Rabies Diagnosed In Colmesneil Kitten

Rabies has been diagnosed in a 6-week-old kitten near Colmesneil, according to Texas Department of Health officials. The kitten sickened two weeks after being attacked by an unknown animal, thought to be a skunk because of the characteristic odor left on the kitten following the attack. A local veterinarian submitted its brain to the Houston Rabies Labo-

ratory for testing after the kitten began to have symptoms of the disease. One person is presently undergoing anti-rabies treatment resulting from being exposed to a scratch from the kitten.

According to Jim Lovick, Regional Zoonosis Control Veterinarian for the Texas Department of Health, this year has seen an increase in rabies among domestic animals. So far three cats, two dogs, four horses, and five cattle have been found rabid throughout East Texas. This compares with only eight found in the 38 county area during all of 1981. Tyler County's last rabies case involved a bat reported in 1980. "Skunks continue to be the number one wildlife vector for rabies," Lovick said, adding that each year for the past three years nearly 100 cases are reported in that species. He speculated that many skunk rabies cases go unreported due to their being discovered and killed by farmers and others without having exposed any animal or person.

Lovick added that all area residents should have their dogs and cats vaccinated annually against rabies as vaccinated animals serve as a sort of buffer zone between humans and the ever-present wildlife rabies.

For Lake Rockland Project

Cost-Benefit-Ratio \$1.60

If only one-half of the \$500 million estimated cost of Lake Rockland is spent in the counties adjoining the 3 mile wide, by 22 mile long proposed lake, it would have the economic impact of putting \$1,500 in the pocket of every man, woman and child in the counties of Angelina, Jasper, Polk, Trinity and Tyler. The "cost-to-benefit-ratio" calculated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers estimates in addition that Lake Rockland will generate \$1.60 in benefits over its estimated 100 year lifetime for every \$1 spent in construction.

Lake Rockland also promises to give the Southeast Texas area a reliable supply of water for industrial and

drinking water well into the next century. Currently most water in Southeast Texas is supplied from wells.

Lake Rockland's "cost-to-benefits" estimates were figured without considering well water as an alternative source of water.

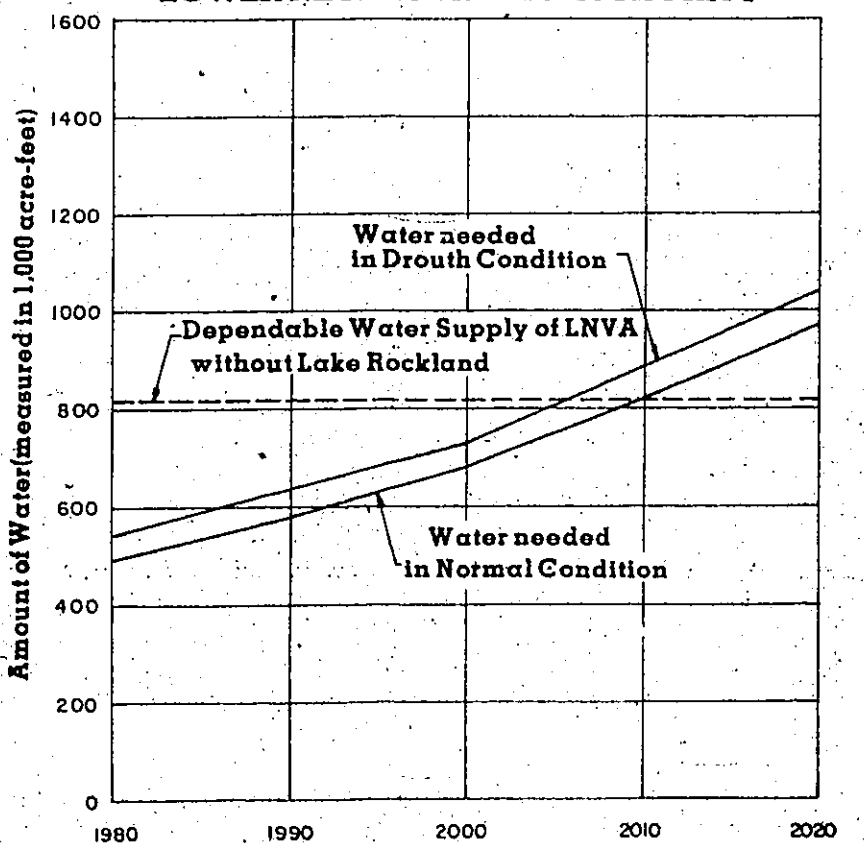
"If well water were available, then we would have opted for it," said Lieutenant Colonel Charles W. Lively, Deputy District Engineer of the Fort Worth District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Existing sources of surface water such as Lakes Toledo Bend and Sam Rayburn, were not considered as alternate sources of water and other benefits because the water from these reservoirs is already committed to use.

