At Monday Meeting Commissioners Hear Precinct 2 Road Complaint

Precinct 2 Commissioner Kenneth Lowe got a blast Monday from a disgruntled resident of White Tail Ridge who leveled charges at the commissioner for "failure to keep up and properly ditch and crown" the mile dirt road leading into the community located near the Polk-Tyler line west of Woodville.

Lowe defended his work in the area, reporting to the court and to Walter Johnson that he had, "At least twice each week, and sometimes even three times a week, and maintained the road as best he could."

"What do you expect from a dirt road?" Lowe asked.

"You've got to realize that White Tail Ridge's 3 miles of road are competing with 100 other miles of road in our precinct."

"Why is the road so pitiful?" Johnson asked, adding that he was in the process of producing a petition asking for specific action on the problem from Lowe and the entire court.

"Better than 1,500 taxpayers are upset about the road conditions," Lowe responded. "Run for commissioner and see if you can keep it up."

Johnson said he would like to invite the court to examine the problem but balked at the idea saying they had other things to do but would go and help if Commissioner Lowe asked them to.

In other action the court heard an appeal from Adult Probation Officer Kenny Simpson asking the court for continued on page 8

Bond Election Eyed

Woodville City Fathers heard a gloomy financial report about future city dollar availability from City Manager Walt Davis at the regular monthly meeting Monday forecasting a possible bond election which could ask for from \$700,000 to \$1 million from Woodville taxpayers for repair of city streets.

Councilmen say they are awaiting word on possible grant dollars which they expect could amount to some \$40,000 for 1983.

Davis said firmly that he would recommend no pay raises for 1983 for city employees and that there would be no rehiring.

He said he expected that it would take some \$5000-\$7000 in upkeep for the new city park for 1983 and that there was some \$80,000 still due on the gas system.

Davis said he would ask the council to put \$15,000 to \$20,000 into new street lights and lighting for the ball park.

The City Manager was also able to report that 3,214 feet of 3 inch gas line had been replaced while 240 feet of 4 inch line had been installed but that, "There was still 18 miles to go."

On a more positive note Davis said the city's sewer project was complete except for installation of a few remaining customer connections.

Davis reported that the city might be faced with the reality of drilling its own water well.

Woodville resident Jose L. Cordero complained to the council asking for a leash law to be enforced here. Cordero, who is convalescing from a triple bypass heart surgery, said his walks around the city have been harrowing experiences.

"This is our town," Cordero said.

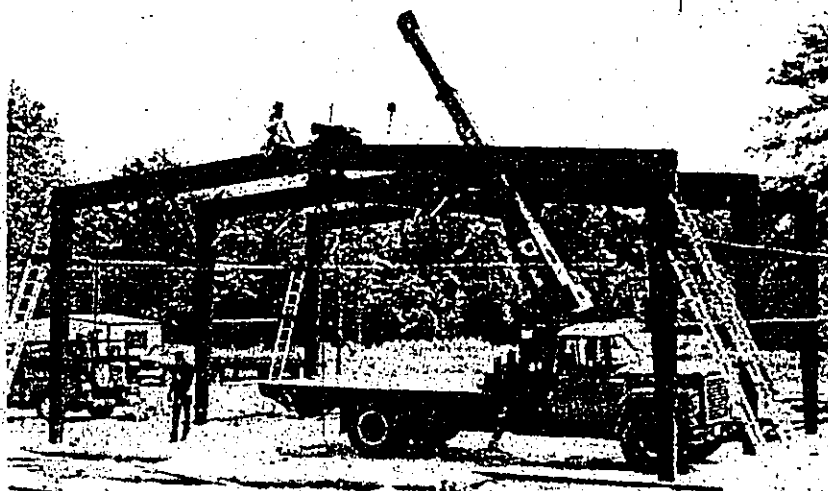

Students in grades 6-8 who are new to Woodville should register the week of August 16-20 at the middle school principal's office on the high school campus. Students in grades 1-5 who are new to the Woodville schools or who did not register in the spring should enroll August 16-20 at the principal's office at the Wheat school building from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Wednesday, August 25, will be the first day of classroom instruction, and will be the first day that school buses will operate.

Pupils who register in kindergarten or first grade will be required to have birth certificates in order to establish eligibility for registration. Pupils new to the Woodville schools should have grade, book and credit records, as well as vaccination and health information from previously attended schools, ready at registration time.

State laws requires that all pupils entering and attending the public schools of Texas must have been immunized against diphtheria,

'Mrs. Evie Of' Johnston Hill'

A lovely baby girl was born on August 10, 1891 to Andrew and Fredonia Peacock Boyer just east of the Emily Community and they named her Evie.

