Tyler County Hospital Adding 'Rehab Center'

"A simultaneous combustion of need" may have sparked a relatively new concept for a "hospital placed" rehabilitation center here as staff members and volunteers work feverishly this week to open the all new Tyler County Hospital Rehabilitation

Center located adjacent to the existing hospital facility in Woodville.

The facility will be designed to specifically assist persons with needs in the areas of speech, physical, and occupational therapy.

"The Rehab Center" as it is re-

ferred to by Hospital Administrator Dick Cordes, won't be ready, however, for several days, awaiting primarily the installation of a telephone.

It will offer it's services in the building located adjacent to the hospital and formerly the offices of Drs. Gayle Burton

and Doug Hallmark.

"The spacious building will offer rooms enough for each of the services. Furniture and outfitting for the facility have been put together "on a shoestring" to this point. "But it's coming together real well," Cordes said.

Tyler County Hospital Therapist DeDe Cordes said that the doctors in Tyler County "were visionary in assisting us and recognizing the need for this type of patient therapy work."

According to the therapist for Tyler County Hospital, the project

evolved out of needing space. The facility will operate as an unattached wing of the facility, and with the help of a "super" board and a "super" medical staff who believe in therapy.

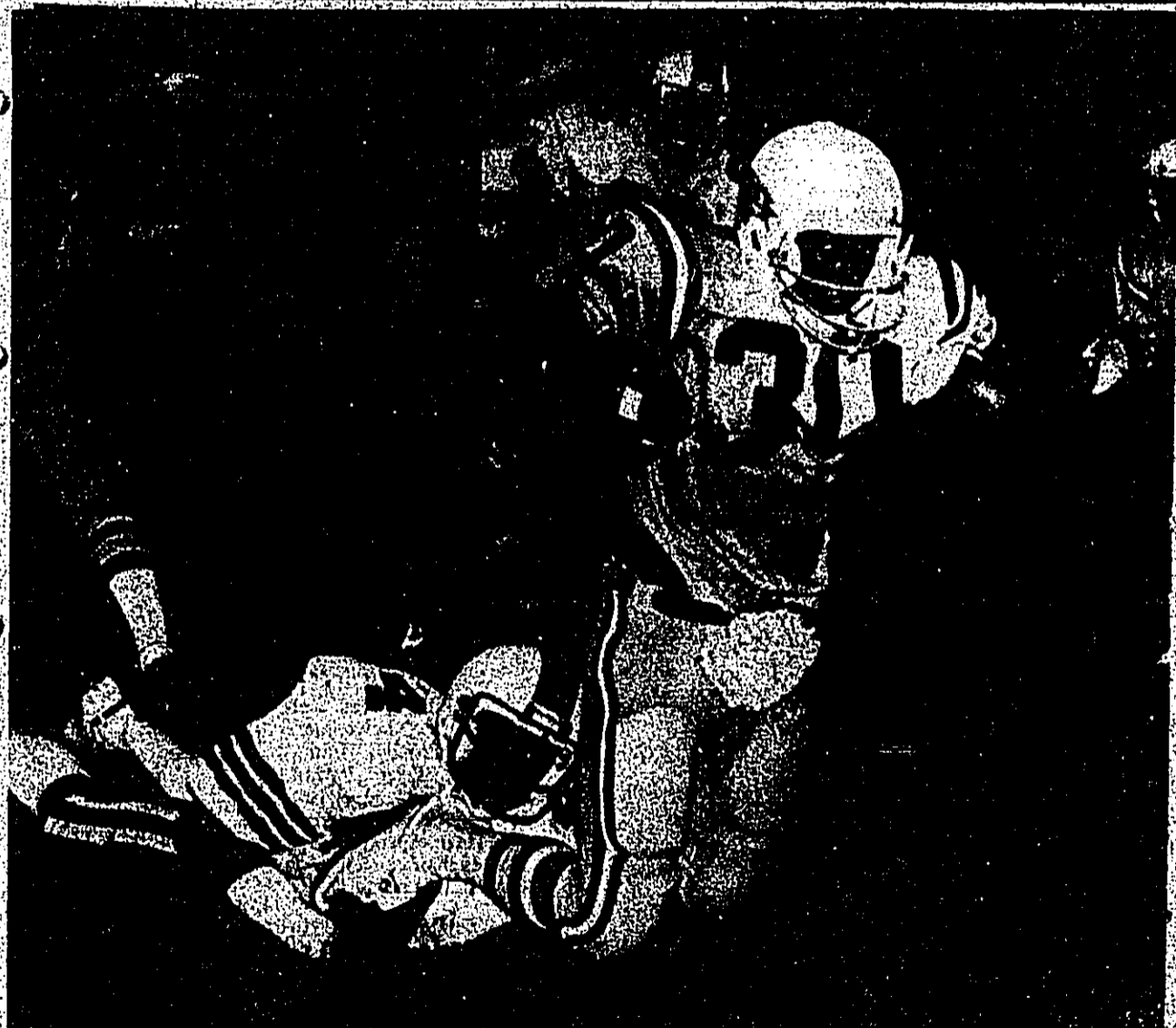

Landowners-Plant Trees As A Crop

The weather is hot, and the economy is cool. If not downright frigid, but state forestry officials are already gearing up for a busy tree planting season this winter.

Why? The reasons are numerous, says Charles "Boss" Walker, state forester with the Texas Forest Service in Livingston. He cites tax incentives as one reason why investment-minded landowners are interested in tree planting.

This amount--up to \$1,000--can be subtracted from the amount of tax owed. Also, the entire cost of planting--up to \$10,000--can be deducted from gross income on a pro-rated basis over a seven-year period.

Wigley said he intercepted the man at the main traffic light in town and followed him, observing him "bounce off the curb two or three times." Wigley said the arrest

did not involve drugs until the man in his own personal search for his drivers license uncovered a package of marijuana, which gave Wigley "probable cause" for the arrest.

Wigley said that he was charged by Justice of the Peace Jimmy Davis with driving while under the influence of drugs, felony possession of marijuana, possession of a controlled sub-

stance, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

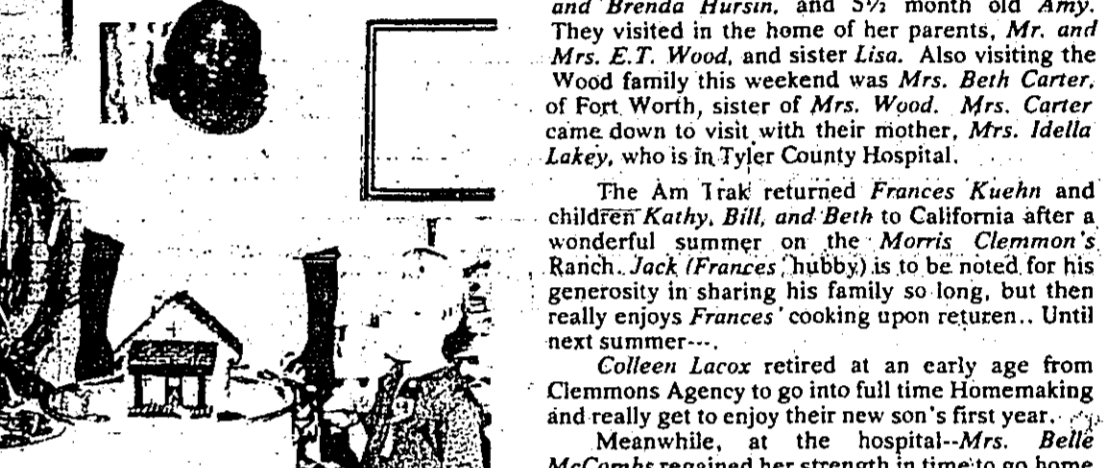

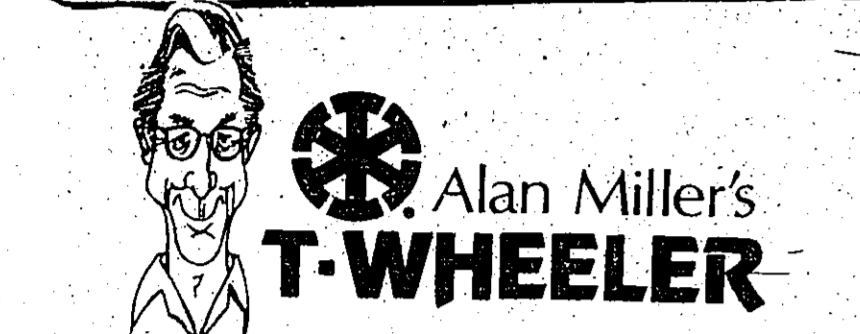

Just to prove how today's worries aren't nearly that important, years later.