"Lake Rockland", according to Leland Wilson, project engineer for the Neches River Basin study, Corps of Engineers, was compared to two other proposed East Texas water reservoirs. These are Lake Pointa, proposed to be built on the Angelina River west of Nacogdoches area and Lake Weches, proposed to be built on the Neches

River north of Lake Rockland. Corps of Engineers calculations indicate that Lake Rockland is much more economically feasible, from an engineering point of view, and feasible as a source of water than either of the other two water projects considered alone or both projects considered together.

We perceive a collective and nearly unanimous sigh of relief in county court houses and city halls as the Republicans vacate Austin after the first of the year.

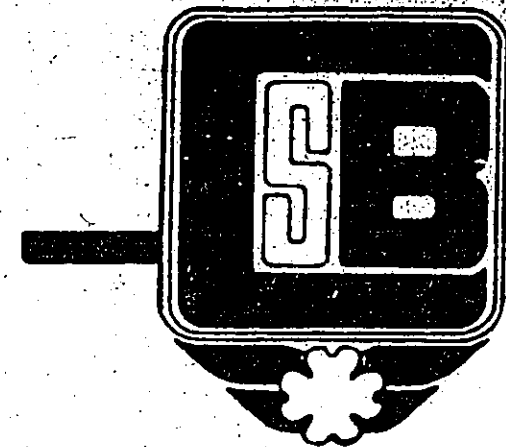

Inventory Woodpile, It's Home Fireplace Season Again

It's that time of year the hot months of summer. The reason for this is to allow the firewood to dry and to replenish the woodpile during start fires. But who really thinks about cutting firewood in hot weather? So we find the chainsaw and head as willow, when dry, and some conifers such as pine, burn rapidly and require constant replenishing to have steady fire. Some woods, such as oak, hickory, pecan, osage-orange and beech have high heat values. The amount of heat is not the only consideration when cutting firewood. Oak, hickory, pecan and ash are relatively easy to split. The following hints should be followed in cutting firewood: (1) Do not use a flammable liquid such as gasoline, oil or charcoal. (2) Use several small pieces of kindling and fire longer. (3) Larger unsplit pieces will burn several logs. (4) Longer than split pieces. (5) Keep a screen in front of the fireplace. Many homeowners are cutting their own firewood to provide.

County Farmers Can Sign Up Now For Reduction Programs

• Tyler County farmers can now sign up for the 1983 feed grain and wheat acreage reduction programs, according to Kathy O. Lowe, County Executive Director. The program requires that farmers reduce their wheat and feed grain planted acreage by 20 percent of the established base to qualify for program benefits. Acreage reduction requirements are 10 percent paid land diversion for feed grain, and 15 percent with a 5 percent paid land diversion for

wheat. All farmers with an established base who plant feed grain and/or wheat are eligible to participate in the voluntary programs. Those who sign up will be eligible for land diversion payments, deficiency payments, and price support loans. "Farmers may request 50 percent of the 1983 diversion payments and 50 percent of the projected deficiency payments when they sign up for the programs," Mrs. Lowe said. Land diversion

payments have been established at \$1.50 per bushel for corn and sorghum, \$1.00 for barley, 75 cents for wheat, and \$2.70 per bushel for wheat. "The land diversion payment is based on one half the per bushel payment rate times the acres diverted," Mrs. Lowe said if a farmer accepts an advance payment and late does not comply with the program provisions, he or she will be required

to refund the amount of the advance payment plus interest. Interest charged will be the rate in effect for the commodity loans on the date of the advance payment, plus 5 percent. The projected per bushel deficiency payment rates are: corn, 21 cents; sorghum, 20 cents; barley, 15 cents

and wheat, 65 cents. The ASCS official said advance deficiency payments will be half these rates. Advance payments are not authorized for oats. "To be eligible for program benefits, farmers must agree to limit their feed grain and wheat acreage planted for harvest to no more than 80 percent of the farm's

base, and also to devote an acreage equal to both the reduction and land diversion to conservation uses. Program participants will receive target price protection of \$2.86 a bushel for corn, \$2.72 for

sorghum, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.60 for oats, and \$4.30 a bushel for wheat. Loan rates per bushel are: Corn, \$2.65; sorghum, \$2.52; barley, \$2.16; oats, \$1.36; rye, \$2.25; and wheat, \$3.65. The 1983 wheat crop

will be eligible for the farmer-owned grain reserve program. Decisions on use of the reserve for 1983 feed grain are being delayed until the domestic and world supply and demand situation is studied.

