or whatever your reason is. Whatever your reason is, it is time to dig and plant or so.

Most herbs prefer well drained and "chilly" sweet soil with a pH of 7 to 8 and plenty of light. The size of the plants will be confined to several 4 1/2 inch pots or even hanging baskets or a whole yard on the Chester highway just before the Woodville High School.

Cinder blocks can offer a simple and inexpensive way to define a bed and also provide

restrictive pockets for agricultural plants. Try mints, chives and thymes in the block pockets or holes. Plant by aiding in the slightly alkaline soil needed by parsley seeds every year to maintain a continual supply as a plant's lifetime is 2 years. Watch out for the year as it will take over a whole bed in one year but it is lovely the year around. It will keep cut. The cut stems of flowers make delightful indoor bouquets or dry well for fall and winter arrangements.

Don't forget to scatter dill seeds for both the leaves and seeds are excellent in the kitchen. Meanwhile, "thymes" awastin', so on your way. And let us hear from you if you have plants to swap and share or even sell.

"Merry Month Of May"

The Merry Month of May was once the third month of the early Roman calendar until they added January and February, placing May in fifth place. Although its position on the calendar has changed, May has always had 31 days.

The most accepted story for the meaning of "May" is the Romans naming the month after Maia, Roman goddess of spring and growth. Some scholars contended that May is short for "Majores," the Latin word for older men. They believed May was sacred to the older people as June was to the juniors or young men.

Customs may vary slightly from continent to continent and culture but May always involves flowers and merriment. May 1 was a day of outdoor festivals even in ancient times. In the Roman era, May 1 was a time to continue and enjoy the spring activities of flowers they celebrated with flower parades.

England is the originator of many beautiful customs, some of which are still carried out today even in the United States. May poles were erected on the village squares, and on the morning of May 1, the young people gathered "Mayflowers" (Hawthorne blossoms) from nearby woods to decorate the poles along with streamers. The young girls all wore their prettiest dresses for the festivities. By popular vote, one was named Queen and she danced with her "sub-juncts."

In the United States, May is a popular time to have a picnic. In many areas May fetes with gaily decorated May poles are still a popular spring activity for May 1. Another lovely custom was to leave a tiny basket of goodies on the doorstep of someone special.

Mothers had a special day the second Sunday in May - set aside honoring them in 1914. Another national holiday is Memorial Day on May 30. Of course, the May flower is the lawn while its gemstone is the green emerald. All of which make a truly merry month of May.

