Rockland Lake Report In D.C.

The Southwestern Division of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has recommended that the Lake Rockland project become an "active" U.S. Army Corps of Engineers project and have forwarded their recommendations to the Office of the Chief of Engineers in Washington D. C.

"Our recommendation to Washington is that it (Lake Rockland) be changed from deferred to active status," said to Bob Billingsly, spokesman for the Southwestern Division office of the Corps of Engineers who said further, "the criteria used to evaluate projects are (1) is it economically feasible; (2) is it feasible from an engineering point of view; and (3) does it meet a water resource need."

"The answer to all these is yes," says Billingsly. "The Lower Neches Valley Authority will function as the local sponsor and the lower Neches Valley will need an additional water supply source."

After approval of the change of status to active by the Chief of Engineers Office, the next step is to try to get it in the federal budget. According to Billingsly, "there has not been approval of funds for a new start on an authorized project since 1977."

Billingsly states that in the last budgeted fiscal year (1982), the Southwestern Division Office applied for budgeting of funds for two reservoirs out of the Tulsa, Oklahoma, Offices. Funds for both projects were disapproved by the Chief of Engineers level in Washington and were not submitted in the budget that went to the Assistant Secretary of Army Civil Works for consideration.

"The division level does not have the final authority to give approval on a change like this," according to Jean Sikes, Division liaison officer for the Ft. Worth District projects.

According to Fred Montoya, Southwestern Division level liaison officer

for Tulsa District projects, the two projects submitted from the Division in fiscal 1982 were the Douglas Lake and Sand Lake projects in Southeast Oklahoma. According to Montoya, "The main problem with getting these projects into the federal budget has been in meeting the administration's and Chief's offices' eligibility criteria as to cost-to-benefit ratio."

"Although the Division felt these were good projects the administration did not feel the benefits of these projects was high enough to justify the costs involved in building them," Montoya said adding, "A major factor in this has been high interest rates which have greatly increased the government's costs of building these projects."

"What this means," he said further is that the benefits are really going to have to be high to include a project in the federal budget. Leland Wilson, Fort Worth District Office project Director for Lake Rockland says, however, "The cost to build these projects is high enough to include this (Lake Rockland) in the budget."

One of the key decision makers helping to ascertain whether or not there will be a Rockland Lake and Dam Project is Major General H.G. Robinson.

Major General Hugh G. Robinson became Division Engineer, Southwestern Division, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, on 1 August 1980.

Before coming to the Southwestern Division, he was Deputy Director of the Civil Works Directorate in the Office of the Chief of Engineers in Washington, D.C. In that position, he was the principal assistant to the Director of Civil Works in managing the water resources studies being conducted by the Corps; the National Waterways Study and the National Hydropower Study.

As Division Engineer, General Robinson is responsible for the Corps' water resources development activities in all or parts of eight states,

including Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Kansas and Colorado. He also supervises the Corps design and construction of military installations for the Army and the Air Force in a five-state area of the South west.

The General is a 1954 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and holds a Master's Degree in civil engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (1959). He is also a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College and the National War College.

General Robinson has served in a wide range of command and staff assignments. Prior to becoming the Deputy Civil Works Director in Washington, he was the District Engineer for the Los Angeles District. Other assignments include: Commanding Officer, U.S. Army Engineer School (Combat), Fort Belvoir, Va.; Executive Officer and Commanding Officer, 3rd Regiment, West Point; Chief Regional Capabilities Branch, War Plans Division for the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, the Pentagon; Commander, 39th Engineer Battalion (Combat), Vietnam; Executive Officer, 45th Engineer Group, Vietnam; Army Aide to President Lyndon Johnson, White House Detachment (1965-1969); and Chief of the Combat Branch, Engineer Strategic Studies Group, Washington.

Among General Robinson's military awards and decorations are two awards of the Legion of Merit, two awards of the Bronze Star Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, three awards of the Air Medal, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, and two awards of the Army Commendation Medal.

The General is a native of Washington, D.C. He and his wife Kay have two grown children.

Car Stolen, Burned From A & M Motors

Breaking and entering and auto theft charges have been filed against Jimmy Ray Menefee of Woodville involving the break-in Friday of A&M Motors Company of Woodville and the subsequent robbery of a 1982 Trans-Am valued at \$14,620, which was found burned in the Spurger Community several hours after the break-in was discovered.

