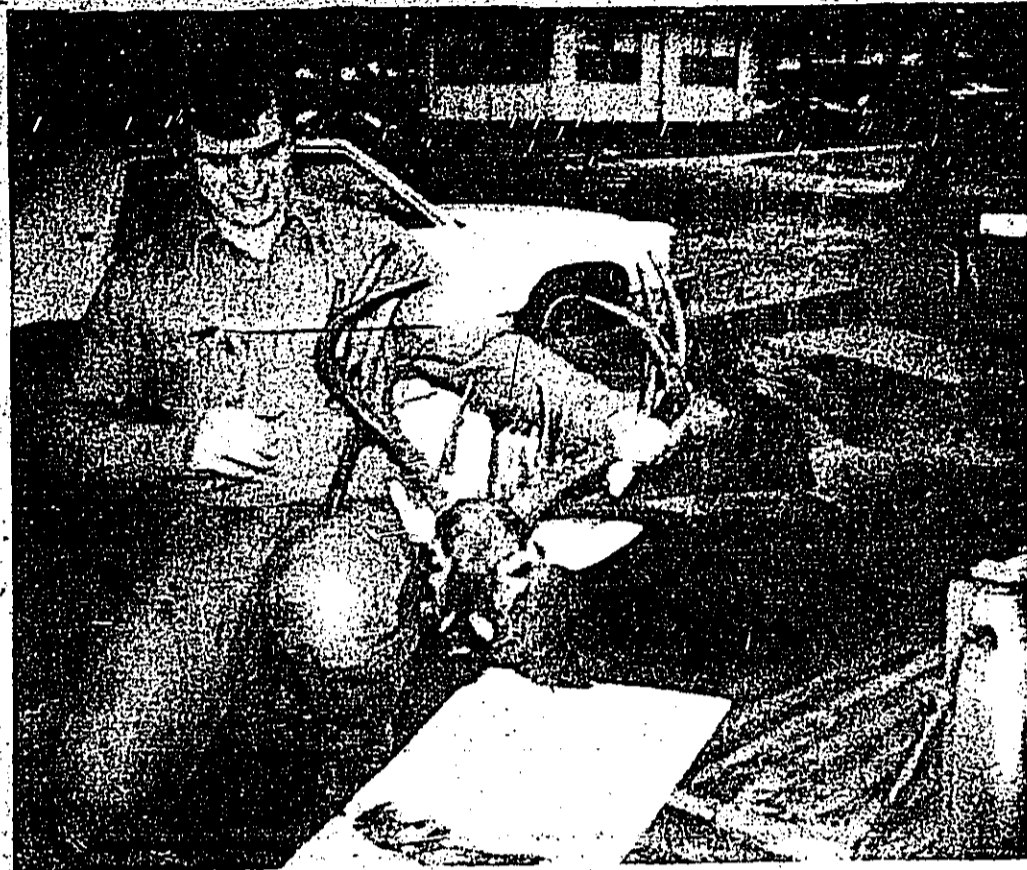

Southwestern Bell Rate Hike Here Soon

The first Southwestern Bell bills reflecting the 10 percent surcharge on in-state long distance calls will begin arriving to Texas customers in Woodville next week, said Gene Thacker, Southwestern Bell community relations manager. The first bills showing the surcharge for state customers were dated November 15. The surcharge will continue for approximately three months, until Southwestern Bell recovers about \$16.9 million in additional revenues authorized by a court decision. The court ruled earlier this year that the revenues would be recovered through a surcharge on in-state long distance calls. The surcharge applies to calls made from telephones in Southwestern Bell territory to other points within Texas. The surcharge does not apply to calls outside Texas. Calls made from coin telephones or hotel or motel telephones are exempt from the surcharge. Starting with the November 15 Thanksgiving services bills, the surcharge will apply to all intrastate long distance calls, even if the calls were made prior to the billing date.

The Deep East Texas Development Association will hold its regular monthly meeting at 10 a.m. on Friday, December 3, 1982 at Scrappin' Valley. The Temple-Eastex, Timber and Wildlife Research Area Conference Center is located between Hemphill and Barkeville on Highway 87. Tom H. Taylor, Director of the Travel and information Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will be the principal speaker for this monthly meeting. Mr. Taylor will be talking about the monetary benefits from travel, a profile of today's visitor and some of the things he sees in the future that will greatly affect and influence the travel industry.

Rockland Engineers Pay Local Visit

Leland Wilson, Project Engineer for the Neches Basin for the Fort Worth District Office and Larry Decas, Project Manager for the Lake Rockland Project, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers visited the Tyler County Booster office in Woodville Tuesday as part of a visit to the Lake Rockland Dam site and an examination of the area which would be inundated by Lake Rockland. Wilson and Decas spent Monday in the Davy Crockett National Forest area at the upper end of the proposed reservoir. Also they were in Beaumont looking over the areas where Lake Rockland would help prevent flood damage along the lower Neches River. In addition Corps engineers Decas and Wilson visited the Big Thicket Park headquarters in Beaumont. According to Decas part of the Big Thicket Park consists of wetlands along the Neches River. The Corps of Engineers, as part of the planning for Lake Rockland will plan to study and then preserve the natural cycle of wetness and dryness necessary to maintain and enhancing these wetlands along the Neches River. In regard to hydro-power, Wilson stated that the original study of hydro-power for Lake Steinhagen conducted when the dam was being de-

signed concluded that hydro-power was not economically feasible. However a recently completed review study on that subject concluded that hydro-power generating facilities operating at Lake Steinhagen would be economically feasible "currently and in the future". Hydro-power from both Lake Rockland and Lake Steinhagen are seen as "peak sources" of power because "in order to generate anything, you have to store it (water) up, that is the elevation of the dam is just not high enough on these projects for continuous running", according to Decas. If the dam were used to generate power continuously the amount of energy generated would be small", Decas added.

