Demo Party Chairman Here

Texas Democrat Party Chairman Bob Slagle will start the second leg of a 75 county 3000 mile Texas tour in Gainesville, Oct. 21. Slagle and his caravan, including singer Fletcher Clark, have been drumming up support for Democrat nominees. They will be on the Tyler County Courthouse lawn for a rally at 8 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 25 in Woodville. "We've been met with much enthusiasm along our route," says Slagle. He continued, "there is more interest in this election than I've seen in years. Democrats intend to win across the board on November 2." The caravan will travel through East and Central Texas towns ending with a San Antonio rally on Oct. 26.

Arrests Sunday In Bunko Ring

Tyler County Sheriff's officers may have a lead on a local prostitution and bunko theft ring as a result of an arrest made at 3:40 p.m. Sunday at the Whitworth Lumber mill in Chester of a 26-year-old Phoenix, Arizona woman.

Arrested in connection with the case was Kathy Ann Page who was allegedly apprehended by a mill hand at the Whitworth Mill claiming that the woman had stolen \$404 from him during the bunko operation.

Sheriff's Deputy Roger Byars, who handled the investigation said Tuesday that he responded to the scene following a call from Constable Lynn Clamon from Pct. 2 who reported a robbery.

Byars said he moved on the case and discovered that two other suspects, one black male and one black female, who are still at large as of presstime Tuesday, were still being sought by police. Byars said his office discovered a wrecked vehicle belonging to the two at the Polk Tyler County Line off Hwy. 287.

Clamon had reported to Byars the vehicle description. The reported victim, a Paswal Santa Maria, detained the page suspect until officers arrived.

Byars said he was then able to ascertain that some \$404 had been taken apparently by the girl in custody and the two other that had fled the scene.

Arraignment was held at the Tyler County Courthouse with bond set at \$25,000 for felony theft and with charges of misdemeanor prostitution filed at \$500.

According to Byars, the case is still under investigation and officers are trying to link the activity with a regional sex and bunko ring.

"It appears they've been working on the scam in our area for some time."

Archer On Clements Team

Austin, F.M. "Polly" Archer of Woodville was named today Tyler County Chairman of Democrats and Independents by the Governor Clements Re-election Campaign.

Archer, an automobile dealer, is a long time resident of Woodville. He is president of A&M Motor Company and served on the local school board for 15 years. He is past president of the Woodville Rotary Club and the Chamber of Commerce. He is currently president of the Tyler County Industrial Corporation.

"Bill Clements is doing an excellent job as our governor, in all phases of our government," Archer said. He joins three former governors and four former attorneys general, all elected as Democrats, in their support of the governor.

All the farmers and ranchers always had a second Bible called the Almanac. They referred to it to find out ahead of time when the moon would be full and when it would new again, so they could plan their planting of crops and garden. Anything that made above the ground was planted on the new moon and everything below the ground was planted on the full moon. However, some planted when there was enough moisture in the ground, regardless of the stage of the moon.

If you cut your hair just after the full moon it won't grow as fast if it was cut on the new moon, and if you dig a post hole you have less dirt to fill it up on a full moon. I figure that everyone dug their sweet potatoes on the full moon in October, so there would be less resin and this made them sweeter.

Then the Almanac was used for the zodiac signs, of which the sun, moon and planets travel in a path across the skies 10 degrees wide. It is marked by the sun in the day and the moon at night. The belt which completely covers, the sky was given the name zodiac by ancient astrologers. All the planets except Mars, Venus and Mercury travel almost in the middle of this path. The belt is divided into 12 equal sizes which are certain star groups. Each group has a name and are known as constellations of the zodiac which are the signs.

The farmers and ranchers used these signs for marking their livestock and etc. Some people even used the signs for pulling their teeth so their mouth wouldn't bleed so freely.