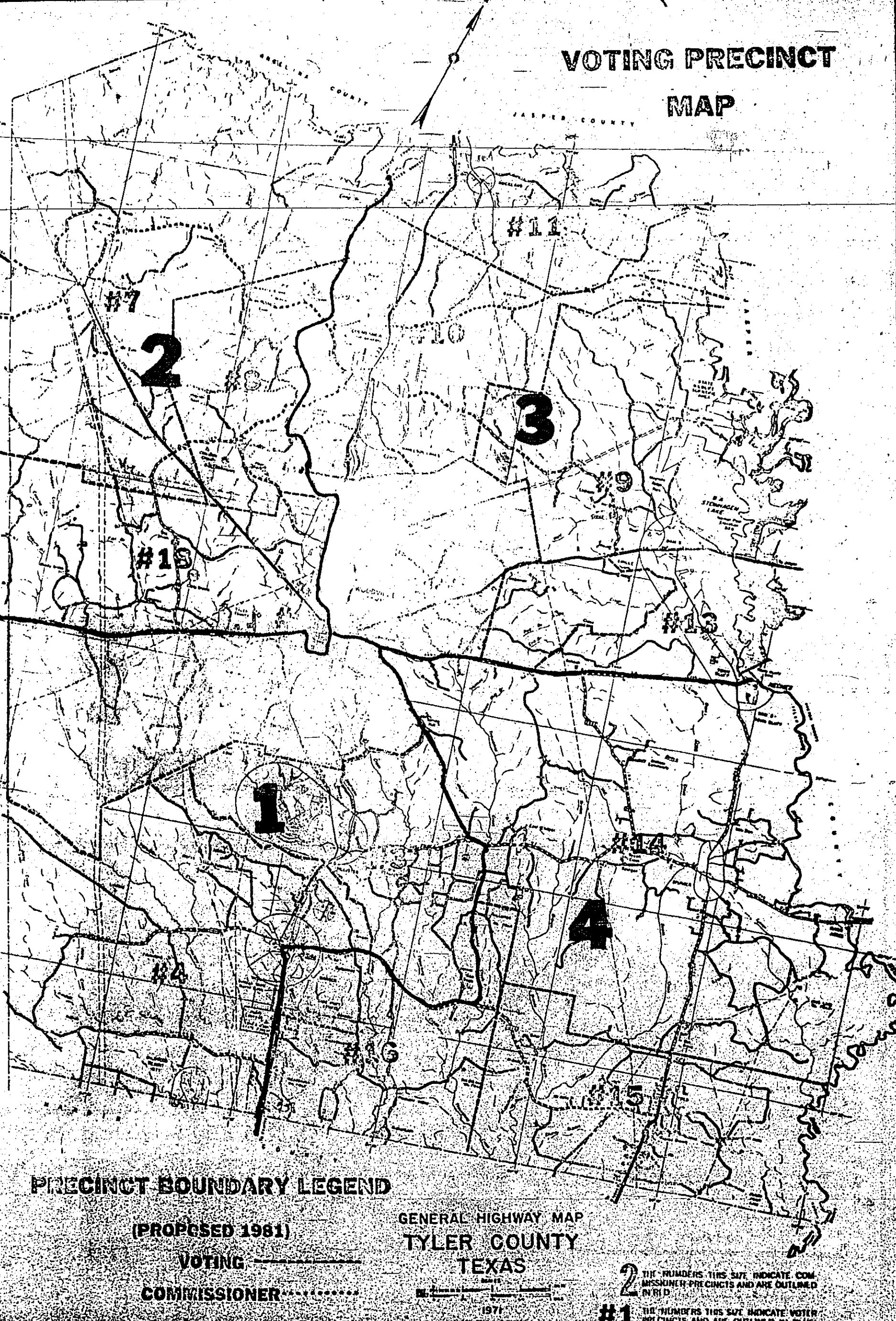

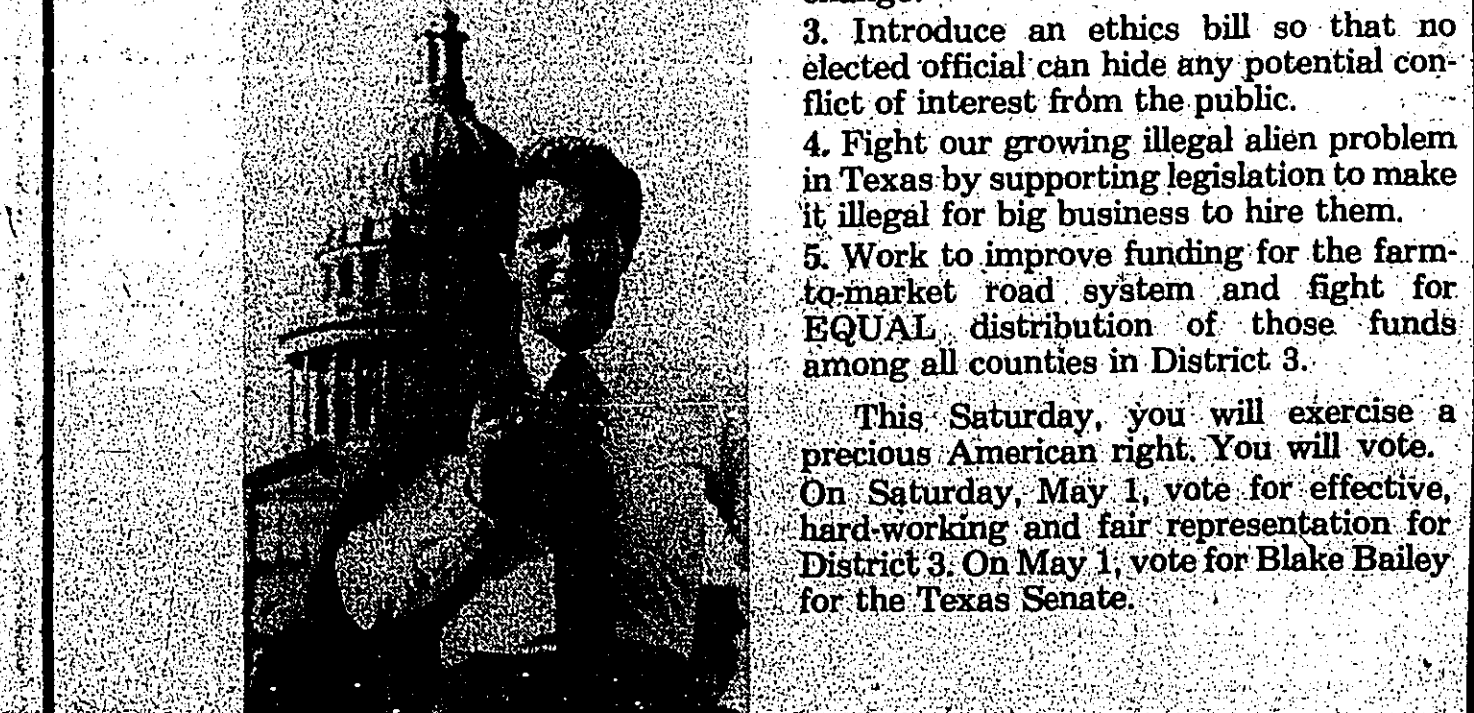

Bailey Says Water 'Vital'

There is no natural resource more vital to East Texas than water. Our generous water supply is basic to the economic well-being of such major industries as lumber, farming, oil and gas production, mining and fishing.

In 1969 and 1976, East Texans turned out in force to defeat proposals to take control of our water away from us. In 1981, our own state Senator, Roy Blake, voted contrary to those East Texas mandates.