The baby grew up attending school at Emily and helping with her three brothers and four sisters. When she was only 16 years old, Evie's school teacher, Miss Charlie Holland, showed her a poem and asked if she could learn it for the school Christmas party.

Mrs. Evie recalls her baptism at age 16 in Wolfe Creek where members of Ebenezer Baptist Church held their baptisms until recent years when in-
dors baptismal was built.

After Evie and Mr. Johnson were married, they moved to the old Segrest Place in 1929 which became "Johnston Hill." Two sons, Frank and Allan, were added to the family. From their marriages came one grandson, Richard Allen and five granddaughters for Mrs. Evie, who is more affectionately called "Momma Johnston."

Richard Allen Johnston lives nearby and his wife, Brenda, recalls preparing lunch and dinner. Their son, Jeffrey, age 8 and daughter, Jennifer, age 3, are delightful visitors for Momma Johnston.

Their great-grandmother, Mrs. Myrtle Rambo, "ain't nothing like a good friend" states Mrs. Evie. Craig Mooney drives up from Lafayette once a month just to do the yard and repairs on the old home. They reminisce about the delicious La Coute pear cobbler, pies and preserves Mrs. Evie has always made from the two trees out front.

Then thoughts run across to the pasture where people covered the trees for the annual sunrise service. The last service held was in 1962 with Bro. Roland Spears, now pastor of San Antonio's Highland Hills Baptist Church, preaching.

Another favorite memory is of the Old Oak Tree which stands in Tyler County. Ella Mosley of Colmesneer wrote a poem about the tree on May 1, 1964 which was framed along with a photo.

As the years of memories grow, friends and relatives come and go but Mrs. Evie Johnston remains keeping the records.

McDonald Receives Wings

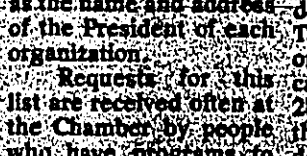

 Attendance in the public schools of this state is compulsory for all pupils ages 7 through 17, for a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term. Attendance in kindergarten is optional. Pupils who are five years old or older before September 1 are eligible to attend kindergarten, while students who are six years old are eligible to enroll in the first grade. The kindergarten program of the districts will operate a full day all year.

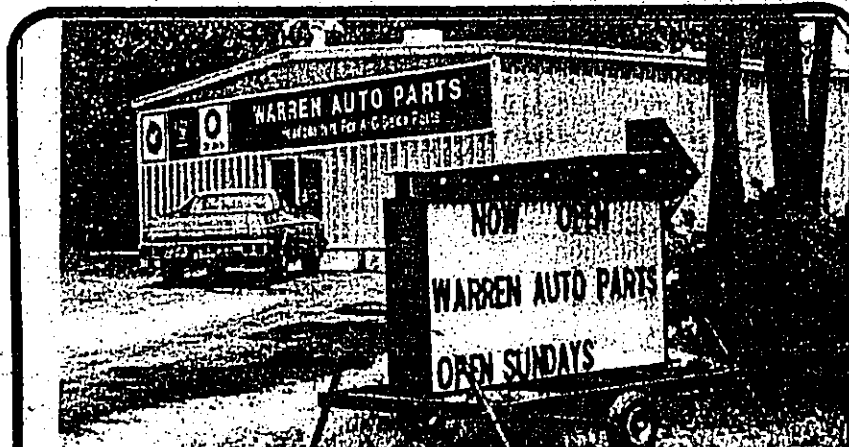

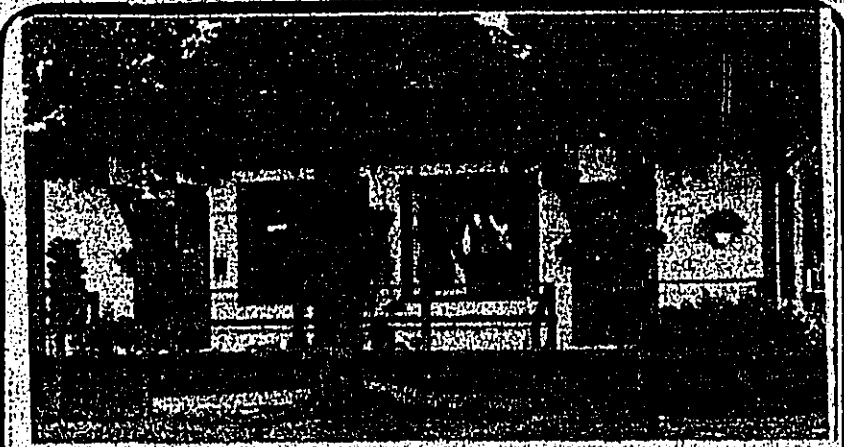
