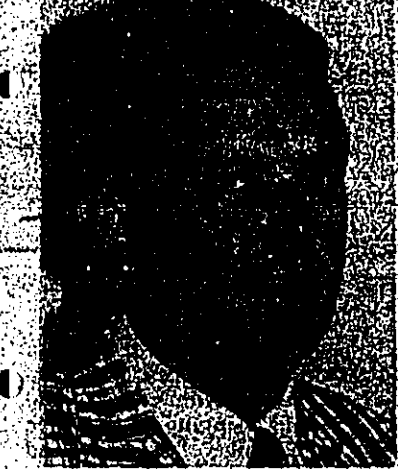

Harold Allison To Serve On CSB Board

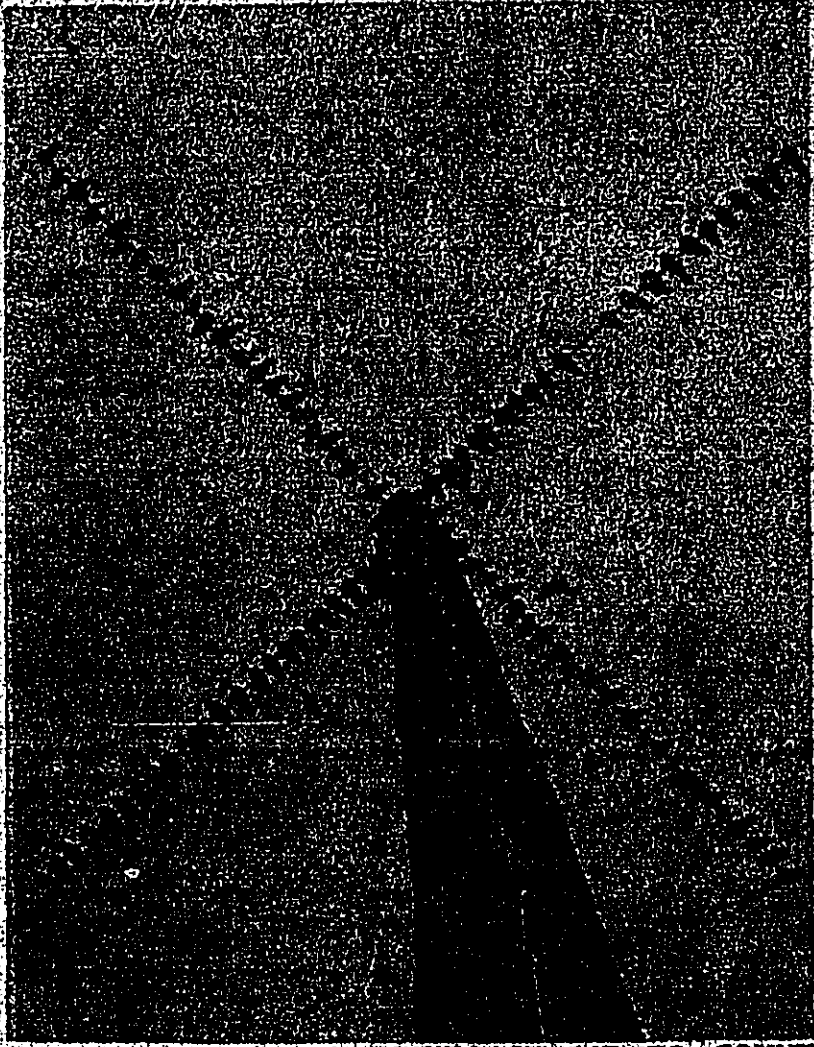

Clements Here Friday

A group of County Republican Party officials will serve as the official greeters Friday when Governor Bill Clements steps off his plane shortly after 9 a.m. upon arrival to address the Deep East Texas Development Association.

The visit to Woodville will be the Governor's first since taking office as the 49th Governor of the State of Texas.

Representatives from each of the 9 Counties represented by the DETDA will be present at the Woodville Inn to hear the Governor talk.

