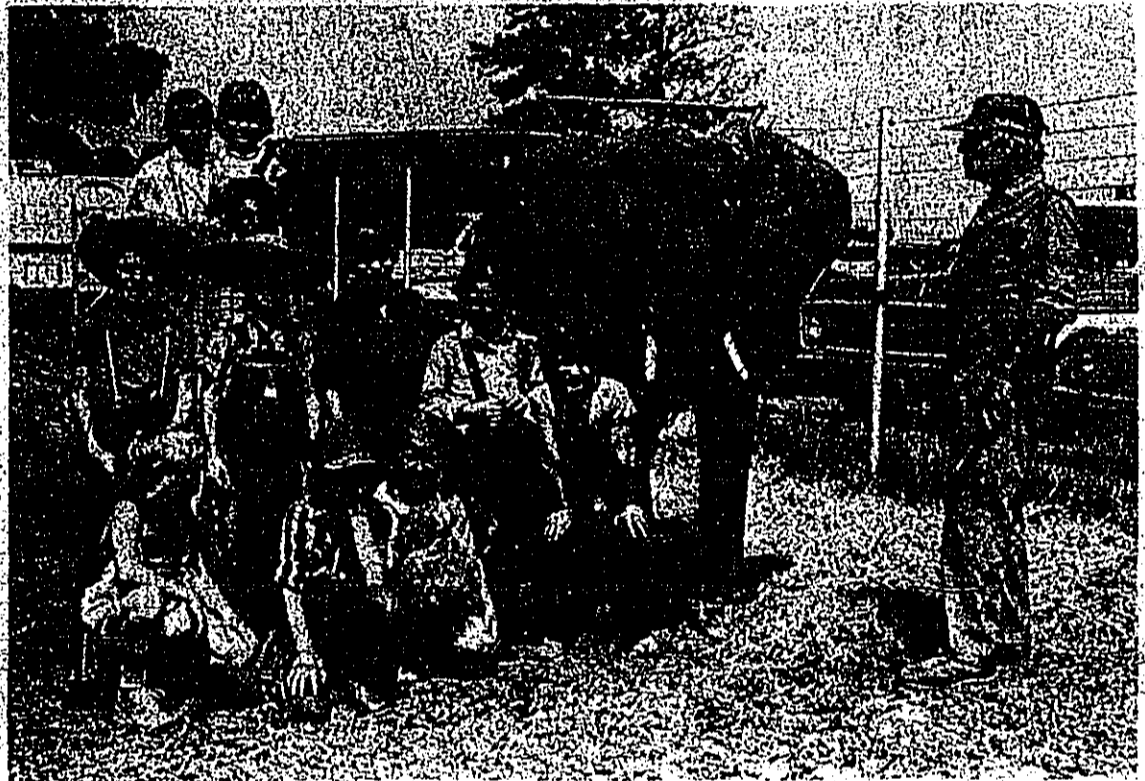
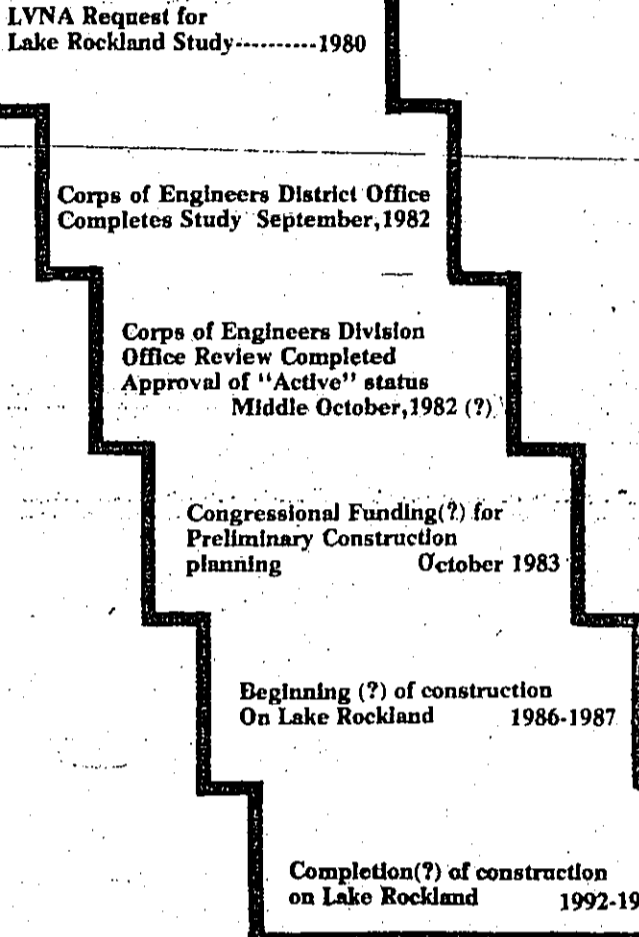
## Lake 'Active' Status Seen