Alan Miller's T-WHEELER

Some of the crazy things that develop when you open your mail in the morning. Usually it's cuss out the power company every month. Wonder why the bank also has a different checking account balance than you do. Then you check the grocery store stubs and the gasoline bills and know what happened.

But this particular morning it was a letter from the Canadian Consulate in Dallas. We didn't even know the Canadians had a consulate in Dallas until then.

The letter indicated that the consulate had learned that the T-Wheeler's company grew some trees in East Texas. Could we possibly part with a couple of them for a logging show they were going to have in Dallas?

We checked with the foresters to see if they could spare a couple of pines, and after much wringing of hands they allowed as how they could. Might disrupt their logging plans but they'd make out a permit for them.

It seemed a local beer company in Canada was anxious to bring some professional loggers out of the Canadian woods to show us Southerners how it's done.

Chainsaw for chainsaw it would be no contest. We'd take 'em hands down. We've been at it longer, and besides we're tougher.

These loggers not only represented Canada. One was from New Zealand and another from Australia. And they even had a clown along, just like you see at Texas rodeos.

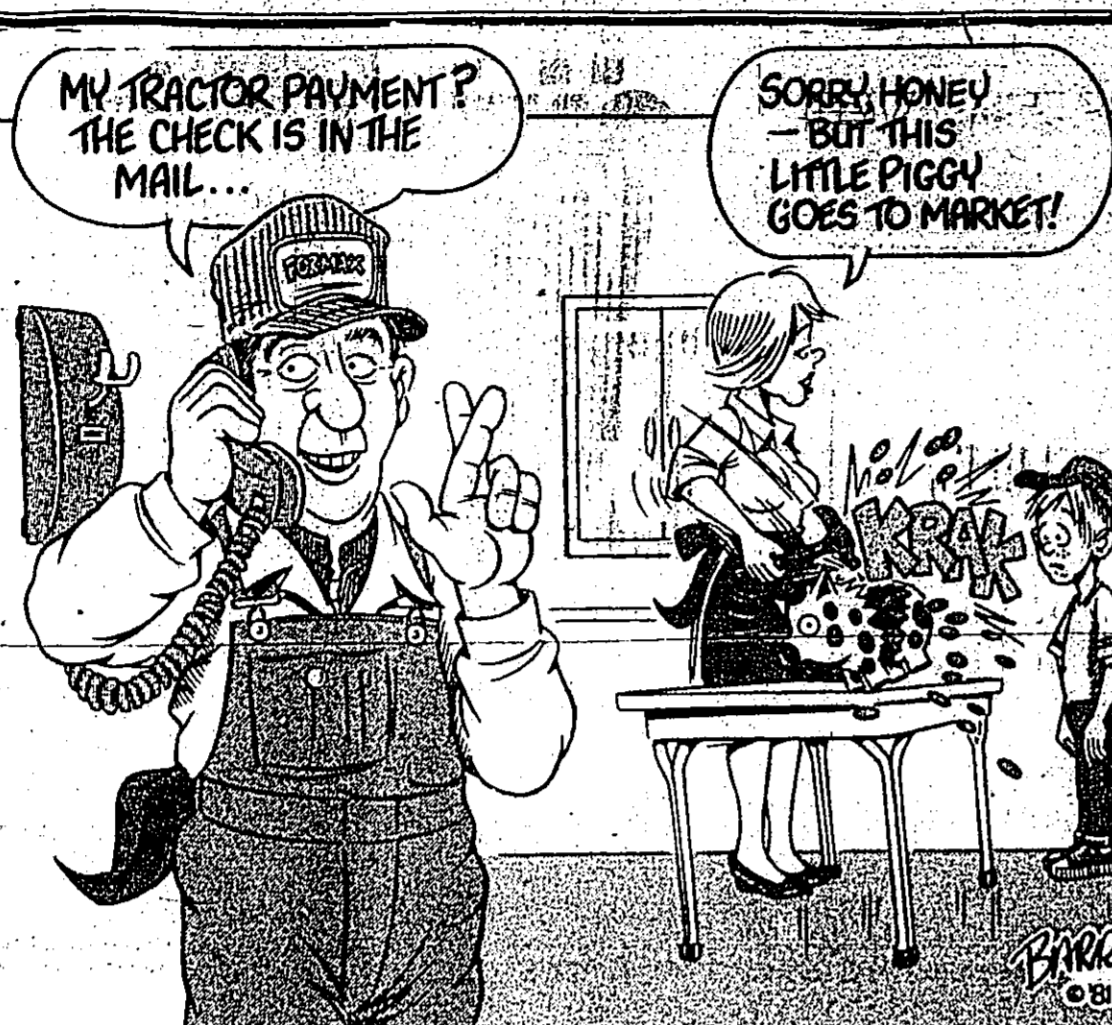
It also came about that they weren't interested in seeing just how fast they could cut off a tree at the stump. They were going to perform feats that the T-Wheeler hadn't seen since he left the Pacific Northwest.

