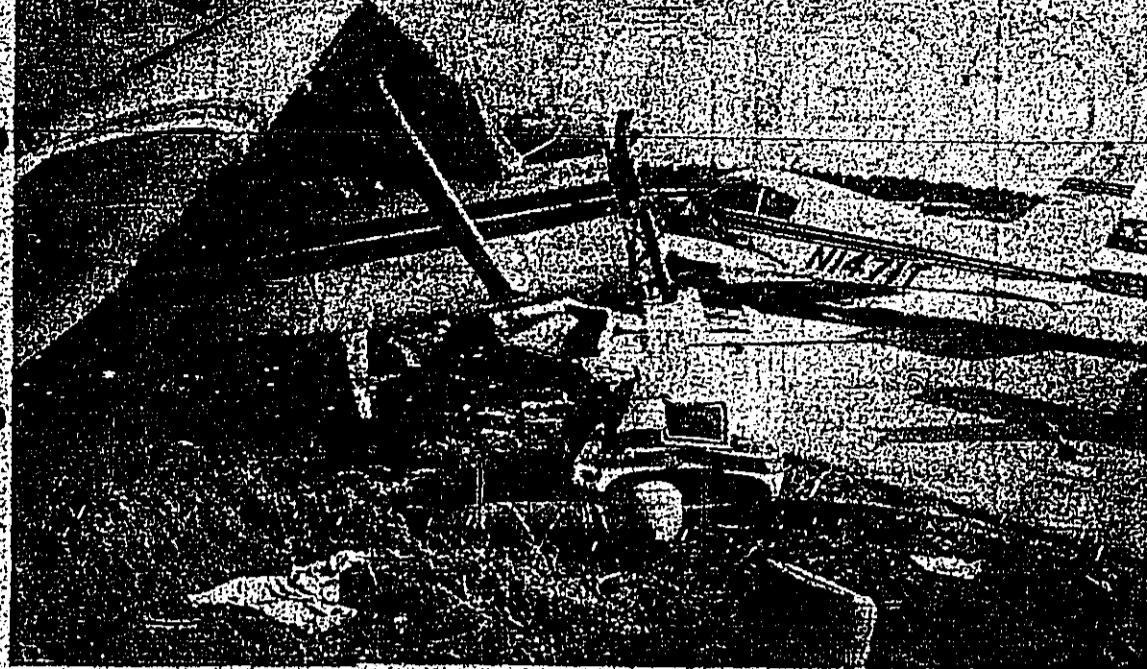


# 3 Perish In Plane Crash

Here, it has been attributed partially to the nose dive crash landing of a Piper 140 Cherokee single engine plane in which three Houston men were killed at about 11:15 p.m. Saturday. Identified the wreck were Elton Busnelle, 38, of Houston, Stephen Pavlik, 45, of Rosharon, and Charles Howard Aikley, 29, of Alvin. The three reportedly left a note at an Indian Springs Camp which their relatives discovered soon after returning from a shopping trip to Livingston.

The three said that they were going to fly the plane. Eyewitnesses to the crash landing said it hit the runway then slid into the two other craft on the apron. "It's a miracle the three didn't go up in smoke." Rescue workers from the Woodville Volunteer Fire Dept. had to free one victim, who later died, with the "Laws of Life", while the other two were thrown clear of the plane. Deputies reported that fog had reduced visibility of the airport to one quarter to one half mile. Federal Aviation Investigators were on the scene early Sunday investigating the site.

### Alan Miller's T-WHEELER

A few weeks ago we received a letter from an inmate in the Texas Department of Corrections asking for some historical information on the lumber industry in East Texas. He's writing a book it seems. Hearing from him reminded us of an earlier correspondence with a fellow who was in the federal prison in Washington state. McNeil Island was really a minimum security type place. You could only get there by boat, and since the feds owned the only boats, it did put a real premium on transportation to get away from the place that any convict might use. Even when the tide was low, there were about three miles of mudflats to cross, and those kind of footprints don't need bloodhounds.