The Rockland project may become an active project of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers by as early as mid-October, according to Jean Sikes, Division Level Liaison officer for the Ft. Worth district Office Projects.  
A review of the Ft. Worth district office's request that the Rockland project be reclassified as "active" which is necessary before preliminary construction planning can begin on the project, is just waiting on the final estimate of cost analysis," Sikes said Tuesday.  
"We are pretty well convinced the project is economically justified at this time but we just need final cost estimates," adding, "we feel it will be recommended that the District Office go ahead and include the Rockland project in the budget requests for preliminary planning and construction projects."  
The Rockland Lake project was classified as inactive since 1945 but according to Sikes, "The situation has changed; we now need more water supply sources."  
Sikes further stated that, "there was no time for preliminary construction planning Sikes said that previous estimates of twelve years were "not-right, it will take three to four years at most." Construction is estimated to take "only six years", he said, "two years less than the original prediction of eight."  
Final cost estimates will compare the costs of water from Rockland Lake with the cost of the cheapest source of water available if Lake Rockland could not be built, Sikes commented.  
Asked if the Corps of Engineers was "hot for this project", he replied, "If a project is needed and justifiable we would be for it."

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The Rockland Dam itself would be located approximately three miles west of Rockland on the Neches River, according to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Its function would be to control floods, generate hydroelectric power, and provide water supply for various uses. The lake will have a total of 3,287,300 acre-feet of storage.  
The dam, which would control runoff from 3,557 square miles of drainage area, would be 23,958 feet long with a maximum height of 106 feet above streambed.