Senator Blake voted for a blank check proposal which would have provided billions of dollars for bureaucrats.

Former Governor Allan Shivers, a native of Woodville, called the amendment "the worst constitutional proposal ever considered by the legislature for adoption by the people." He said, "If this had been passed 10 years ago, we would have had at least two tax bills by now. And if it is enacted this time, you are going to have one within one or two bienniums."

When Senator Blake held a fund-raiser in Lufkin recently, he took credit for the fact that we had not seen an increase in state taxes in the last ten years. I suggest that it was the Texas voters who defeated Senator Blake's and Billy Clayton's water fund proposal by an almost three to one majority, and who deserve the credit.

The proposal supported by Senator Blake was, in effect, a three-fold Hidden Tax Bill which would have grabbed our hard-earned dollars. The first Hidden Tax in this water proposal would have been a statewide tax to make up for the revenues we still need for education, health, crime prevention and other state priorities. The Texas Research League, a respected conservative research group in Austin, predicted that the legislature would have had to pass a state personal income tax "just to break even" if the water fund had passed.

The second Hidden Tax would have been a local property tax increase to make up for the state education funds we have been receiving for teacher pay raises and other necessities. Without the surplus we have come to depend on, we would have had to make up the difference with increased local school taxes.

And the third Hidden Tax would have been the increase in people's water bills to pay off the water bonds bought on the state's credit.

It is significant that just at the time when we are facing a national economic crisis triggered because our national government is gone into debt, Senator Blake would back a proposal that could send the state of Texas down the same path.

I do feel a state water plan is needed. East Texas people have always borne their share of the state tax burden, and we have always supported rational and fair state plans to allocate the state's scarce resources.

Texas supported national and state plans to support the following water plan proposals:

I. I would support the amendment, which should have come before the voters in November. Instead of asking for billions of dollars, I am pledging the state's credit, the amendment should simply have raised the interest rates on water bonds from a low 6% to a reasonable 12%. This would have released \$218 million which has been available for water programs for two years. Texas taxpayers have spent a total of \$360 million for water programs over the past 25 years. It seems only fair that the state should have a share of the cost.

II. I would support legislation which provides assurances that throwing money at them in an unplanned, open-ended commitment that water represents an end-run around a normal budgetary process. No other set of needs enjoys this kind of luxury.

III. I would support legislation that provides incentives for West Texas farmers to continue their recent attempts to conserve water by using such techniques as drip irrigation and the need to spend their tax dollars wisely. It is time that crops suitable for dry farming and other methods.

Snelson Issues Warning About School Fund Loss

Austin-Senator Pete Snelson, chairman of the Senate Education Committee and candidate for Texas Land Commissioner, this week warned local school districts that they face a loss of \$50 million from the Available School Fund if a plan advocated by another candidate for the office is adopted.

State law requires that one-fourth of all severance taxes on oil and gas go directly to the Available School Fund for distribution to local schools throughout Texas and yet candidate Mauro has proposed that \$200 million be diverted to fund a dedicated fund for higher education," said Snelson.

In addition to diverting \$50 million from the Available School Fund, it would pull \$150 million away from the General Revenue Fund pointed out.

The plan would result in a \$50 million tax increase at the local level and \$150 million increase at the state level or a corresponding reduction in the level of services provided," said Snelson.

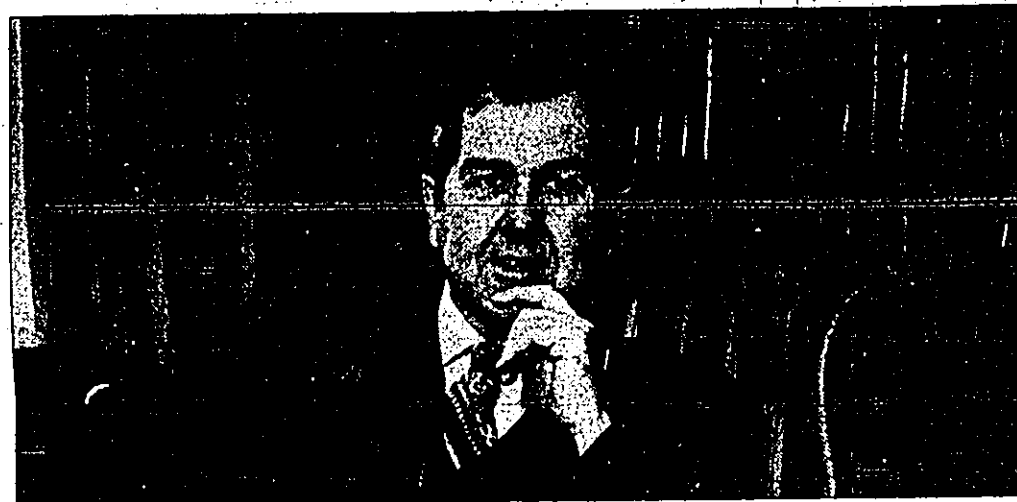