Those fellas at McNeil were kind of interesting all the same. One had ripped off Army post exchanges in Korea and admitted he just got careless.

Another was the head of the Teamsters on the West Coast. He ran the prison sawmill as we remember. Quite a change in career from the parking lots in Seattle that were his alleged source of income earlier.

Another was a counterfeiter and worked in the prison print shop. All of them took "visitor's day" as a chance to celebrate. The food was good. Served by prisoners in waiter-type uniforms, complete with the towel over the arm, but obviously waiters to the rest of the prisoners seated with us. None were hard core criminals of course. Each had fallen afoul of federal law through some white collar crime. And each was looking for a sponsor so they could manage parole when the time came.

The recreation area where we met was huge, with a library, newspaper office, conversation areas, the kind of layout you'd expect in a downtown office building or club. All of them dressed in denims, reminding us of the work uniforms we wore in the Navy.

Well mannered guys, with the guards present but always in the background. The only restriction we remember was that no written notes could be passed back and forth, and we were searched on arrival and when we left. You really lost mental note of it being a prison at all until you realized that each door automatically locked when it closed.

It got us to wondering about prisoner #3-0-1 who wrote us from a dorm at Lovelady, Texas. All he mentioned in his first letter

to us was that he was a prisoner in the TDC, that he was required to tell us that first off.

As that he was trying to find some material concerning the early history of the lumber industry in East Texas for a novel he was writing. We bundled up quite a bit of information, wondering who he was, what he'd done, anything other than his name and serial number.

In his most recent letter he apologized for being late in replying, and offered this reason, which stunned us a little bit. It wasn't quite the way we had thought most prisoners related to where they were.

He said: "...please accept my apology for taking so long to write and thank you for the very informative material you sent me. In here, one tends to lose all-track of time, if you get my drift. Each day is the same... I'm busy and the day is gone before I realize it."

Obviously he doesn't spend all day hangin' on the bars wondering what to do next. But we would also presume that he doesn't have livered waiters serving his lunch in a private dining room either.

We remembered reading the "Bird-man of Alcatraz" and wondering if he was that kind of a person. Then we got to thinking about the prisoner Norman Mailer sprung. Mailer is a prominent American author, thought the guy in prison showed real promise and got him paroled. And the guy promptly killed a waiter in a cafe because he thought the beef was too rare, or some such thing.

But we'll go on corresponding with our friend in the TDC. Just maybe he's got that novel to write, most of us who play with words for a living would like to think we could write another "Gone With The Wind" if we only had the time. And of course his subject matter hooked us in the first place. He's writing about a part of the country we feel awfully close to.

And as we wait, we have no inkling why he's there, how long he's going to have to stay, only that for him "one tends to lose all track of time."

We want to give him credit for this. He knows how to keep us hooked on his little project. The latest item he's trying to find for his research is a map of Avonlea County in the late 1800's.

We're not even sure such a map exists. We'll try our railroad friends first off, after all the guys who laid the track had somebody survey where they were going.

### The Speaker Reports

AUSTIN — There are thousands of single parents in Texas, mostly women, who are forced to support their children by themselves or with government funds because the absent parents fail to pay court-ordered child support. Statistics from the Department of Human Resources tell us that in Texas 155,594 children live in single parent homes, are on welfare, and receive no support from the absent parent.

This is a terribly unjust situation to the children, to the single-supporting parents, and to the taxpayers of Texas. The problem of delinquent child support has grown steadily worse in the last decade. The increase in delinquency and difficult economic times aggravate the situation.

In response to this problem a new federal program has been developed which will provide our state with some assistance.

This program will allow the IRS to withhold tax refunds from individuals identified by the states as delinquent on child support payments. All or part of these funds will be channeled back to the states. Texas will implement this program in 1983 and expects to collect \$4 million.