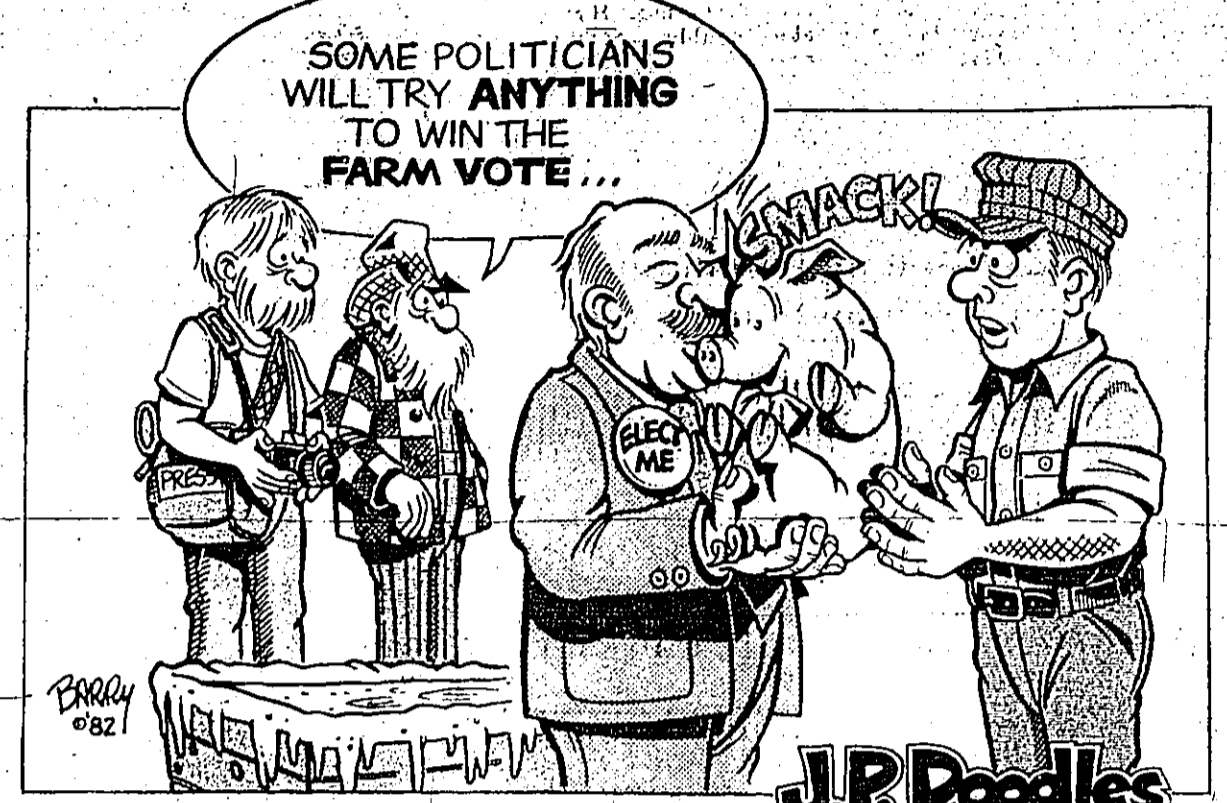

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## T.C. Advisory Council Meets Oct. 18