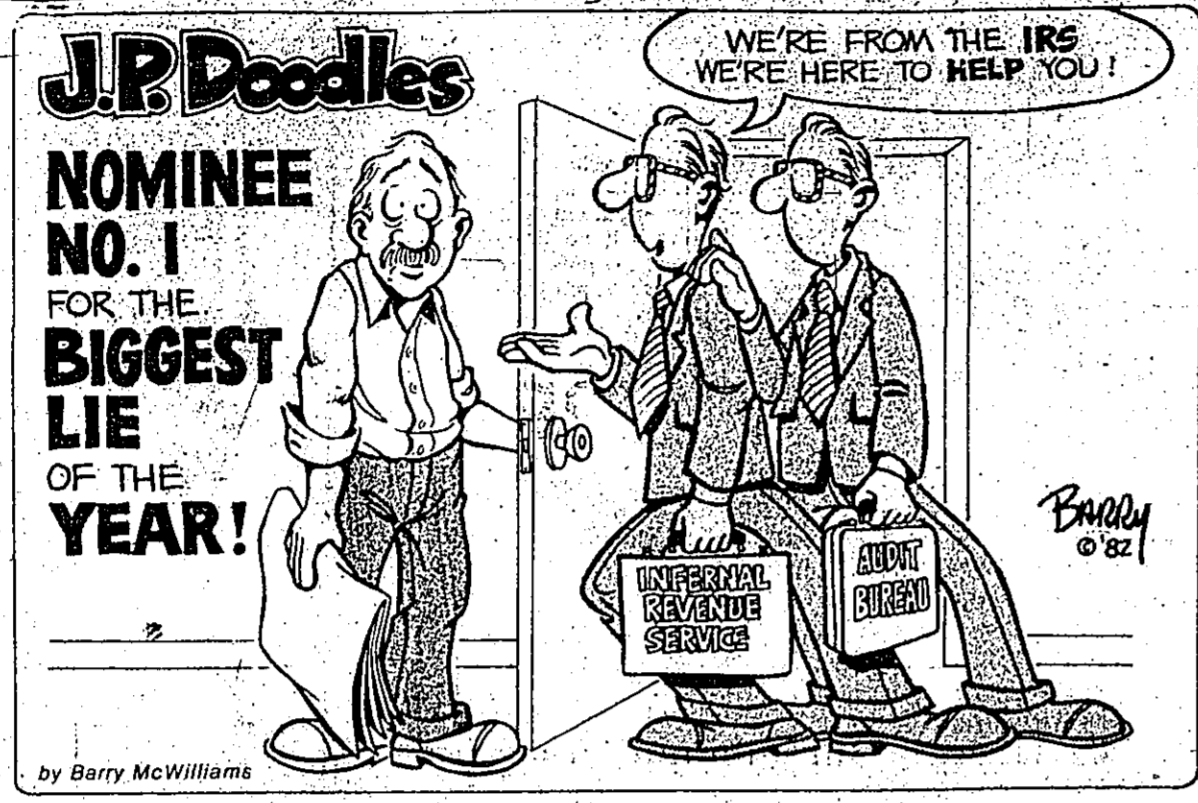

AUSTIN—Let's discuss a new issue, that is new to us—acupuncture. Of course this has been practiced in China and other oriental countries for more than 5,000 years. Today acupuncture is used to prevent diseases in as many as 50 countries around the world.

The theory of Chinese medicine, of which acupuncture is a part, proposes that disease itself is the manifestation of a disturbance in the body's balance of Yin and Yang. This theory may be compared to the Western scientific theory of the function of the sympathetic (Yang) and parasympathetic (Yin) nervous system. The aim of acupuncture is to bring the energy back into balance by the judicious stimulation or depression of the flow of energy in the various meridians.

