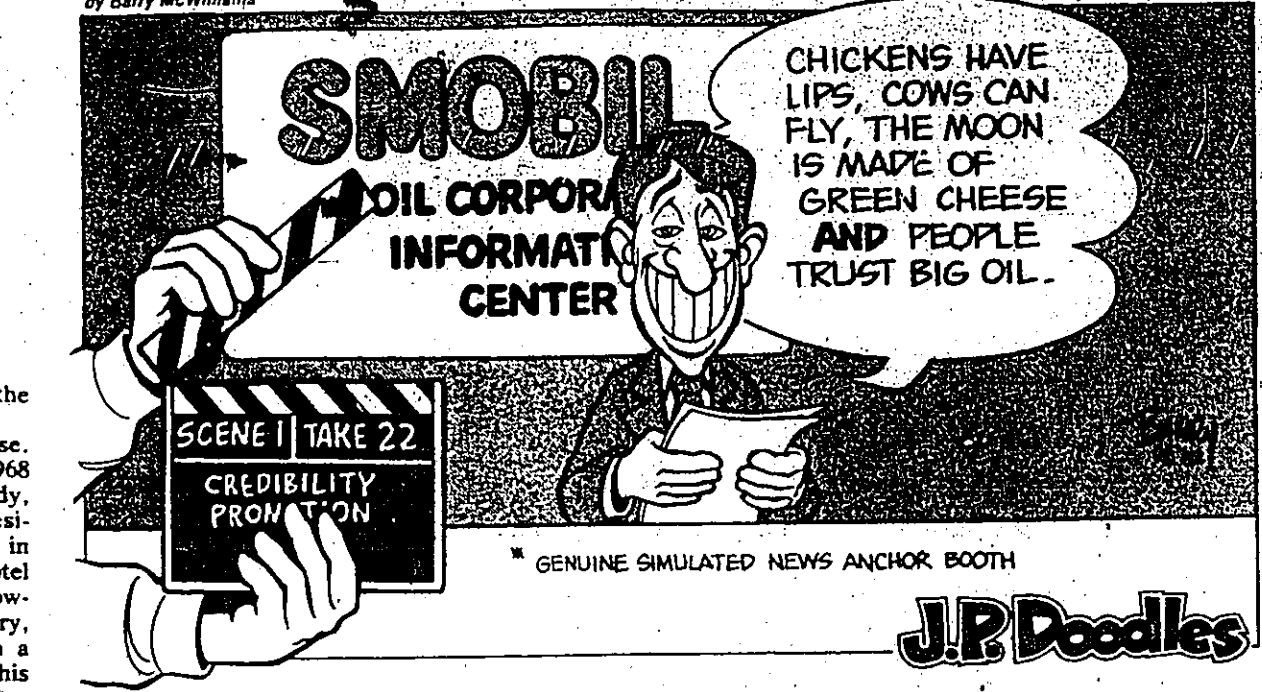

The coincidence of headlines this past week out of Texas goes bump-in-Washington, D. C., a young man from Colorado is in the dock charged with attempting to assassinate President of the United States. At the opposite end of the country, a man convicted of killing a Presidential candidate is appearing before a grand jury for release from prison.

CHICKENS HAVE LIPS, COWS CAN FLY, THE MOON IS MADE OF GREEN CHEESE AND PEOPLE TRUST BIG OIL.

John W. Hinckley Jr. admits attempting to shoot Ronald Reagan. He once said he was only shooting at the Presidential limousine. And his line of defense is that he was insane at the time. We have not heard of any insanity plea in today's legal pleadings. Especially since that same pleading is always prefaced with "not guilty by reason of insanity." Lawyers will probably climb all over us for this, but is the man or woman in a fit of rage who sends a spouse into the Great Beyond with a baseball bat any less "insane" than a man who stalks a person with a loaded pistol?

Since Woodville and Tyler County is recognized as a retirement community it seems appropriate to make a suggestion by this letter to all residents of the county.

The United States Senate and House of Representatives have each developed and passed a budget proposal by the committee. The reduction of the budget deficit and spending will be debated on the floor of both Houses within the next few days. The passage of this budget legislation will ultimately affect the income of retirees. Some of the proposals would eliminate, reduce or modify Social Security, Railroad Retirement and other retirement income programs. These cuts are aimed at Medicare and Medicaid, which are in addition to the cuts made in 1982 budget. Bringing the budget into balance the deficit should be addressed to the revenue side, certainly not to take away retiree subsistence.

"The extent to which small businesses have been regulated," his report revealed, "is small business that will play the primary role in the economic revitalization of this country, and it is imperative that Congress effectively address the needs and problems of small business," concluded Tower.

We would feel a little more comfortable if the case were decided in a slightly different evidential order. Did Hinckley have a gun? Did he shoot "Who?" And what were the circumstances that led to the shooting or not guilty. Then let the psychiatrists have their findings, and come up with a judgement. "We realize it is legal language that bothers us, the "not guilty by reason of insanity" bit, but that can be little comfort to Jimmy Carter who was stalked by a same individual during the 1980 Presidential campaign.

