Kirby Restoration Project Fund Drive Now In Gear

Tyler County Heritage Society Inc. launches the Kirby Peachtree Village Restoration Fundraising Drive this week with the expectation of an incentive check from the Chester State Bank in the amount of \$1400. Don Schauteck, bank president, pledged the dollars toward the project at a Project Committee meeting held in The Community Room of the Chester Bank on July 22, 1981.

Schauteck was quoted as saying, "We're behind the City of Chester all the way."

Further evidence of executive committee work thus far has resulted in the hiring of the architectural firm of Graham B. Luhn, A.L.A. of Houston to direct the restoration project. Jack Whitmeyer, TCHS President, stated "Restoration will follow specific guidelines set forth by the National Historical Commission to qualify the site for placement on the National Register." Whitmeyer explained.

"Local persons and services are, of course, our first choice in restoring the old Kirby Home and accompanying 10 acres to its 1910 condition," Whitmeyer

emphasized. Peachtree Village, approximately 2 miles north of Chester on FM 2097, was settled by the Alabama-Coushatta Indians in the early 19th Century with a few remaining until resettlement in their present re- younger Kirby grew up to become the timber with the John T. At the apex his career, Kirby built a new house for his parents which is part of the complex of buildings to be restored. After their death, a chapel style memorial building was erected a short distance downhill. The chapel will be included in the restoration project. TCHS has projected the completion

date of 1986 as part of Texas' Sesquicentennial Celebration. Churches, Organizations, Businesses and individuals of Tyler County will be called on to contribute photos and stories of the past and make financial donations to preserve the future.

Presiding for his first meeting as president, Wayne Smith presented new Rotarian Roy McPhearson and recognized Robert Nash as guest of Bob Boykin.

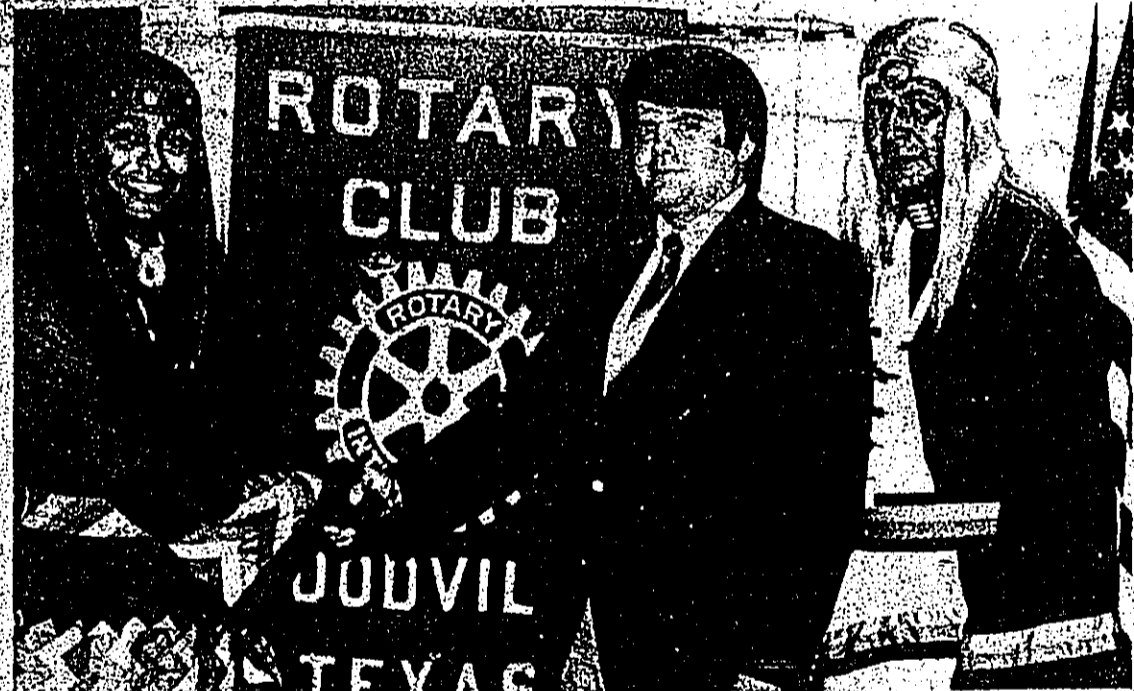
Don Stevenson introduced

Baby Talk

"Hug Me I'm Yours"

This column is the first in a series prepared by local staff of Deep East Texas Regional Mental Health and Mental-Retardation Services, intended to help parents of infants and

young children do the kinds of things with their babies that stimulate growth in intelligence and skill development. Studies have shown that the best time to help a child is in the early months of growth because at this time the child is especially receptive to stimuli of all kind and can make significant gains in development in a relatively short period of time.