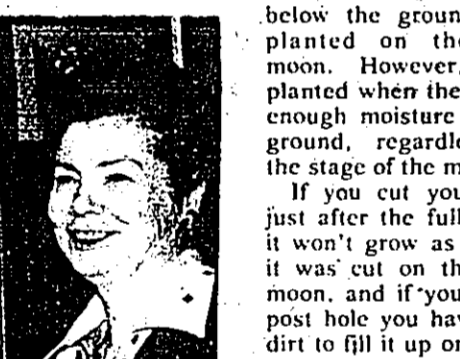

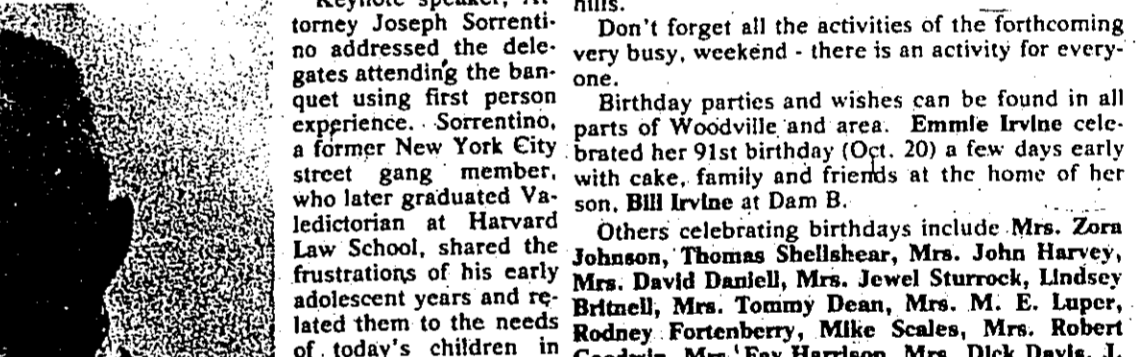

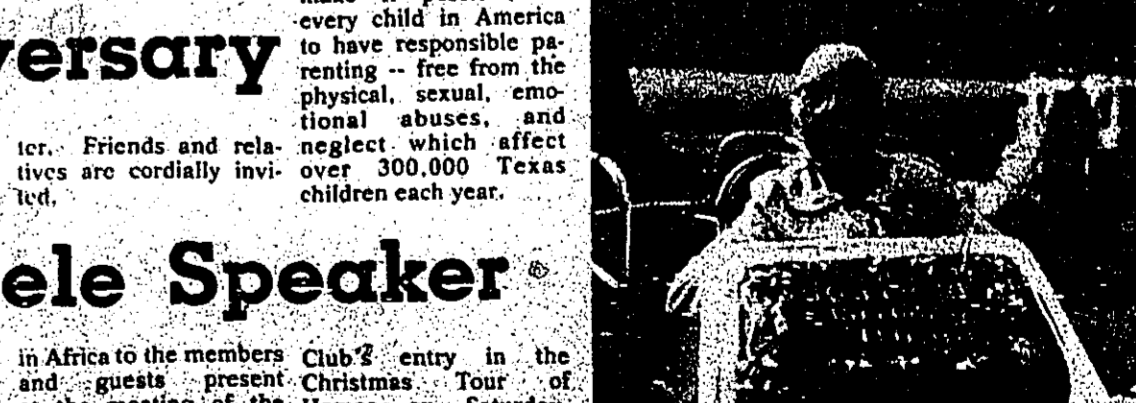

Houston City Water Needs OK Till 2010

By John Tompkins
Planning through the year 2010 has pretty well taken care of city of Houston water supply needs through the three lakes Conroe, Livingston and Houston, according to Dan Jones, official of the Houston Water Department in an interview at Houston City Hall Annex Monday. "In the future," Jones said, "the city of Houston will not be looking at creating new lakes. But will probably be looking for a third party supplier after the year 2010. If the third party contacts us and says 'If we build it will you buy it?' ...we would then probably be involved in some complicated discussions." Beyond the year 2010, Jones suggested, that if you look at what water sources are north and east of the city, then they would be "covetously" looking at them. "With Lake Houston, Conroe and Livingston," said Jones, "we are in good shape till 2010. It is difficult to project exactly what our growth will be. The city of Houston currently uses an average of 370 million gallons of water a day and it is projected to increase to 520 million gallons per day by the year 2000. But our growth rate has changed greatly over the past twenty years and we assume that our rate of growth over the next twenty years will not be what it is today. It may be greater or lesser." For the next ten years or so, the Luce Bayou project which will enable the city of Houston to draw its "entitlement" of water which is 70 percent of the water of Lake Livingston is the major water project quenching the city of Houston's thirst. The Luce Bayou project is still in the acquisition of right-of-way stage and it will be 1992 before the city of Houston begins to draw water through the Luce Bayou water canal.

