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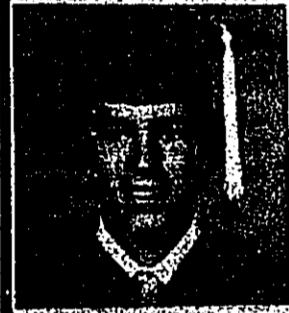

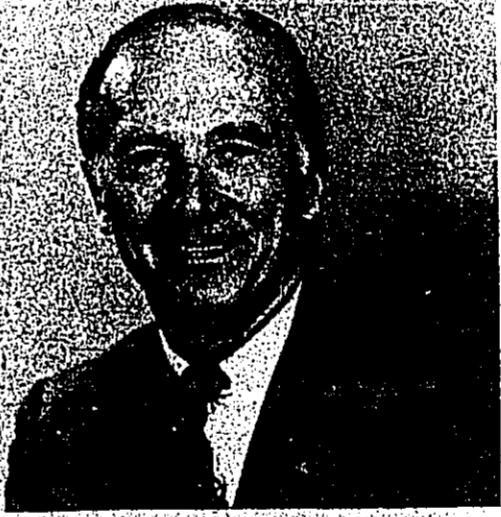

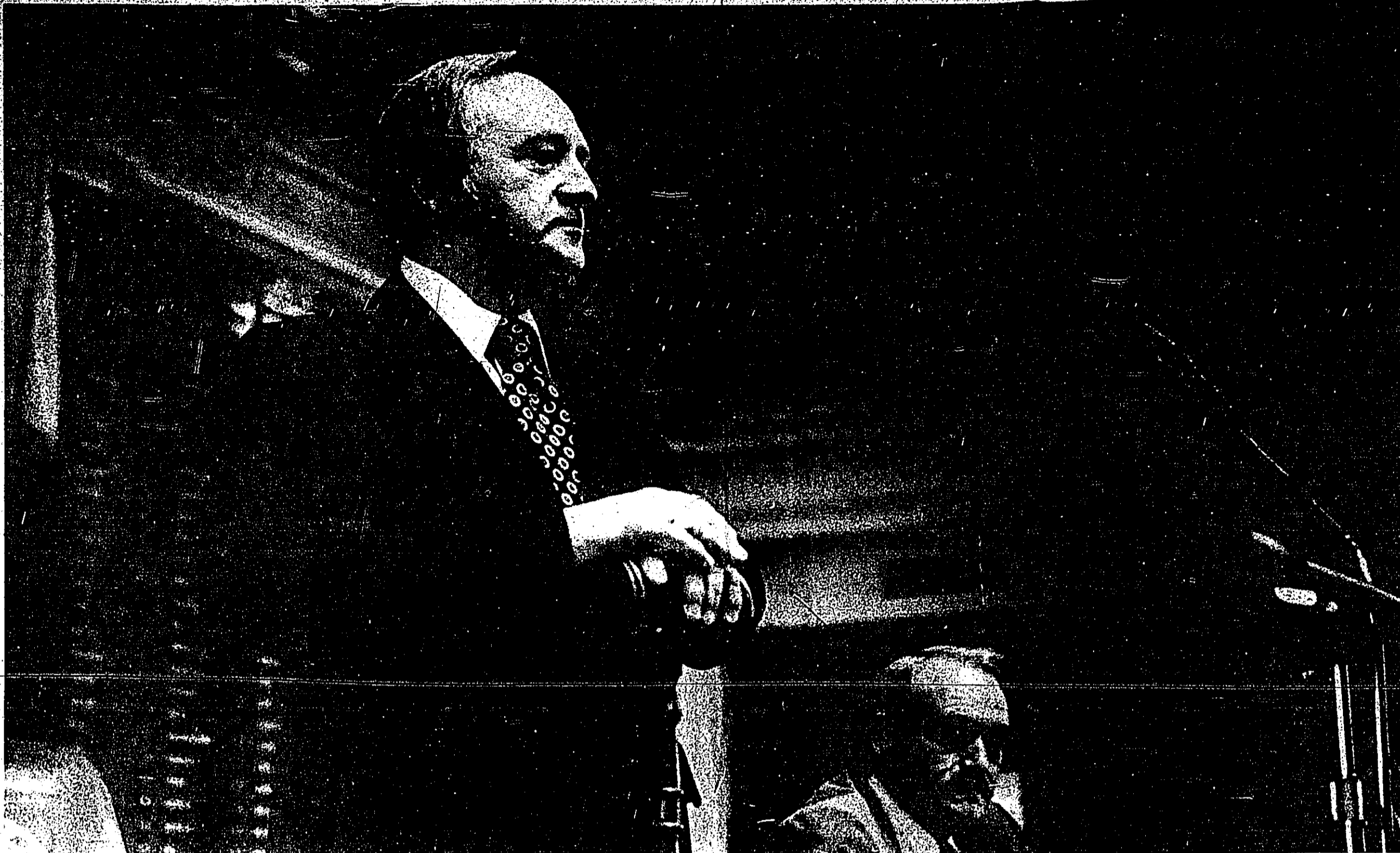

Senators, Representatives Meet

The House machinery of Billy Clayton moved efficiently Monday in a vote to abolish that state property tax which the Senate bogged down in heated campaign rhetoric.

Of specific concern to State Senator Roy Blake of Nacogdoches was the second agenda item in which the Gov. is appropriating \$129 million on a one-time basis to sustain the construction needs for new buildings and repairs and renovations for 17 Texas Universities including