Common diseases and ailments that can be treated by acupuncture include many familiar respiratory and heart ailments. It is estimated that more than two million cases of surgery have been performed in China under acupuncture anesthesia, with results in 80% of the cases found to be good or excellent. More than 100,000 types of operations have been performed with acupuncture anesthesia, including open heart surgery, lung removal, brain surgery, and others.

Over a period of decades, Western research has revealed various acupuncture mechanisms - though acupuncture has not been explained completely.

Acupuncture may be an answer for many who have failed to find relief from other forms of medicine but, clearly, it is not a panacea for all ills. Acupuncture, like all other forms of human activity, is not without risk. Although this has happened only rarely, the fact remains that acupuncture treatment, if administered by an inexperienced person or one lacking the necessary expertise, may sort, the last hope for many conditions which do not respond to orthodox medicine. It may, indeed, often have the effect of being good or excellent. More than 100,000 types of operations have been performed with acupuncture anesthesia, including open heart surgery, lung removal, brain surgery, and others.

trator Corley, the facility should serve a multi-county region and the coordinating agency is currently developing an international network to distribute to persons who are interested in the project and to health service agencies who would refer clients.

Along with the Speech Therapy function in the new facility will be Specialists Joanne Collins, as the Occupational Therapist; and Al Roundtree of Jasper, as the Physical Therapist.

Occupational therapy will include assisting people of all ages including infants, pre-school age children with motor problems, arthritis patients, industrial accident injuries, stroke victims, and language disabled with motor coordination problem persons.

Speech Therapy will include handling patients with "hard-of-hearing" problems, cleft palate, cerebral palsy patients, delayed language problems, articulation disorders, rhythm disorders, stroke victims, laryngectomy patients, and parkinsonian patients.

The Physical Therapy side of the program will involve those patients who have been victims of stroke and other physical disabilities.

Persons interested in more information about the project are asked to write until a phone is installed at the Rehab Center. "Once that's done we'll be better able to serve the public. We're not ready now, but we will be soon. We're very excited about this whole project. Now at least we'll have a place for outpatient care."

The facility will be designed to specifically assist persons with needs in the areas of speech, physical and occupational therapy.

According to the TFS forester, many landowners just want a place to get away from the hustle and bustle of city living. Others want a combination of benefits from their land, including wildlife, recreation, and income production.

"Woodlands offer these benefits without requiring large investments of management time, a particularly appealing investment feature to absentee landowners," says Walker.

The forestry specialist advises landowners to make their tree planting decisions as soon as possible. These decisions have to be made well before the actual planting, season or landowners could find themselves without seedlings or a planting vendor.

A list of certified forestry vendors is available upon request from the Texas Forest Service offices. In this area contact the TFS at 508 Pan American Drive, Livingston, Texas 77351 or 713/327-4832.

"Although winter may seem like a long way off, it may arrive too soon for landowners who don't start now to plan their winter forestry activities," concludes Walker.

Voter Registration Info

Qualifications for Voting:

1. You must be a citizen of the United States.
2. You must be at least 18 years of age on the day of the election.
3. You must be a resident of the county, or political subdivision conducting the election.
4. You must be registered to vote.

Persons Not Entitled to Vote:

1. Those convicted of a felony whose full rights of citizenship have not been restored.
2. Those persons found mentally incompetent by a court of law.

How to Register to Vote:

1. Complete a post card application for voter registration and mail it postage-free or present it in person to the voter registrar in your county.
2. You may register to vote at any time, but your application must be received by your county Voter Registrar by October 3, 1982 in order to vote in the November 2, 1982 general election. Because October 3, 1982 falls on a Sunday, persons wishing to register in person at the voter registrar's office by the October 3rd deadline must do so no later than the close of business, Friday, October 1, 1982.
3. You may register to vote if you are at least 17 years and 10 months of age, but you may not vote until you are 18 years of age.