Water For Texas Confab Studies Dollar Sources

College Station-Financing future water development in Texas will be a top agenda item when the Texas legislature meets in January 1983.

It was the top agenda item also at the 1982 "Water For Texas Conference" held at Texas A&M University November 18 and 19.

A panel addressing "Financing of Future Water" was moderated by Catherine Perrine of Dallas, State Water Director, League of Women Voters.

Among the various experts speaking on the panel was Tyler County lawyer Josiah Wheat, Jr., secretary of the Governor's Water Task Force and Texas Water Development Board.

Other panel participants included State Senator Ed Howard, chairman of the Sunset Advisory Commission and a member of the Senate Committee on Finance; Alan Henry, current president of the Texas Municipal League, and a city councilman in Lubbock,

Texas; and Bond Lawyer Donald L. Howes of the Houston law firm of Vinson and Elkins, currently president of the National Association of Bond Lawyers.

Louis A. Beecherl, Chairman, Governor's Water Task Force and Texas Water Development Board presented figures show that total available surface water supplies for Texas in 1980 at approximately 11 million acre-feet of water per year. If all 33 potential surface water reservoirs including Lake Rockland were developed by year 2000, that would add an additional 5.1 million acre-feet of water supply per year. This plus the 5.1 million acre-feet per year (wells) in Texas produces a total projected water supply for the state in the year 2000 of 11.2 million acre-feet of water per year. With continuing healthy population growth in Texas water needs for the year 2000 are projected to be approximately 26.5 million acre feet of water per year, which leaves a major water shortage state-

wide of 5.2 million acre feet of water per year. It was pointed out that even in water-plentiful East Texas certain cities are straining at the limits of their current water supply capacity. In certain areas such as Angelina County, the ground water supplies (well) water have been overtaxed to the extent there has been a serious deterioration in the quality of ground water in that area. Overall, 10.5 million gallons of well water was used as supply in that area in 1980. Of that amount only 5.1 million acre feet per year is subject to being rechargeable to ground water (wells) "charged". This is a problem to be dealt with that has been suggested by the Governor's Task Force report that the legislature consider legislation permitting the state to step in and regulate the use of ground or

well water in areas where overuse of well water supply is a problem. Dr. Jack R. Runkles, director of the Texas Water Resources Institute pointed out that federal funding for water development and for water and wastewater treatment are drying up. "Water users from throughout the state in cities, farms, in energy and to the extent there has been a serious deterioration in the quality of adequate water in the future".

Engene Hinds, Southwest Regional Director, Bureau of Reclamation stressed increased responsibility and power of states to provide for their future water needs. For instance, The City of Corpus Christi is providing approximately twenty two percent of funds for a Bureau of Reclamation water supply project on the Neches River, a much higher percentage than in the past.

Josiah Wheat Biographical Sketch

Josiah Wheat was born in Woodville, Texas December 21, 1928. He is a lifelong resident of Tyler County. He graduated from the University of Law, University of Texas law in Woodville in the firm of Wheat, Wheat and Stafford. He is married and has four children. Josiah Wheat is a past-president of the State Bar of Texas, past president of the Texas Water Conservation Association, and past president of the Deep East Texas Council of Governments. He also currently serves as Secretary of the Governor's Task Force on Water Resource Use and Conservation. He was appointed by the President of the U.S. to the National Water Commission in 1969. He served as General Counsel of the Texas Water Quality Board for two years and serves on the American Bar Association's Standing Committee on Environmental Law. He serves as General Counsel for the Lower Neches Valley Authority. Wheat is a member of the Executive Committee of the Centennial Commission of the University of Texas at Austin. He serves as City Attorney for the City of Woodville.

municipalities going to the market each year in competition with each other and other localities. The contention is that the multiplicity of insured local bonds on the market in various amounts and names would create a disorderly market and the localities would not receive as low an interest rate as would the large State water bonds. Others in the field contend that the number of bonds on the market would not affect the credit worthiness of any and that the important aspect is that each issue would be backed by the insurance fund. As Governor Hobby has stated a bond insurance program would get the best possible bond rating, the question we must resolve is which procedure should be followed and we trust this will be fully discussed at the meeting of TENRAC on November 30. There are, of course, numerous other means and methods of securing financing for badly needed water related projects. However, those I have just described were the ones the Finance Committee felt would most likely find support in the public community, among the people of the State and in the legislature. The one thing that is clear is, as was pointed out by the Finance Committee, we must have large investments and a wide range of water projects are going to be needed within the next two decades and the source of funding, new moneys are inadequate to meet that need. If we are to have clean water and in its abundance we must move forward in

State Water Financing Subject Of Wheat Speech

This speech was presented as a part of a panel presentation on Financing Future Water of Texas at the 1982 Water for Texas Conference held at Texas A&M University November 18 & 19. Many of these "alternatives" will appear in the form of proposed legislation in the 1983 Texas state legislature which convenes in January.