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Lake Rockland Multipurpose: Water Supply, Recreation, Flood Control and Energy

Lake Rockland, unlike Lakes Livingston, Conroe and Houston, is designed as a multi-purpose lake. According to Dan Jones of the Public Works Department of the City of Houston, the purpose of Lakes Houston, Conroe, and Livingston is to supply water to the city and industries of Houston. Lake Houston is regarded as a "large holding tank" for water from the other two lakes. "According to Jones, "Those bonds used for Lake Livingston were not dedicated to water skiing." The city of Houston is entitled to 902,000 acre-feet of 70 percent of the 1,750,000 acre-feet of water Lake Livingston holds. After completion of the Luce Bayou water canal in approximately 1992, the city of Houston will begin to draw that entitlement. "Where Lake Livingston and the Trinity River Authority gets the water to keep Lake Livingston full," ask them," Jones said in a Booster interview Monday. These impoundments are seen as sources of drinking water and industrial water. Jones said further that the City of Houston's current water needs have already pulled the water level Conroe lake down two feet. "Lake Rockland was conceived by the United States Army Corps of Engineers as a multi-purpose reservoir and not only as a source of water, but as a way of controlling flood damage in the areas below the proposed dam." Also, this reservoir will provide electric power for area utilities to use during times of peak demand. Finally, Lake Rockland as presently conceived will be managed for recreational uses for Lake Rockland as well as fishing, camping, and other potential recreational uses are seen as a part of the lake's future.

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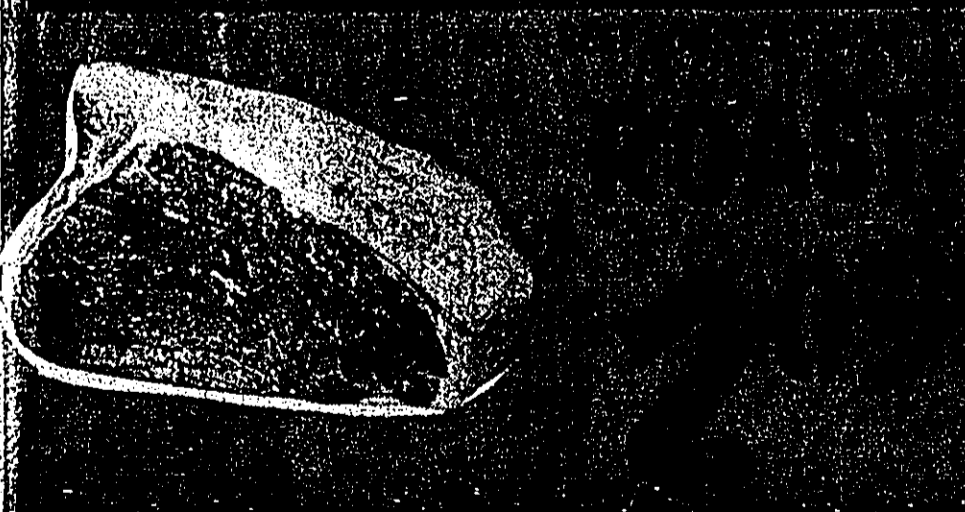

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'Object Constancy' Is Child Stage

We have all marvelled at how a magician can make objects seem to appear or disappear in his hand, hat or pocket. Our logic tells us that he is not really creating things out of thin air, or making them disappear without a trace, even though the visual illusion is moving unless some- thing else makes it stop. So if a toy falls or rolls behind an obstruction, she may not find it at just the place where it disappeared. She will learn that an object looks different from different viewing angles, but its true nature hasn't really changed.

This concept is called "object constancy" and learning it takes time and experience. It is one of several stages of mental development that increase in complexity throughout Baby's preschool and early school years.

At 8 months old, a baby is still working on simple ideas, like recognizing familiar objects and deciding whether new objects fit in with her present conceptions. She tends to accept changes in appearance at face value, without holding out many long-range expectations. Her "logic" tells her that things change unless they can be proven to be the same.

A proving process probably has to happen for every object that Baby encounters in her early months. It happens first for those objects she sees most often, or are most important to her, like the faces of her parents.

Senator Blake Reports

AUSTIN — In the last two reports, I have discussed the weaknesses of the Texas DWI laws and some changes that will probably be proposed in the next session of the Legislature. Even though many good ideas are presented to the Legislature, there is never any guarantee that they will become law. There is considerable opposition to mandatory sentences. Groups like the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) generally oppose changes in laws which might infringe on the civil rights of motorists. The ACLU avows to be as concerned with crime as the average citizen but is generally opposed to speedy conviction and to strict penalties which they argue do not deter crime.