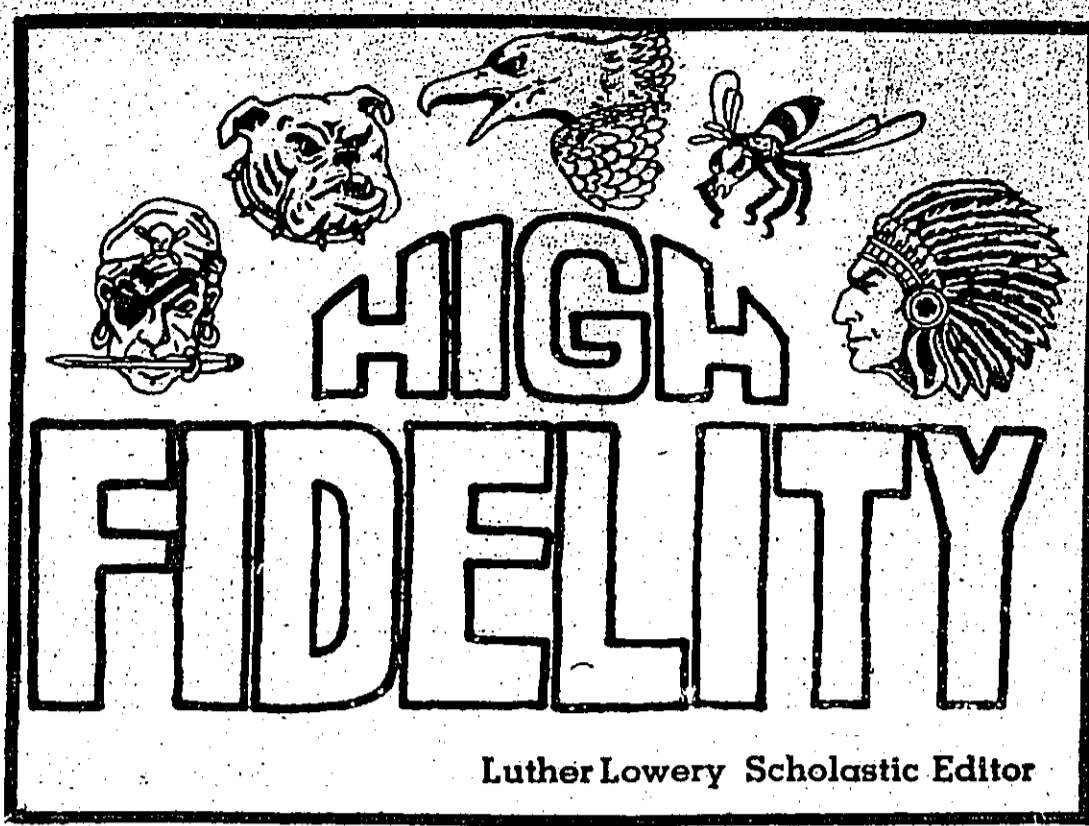

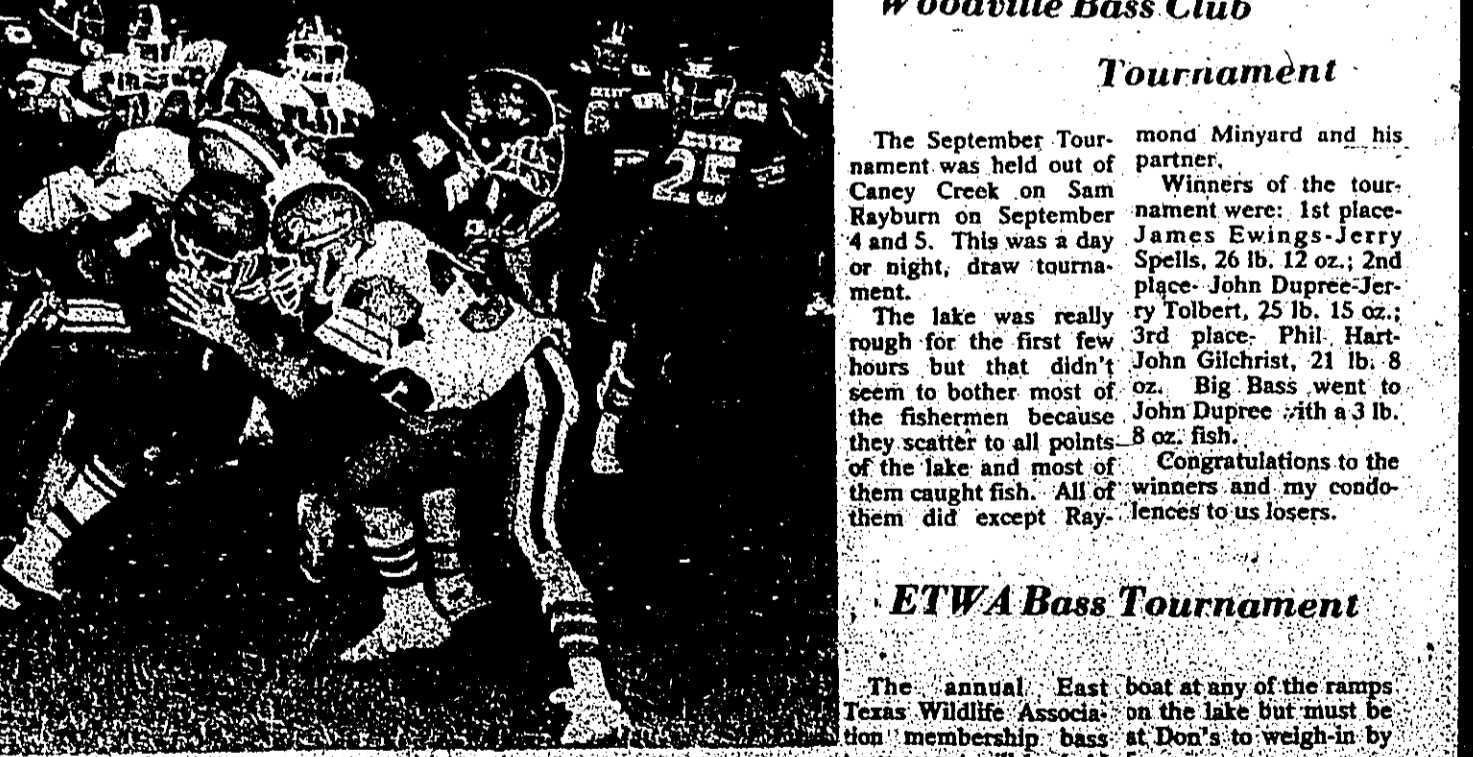

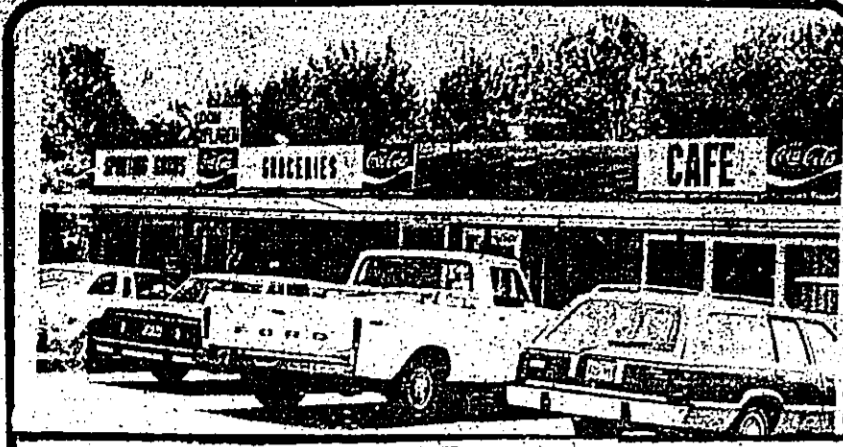

The amendment would be repealed by the Legislature if the Legislature passes a law that would increase the state ad valorem tax rate after the effective date of the proposed amendment.

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 3 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to both individuals and partnerships as well as families and individuals. The proposed amendment would apply to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions. The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties is hereby approved."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the maximum amount spent for state welfare aid during any fiscal year. The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium. The amendment would be repealed by the Legislature if the Legislature passes a law that would increase the state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