Lamar and Stephen F. Austin, Blake who serves on the prestigious finance committee was specifically interested in Stephen F. Austin, president Ben Johnson's appeal for that institution's bid for \$4 million.

Lamar University, which is politically represented by State Senator Carl Parker and Blake's representation of Stephen F. Austin are two examples of "universities which are equidistant from Woodville.

The Legislature has about \$196 million to spend during this special session.

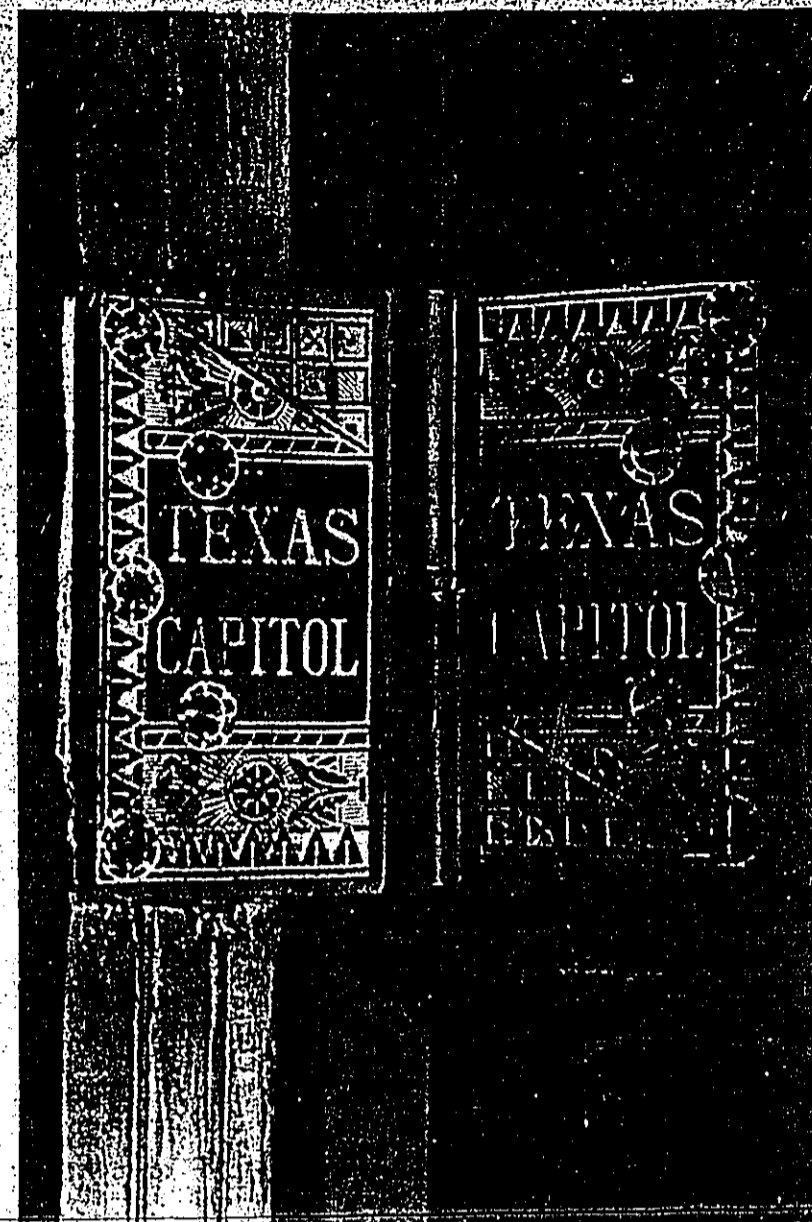
State Representative Larry Browder, D-Cold Spring returned to the special session this week sporting a new dash-grown beard.