Tree topping.

This was common in the Northwest woods not too many years ago. A tree of pretty substantial size was selected at the highest point of a newly opened logging area.

A logger with spurred boots and a sling that attached to his belt and wrapped around the tree would climb that tree to cut the top off. The resulting "pole" was used to rig logging cable to pull the logs uphill from where they'd been felled to the landing where they would be loaded on the trucks and sent to the mills.

It was always a spectacular thing to watch. The logger with a short-handled double-bitted axe on his belt sometimes ending up more than a hundred feet in the air. Cutting limbs as he went, and then using an axe or a chainsaw to cut the top off the tree. And once it was released the tree would sway in a huge arc, usually

Watching Washington Senator Lloyd Bentsen

"My vote won't matter anyway." How many Texans will be saying that to themselves Tuesday, November 2, as they contemplate making the effort to get to the polls?

With the thousands and thousands of votes being cast, that may seem to be a persuasive argument against making the effort. But it couldn't be further from the truth.

A single vote in many cases has changed the course of history. Elizabeth II is Queen of England today because the British House of Commons voted some 250 years ago in favor of the House of Hanover, 96-95.

Some vote cast King Charles I of England his lead in 1649; the U. S. Senate agreed in 1845 to annex Texas by a one-vote margin.

In 1868 the U. S. Senate twice failed by a single vote to convict President Andrew Johnson in his impeachment trial.

While on the topic of British and American history, did you know that the United States might still be under British rule, but for one vote?

On September 28, 1774 the First Continental Congress in Philadelphia debated the "Galloway Plan." This plan would have made the American colonies into a British dominion ruled by a Parliament and a British governor.

Virginia's delegate, Patrick Henry, opposed the plan in an impassioned speech. The Galloway Plan was defeated by one vote.

After America became an independent nation, the power of a single vote continued as a major factor in electing its leaders.

Thomas Jefferson in 1800 was elected President over Aaron Burr by one vote in the House of Representatives, following a tie in the electoral college.

John Quincy Adams in 1824 was chosen President by a one vote margin when his race was decided by the House of Representatives for a decision.

Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President over Samuel J. Tilden in 1876 when a special Electoral Commission voted 8-7 in his favor.

John F. Kennedy had less than a one vote per precinct lead across the nation in his race for President. In Illinois and New Jersey, one-half of one percent of the votes cast swung 43 electoral votes to him. Reversing that small percentage of votes in only two states would have thrown his election into the House of Representatives for a decision.

The stories of one-vote election decisions don't just happen at a national level.

According to one well-told tale in Washington, one California congressional incumbent saw his race end with a dead-even vote. State law required that the race be decided by having the candidates draw lots. The incumbent lost the draw and sank into political oblivion.

The secretary had decided she was too busy working at campaign headquarters to vote on election day.

In a Cincinnati suburb, a city council candidate was hospitalized on election day for an emergency appendectomy, without having voted.

He lost by one vote.

So one, single vote does matter. Make the effort to get to the polls on election day. Your vote could make all the difference in the world.