Senator Tower, in remarks prepared for delivery before the Senate, congratulated and commended the entrepreneurial spirit of small business men and women around the country. "The initiative and challenge of small business is the life blood of the American way. Small business is symbolic of the freedoms that only Americans enjoy," Tower said.

In addition, you may be expected to observe a higher standard of care because you babysit for pay. You will want to discuss liability protection with your insurance agent to determine if you are covered for this type of liability.

We seemed to have a swift judicial action against the "anarchists" who assassinated our leaders in years past. But the legal impediments of today seem to want to assure us that they were socially, emotionally or economically deprived somewhere along the line, and can't be held accountable for the fact that they acquired a firearm, even illegally, and attempted or succeeded in killing another human being.

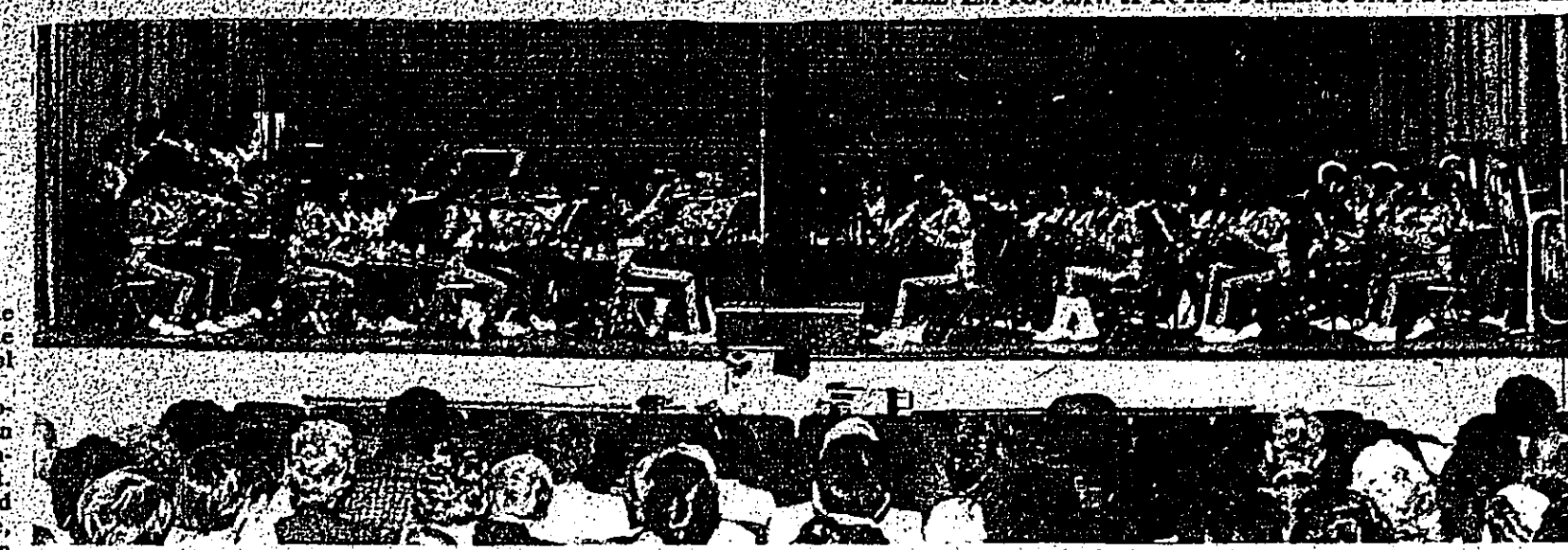

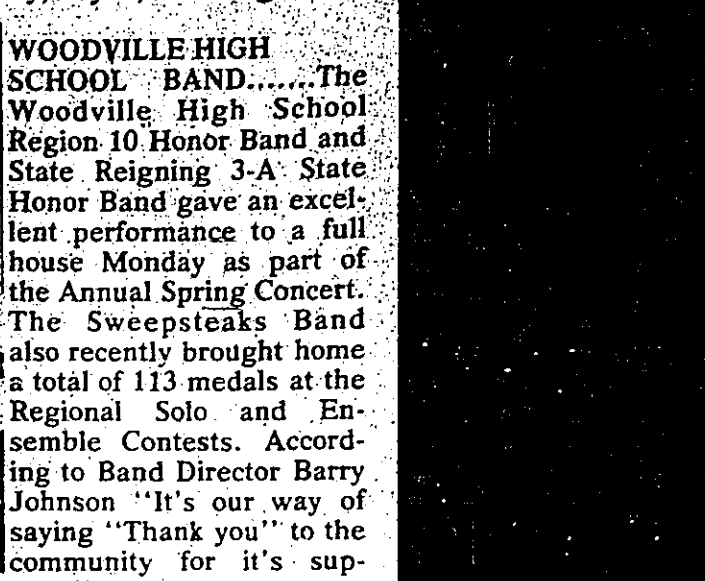

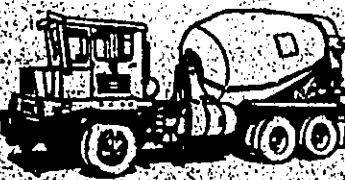