Browder lost his bid for re-election to a run-off between Huntsvillians Mac Woodward and Allen Hightower.

Clements, under pressure from across the State to include the overcrowded prison question in this session's work faces questions now similar to Rep. Matt Garcia, D-San Antonio, who asked "Do we have colleges as our priority or prisons?" Garcia further accuses Clements saying, "I think it is totally unfair not to give the Legislature the full picture. I want the Governor to show his full hand, and not lay out one card at a time."

FAIRY TALE ANALOGY - Republican Senator Bill Meier of Dallas produced a box of sawdust from under his Senate floor desk to illustrate his "pinocchio" of Texas politics characterization of gubernatorial candidate Mark White. Meier, a Democrat, has been chosen as nominee for Attorney General, was accused by Senator Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur as being a "expert in fairy tales."

Senator Oscar Matzzy, D-Dallas, "tagged" the tax repeal question creating a 48-hour delay which will hold the repeal vote at least til Wednesday afternoon. (May 26).

House Speaker Bill Clayton predicted Monday that the session should end in about a week. Others were not so sure. Clayton who appears before the House wearing his "Lucky suit and tie" for each session, said his hope the session would end quickly was based on his "eternal optimism."

State Senator Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, said the session "Was a waste of taxpayer's money" and that the questions could easily wait until January when the regular session convenes.

State educators told from under his "Senate desk and let it filter through his fingers as he described the "trail of sawdust" which led to Railroad Commissioner Buddy Temple's withdrawal from the Governors race in support of Mark White.

Senator Carl Parker D-Port Arthur told Meier the pinocchio story ended with the puppet as a hero. Meier retorted saying "Pinocchio is a fairy tale and that's usually what's involved in Democratic party politics."

The heated nature of the political exchanges are expected to continue over the next few days as legislators justify their need for being in Austin for this special session.