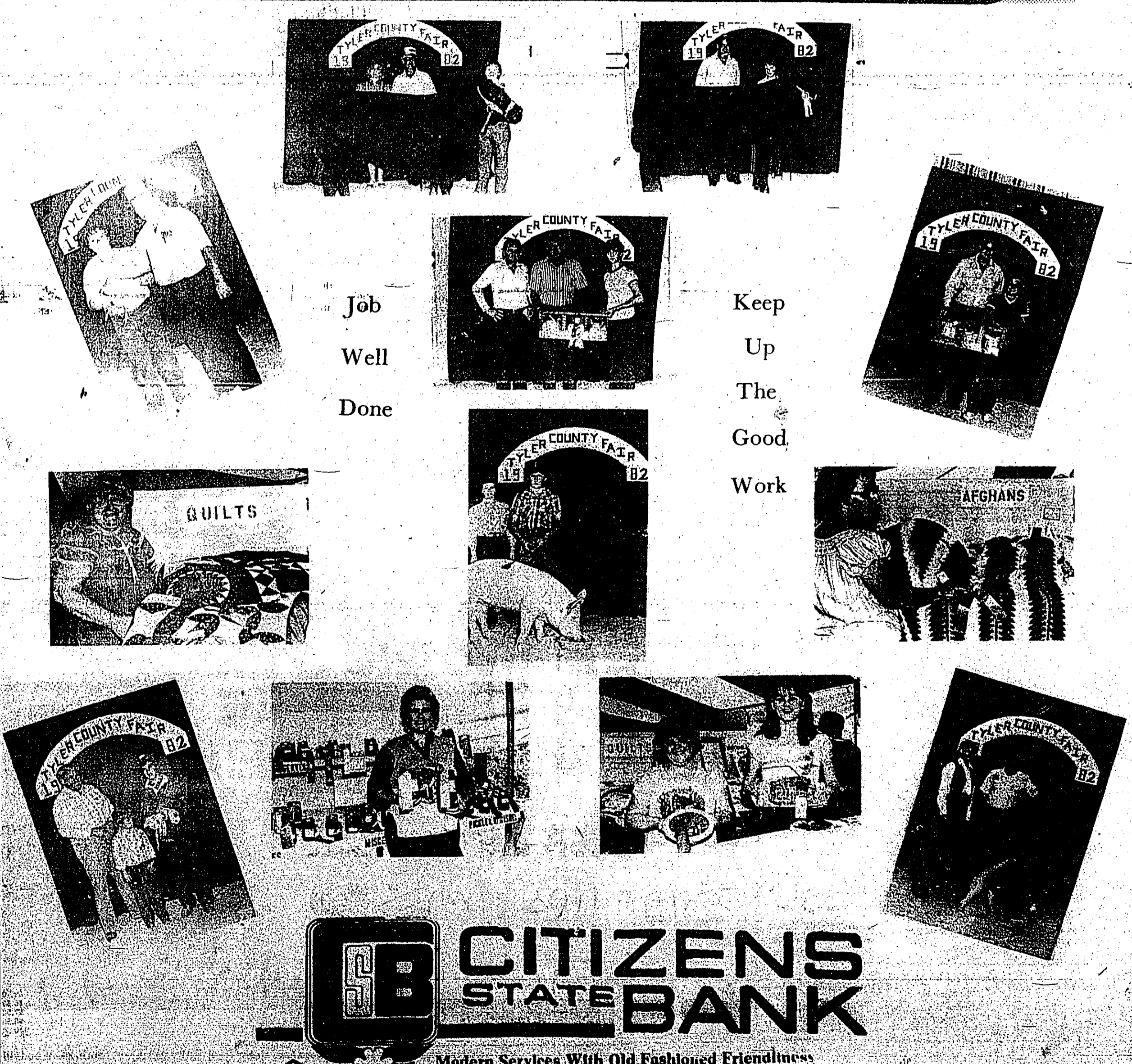

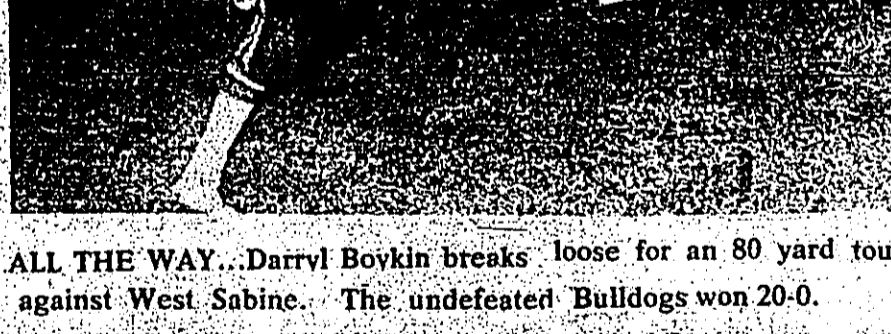

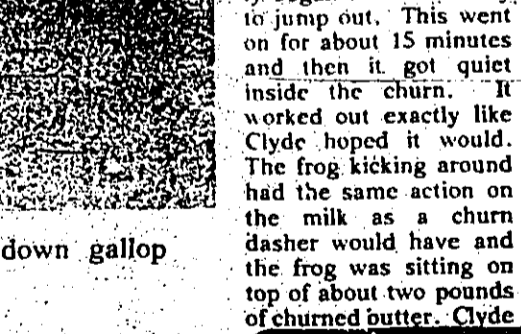

The exciting new 1983 Pontiacs were not created overnight. With Pontiac, a car begins as a concept, a dream to build an automobile.

In its incubation stage, the dream starts out as a series of fine line sketches, explorations of various configurations in which the total package could conceivably exist.