Without becoming embroiled in philosophical arguments, something must be done to keep drunk in people from driving automobiles if we are to reduce the death toll on Texas highways. The people are the most powerful lobbyists in this state. Last session, we passed the toughest package of anti-crime, anti-drug and anti- pornography laws of any state in the nation. The people demanded passage of these laws, and they were passed in spite of the objection of various groups.

If the people demand passage of stronger DWI laws, they will be passed. There is strong public support, efforts to strengthen the laws may not be successful.

A criticism I very often hear of our court system is that justice is not meted out in a standard manner. Similar crimes do not result in similar sentences. There is too much plea bargaining that results in criminal offenders being left on the street. I hear all of these criticisms frequently, but probably criticism of plea bargaining most often.

It is easy to criticize, but there are circumstances involved that make our criminal justice system cumbersome and slow. Most of our courts have a log jam of cases on their dockets. Most district attorneys do not have enough staff members to prepare good cases against people who are charged with crimes. District attorneys and assistant district attorneys are not compensated as well as attorneys in private practice. It's

These circumstances increase the practice of plea bargaining. If a D.A. can get a plea bargain, this results in a certain conviction that might not occur if the case went to trial. Less time is needed to prepare a case and the trial process is less expensive. If probation is granted, the offender is given another chance and society is spared the cost of supporting another person inmate. If the probationer does not satisfy the terms of the probation, a revocation of probation is much simpler to achieve than proving guilt in an original trial.

Social Security Emphasises Debt Collection

The Social Security Administration is actively engaged in expanding efforts to collect all debts owed it, David Bennett, Social Security District Manager in Lufkin, said recently.

A debt to Social Security usually arises when a person receiving retirement, survivor or disability benefits, or supplemental security income (SSI) payments receives more money than is authorized by law.

These debts, or overpayments, generally are caused by the person's failure to report any event that has an effect on the amount of the benefit that is due. These overpayments can amount to many thousands of dollars, Bennett said.

Social Security must take action to recover all overpayments. A person is first asked to repay the entire amount of the overpayment, if this is not possible, arrangements can be made to make the repayment over a period of time.

People can avoid overpayments if they promptly report any changes in their living situation, such as marriage, divorce, or death of a spouse. People who receive Social Security benefits should also report any changes in their living situation, such as marriage, divorce, or death of a spouse.

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Over the years, through long, dedicated research and public awareness, we have made great strides toward eradicating certain diseases and illnesses from our society.

It was announced recently by the Center for Disease Control that domestic measles is now a rarity in children due to a stepped-up immunization program with an effective vaccine. Similarly, an effective vaccine, with a planned immunization program, dramatically reduced the number of paralytic polio cases from over 20,000 in 1952, to 6 cases in 1981. Fifty years ago there were more than 200,000 cases of diphtheria; last year only 4 cases were reported. These are just three examples of the progress which can be made, and has been made, through medical research.

However, we have seen only a beginning in our nation's efforts to battle illness; work continues today in many other areas on diseases for which a cure has not been found. While some research programs do not always result in curative breakthroughs, the work of these research scientists and physicians brings hope to those who suffer, patients and families alike.

One disease into which research is just beginning is Neurofibromatosis (NF), the most common serious neurological disorder. Affecting one in 3,000 people, the tumors of this progressive disease can cause dysfunction of many organs, deformity of limbs, deafness, blindness, disfigurement and early death as was the case with John Merrick, "The Elephant Man."

An estimated 80,000 Americans are believed to have Neurofibromatosis. Five thousand of those victims live in Texas. Fifty percent of the people who have NF inherited the disorder from one of their parents. Each person with NF has a fifty percent chance of passing on the disorder to their children.

Despite the prevalence of the disease, NF is perhaps the most overlooked serious disorder of our time. To date almost nothing is known about the causes of this mutation and the only treatment now available to NF patients is surgical intervention in the growth of the tumors, which can grow back. As one publication recently wrote, it is "still 'Dark Ages' for neurofibromatosis.

Texas is very fortunate to be home to the largest Neurofibromatosis clinical research program in the United States. Headquartered at the Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and working through Texas Children's Hospital and Methodist Hospital, the program provides diagnosis and evaluation of NF, counseling for patients and their families, and plans follow-up programs for improved management of NF's complications.

Other similar programs operate across the country, searching for an answer in treating this very serious but poorly understood disease.