Clements is expected to address issues affecting development of the multi-county area. The incumbent Republican governor will face Democratic candidate Mark White in the November election.

A large turn-out of the county officials, private citizens and state agency representatives who make up the regional association's membership list is expected for the 10 a.m. luncheon meeting at the Woodville Inn. City/County Equity Sought

The Deep East Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association meeting last Thursday in Jasper, urged the state to use a peer review panel made up of representatives of both county and city officials in distributing federal Community Development Block Grant funds.

Tyler County has received two grants under this program. A \$100,000 grant for paving streets in the Trousdale area. A \$250,000 grant for

bridge construction and street paving in the Hillister-Spurger (Beaumont Hills area). The county is currently applying for a grant street paving in the Warren area. The city of Woodville received 1 1/2 million dollars over three years which was used for paving and guttering streets, rehabilitation of housing, demolition of substandard housing, enforcement of housing codes and providing public recreation areas.

The County Judges and Commis-

sioners Association was in particular opposed to an alternative proposal put forward last October by the Texas Municipal League (TML). According to Jasper County Judge Harold Kennedy, chairman of the Deep East Texas Association of County Judges and Commissioners, the TML proposal calls for a state level peer review panel for the grants comprised of mayors, council members and municipal administrators.

Vaughn Makes More Than Chairs

SAN ANTONIO, TX - Woodville's High Vaughn does more than make chairs - he also keeps a dying craft alive. Vaughn will participate in the seventh annual Texas Folklife Festival where he will show visitors from across the state and country - how old fashioned rocking chairs are made.

The Texas Folklife Festival is a truly unique celebration of Texas history, with emphasis on the state's ethnic

diversity and cultural traditions. Some 6000 participants will gather on the grounds of The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio August 5 through 8. They share with the more than 100,000 visitors their ethnic and folk entertainment, crafts, music, food and games.

Vaughn will bring a custom lathe to the festival to show how long and short posts for chairs are carved and

teach the basics of turning wood in a lathe. Participating in the Festival for the first time is Sid Owens, another Woodville resident. Owens will teach visitors that favorite of frontier past-times - whittling.

At the Texas Folklife Festival, nine entertainment stages feature talented Texas dancing, making music and short posts for chairs are carved and

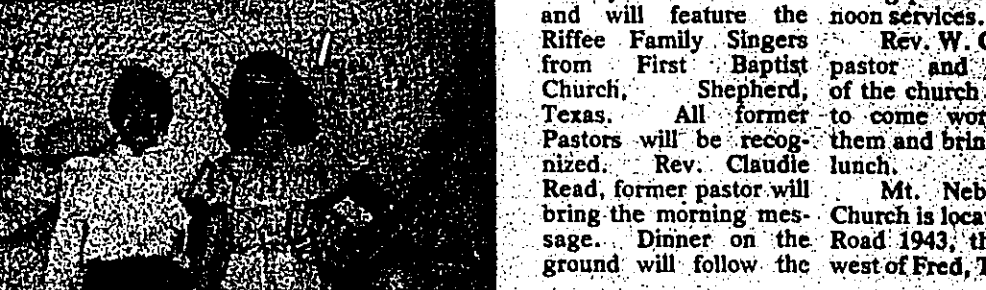

Hints To The Consumer "Air Conditioning"

Of course they will be used when you decide to run the air conditioner. You can still save energy by turning the thermostat to a slightly higher setting. Use a timer to turn on the unit just before your return. Keep the air conditioner cool and keep your electric bill within your budget is possible. Thoughtful use of appliances can contribute substantially to these savings. A whole-house window fan and proper use of shade will help you stay cool when the outside temperature soars. In turn, you'll postpone the time when you reach for that expensive air conditioner.