The Department of Human Resources has forwarded a list of 16,000 names to Washington, D.C. Individuals on this list are required to be delinquent in payments totaling over \$150 or delinquent in payments for three months. Federal law requires that a state must have made every reasonable effort to obtain back payments before submitting names.

Other states like California and New York are already participating in this program. New York received \$6 million for the first six months of this year. Texas will not collect such a large amount of money

because our welfare payments are set much lower. Of the 16,000 names submitted, at least 15,000 of them are parents whose families are now part of the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program. AFDC families in Texas receive \$31.40 per child per month. Presently, the state pays 2/5 of this and the federal government pays 3/5. National figures show that 80% of the women who receive AFDC payments are eligible because they receive no child support from the fathers.

The IRS refund checks will be sent to the states to help offset AFDC payments. Refund checks will continue to be withheld until child support is paid up. This IRS refund program is only in effect for delinquent child support cases and not for any other type of welfare case.

Withholding IRS refund checks is a new tool that can be effectively used against individuals who do not make child support payments. State law, it is often argued, does not do enough against such individuals. Texas only allows civil contempt proceedings as a means of enforcing child support. Though this can mean that the offender goes to jail, this is rarely the case. And if the offender is in jail, he may lose his job and therefore would not be able to pay child support.

Many believe that Texas should seriously consider garnishment of wages. The support payment would be taken automatically from the paycheck much like income tax.

This and other alternatives should be closely considered by our next legislature in 1983. The problem has become epidemic in proportion and deserves our close scrutiny.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington



Over a half million Texans are out of work and one of the reasons for this record setting rate of joblessness is unfair foreign competition.

Unfair trade practices by foreign countries is by no means the only cause of the recession. The reason for the unemployment through the world in Texas and around the country. There are a lot of reasons for our current economic problems.

But unfair foreign trade has beyond question played a significant role. You need look no further than the recent shutdown of the Lone Star Steel plant in Daingerfield, Texas to understand that.

"This indefinite shutdown cost as many as 4,000 Texans their jobs and it should never have happened.

Lone Star officials tell me that their Daingerfield facility is as efficient and modern as any in the world. But it just couldn't compete against a stacked deck.

One big factor in the closing was continued unfair trade practices by steel producing countries in Europe.

The Daingerfield facility produced specialty goods for the oil industry, such as pipe and tube products. Yet subsidized imports of these products from Europe increased more than 50 percent in the first six months of this year, according to the American Iron and Steel Institute.

This flood of pipe and tube imports came after the U.S. clamped down on Europe's unfair subsidies of carbon steel products.

Subsidies of European carbon steel products has ranged as high as 20 percent by the French, 25 percent by the Italians, and 20 percent by the British and Belgian governments.

Some weeks ago, at the height of the international steel negotiations, I wrote to Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige advising him to avoid a deal with subsidized producers of carbon steel in Europe that left out pipe and tube products.

"At that time, Lone Star was not a party to any action to limit steel imports. However, it has now become obvious that even as negotiations with Europe proceed, the steel industry is pumping out pipe and tube products to make up for other steel markets they expected to lose in the negotiations.

I would venture to guess that the Europeans avoided an agreement acceptable to American carbon steel producers so that the pipe and tube market could be open to subsidizing a little longer.

"If negotiations on trade matters are approaching, and I have just written to President Reagan advising him of my concerns in this situation and urging him to use his powers, already in law, to slow the flood of subsidized European steel products into our country."

As Ranking Member of the Senate International Trade Subcommittee, I will be following these negotiations closely.

Unfair trade practices hurt not only the oil, instrument companies. The indefinite shutdown of the Daingerfield plant shows beyond a doubt that unfair trade can also cripple our toughest, most efficient producers.

THIRD SENATORIAL DISTRICT OF TEXAS

AUSTIN — The Paygo Bill provided a \$5,000 exemption, from school district taxation to the holder of a residence homestead. If given, an additional \$10,000 exemption to those over 65 or disabled, and it allows open space land to be taxed on a productive rather than actual value. This portion of the law was mandated by the Property Tax Amendment of 1978. School taxes of those over 65 or disabled were frozen to the dollar amount of the taxes levied in the year they qualified for the exemption. State funds were sent directly to school districts, to compensate for the loss in revenues due to the exemptions.

