

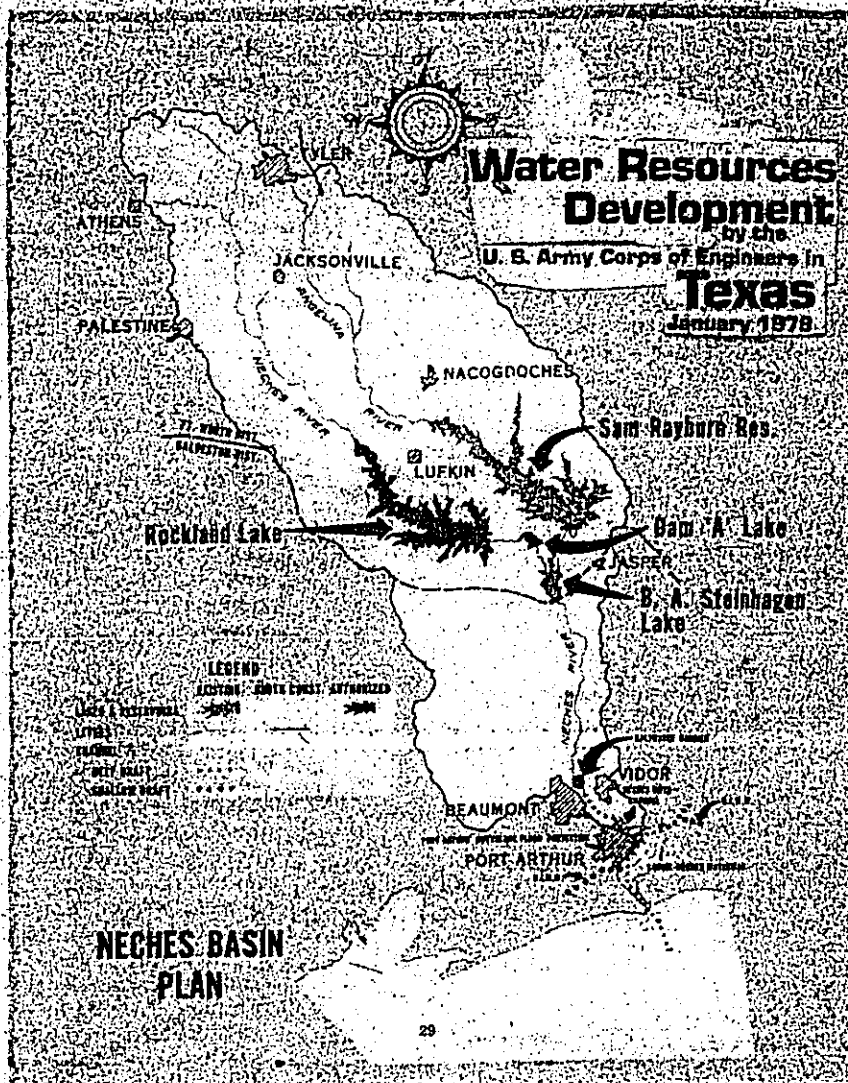

## First of 52 Week Series Rockland Lake Dam Report Due

A Corps of Engineers \$100,000 report still considered "in-house" but due to be released at the end of this month recommends removal of the Rockland Lake and Dam Project from the "inactive" list allowing the Corps of Engineers to proceed with preconstruction planning.

Leland Wilson, project engineer for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers Office in Fort Worth, and who is in charge of the Neches River Basin Study, said Friday, "We are recommending further detailed preconstruction planning on this Rockland Lake and Dam project." Previous estimates from Wilson's office indicated that the detailed planning and preliminary impact studies stage of the project will take 12 years while actual construction of a three-mile wide and 23 mile long water storage reservoir will take only 8 years.

Wilson said studies of four areas of usage of the project suggested further planning. These areas are: (1) flood damage, (2) water supply need, (3) hydro-electric potential and (4) water-oriented recreation needs.

Implementation of the recommendations in the forthcoming engineering report will depend on several factors. Wilson said, "Approval of the report at the Division level of the Corps of Engineers and concurrence with the recommendations of the report by the Lower Neches River Valley Authority are necessary along with

he said, "the inclusion in President Ronald Reagan's budget."

Wilson stated further that funding for the preliminary planning is not scheduled in the fiscal 1984 budget which begins October first, adding, "I don't know if it will be in the following years budget or not."

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The Tyler County Booster begins this week an aggressive 52-week look at the Rockland Lake and Dam Project. Wilson's office had guestimated in January 1981 that the Rockland Lake and Dam Project could cost some \$200 million and could possibly be completed by the year 2000.