Even with the babies milk, cool water, the schedules that young mothers often have, there are still many ways to make each day with your baby a special time for him or her. Here are a few ways you can be teaching your baby even during the regular routine of the day:

1. Talk to the baby as you bathe and feed him. Name objects such as the towel, soap, powder and bath tub. Name his body parts as you wash them. Now we are washing your arm, leg, foot, toes. Every baby should get a chance to play "This Little Piggy". Talk about how things feel as you and he touch things: the rough, dry towel, the slick smooth soap, the wet water. Also how things taste: the sweet apple sauce, warm
2. When baby is playing in his crib and you are busy with other work, this will help him feel secure you are still there, even though he can't see you, and it will also encourage him to make his own sounds—the early beginnings of speech.
3. At bedtime or nap time, take a few moments to look at him, call his name, tell him you love him and hold him close. If your baby knows he is loved and he learns that by how you respond to his needs by holding him, smiling, talking, playing with him, then he will be a happier baby. A happier baby will make a happier mom!

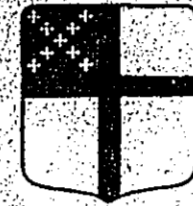

Toys To Learn By

Although there are many good commercial toys on the market today, they are often too expensive for families on limited budgets. Sometimes, the less expensive ones are not as safe or as useful for teaching our little ones new skills. Everyone has probably had a chance to see the young child who unwraps the Christmas gift, only to turn to the box and wrappings for a game of hide-and-seek or noisemaking. In any case, homemade toys, or learning ways to use household items for toys, can be a help to a busy mother. Here are a few simple ideas that take only a little time and a few everyday things.

(1) Sound-Shakers. Use six ounce juice cans covered with contact paper. Put a few small stones, some rice, dried beans, macaroni or salt in a can. Be sure the can is covered securely so your little one can't get into it. (Make pairs of each sound and let older children match the ones that sound alike.) These items can also be good for grasping and holding exercises.

(2) Pull-Toy. An empty shoebox makes the body; four plastic coffee can lids are the wheels; two plastic straws make the axles and a piece of string with a spool on the end makes easy pulling for the toddler.

dier. Cover the "wedges, points, or small objects he could swallow."

(3) Picture-Cards. Cut out pictures for your toddler from magazines and paste them on 5 x 8 index cards. Be sure to cut out pictures of items that are common in your everyday living (cups, a bottle, broom, car, bicycle, etc.) Besides naming the picture as you show it to your toddler, you can relate some experience he has had with it. Example: "We ride in the car to go to town." Or "Mommy drinks coffee from a cup and (baby's name) Deep East Texas drinks milk from a bottle."

(4) Crib-Hangers. For the very young infant, a variety of colors and shapes hanging on a string across his bed can provide interest and stimulation of his visual (seeing) and auditory (hearing) senses. Tie a string across the bed; to the string tie painted thread spools (close enough together so they click when baby moves), colorful pieces of material, a small toy car, or a small bell. Be sure the items are out of baby's reach or tied securely so they can't come off if he pulls on them.

As you begin to make some of these toys, you will probably think of other ways to use everyday items for baby's playtime. Be sure that all items are safe with no sharp

Company Files Application for Increase in Rates

Unless you've been out of the state the past few weeks, I'm sure you know by now we've filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission an application to increase rates. We are well aware this is not the way to win a popularity contest. It's unfortunate, but it's necessary.

The \$471.5 million we are seeking is more money than I can imagine, but so is the \$1.5 billion we've budgeted this year to expand and improve service in Texas. Incidentally, this is the fifth straight year we have committed more than \$1 billion in the state.

Almost a third of the total we've asked for is the result of rules the Federal Communications Commission recently adopted, requiring faster recovery of expenses for depreciation and other capital costs. The FCC's action was taken because competitive and technological developments have resulted in shorter service life for telephone equipment. It's a simple, but costly, fact.