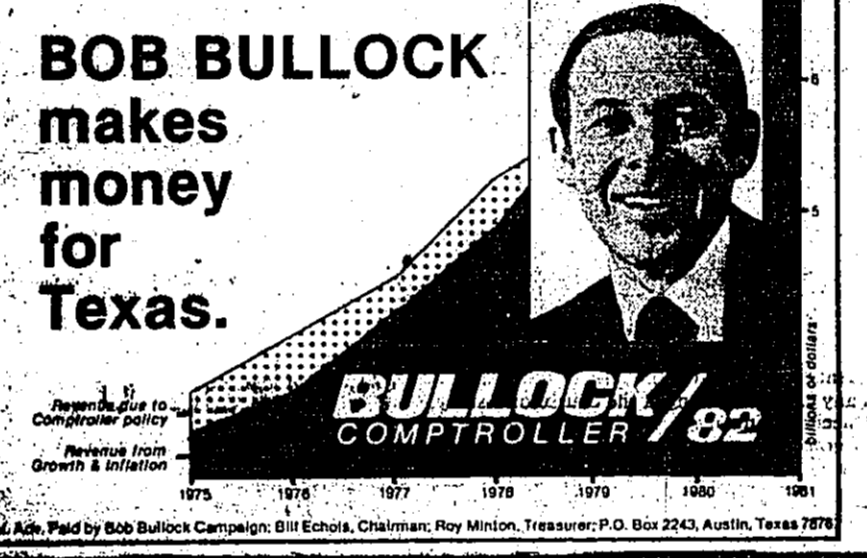

Don't Stand With Firearm Along Public Roads

The Tyler County Sheriff's Office is advising all residents and visitors that hunting or standing with a firearm along any public road in Tyler County will be investigated and prosecuted where applicable.

Due to the number and frequency of calls by citizens and visitors involving conduct mentioned above, the Tyler County Sheriff's Office will actively enforce the statutes provided by law in order to maintain safety and well being of all Tyler County residents and visitors alike.

The Texas Penal Code provides protection in Article 42.01 (Section 9) if he intentionally or knowingly discharges a firearm on or across a public road.

Both of the offenses above are classified as "B" misdemeanors. The punishment provided for Class "B" misdemeanors is as follows: a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00, confinement in the county jail for a term not to exceed 180 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

An additional statute from the Uniform Wildlife Regulations Act, Chapter 61, Texas follows: under Section 11.01, a person who stands with a firearm on or across a public road, or on a highway, or on a right-of-way of such public roads and highways. The punishment provided by law for a person convicted under this law is deemed guilty of a class "C" misdemeanor. The statute states that an individual adjudged guilty of a class "C" misdemeanor shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200.00. It is the sincere desire of the Tyler County Sheriff's Office that all concerned parties be aware of these regulations and will voluntarily abide by them.

Applications for ordering pine and windbreak tree seedlings from the Texas Forest Service are now available.

This year, available pine seedlings at \$68 per thousand. Mulberry, Virginia pines will be sold only in 1,000 hardy loblolly, improved superior loblolly and regular shortleaf. Prices are \$25 per thousand.

Windbreak tree species include: black walnut, cottonwood, cuttings, green ash, honeylocust (thornless), loblolly pine, mulberry, Oriental spruce, slash pine, Shumard oak, slash pine, sycamore and Virginia pine. Cost of all windbreak species is \$12.50 per hundred, f.o.b. nursery, plus 4 percent sales tax. Shipments from Indian Mound Nursery near Austin, Texas normally begin around mid-December.

Seedlings purchased from the Texas Forest Service may not be used for ornamental or landscape plantings. Seedling applications are available from Texas Forest Service area and district offices or from the Indian Mound Nursery, P.O. Box 617, Alto, Texas 79225-0617.

In 1964 Clements was State Finance Chairman for George Bush's U.S. Senate campaign, and in 1970 he served as Bush's Dallas County Finance Chairman. 1971 saw Clements serve as Senator John Tower's statewide Fundraising Dinner Chairman. During the 1972 election he was Co-chairman of the Republican Presidential campaign for the State of Texas.

He spent the next four years

managing the operations of the Pentagon as Deputy Secretary of Defense, displaying such effective managerial talents that he was awarded the Department of Defense Medal for Distinguished Public Service (1975). President Ford later added a Bronze Palm to the award. He oversaw the daily operations of approximately 3 million defense employees, and administered the \$100 billion plus annual Defense budget.

Bill Clements has been working for the Republican Party of Texas for nearly 30 years. He is the first Republican in many years to have a broad-based appeal to all Texas voters, and the commitment and resources needed to win in November.