Wilson said the three major criteria which have to be met in the project are: 1) Are the dam constructions plans safe? 2) Is the project environmentally acceptable? and 3) Is the project economically justifiable?

Wilson said that water projects are generally considered a good investment when computed by population growth factors, which are constantly on the rise.

Wilson also said, "There would be

no further legislative enactment other than appropriations necessary...that is," he added, "if the rules don't change and if everything remains the way it was authorized."

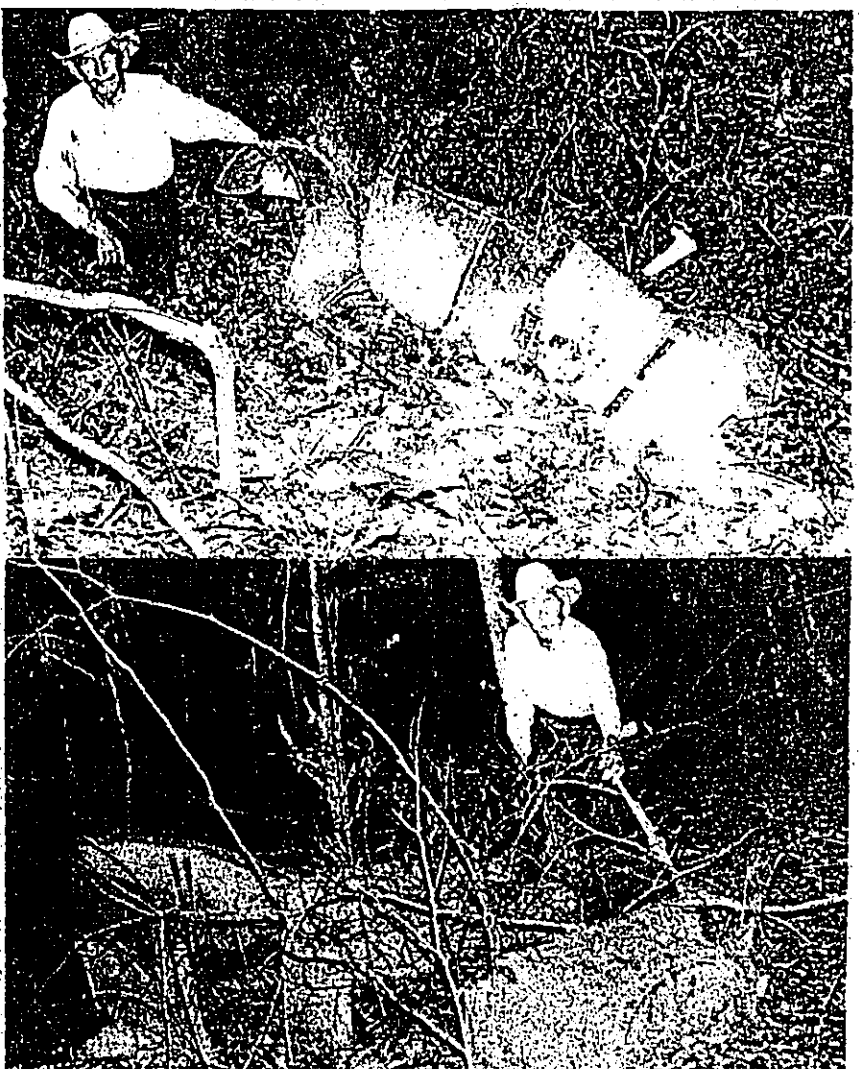
Wilson said the economic basis for building the dam and watershed is that, "The total benefits should exceed the costs...a cost to benefits ratio." He indicated that the project could be funded over a 100-year period which he said is considered the "life of the project."

Hydroelectric use of the dam is eyed by the federal government as a generally good undertaking and with the current energy shortage... "It fits in pretty well."

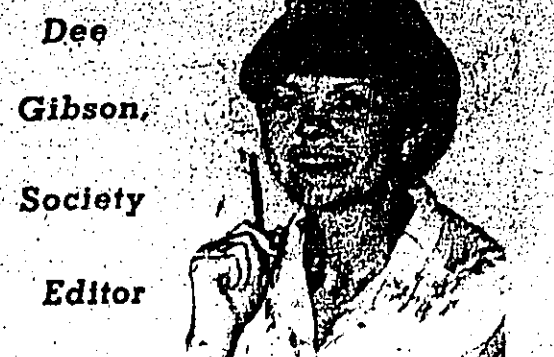

So we dashed off a note to him, commenting on the article and explaining that it was difficult to relate to his problems since we had a mile and a half drive to the office every morning, and were bothered only by eighteen wheelers, churning on the trunk and strag dogs on the highway. Then our conscience started to bother us.