In the first year thereafter, they are returned in the form of increased state aid. When the Appraisal District started appraising all properties and using a standard scale for each category of property, the values assigned to homesteads skyrocketed because they had historically been undervalued. Values assigned to such things as businesses, industries and pipelines did not increase in the same proportion because these properties had always been appraised closer to true value than homesteads.

As you can see, homestead holders will assume a greater portion of the taxes under these conditions. When this situation became obvious, another amendment to the Constitution was proposed and was approved by the voters which allows local governing bodies to grant a homestead exemption this year and a larger amount in future years. Some local governments granted this exemption, but most did not.

The Central Appraisal Districts had a lofty goal of appraising property fairly and equitably. Who could argue with that? I'm not sure that's what the people want. I've heard it said many times that property taxes are not fair. I tend to agree. Many people have built homes in which to live and to die and have no desire or intention to sell them. Few incomes have risen as much as inflation, and the added taxes caused by the escalation of property values are a burden to many.

Again, it's government spending rather than property values that causes this. Our state Constitution provides that all property shall be taxed on its value, and as long as it contains this provision, property will be taxed.

Many feel the sales tax is the fairest of all taxes while others favor income taxes. Generally speaking, retired people

favor income taxes and don't like property taxes or sales taxes; home owners who are not retired don't like property taxes or income taxes but don't mind sales taxes because every body could share. Labor doesn't make a fuss about property taxes, but it does like sales taxes but likes income taxes and especially corporate ones. Businesses and industries like property taxes most of all because this form of taxation is better than the other options.

We sometimes forget the renters whose landlords pay property taxes. A portion of the monthly rental of each tenant is used to pay property taxes, and tenants have no access to the exemptions.

As the book of Ecclesiastes says, "All is vanity." I believe it's safe to say that people don't mind paying taxes but that the burden has increased so much in recent years that hardly anything is left. We tend to blame all of this on a bloated Federal budget and the trillion dollar deficit.

While the Federal bureaucracy has put a king sized monkey on our backs, all governments share in the blame. The Paygo Bill, which I didn't support, won't cause your taxes to go up and won't cause them to go down if it should be repealed.

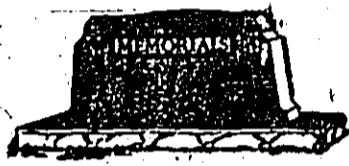

**New Help For Angina Patients**

The term *ischemic heart disease* is characterized medically by an imbalance between the oxygen supply to the myocardium—the muscle of the heart—and that part of the heart's demand for oxygen.

The principal symptom of ischemic heart disease is what we know as angina pectoris or chest pain. The flow of blood to a section of heart wall becomes insufficient to maintain oxygenation and nutrition. Angina usually occurs during periods of exertion or stress, when the demand for oxygen is increased. A variant type occurs while the patient is at rest. This is known as Prinzmetal's or unstable angina.

Both types are treated by nitroglycerin, known for more than a hundred years to be useful for the prevention and treatment of acute angina attacks. There have been some drawbacks in administering the drug over the years.

When the tablet is placed under the tongue, the effect is immediate but with a short duration of action. When given orally, it is



A new drug offers quick and long-lasting action for sufferers of angina pectoris. absorbed through the gastrointestinal system, and quickly metabolized by the liver prior to exerting its maximal vasodilation effect.

A new drug that avoids the pass through the liver yet provides both rapid and prolonged action has been developed. It is placed under the upper lip (between gum and cheek). Tests have shown onset of action within three minutes and prolonged relief up to five hours. Known as Sustin Transmucosal Tablets, this new nitroglycerin preparation is from Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals. People may eat, drink and talk while the tablet is dissolving.