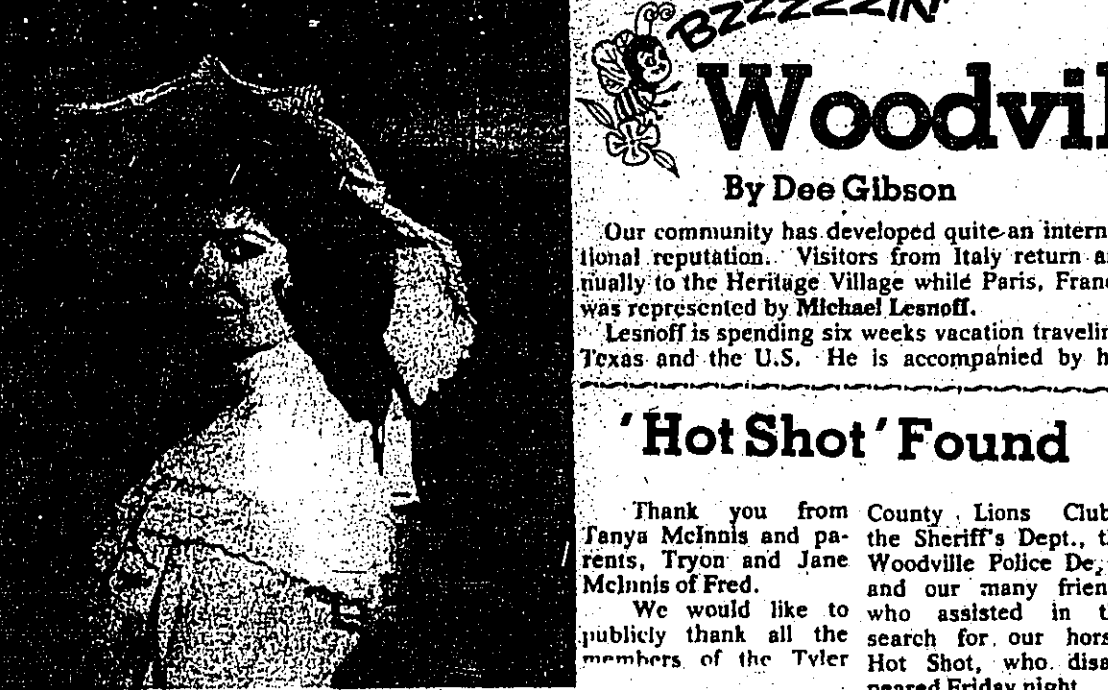

Tyler County Judge Allen Strickland told the group, "the cities in the Deep East Texas area are with us; if Dick Brown has a fight we'll give him one; if he wants a damn fight, we'll fight him." Brown is Executive Director of the Texas Municipal League. The Judges and Commissioners Association proposed further for the Community Development Grant Funds to be equitably distributed among the 24 geographic planning regions of the state, (through the states' twenty-four regional Councils of Governments), by a formula based on need for funds in each region. Keynote address was given by Jim Allison, Texas Assistant Attorney General. He spoke on county policies on inventory and purchasing of county-owned property for medical care for the poor. He stressed need for individuals independent of those actually doing the purchasing and receiving of purchased items be responsible for documenting those actions. In regard to medical care for the poor, Allison emphasized that state law requires responsibility for "care of paupers and lunatics, and that the limits of the counties' responsibilities in this area are currently being defined by civil rights lawsuits. Allison stated that Tyler County Judge Strickland had requested by letter a legal opinion from the Attorney General's Office as to the liability a county would incur through use of Community Service Probation. Allison stated that a formal opinion would come from the Attorney General's Office but that in his personal opinion Community Service Probation is not to be subject to liability as they are not paid county employees. However they might be liable for actions when operating county owned equipment. In other business, the association passed resolutions commending Charles Wright, aide to Nacogdoches State Senator Roy Baker, for his assistance in helping the Association during the 67th legislative session, and a resolution urging continued strong financial support by the state legislature for community based Mental Health-Mental Retardation Services. Referring to the resolution on community MH-MR Services, Strickland told the group "If we can keep these people out of Rusk and other such places, we can save ourselves \$62 a day. We want to keep these places (community MH-MR centers) open so we can keep these people at home." Judge Roy Smith of Sabine County was appointed to chair the legislative committee. Tyler County Commissioner Mazie Riley was appointed head of a nine member committee to find additional money for the association. Tyler County Commissioner Jerry Mahan was appointed chairman of a six member committee which will draw up a state of affairs for submission to the members at the next quarterly meeting to be held in Woodville on Oct. 6.