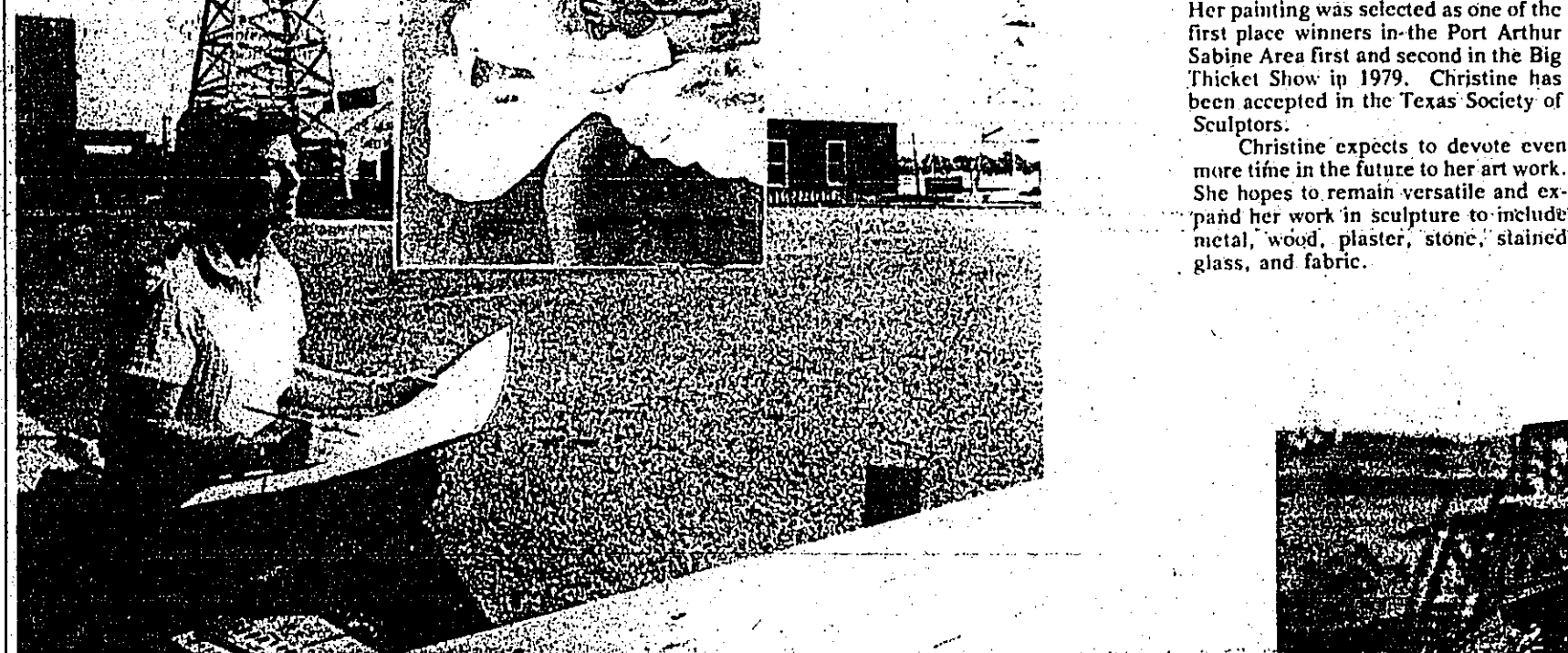
Her technique has crossed a few miles, who helped establish the Beaumont school system. She has had a long interest in Texas history and hopes to enable children and adults to relive history through art.