"In the time allotted to me today I wish to briefly discuss the assignment of the Finance Committee, some of the matters considered and some alternative methods of finance for water related projects recommended for consideration by Texas Energy and Natural Resources. Advisory Council, (TENRAC) and the Governor's Task Force.

The Committee's assignment was to identify as many practical approaches as possible to finance the construction of water related projects, an area of increasing importance in view of the diminished role of the Federal government discussed here today.

We first reviewed the programs now in place. First, you will recall that a constitutional amendment passed in 1957 created the Texas Water Development Board and authorized the sale of two hundred million dollars in water development bonds to provide money for the Water Development Fund. A subsequent constitutional amendment added an additional two hundred million dollars in bond authority. The Board uses the fund to assist local governments in financing water projects. This can be done in two ways. The Board may buy into a project, such as a storage reservoir, by providing a portion of the funding and actually becoming a part owner. However, the more frequently used method involves the Board's purchase of bonds issued by a local government. The Board is authorized to sell the state bonds to obtain the money used to buy such participation offer a constitutional amendment to such local government bonds, the voters of Texas which would authorize an additional 250 million dollars in Texas Water Development

Bonds to be used for the same purposes as heretofore authorized by the Water Development Bond and the Quality Bond constitutional amendments. However, we recommend one point of fine tuning which was strongly urged by the Chairman of this particular panel, Mrs. Perrine. To avoid any "shortfall" during the amortization period the Committee recommends that the constitutional amendment require that loans financed through the Water Development Fund obtain interest of at least 1/2 of 1 percent more than the interest paid by the State on such bonds with the further constitutional requirement that the Water Development Board give paramount consideration in the administration of the program to insuring that it be totally self-sustaining without any drain on the State Treasury.

As previously mentioned legislation governing both the Water Development Bonds and the Clean Water Bonds limits their use to the hardship cases mentioned by Governor Hobby and requires that, before making any loan, the Board must find, and I quote, "that the political subdivision cannot reasonably finance the project without State assistance in the amount finally approved by the Board.

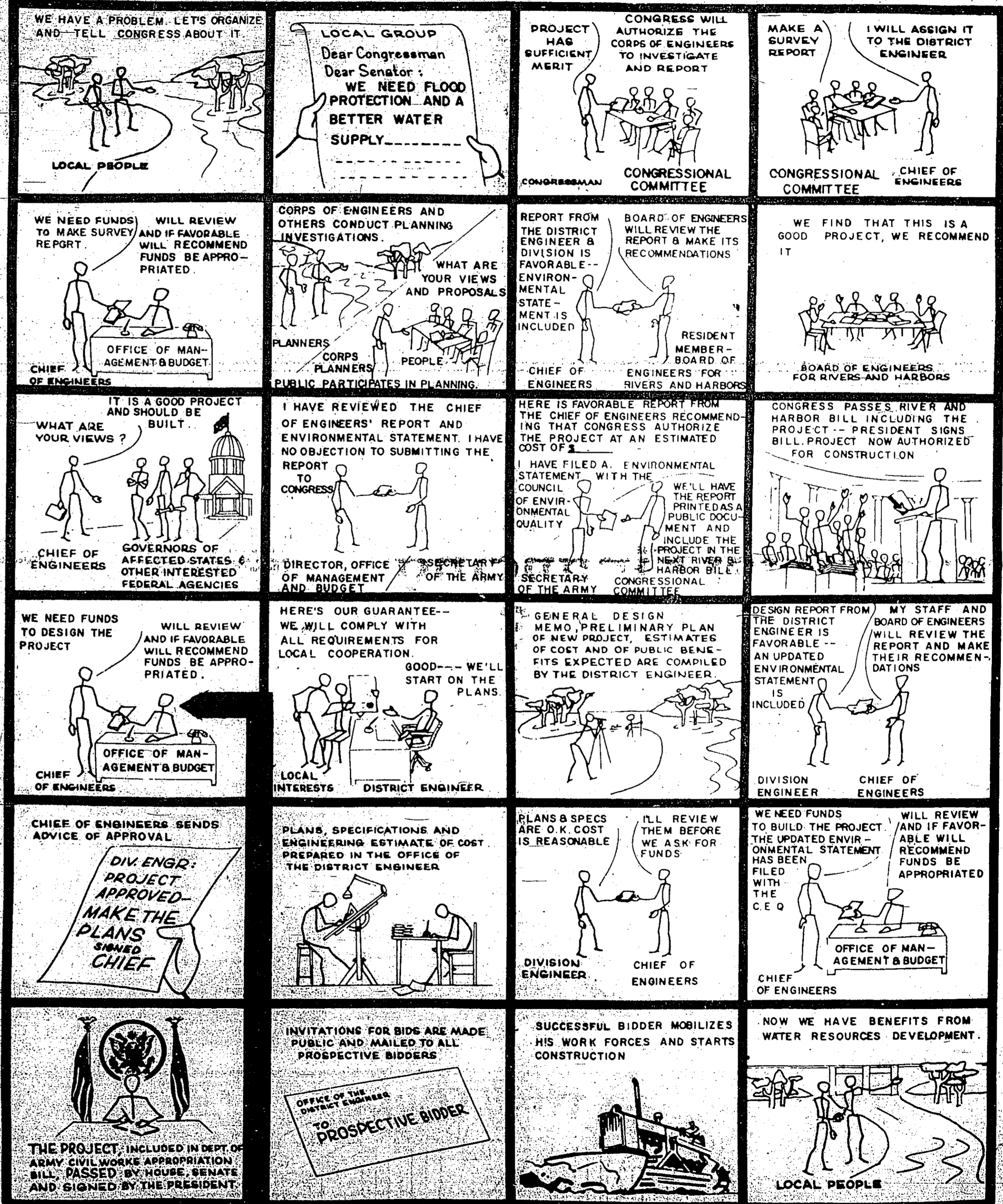
Both the remaining Water Development Bonds and Clean Water Bonds can now be sold as a result of the voters action in the general election which authorized an increase in the maximum interest payable by the State on state bonds.