Highway Dept. Will Receive \$130 Million, Says Hobby

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will receive an estimated \$130 million in additional funding for highway construction and maintenance through 1983, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby announced Friday.

The Highway Cost Committee provided the additional funds by updating its method of calculating the effects of inflation on the costs of highway construction and maintenance. The committee, comprised of Gov. R. Clements, Hobby and State Comptroller Bob Bullock, adjusted its calculations to include a change in the price index by which contractors bid on highway jobs and to give more stress to highway maintenance.

During the committee meeting, Hobby pinpointed a flaw in the Highway Department's method of calculating the Highway Cost Index and suggested an alternative that will provide an additional \$12 million for 1982-83.

"I am pleased that the committee saw fit to make these changes," Hobby said. "For various reasons, the Highway Cost Index needed updating to provide a more accurate picture of the effects of inflation on highway programs."

Hobby said the additional \$130 million is severely needed to help upgrade the state's highway system.

The 1980s for farmers in Texas have meant high interest rates, rising costs and falling prices. These factors have combined to push many farmers to the brink of insolvency.

And this spring, nature has dealt another serious blow to our farmers, particularly those in West Texas. The damage caused by recent hail storms is almost incomprehensible. Preliminary estimates indicate that 75 percent of the 4.2 million acres planted in cotton was damaged. That means the loss of about a million bales of cotton. Figures still are being compiled on other crop losses, but it is clear that wheat production has been affected substantially, and the corn crop also suffered significant damage.

The impact of this loss of food and fiber will be felt throughout the economy of the region. But the real tragedy is the plight of the individual farmers, who face imminent bankruptcy if assistance cannot be provided.

I spent enough time as a boy chopping cotton on my grandfather's farm to understand the heartbreak of seeing a crop destroyed by a whim of nature. I know that farming is more than a business; it is a way of life deeply cherished by those who cultivate the land and feed and clothe the rest of us.

In any year, crop damage of this severity would be a serious blow to farmers. But this year could be far worse because of the economic factors which have left many farmers facing this natural disaster with their credit resources exhausted.

For this reason, I have asked Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block to use every resource available to him to help Texas farmers survive this crisis.

It is clear that implementation of the crop insurance program enacted as part of 1981 farm legislation is insufficient to alleviate the economic pressure.

I have asked the Secretary to consider invoking a special provision of the 1981 legislation which provides for direct disaster payments to producers. A high-level disaster task force sent by Secretary Block is compiling the necessary information and local officials are marshaling supporting data to forward to the department. And Secretary Block has promised me that he will give this situation his careful personal attention. I will continue to press vigorously for a prompt and favorable ruling.

In a larger sense, however, I hope that this disaster will help focus attention on the broader problems that face farmers throughout the nation.

We need to remind officials throughout the Administration, and in Congress, of the absolute necessity of maintaining a viable agricultural economy. The solutions to the many problems plaguing farmers will not come easily. Some solutions will come naturally as we improve the overall economy.

However, we must examine and deal with the problems unique to agriculture. It is my hope and expectation that we will be able to refine our domestic farm policies and expand export markets. If we can accomplish these two major goals, the innovation and hard work of our farmers will carry them through these trying times.

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Cut Heating-Cooling Bills With Creative Horticulture

While Texas temperatures are beginning their annual rise, the utility bills to keep Texans cool are rising just as fast if not faster.

Summer's heat leads Texans indoors, which means air conditioning, and that means big cooling bills, which no one likes.

However, there is a way to have cooler homes and lower bills, according to Ann Holland, urban forester in San Antonio with the Texas Forest Service, a part of the Texas A&M University System. It is called precision landscaping.