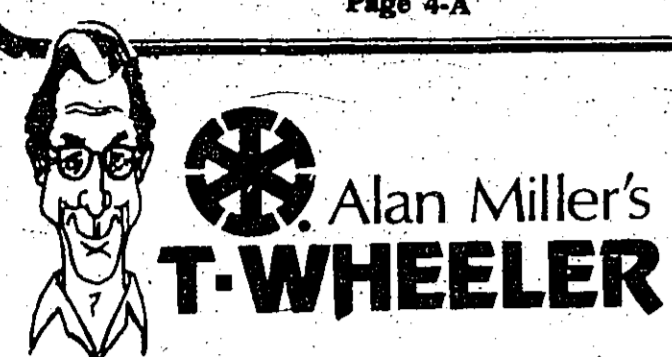

One of the highlights of summer vacation when you were a kid (at least in our neighborhood) was an early visit to Sears to get a pair of Keds sneakers and a pair of jeans. We called them overalls in those days, and a designer fit they weren't. You always bought them several sizes too large, because the hot water and the strong soap meant lots of shrink before the summer was over.

The sneakers were the high top variety. There might have been a choice in the fabric color, but basically a sneaker was a sneaker. Uniform of the day then, and sneakers and sneakers. No T-shirts - no socks. Those sneakers must have been of very unusual design. We could play basketball in them. We could run from them. We wore them when we went to the swimming hole. About the only time they came off was Sunday morning when we headed for Sunday school.

They were something like two dollars a pair then and those Keds people seemed to know just how long a growing boy could wear them, because about time school was ready to start again the soles had separated from the fabric, the laces had disintegrated, and it was time to go back to Oxford and socks and head back to school again.

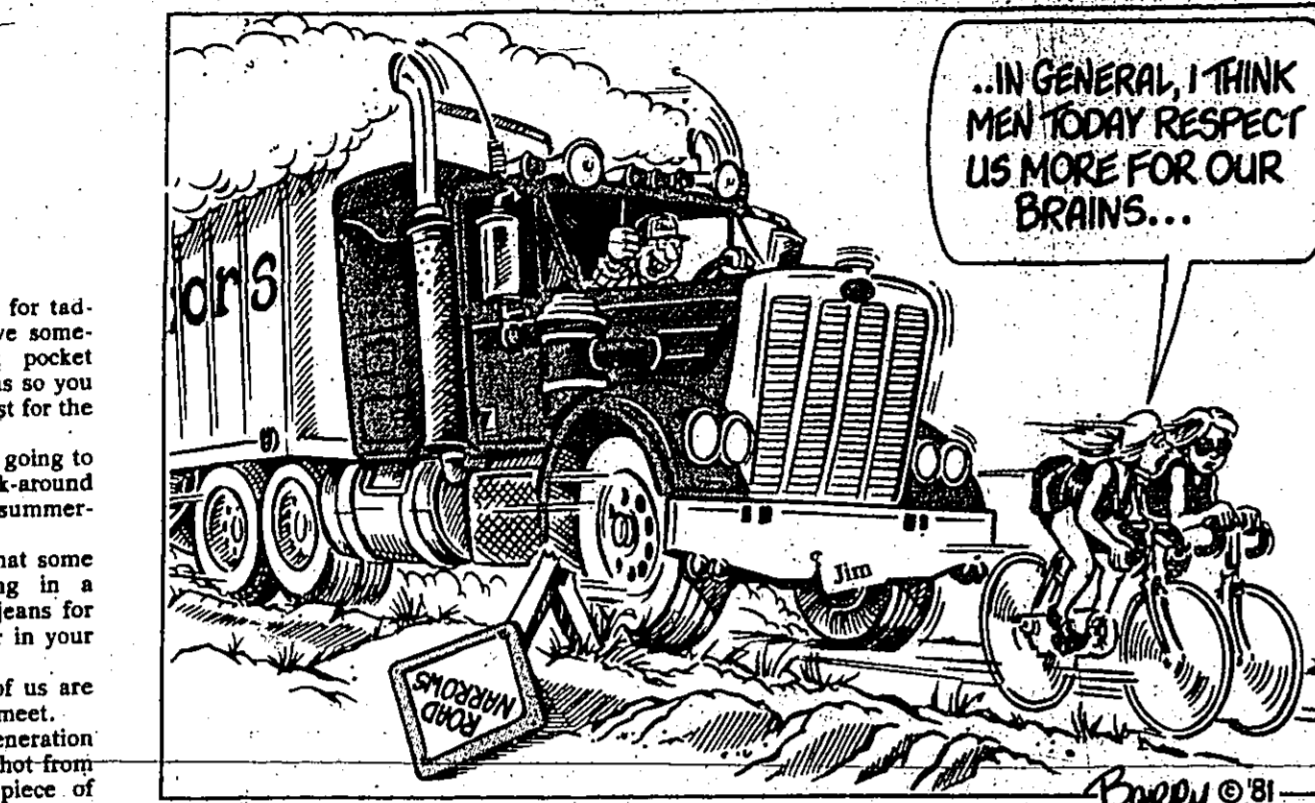
We don't even know if Keds makes sneakers anymore. We'd have to guess not because you can't find a pair of "sneakers" that will be proper for playing baseball. Kicking the can, climbing trees and all those things kids like to do. You've got to be very selective about how long you put on your feet. We have shoes designed especially for running. Even shoes for can't find dirt, and shoes for running on asphalt. We have shoes you must wear to play volleyball. Shoes for baseball, game uniforms and equipment to play again. One Ole Cat, and the average kid wear outside when you're mowing the yard.