Governor Hobby has pointed out that these programs have worked well and have provided funds for hardship cases, that is cities that cannot sell bonds on their own. Even with an insurance program as discussed later, the Board must find, and I quote, "that the political subdivision cannot reasonably finance the project without State assistance in the amount finally approved by the Board.

This brings us to the third existing finance program which was created in 1981 by the 67th Texas Legislature; for the first time in the state's history the legislature appropriated state funds which could be used for water project construction as well as other purposes. Television has been a permanent guest in our home for nearly thirty years now. Some programming and even some commercials are exceptional, but three examples come immediately to mind that drive us up the wall.

The political season. For months we watch candidates running up and down the capitol steps, bulging briefcase clutched in one hand. A purposeful glint in the eye and the American flag as a backdrop. All of them would save a lot of money if they recorded the same soundtrack, mention social security, defense, crime in the streets and a balanced budget. They really don't look for party identification anymore. How long has it been since you heard any candidate say he was a democrat or a republican? Hundreds of millions of dollars go into television campaigns offering thirty seconds of wisdom on world and domestic affairs. And from this little snippet we make our decisions.

Even the Sunday sporting talk shows on the networks provide little additional information. The panelists probably get tired of asking pointed questions and getting weasel answers, because usually the whole program appears as if all the participants were just trying to get the thirty minutes over with.

What happened to the Wayne Morse-Everett Dirksen-Hubert Humphery oratory that often was spell-binding even if you didn't always agree with what you were hearing?

The "space program". Dear to our pocketbooks because of the tax money involved, NASA is just terrible at telling us where these millions of dollars are going. The liftoffs at the cap are made for television, but the awful photo opportunities after they get into orbit are kindergarten stuff for the most part.

Are we spending those billions of dollars so we can see an astronaut walk barefoot on the ceiling? Or watch his dinner through a straw? And after you've seen the cargo doors open a few dozen times, what else is there? We assume those people spend a few days up there doing something constructive in addition to eating and sleeping and tumbling through the air. Can't we see some of that?

And of course the latest "spectacular" was aborted because a two-bit fan in a two million dollar space suit refused to fan.

If our space program has faded into one hundred mile high orbits of high jinks, maybe NASA should pull the plug on all the publicity and just go on about its business. Kind of hurt less if we didn't know where those billions of tax dollars were being spent.

The NCAA commercials on college football every Saturday afternoon. That back-lighted bulging plastic head

that apparently resembles some futuristic collegiate brain is really for the birds. And the 160 minute monologue that goes with it is really inspiring.

Shots of endowment museums on college campuses from New Haven to Berkeley really are a tribute to the stone masons involved rather than the educational excellence of the universities.

It goes without saying that the NCAA has a tough road to hoe in the first place. The commercials attempt to tell us about the focus on learning that is rampant throughout the land and then we watch a football game in which less than twenty percent of the players will ever receive a college degree. We used to count the "you knows" when these same athletes were interviewed on the sidelines, but we'd guess even the commentators knew how deadly that exercise was, so now they harass the coach who is thirty points down at the half and ask how he's going to turn the game around.

A just thought of another one that bears mention. "The Tylenol Scare." We are not in any way ignoring the fact that several persons died because some nut replaced the chemicals used in Tylenol with deadly cyanide. We are concerned that the press chose to expand the story from an incident in a Chicago suburb to one of national significance. Those individuals who died rivaled the attention given the hoodlums killed in the St. Valentine's Day massacre during Prohibition.

This is in the face of the fact that thousands of people are killed every year by the drunks on our highways. These deaths have to be spectacularly gruesome to reach the front page of the television news. But a national hysteria was promoted by the press in the Tylenol incident. And every look looking for a little publicity got into the act.