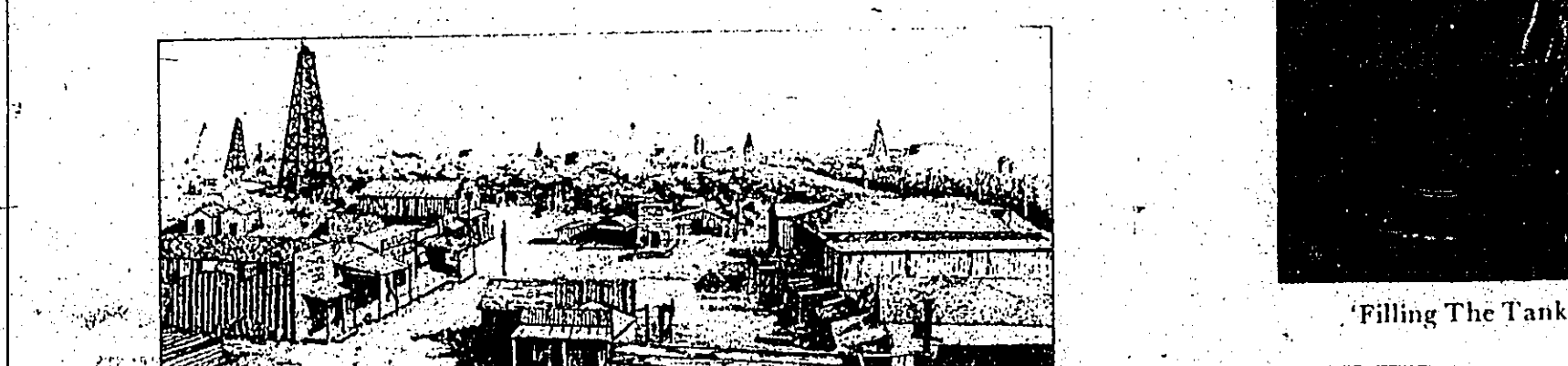

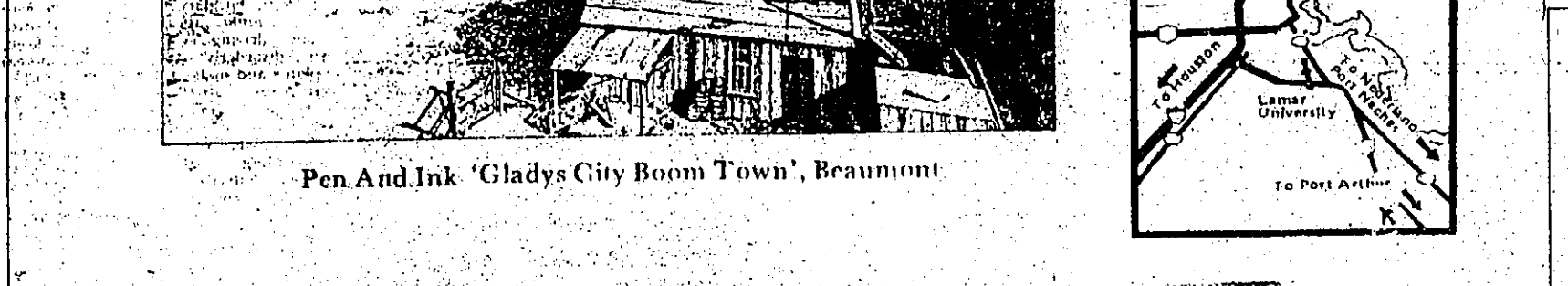