And the prices start at about \$50 a pair. Fifty bucks for a pair? And overalls? There isn't a pair to be had anymore. They aren't designed for comfort. No room in the pockets for frogs and things. Can't roll up the pantsleg to wade for tadpoles. And they had to have somebody's name on the back pocket that makes 'em designer jeans so you can pay another \$50 dollars just for the pleasure of wearing them.

Mothers find themselves going to work just to pay for the knock-around clothes the kids wear in the summer-time. And you can't be sure that some little Taiwanese isn't sitting in a sweatshop making designer jeans for \$5 that you will pay \$50 for in your favorite clothing store. Small wonder so many of us are finding it tough to make ends meet. When most kids in our generation aren't too many manufacturers around here in a forked limb and an old piece of innertube, today too many kids are doing nothing to do unless they've got a pocket full of quarters to visit the video games at their local shopping center. Come to think of it though, there aren't too many manufacturers around anymore either what with useless tires.

We still wonder if creating your own entertainment during the summer recess when school was out wasn't a lot more fun than regimented team sports and adults driving themselves crazy trying to make sure you were always "entertained." The endless games of cowboys and Indians, building a soap box racer out of apple crates and old tricycle wheels used to keep us occupied for days at a time, and the kid with the tallest stilts was the envy of the neighborhood. The new baseball in June was wrapped in electrical tape to hold it together till September and the only player on the team was a glove was the catcher. One bat would last for the season. But times do change and our wants change with them. A hundred bucks for a summer outfit. A couple hundred more for a video play volleyball. Shoes for baseball, game uniforms and equipment to play again. One Ole Cat, and the average kid wear outside when you're mowing the yard.

College Station, May is both "Older American's Month" and the month for honoring volunteers. Taken together, honors go to a special combination - the older volunteer.

Older adults can be a valuable community resource when it comes to filling leadership positions, reminds Judith L. Warren, family life education specialist - aging, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Being contributing community leader provides a valuable role for the retired person seeking a new dimension to his or her life," Warren says.

Some retired people, the specialist says, welcome a "second career" in volunteering. "These retirees are willing to assume leadership positions that require day-to-day efforts on a year round basis," she adds.

Many retired people, however, desire a more flexible volunteer schedule. These individuals are quite willing to be volunteer-leaders but desire short term projects.

Several steps should be considered in order to successfully involve retired adults in volunteer leadership, Warren suggests.

"First, determine the scope of the project. Second, identify those potential 'career' volunteers to head up lengthy projects," she says.

Then focus on other retired people for short term projects or those requiring intermittent involvement. Examples of such projects would be a public television fund-raising drive held annually or a series of educational programs on personal safety, she adds.
