

Booster Reporter Balloons 15 Miles

Today, though, Bill was preparing for a morning of unterhered flight, exploring the wilds of Tyler County. Mary, with her newly acquired map of Tyler County, will follow along on the ground. The huge red, green, blue and yellow balloon is rolled up in a large brown canvas bag and sits in the back of the pick-up truck along with a large fan and a huge cane basket.

As I am the only one available, I help turn the basket on its side and pull the balloon out in front of the basket in a straight line. Mary and I then pull the balloon out from the sides. The two of us then hold open the lower edge, "mouth", of the balloon while Bill uses the large fan to fill the balloon with air. As Bill makes final preparation to launch he looks over to me, smiles and says, "Well, hop in."

As we rise we find what wind there is comes from the east so we begin moving west, quickly leaving Wal-Mart-Fairway Foods parking lot.

We are moving with the wind so there is no wind blowing against us; the air around us is calm and we do not feel cold. Yet we are moving at tree-top level at about ten miles per hour across the outskirts of Woodville, just above Cobb Mill Road. Unlike an airplane, it is quiet in the balloon basket. You can hear sounds from the houses and cars on the ground and even carry on conversations with people below. A voice comes up from the trees below, "Hello, nice morning isn't it?" and we

At regular intervals Bill turns on the valve on the large chrome propane burner from which "Lazy Day" gets her hot air to stay aloft. The propane butner sounds like a gas hot water heater only much louder. When the burner is off you are left with genuine silence. There is nothing between us and the ground except for the basket. Riding at tree-top level the trees

reveal a patchwork of fall colors: Hot Air Balloon pilots Bill Murtorff faded browns, reds and dark greens

Using the propane burner, Bill is able to increase our altitude to where we are able to pick up a wind which moves us on a more northerly course. We cross the Livingston Highway west of Heritage Gardens and decrease our altitude gradually to where we actually bump the ground at the Tyler County Airport.

I had thought earlier that Woodville seemed especially quiet this Sunday morning. The reason soon became apparent. Riding northwest of Woodville toward Highway 256, the woods, fields and roads are full of deer hunters. All through this area the woods are one vast armed camp.

At one point we watch a group of about twelve deer "scared up" by "Lazy Day's" propane burner gracefully bound across an open field. A little later we waved at a deer hunter in a pick-up truck who was moving down a dirt road and trying to point out to him a large buck which was further down the same road running in his direction,


We paralleled Highway 256 to it's

"Lazy Day" had been floating for about an hour and Bill began to look for a field to land in. We found that most fields that were clean enough for landing were crossed by utility lines. As we floated across one pasture we found that all the cattle in the pasture were coming to the edge of the pasture nearest us. As "Lazy Day" passed over the pasture, the whole group froze, eyes wide and necks turned up, then turned and ran to the other end of the pasture when Bill surged more fuel to the flame.

Finally within eyesight of downtown Chester, Bill decided to land on the highway. We crossed some utility wires then bumped the highway once, went back into the air and finally back down again, Bill pulled the cord which releases the hot air out of the top of the balloon and as we hit we turned the basket forward on to it's side. We then got out and begin pulling the fast deflating balloon off the highway. "Lazy Day" has landed across the street from J. E. Seamon's house in the outskirts of Chester. As I go to the nearest house to call and leave a message so Mary can find us, I am met at the door by three very wide-eyed, open-mouthed small children. Godette, Brint and Bret Williams. I doubt if they would have been any more amazed had the space shuttle Columbia, landed two days early in front of their house.



Mr. Solberg and his wife first purchased a roll of clear vinyl plastic, several strips of 1/4" X 3/4" molding, and some 1/2" and 3/4" wire nails (to hold everything together) When all these components were gathered, the couple was ready to begin construction

of their storm windows.

Each 3! X 4! window covering was begun by first measuring the inside of the window casing and then cutting the molding strips for the storm window so that—when it was assembled—the finished frame would be 1/4. shorter, both vertically and horizontally, than the opening. This slack allowed Gordon to be sure that the completed window would slide into place next to the existing glass window. The accompanying drawings show how Gordon and Judy made their do it yourself storm windows . 5, with a sandwich of two layers of plastic and three of wood. To build your own storm windows just lay the first four pieces of molding down, in the shape of a correctly sized rectangle, on any flat surface. Then spread's sheet of vinyl (cut with an inch of overhang all around so you'll have something to hold on to when you stretch the flexible material taut) over the strips. Lay four more strips [positioned] you stretch the material rand over the strips. Lay four more strips (positioned so that the corner joints' long and short places will be in positions opposite those in the lower levell on the vinyl. Now, tack this portion of your storm window sandwich together with 1/2" nails while someone stretches the plastic tight for you.

Once you've gotten that far, roll out another layer of vinyl, top it with your third set

of molding strips ..., and then nail through the complete sandwich (wood, plastic, wood, plastic, wood) with the 3/4" nails while your partner stretches the second layer of yinyl tant, keeping ahead of you while you work.