Precision landscaping is the use of strategically planted trees and shrubs. It can make a significant difference in utility bills, especially for city dwellers.

"By their very nature, cities are warmer than the surrounding countryside due to surfaces such as asphalt, concrete, steel, glass and tar roofs, coupled with reduced vegetation," she said. "City surfaces absorb solar radiation."

They are also poor insulators. They gain but also lose heat faster than vegetation, leaving a considerable difference between those surfaces and the surrounding air.

"That means increased temperatures and decreased relative humidity. But trees can improve temperatures in cities by controlling that

solar radiation," said Ms. Holland.

The effectiveness of trees will depend upon their canopy density, leaf shape and branching patterns.

Ms. Holland recommends deciduous trees, those losing their leaves in the winter, over evergreens. Deciduous species allow the warming winter sun to penetrate and help in winter heating.

"In summer, trees are nature's air conditioners. One isolated tree may transpire 90 gallons of water per day, with sufficient moisture. This equals five room-sized air conditioners, each running 20 hours per day," she said.

"Temperatures felt by people can be reduced by several degrees through shade trees, especially around hard surfaces found in cities."

Studies show that shaded houses use up to 25 percent less energy than unshaded houses. Other studies state that temperatures of a shaded house will be 15 degrees cooler than one not shaded.

Now for the really good news. Savings may range from 10 to 20 percent when air conditioner use is reduced. And, those machines run more efficiently when the house or building is shaded.

"The important decision is where to plant," Ms. Holland noted. "Spatial relationships between the tree and the houses are important so that the maximum shade protection will be provided."

In other words, do not just stick any tree in the ground around the house and hope it works.

"Don't guess. Be precise. This is a good time of the year to determine the best location of a tree. Put an 18-inch or 24-inch stake in the ground and observe it for a couple of weeks. Trace the stake's position to see where it projects itself in relation to the house. This way you can approximate the tree's shadow knowing its mature height," she said.

Utility records indicate that the hours between 3 p.m. and 5 p.m. are the most crucial because the sun is at its hottest. This is when consumption is also at its highest, and the time to trace the stake's shadow.

After determining where the trees should be planted, the next step is planting the correct species.

Important in species selection are the characteristics of a particular tree and the characteristics of the site.

Information needed about the species includes how tall the tree will grow, its soil requirements, eventual root size, whether it needs full sun or shade and its water needs.

"As far as the site, look around for overhead power lines, sidewalks, buildings, other vegetation, underground sewer or cable lines and other times which might affect the tree or might be affected by it later on," she added. "A little planning beforehand will save many headaches in years to come."

To determine the recommended species for a particular area, contact a local nursery, the Texas Forest Service or extension service.

One last recommendation: this late in the planting season, Ms. Holland suggests planting containerized trees, which have a better survival rate when planted in late spring and summer. Balled-and-burlapped trees and bare-rooted trees are better planted in the dormant season.

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Glass Recycling Is On Upward Trend

More than 100 glass container manufacturing plants produce new containers in part from recycled glass. In addition, there are thousands of collection points throughout the United States that accept or pay the public for used glass containers.

In fact, hundreds of independent recyclers throughout the nation are presently paying consumers up to one-and-a-half cents a pound for used glass.

These multi-million-dollar recycling centers take clean, color-separated glass containers and crush them into small bits known as cullet, which they store to glass manufacturing plants.

Although the primary components of glass—sand, soda ash and limestone—are in abundant domestic supply, cullet has long been an integral part of the glass manufacturing process because of its economic advantages over virgin raw materials.

The use of cullet also provides energy benefits. Since cullet melts faster than virgin materials, its use allows manufacturers to lower the temperature of their furnaces and, thus, decrease energy usage and emissions.

Glass is being recycled at the Anchor-Hocking plant in Houston; at the Owens-Illinois plant in Waco; at the Kerr plant in Waxahatchie; at the Chattanooga plant in Corning; and at the Glass Containers plant in Palestine.