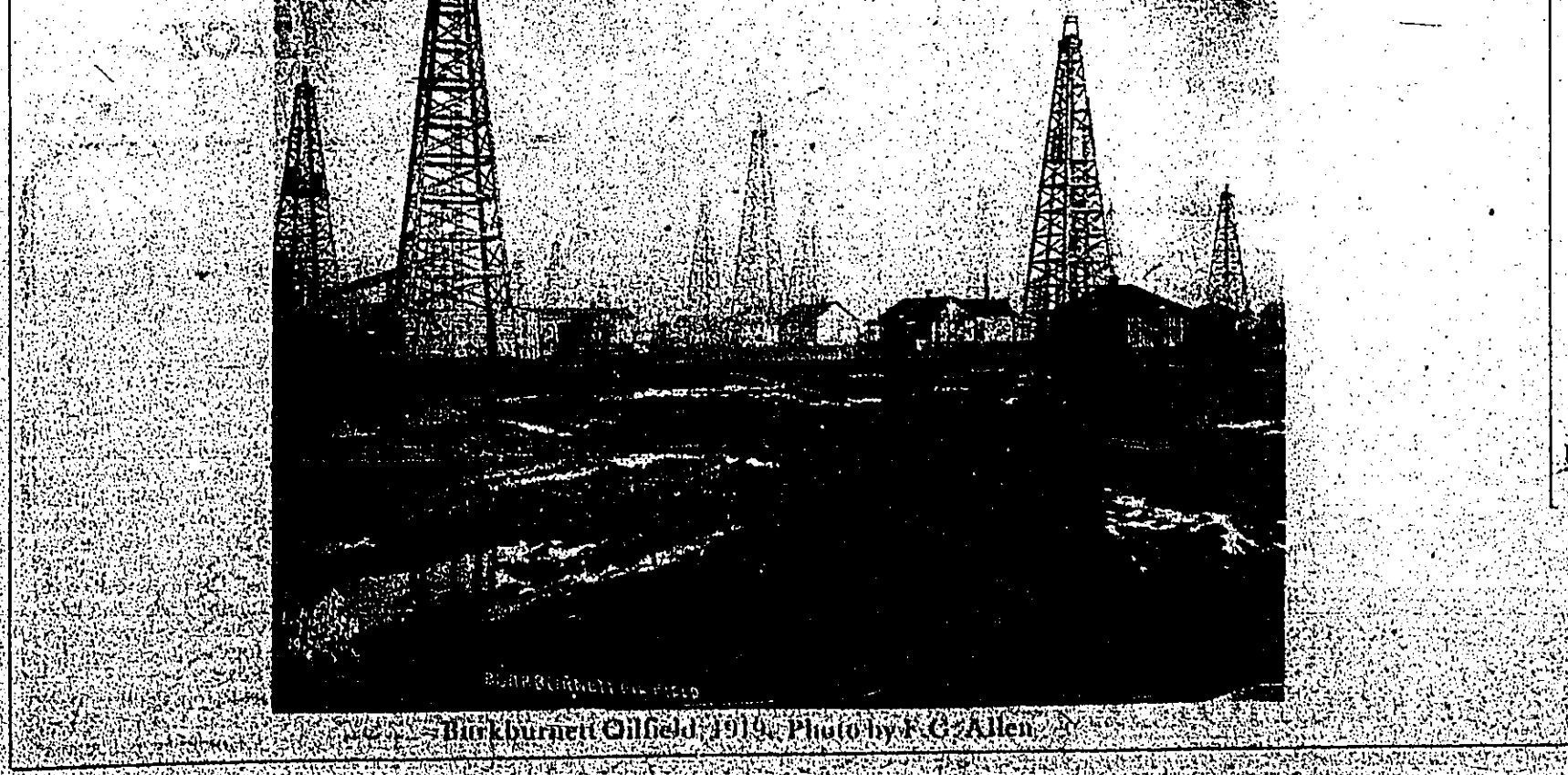

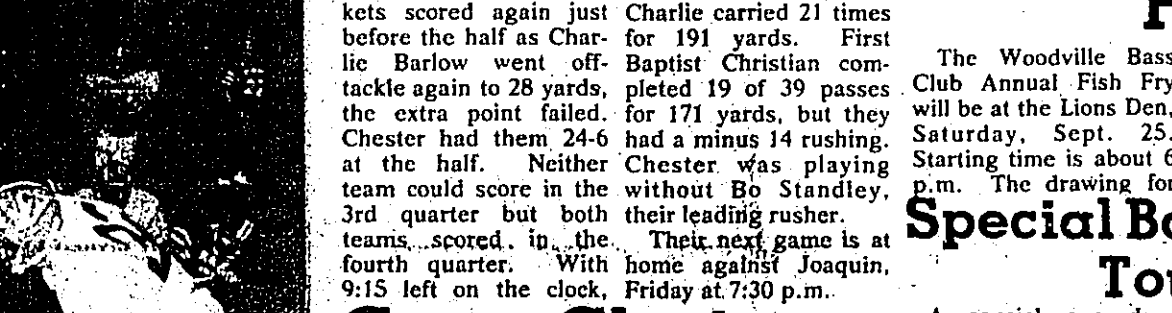

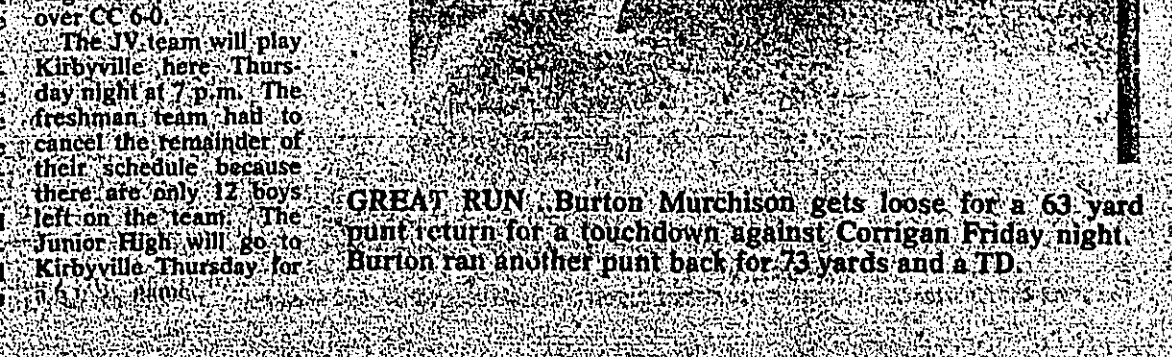