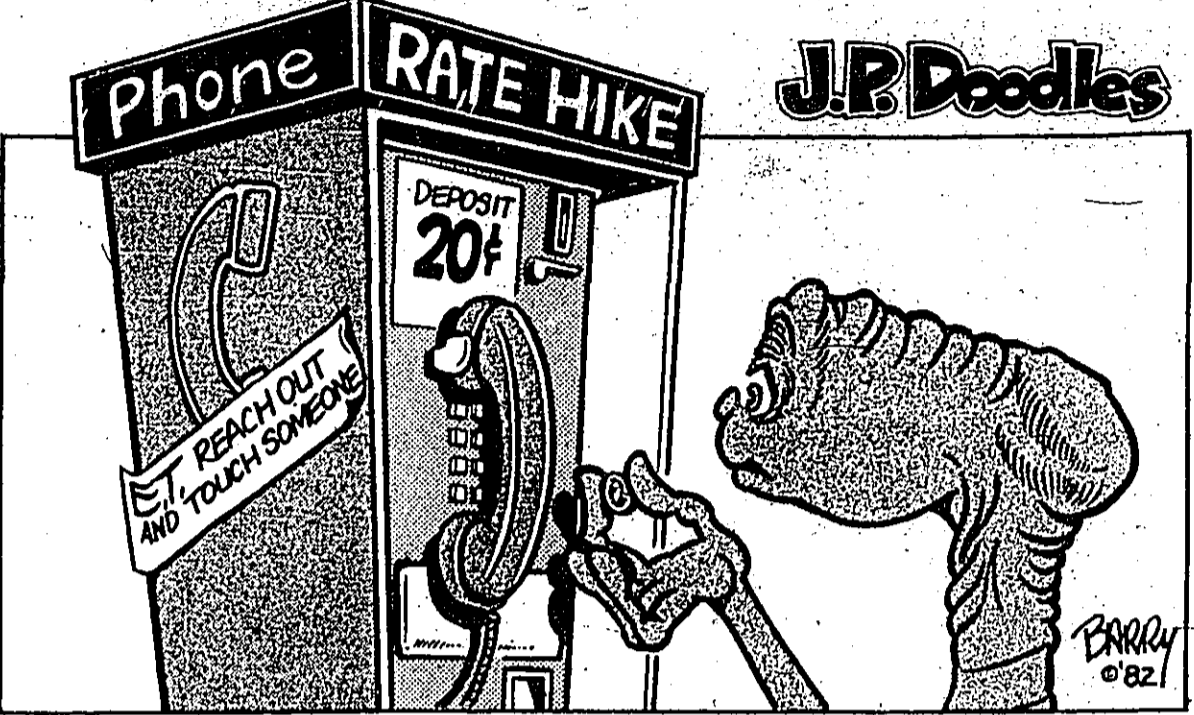
The ratings war on television and the circulation gains demanded by newspaper publishers add to the pressures put on the nation's news gatherers whether they will admit it or not. Very little is put in any kind of historical perspective if it will generate additional ad dollars.

So the politicians, the NCAA, NASA and the newsheds on television all know where their bread is buttered.

And as long as millions of dollars are available to promote their wares, we're stuck with what we see.

All Dan Rather needed to make it work was to make sure he wore a sweater on the evening news. Kind of strange isn't it? Jimmy Carter was almost laughed out the White House for doing the same thing.

Report From Senator Blake

AUSTIN — The 72,300 mile state highway system is rapidly falling into a state of disrepair. The term "highway" includes, in this context, any public road or thoroughfare (including bridges, culverts and other necessary structures appertaining thereto) constituting a part of the designated state highway system.

The system carries about 71% of all traffic in the state. It is composed of 27,400 miles of U.S. and State highways that carry 36% of the traffic; 3,200 miles of Interstate highways that carry 23% of the traffic; 41,600 miles of Farm-to-Market roads that carry 10% of the traffic; and nearly 100 miles of recreational roads.

There is not one segment of the highway system that has not deteriorated. The causes of the degeneration are heavy traffic and a shortage of funds to keep our highways maintained. Our growing population has increased automobile and light truck traffic, and our prospering state economy has increased the traffic of heavy trucks. Our highways could be compared to leaky roofs. Once they begin to wear through the pavement and water begins to leak through the base, they rapidly disintegrate.

More money is not the only answer to every problem state government, but it is the only answer to our highway problem.

We live in a highly mobilized society which in 1980 was composed of 14.3 million Texans. It is estimated that our population will have grown to 22 million by the year 2000.

The transportation function of state government, of which the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is the chief component, receives the third largest share of the state budget. During the 1982-83 biennium, about \$3.2 billion was earmarked for the transportation function. This represents 12% of the budget.

The State Highway Fund is the dominant source of revenue for the Highway Department. Two sources of revenue generate 86% of the Fund's total. Motor fuel taxes will produce \$346 million in the 1982-83 biennium while motor vehicle registration fees will produce \$284 million.

During the last few years, the budget of the Highway Department has been indexed to inflation and has been supplemented by appropriations from General Revenue. The idea behind indexing is fine, but it does not account for increased traffic.