When a sketch appears that captures the essence of the car's objective, the next step is to tape it up full-scale. The trick here is to retain its character and engineering attitude while dramatically increasing its scale.

At this point, a two-dimensional dummy is introduced to incorporate human concerns, including seating comfort, visibility and control accessibility.

Once the designers have some of the proportions and contours roughed out, they can develop a small-scale model. Then the full-size clay model is shaped

by conventional methods on a rigid steel armature to which, if necessary, designers can attach wheels and chassis components.

When a design is final, the model is then scanned. An operator uses a digitized, light-beam measuring device to rapidly and accurately record thousands of points along the model's surface. This final record becomes the raw input for an advanced computerized acquisition and control system called CADANCE.

Complex mathematical formulas within CADANCE enable designers to smooth out and refine the raw data. This procedure replaces endless hours spent at drawing boards.

The mathematical model can now readily be assessed by design or engineering departments to determine if the design meets specific allowances, such as structural rigidity, wheel clearances and engine compartment requirements.

This refined data from the computer can then be programmed directly into the milling machine which recuts the new master model out of clay or wood for final surface rechecking and wind tunnel testing.

Many people think of aerodynamics strictly in terms of fuel efficiency, but that tells only half the story.

At Pontiac, aerodynamics goes miles beyond fuel economy. Through our work at the GM wind tunnel, we've discovered that by redirecting the flow of air we can reduce wind noise, improve ventilation, maintain surface cleanliness, enhance engine cooling and car-

burion and more importantly, fine-tune vehicle ride and handling. You see, after designers receive the aerodynamic data a wind tunnel, they feed this information into a computer. The computer pinpoints high and low pressure zones along the vehicle surface. These zones determine how the vehicle will perform in typical driving situations; at high speeds; in crosswinds or while passing trucks.

Firenza, Oldsmobile's entry in the compact market, is available in six models. With a 101.2-inch wheelbase, the five-passenger Firenza features front-wheel-drive, transverse engine and rack and pinion steering.

New to the lineup for 1983 are two station wagons—the Firenza Cruiser and Firenza LX Cruiser. These models provide customers with 64-cubic feet of cargo volume with the rear seat folded down, and yet are compactly sized for maneuvering and parking. When the rear seat area is utilized for passengers, the area can accommodate 34-cubic feet of cargo.

The cargo opening of the new wagon is 48.3-inches at floor level and the opening height is 30.1 inches.

Standard equipment on the wagons includes a tailgate ajar warning lamp in the instrument panel and a rear window wiper/washer is available.

A new standard engine for 1983 Firenza models is a four-cylinder, 2.0-liter with throttle body fuel injection. It is teamed with a four-speed manual trans-

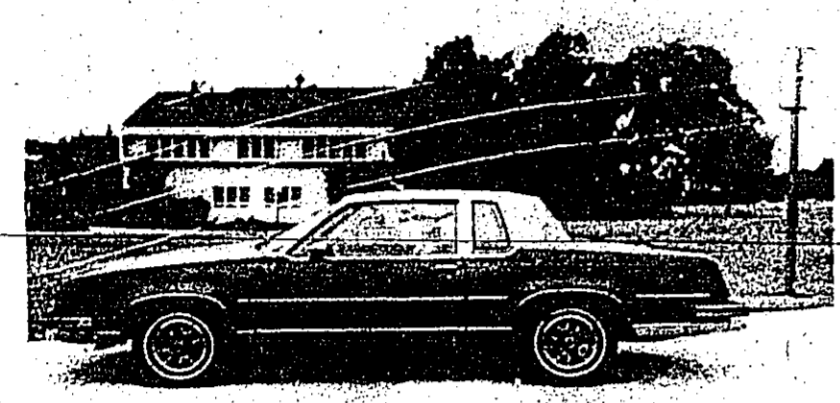

CAPITOL UPDATE

John Tower U.S. SENATOR FOR TEXAS



The Reagan Administration has responded decisively to the growing threat to U.S. interests around the world from the Soviet Union.