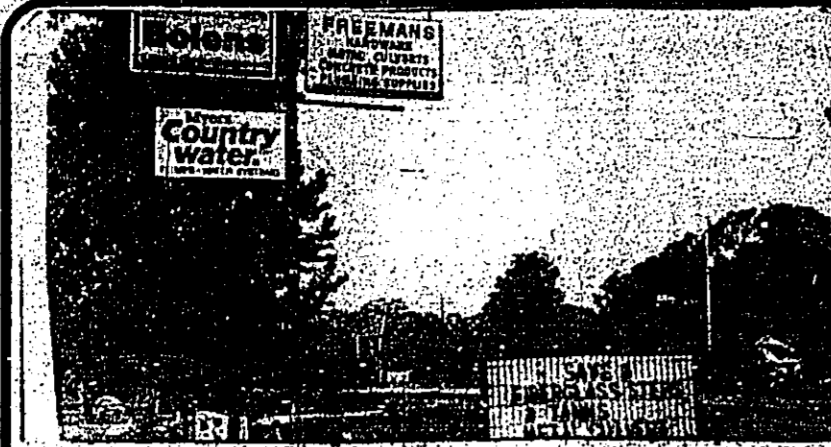
PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT
House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote. The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties is hereby approved."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT
Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 10%. The new 10% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued prior to the date of the proposed amendment. The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to raise the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 10% is hereby approved."



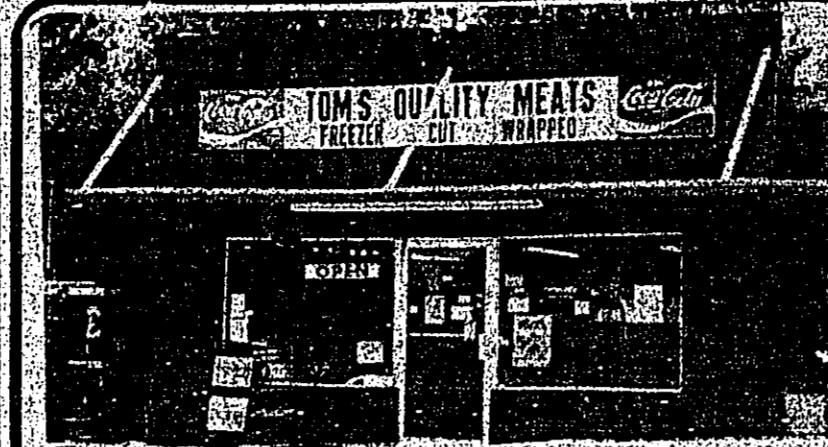

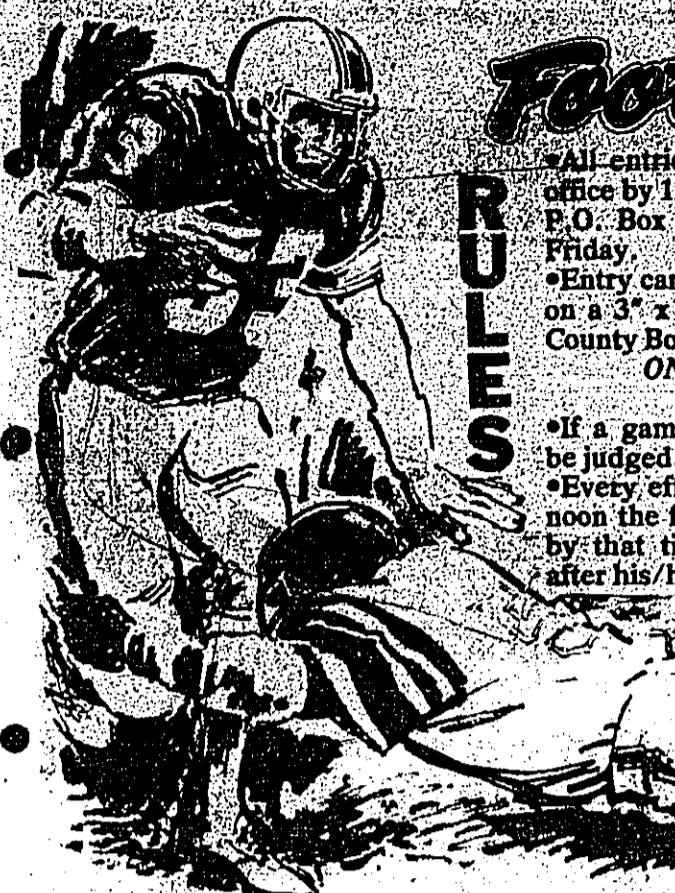