While, under ordinary circumstances, increased traffic would result in greater motor fuel tax revenues, the introduction of smaller and more fuel efficient automobiles has caused a decline in the yield of the tax. Until motor vehicle registration fees were increased, the revenues generated by registration fees were also threatened because of the sale of lighter weight cars and trucks.

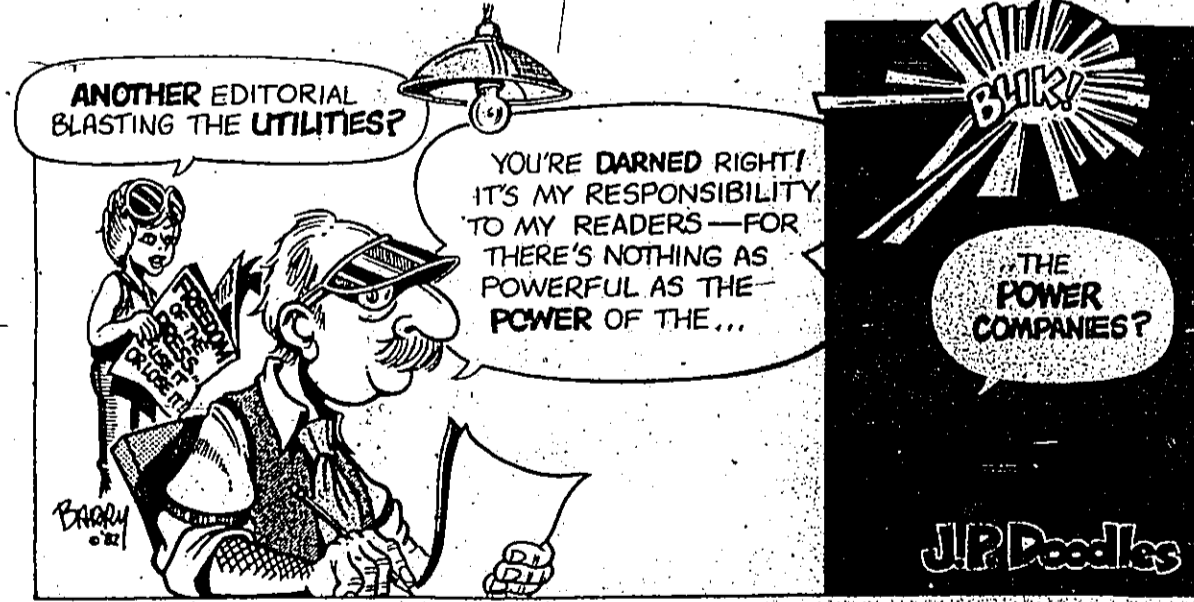

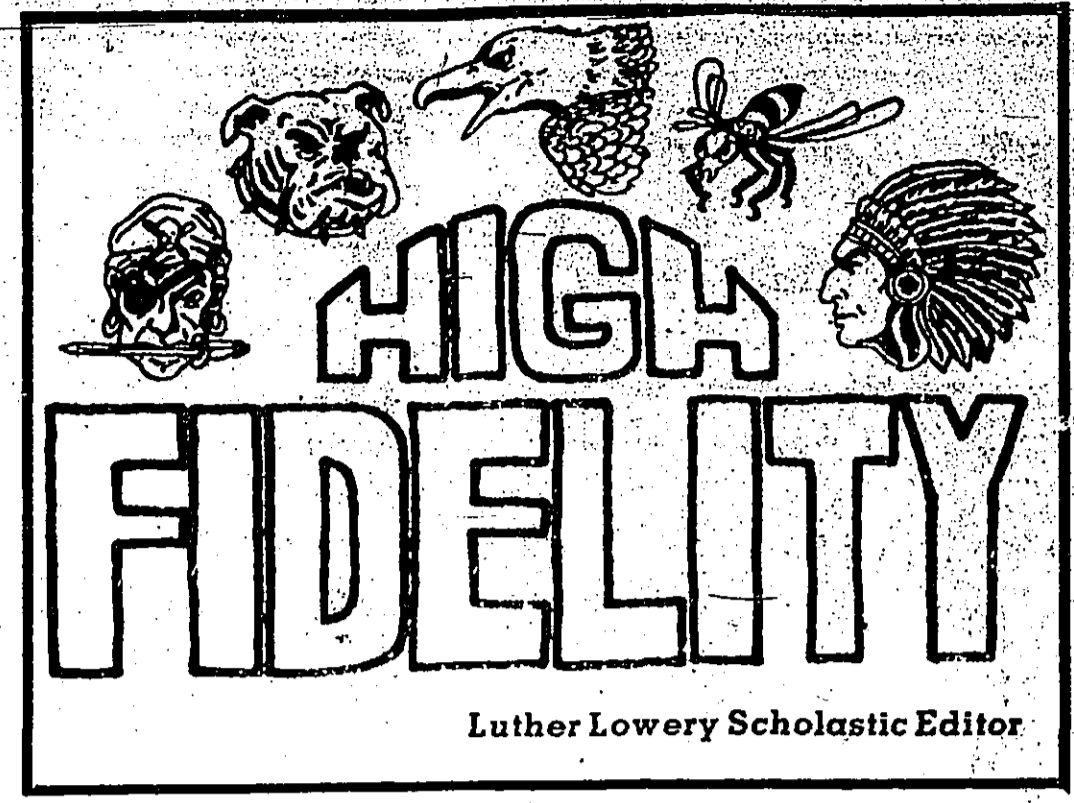

'The Word Of God Is Faith'