Thus far, Congress has been reasonably responsive to these proposals. Now, however, I am concerned about the willingness of Congress to continue our progress toward strengthening our national security system.

I believe there are three major threats to the success of the Administration's defense program, and each is related to public perception, rather than misperception, of our national security policy.

First is the misperception that we cannot afford to spend at proposed levels. Many in the media and in Congress believe the cost of the Reagan defense program to be unprecedented and proposed at the expense of growth in domestic programs.

Additionally, during the last decade, spending for defense declined by 9 percent after inflation while non-defense spending increased by 97 percent.

A second misperception is that money has been "thrown" at the Defense Department without any plan or strategy. This is not true.

The Administration immediately recognized that not all of our resources are available for defense. Priorities have been articulated clearly in several statements of policy. They are improved readiness, strategic force modernization, general purpose force modernization and force structure growth.

When funding has been constrained, programs of lower priority have suffered or been cancelled so that the most essential ones can be funded. This Administration deserves credit for implementing a defense policy according to previously established criteria within the dollar constraints imposed by Congress.

The third misperception which endangers defense program is that our policies are misdirected. This argument holds that simple weapons are cheap and good and sophistication is expensive and ineffective. This argument usually is focused on the vulnerability or desirability of certain weapons systems.

Those who question the effectiveness of our modern weapons systems would do well to examine what happened to the Syrians and the Argentines when they faced some of these weapons in battle.

These three misperceptions of our defense program are as real a threat as they are unfounded. It would be a tragedy if they were allowed to grow and endanger the national consensus for a strong defense.

I do not intend to place all of the blame on the media, although many in the national press have fallen prey to all of these misperceptions. Public officials in and outside of the Administration also share part of the responsibility.

Too often, internal squabbling over comparatively minor issues has led the public to believe that defense problems are not all that urgent, or that they cannot be solved with the means at hand.

We must never lose sight of the necessity for the U.S. to act now to restore the military balance. The Administration's defense program is timely and is supported by the American people. While there must be debate on defense issues, from it must emerge the determination and the means to meet the Soviet challenge.

The awards are given to the author or publisher of a book published between December 1, 1981, and November 30, 1982, that is considered to be one of the best published in the state during that period.

## Economic Recovery Act Offers Tax Credit

Texas developers and property owners are discovering that there is money to be made in the restoration of older buildings for new commercial and residential uses. One of the major new incentives behind the increasing preservation activity in Texas is the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981. Offering tax credits of up to 25% on certified rehabilitation of historic structures, the tax act has stimulated the initial planning of some 105 major restoration projects in Texas.

One such project involves the State National Bank Building, a 58-year-old National Register site on Houston's Main Street. Developers are planning a \$1 million restoration of many of the distinctive architectural details of this 13-story office facility. Care is

being taken to either repair or duplicate original moldings, window and door fixtures, brass mailboxes, and other decorative features. The marble entranceway will be repaired and refinished, as well as the tiled roof cupola, plaster and gold leaf interior trim, and the building facade.

The neoclassical State National Bank Building is an early achievement of one of Houston's best-known 20th century architects, Alfred Finn. The building is a durable and tasteful representation of an earlier period of the city's development.

A few of the other important Texas landmarks that have benefited from the Tax Act preservation incentives are the Sartor House in San Antonio, the Old Ellis County Jail in

Waxahachie, the Galvez Hotel in Galveston, Albany's Black Building, the Old Mercantile Building in Sonora in Sutter County, the Fort Worth Livestock Exchange, and the Ragland Building in Sweetwater.

For a historic structure to receive tax benefits, a Historic Preservation Certification Application must be submitted to the Texas Historical Commission. After review by the Commission's National Register Department, all applications and recommendations are forwarded to the National Park Service for final review.