Participation in the 1983 programs is voluntary. However, only those farmers who take part will be eligible for program benefits. Sign-up will be conducted through March 31. For further information call 713/283-2244.

Soybean Loan Purchase Rates

Basic county loan and purchase rates for 1982 crop soybeans grading No. 2 were issued today by Everett Rank, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Rank said the basic 1982 crop soybean rates are based on the preliminary national average loan and purchase rate of \$5.02 per bushel. Changes in the area-to-area relationships, prices received by far-

mers, trends in production and results of the loan and purchase program resulted in some adjustments, Rank said. Loan rates in North Carolina and West Virginia were increased 2 cents per bushel; South

Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia were increased 1 cent per bushel; and four counties in Missouri bordering Arkansas were increased 1 to 2 cents per bushel, he said.



The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Apartment hunting can be difficult if you don't know what to look for. Apartment seekers must know how to safeguard a security deposit, what to keep in mind when signing a lease or rental contract, and what their obligations are as a renter. Our Consumer Protection Division attorneys suggest these steps:

• Determine what location and price range you want, then get recommendations from friends, check newspaper ads, real estate dealer listings, or professional apartment finders.

• Decide in advance what special features you want. Tennis courts, swimming pools, saunas, game rooms, and other amenities are available at some apartments.

• Check all appliances, water faucets, toilets, hot water heaters, air conditioning, and heating yourself. Don't take someone else's word that they work!

• Make arrangements to have the locks changed before you move in.

• Even with air conditioning, see that windows open easily, since you may need them for ventilations or for an emergency escape route. Note stair locations, elevators, and fire extinguishers.

• Talk with people who may be your neighbors. Find out if they have had satisfactory relationships with the apartment owner or manager.

• Ask if there have been any rent increases in the past year, and inquire about the cost of monthly utilities.

• When you locate the apartment you want, think it over a day or two before committing yourself.

• If you still want the apartment, check on specifics. What utilities and repairs will be your responsibility? How much is the security deposit? Are there restrictions on children or pets?

• Before signing a lease or contract, go through the apartment with the owner or manager and list any damage, making a copy of the list for both of you.

• Read the lease or contract carefully before signing and make sure there are no blank spaces. Check to see that all things you have discussed are spelled out, along with how much notice you must give before moving or what the consequences are if you leave before the lease expires. See that both parties sign and get a copy.

• When you move, again go through the unit with the manager or owner and determine any damages that will be deducted from your security deposit. Under Texas law, the landlord must refund your deposit within 30 days or give you a list of deductions along with the balance of your deposit. If you leave owing rent, this can be deducted.

You are required to furnish your forwarding address so the refund can be mailed to you.

Some Answers for AT&T stockholders

In Southwestern Bell's territory, there are 224,000 AT&T stockholders and more than 100,000 of them are right here in Texas. Many of you have questions about what will happen to your AT&T stock after divestiture.

Currently, AT&T stock represents an investment in the total Bell System—Long Lines, Western Electric, Bell Labs and the operating companies, like Southwestern Bell. At divestiture, the assets of the Bell System will be divided.

For example, a share owner who currently owns 50 shares of AT&T stock will still own 50 shares of AT&T stock after divestiture. In addition, the stockholder will own a proportionate interest in the divested operating companies.

No final decision has been made on a procedure for dividing the stock once AT&T spins off the 22 operating companies. However, AT&T is working on a plan to make it easy and inexpensive for share owners to manage their holdings.

Specific investment procedures and other details have not been finalized. Any plan regarding AT&T stock requires review by the Bell operating companies, the Department of Justice and the federal court before it can be enacted.

Whatever plan is accepted, AT&T is committed to ensuring the plan is fair and equitable. In addition, AT&T plans to minimize, as much as possible, transaction costs associated with the consolidation of small share holdings.

Check Identification Whenever In Doubt

It's a good idea to make sure you're satisfied before letting anyone in your home. That's why every Southwestern Bell employee carries an identification card.

The ID card shows his or her name, a photograph and an expiration date. The next time a Bell employee comes, your car request