Sermon By Rev. Joe Sheldon

Today we have two stories about faith in the Bible. The first story is a story about faith in life's crisis situation. The disciples were in the boat with Jesus crossing the lake when a storm came up that threatened their safety. They had faith in that they went to Jesus and complained that He was still sleeping. He calmed the storm and asked about their real faith. Didn't they really believe that He would protect and care for them? That is faith in the crisis—we all have that. Jesus wants more. He wants trust that He will take care of us. The second story is about another crisis—danger, evil and evil forces. Here we have an insane man who could not be restrained even with chains. He lived in the graveyard and constantly frightened people with his shouts and screams. Here is hopelessness at the heights. Yet, he ran to Jesus while the demons were shouting "What do you have to do with us Jesus, son of the Most High?" Jesus commanded the evil spirits to come out of the man. They began to plead with Jesus to let them go into the sea and were drowned.

The twentieth-century really doesn't believe in demons. Ghosts are about why—it was good to change Holy Ghost to Holy Spirit, so people wouldn't believe that they were in a holy fairy tale. Yet, the Catholic faith has consistently held that there is evil that must be renounced and fought against. In Baptism we renounce these evils. The old prayer book asked us to renounce "the flesh, and the devil, and the world." Today we ask "Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of the world which corrupt and destroy the creature of God?" In Baptism we turn our backs on evil and our faces toward God. That is what the demon was doing when he ran to Jesus. He was turning his face toward Jesus and in doing so

AUSTIN — In November of 1978, the Legislature of Texas approved the "Tax Relief Amendment" to the State Constitution. The Amendment was designed to exempt a portion of the value of residence homesteads from property taxation and to exempt an additional portion of the value of homesteads of persons 65 or over who were disabled. The Amendment also permitted open space land devoted to agriculture or timber production to be taxed on productive value rather than real value. In 1979, the Peveco Bill, named for its author, Representative Wayne

Peveco of Orange, was passed by the Legislature. In addition to making the provisions of the Tax Relief Amendment into general law, it went a step further and mandated that a single appraisal district be created in each county of the state to appraise all of the property in each county. Those who supported the concept argued that a property in any given county of the state likely had as many different values as tax rolls on which it appeared. They also contended that, in having all property appraised in a county by a single appraiser who used the same scale to measure each

of them, a situation would be created which would be fair and equitable to every property owner. The Appraisal Districts would have the authority to send tax statements, collect taxes and collect delinquent taxes if the taxing authorities in the counties wanted them to. This would allow the various entities to close their own tax offices, and the combined savings to be gained by using fewer employees, rents and supplies would more than pay for the costs of operating the Central Appraisal Districts. I didn't support the Peveco Bill and

in fact, I voted against it. In the first place, I viewed my philosophy as one which was put on the table, and I don't believe that state officials should dictate things for themselves if they wanted to. In the second place, the mandate was an expensive one, and no appreciable state funds were sent to cover the cost of setting up and staffing the Appraisal Districts during the interim period prior to actual operation. I didn't support the

Peveco Bill. I have supported efforts to "clean it up." When it became obvious that some districts would not be able to deliver a tax roll this year, I supported legislation that would allow local officials to postpone implementing the new values, but it appears that quite a few should have been aware of what could happen and to encourage them to watch the budgets adopted by the entities of local government which levy taxes on the property. 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The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN — Many Texans have bought goods and services like magazines, kitchenware, children's photos, and insurance as a result of a telephone call from a salesperson. Here's how they work. The phone are straightforward enough to say they are selling something. However, some telephone sales people are not so direct. Many use unscrupulous sales tactics calculated to trick consumers into making a purchase immediately, or into listening to a sales pitch in his home. Two favorite tactics of telephone salespeople are the "free gift" and "you've won a contest." These are used to sell everything from magazines to baby equipment, from encyclopedias to pots

and pans. Here's how they work. The consumer is told that he or she has been selected to receive a free gift, or that if they answer a quiz question, they win a prize. (The question is usually no more difficult than "Who's buried in Grant's tomb?") Or, a free gift, like a camera, may be offered. The free gift or prize almost always has strings attached. For instance, these three magazines will come to you free for three years. All you have to pay is 25 cents a week for each magazine for the three years. This covers the handling and postage. Now 26 cents a week for a magazine doesn't sound like much, but it is approximately \$117 for three years. On top of this the company will probably place a finance charge which they won't tell you about over the phone. Similar practices are used to sell sets of encyclopedias. They may be "free" if you buy an annual supplement costing several hundred dollars. To avoid the hassle of telephone sales pitches our attorneys suggest that you follow these guidelines:

—Never agree to buy a product or to have a salesperson come to your house during the first call. Tell the person you will call back. This will give you a chance to consider the offer.
—If you are told on the phone that you have won a prize in a contest, ask if you will be obligated to listen to a sales pitch for a product or service. Many times, to accept a "prize" is to leave yourself open to an intense, high pressure sales pitch.
—Find out the conditions of getting the free gift. The gift is usually free only if you buy something. Often you will be overcharged. Tell the caller you wish to shop around to determine how the price you must pay in order to get the gift compares with the item you wish to buy.