Public attention has been focused on NF recently, as a result of the theatrical and motion picture productions of "The Elephant Man," the true story of John Merrick's struggle with the most severe case of NF ever recorded. That attention, however, will not replace the needed coordination of our country's research efforts which would be provided by a National Commission on Neurofibromatosis.

I have joined in sponsoring legislation to establish such a commission. The legislation would set-up an independent commission of 20 members, organized, operating and reporting within an 18 month period. The commission would prepare a comprehensive plan for research and education on NF and the needed services for NF patients and their families. This commission would fill the current gap in coordinating and funding NF research.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

Workers in Texas and the rest of the country want paychecks, not handouts.

Unemployment is at a record high level in the United States. Even though Texas remains better off than most states, more Texans have been out of work this year than ever before in our state.

Most unemployed workers understand that if get jobs, there must be renewed health and prosperity in U.S. business and industry. One vital key to economic recovery is a return to acceptable interest rates, especially long-term rates.

So it was with a great sense of relief and optimism that the country watched short-term interest rates decline during July and August.

Why then are the economic forecasters for major financial firms pressing in their gloomy prediction for the nation's economic recovery?

They remember, as I do, a similar situation last fall when interest rates were sliding downward and hopes were rising for a quick recovery from recession. Just as now, declining interest rates seemed to indicate a return to health for our economy.

Then, in December of last year, the Federal Reserve Board abruptly halted the decline in interest rates by stopping the growth in our money supply. The Fed's action was puzzling. Had interest rates been allowed to continue decreasing at a moderate rate, the recession could have been cut short by six months or more.

Now interest rates are coming down again. Only this year, economists are hesitant to be optimistic. They fear a replay of last year's disaster.

I have written to Federal Reserve Board Chairman Paul Volcker asking him to accommodate the current decline in interest rates. We need a monetary policy that allows a stable, moderate increase in the money supply to encourage a continuing fall in interest rates.

The nation cannot afford a repetition of the no-growth or stagnation policy that has been practiced by the Federal Reserve. Continuing such a policy will again choke off recovery and create more unemployment.

A sensible and accommodative monetary policy is the best and quickest way to restore prosperity to our business and industry, bringing more jobs back to the economy (HARV. J. 24).

In fact, if the policy were to continue to be as tight as it is now, as many as a million new jobs would be lost by December. With the pressure of unemployment growing, our country needs those jobs.

If the Federal Reserve will maintain a moderate, steady monetary policy this would be the easiest and most practical way to ensure that American men and women who want to work can earn a living.

I want to see our workers in Texas and the rest of the country move off the welfare rolls and back onto the payroll.

AUSTIN—The 67th Legislature met in its third called special session and passed two important pieces of legislation.

The Governor called the legislature back to Austin to address the situation of a rapidly deteriorating state fund which pays out benefits to union employed workers in Texas. This fund is fed by a payroll tax paid by employers in our state and a one-time surtax on each of their employees. Because of the recent increase in unemployment, the fund has that the surtax rate will be 5% added to the automatic 2700% increase in payroll taxes.

House Bill 1 was passed to prevent the unemployment fund from going bankrupt and to levy a new payroll tax for next year floor is created so that which will replenish the fund.

To prevent the bankruptcy of the fund, the Governor was given authority to request an advance from the federal unemployment trust fund. However, interest must be paid on this advance. To pay the interest other provisions were necessary: \$3 million was appropriated from a special administration fund of the state and a one-time surtax on each of their employees. Because of the recent increase in unemployment, the fund has that the surtax rate will be 5% added to the automatic 2700% increase in payroll taxes.

A new triggering mechanism for a surtax to the fund is created so that the surtax formula is adjusted annually in consideration of economic growth. The ceiling of the unemployment fund is raised from \$325 to \$500 million in October 1982. This means that the fund thereafter will have a bigger cash reserve to respond to economic situations like the current recession.

Two other sections of this bill raise the wage base used to compute payroll taxes from the first quarter of 1983. The total money borrowed from the federal fund will be about \$270 million, and \$31 million in interest is expected. The money borrowed and the interest must be repaid by May 1984.

House Bill 1 addresses the future solvency of the fund with other provisions. Employers will pay a surtax of 4% for the first quarter of 1983, and from the second quarter through the remainder of 1983 there will be 3% added to their experience rate. In 1984 it is the first \$6,000 earned by each employee