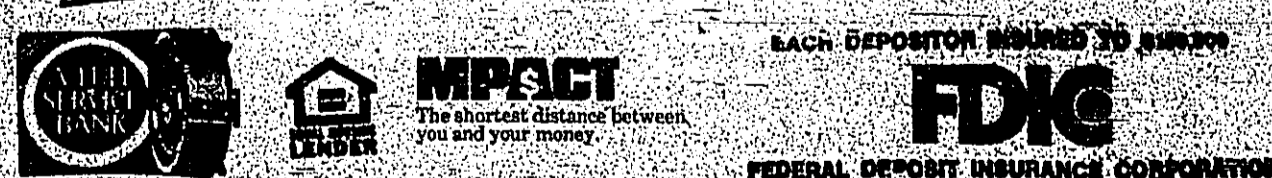

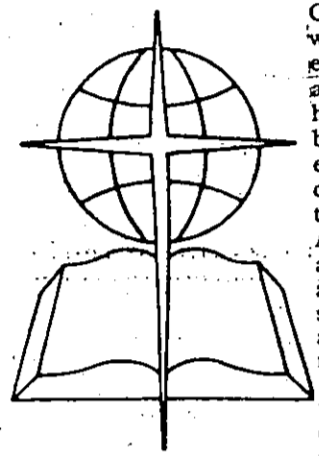

The First Baptist Church of Colmesneil was organized by Rev. Arnold Rhodes, as a result of a revival held under a brush arbor, near a branch in east Colmesneil. The church was accepted in the New Bethel Baptist Association at the 1883 annual meeting, held at Mr. Zion W. R. Blackshear was the pastor and there were fourteen members.

A small, one room frame building was built on a clay hill on the east side of town. This building served the people's needs until 1947 when

all of the church's activities were held in the Colmesneil High School Auditorium. A new building was completed in 1948, located on the west side of town. In 1951 an educational building was built to meet the needs of the growing church and a parsonage was completed in 1962.

For many years the church met only one time each month and remained so weak that for a number of years no report was sent in to the association. By 1929 sufficient strength and interest had been gained

for services to be held twice a month. Full-time services became a reality in 1947.

Several outstanding revivals have been experienced by this church. One was in 1948 when fifty-seven persons united with the church; forty-nine by baptism,

seven by letter and one by statement. The church has 459 members today, has all of the program organizations, averages 134 each week in Sunday School attendance and gives thirty-three and one half percent of its tithes and offerings to missions. The Cooperative Pro-

gram receives twenty-five percent of all undesignated gifts and four percent is given to associational missions. Total mission gifts in 1980 amounted to \$30,845.

James Richard Best has been pastor of the church since May 1, 1978 and serves as the associational Sunday School Director.

Shortly after Rev. James Best assumed his duties as pastor in 1978, he asked each member to write out his or her vision for the church. J.R. Dean wrote

"to see us build a completely new sanctuary building with a seat for every member... modern nursery facilities... every member visited and active."

Dean says, "It was a real honor when I was appointed chairman of the building committee in 1981 for my dream." His day, J.E. Dean, was the building committee chairman for the sanctuary built in 1948.

Seven months of sacrificial working together culminates in the new facilities to house staff offices, nursery facilities and the sanctuary being dedicated Sunday, Nov. 28

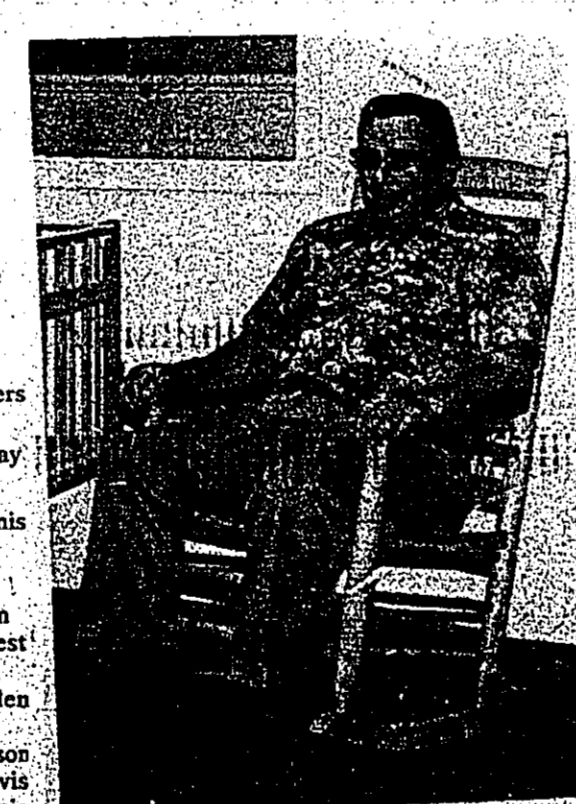
