Hryhorchuk reported that the gymnasium floor at the High School and the ceiling in the Resource Center at the Junior High were in need of repair. Ramps and restroom facilities for students in wheelchairs also need to be built. The Warren Elementary School needs to have the ceilings

Alan Miller's T-WHEELER

We usually try to avoid any personal comment on this country's defense strategy, but somehow things seem to be getting out of hand.

Sure, there are more generals and admirals gnawing on this problem than were at sea or fighting the battles of World War Two. But somehow all this weight of brass doesn't seem to be coming up with any decisions that don't indicate we need the firepower necessary to blow everyone on this earth to Kingdom Come.

The MX missile is a case in point. Apparently we feel that the existing missiles that are in silos in the Dakotas, Montana and elsewhere are too vulnerable to attack. The MX is to be the replacement. But how do we hide it from the Russians? We've considered running it around a railroad system in Utah, basing it on submarines, carrying it aloft in big bombers. Hitting a missile or two on conventional freight trains. All kinds of ideas. Now a hard stand fourteen miles long on an air base outside Cheyenne, Wyoming.

We apparently assume the Russians know where that SAC base is out there, and if they can find a downed private aircraft in West Virginia with their satellites, let's give them the benefit of the doubt.

What troubles us is, why are we concerned that we have a "second strike" capability in case the Russians unleash millions of tons of hydrogen bombs on our heads? Will there be anything on this earth that will survive such onslaught? Probably not.

There really seems to be only one answer to this whole dilemma. Despite all the gold braids in the Pentagon and the Kremlin that make our games they play, this earth as we know it cannot recover from an all-out nuclear war. And those people know it.

The post office can send out their silly pamphlets telling us how they're going to keep delivering the mail after New York City is wiped out by Russian bombs. And the Civil Defense people can spell out how two million people can be moved from Houston to East Texas in case of nuclear attack. All of these are silly games played with paper, people and computer graphics. A big "worst scenario" chess game signifying nothing.

Don't assume from this that the T-Wheeler has turned into a pacifist. Far from it. We have let our conventional arm forces deteriorate to such a point that we couldn't look a guerrilla attack in the eye anywhere in the Western Hemisphere without blinking. And those same guerrillas know we aren't about to send any Minieman missiles their way either.

We felt so much guilt after World War Two with the "colonialism" label the Russians painted on us that we couldn't resist the temptation to cut loose all those Western possessions and protectorates that depended on us for their economic stability, and we on them for our strategic outreach.

"Nations" cropped up all over the globe. Unable to stand alone, and easy prey for Communist domination. We assumed more "nuclear" bombs would keep the Russians at bay. It hasn't and it won't. But we keep building them anyway. John Foster Dulles, Eisenhower's right hand man, called it "more bang for the buck" and the last time the Russians blinked was at the Bay of Pigs twenty years ago.

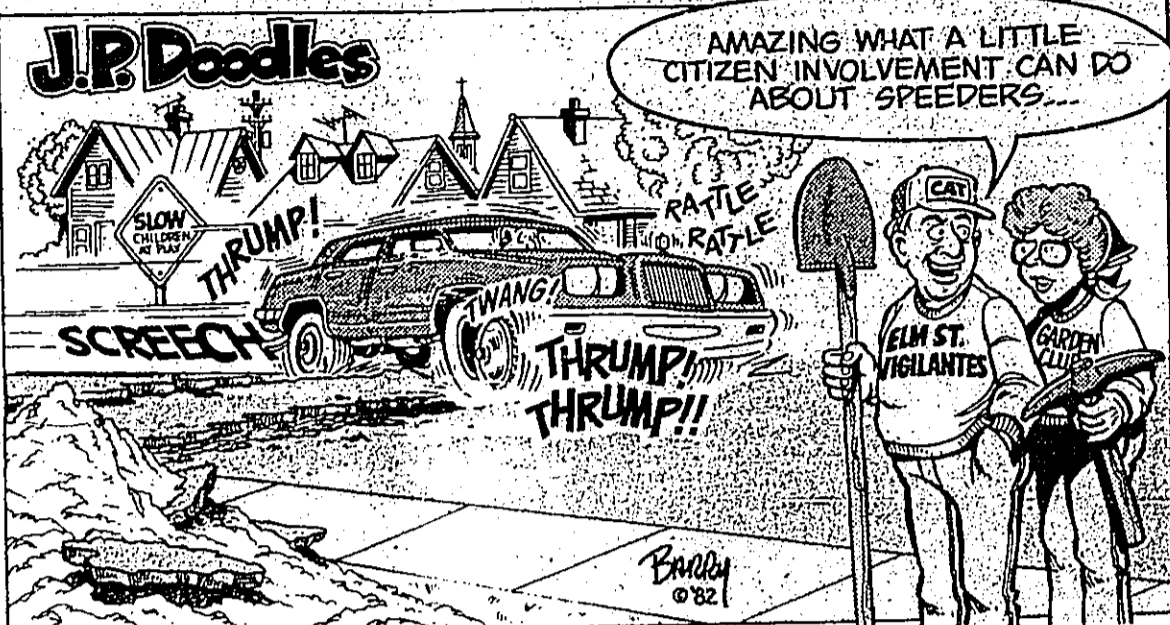
We have a hunch that our generals and their Russian counterparts are stuck to a tarbaby they can't turn loose. They just don't feel they can back away and say "no more nuclear bombs." Let's disarm the ones we've got. There will always be a "diplomatic real estate" that we will argue about, but both of us know that an all-out nuclear war isn't going to resolve anything except our total destruction.

Sounds too simple doesn't it? Too many people feel a nuclear freeze or no more nuclear weapons at all means peace in the world. That's not true. Conventional forces will still be needed to inhibit any overt rashness in horn dictators and religious fanatics will still be keeping the world in a turmoil as they always have.

But anything should be obvious to the beribboned brass that make our defense decisions it is that it's time to get off the nuclear dominance theory that has been their fixed focus for too long. That decision would put our achievable goals in a realistic posture and eliminate the hogwash of a "second strike" capability.

The best we can hope for is that the whole conversation about the MX missile is nothing more than a diplomatic conversation piece to get us talking with the Russians about a general nuclear disarmament. A poker chip as you will to let each of us save a little face while we move to eliminate our nuclear arsenal.

Of course the ego trip could continue. Who can build bigger more powerful smarter bombs? Could life on this earth start all over again from a tunnel at NORAD headquarters in the Rocky Mountains? A scenario such as that wouldn't even make a suitable plot for an afternoon soap on television. And some of them are pretty far out.

According to preliminary figures from the Texas Department of Water Resources (see grants) Jasper County and Angelina County are facing this transition within the decade of the 1980's.

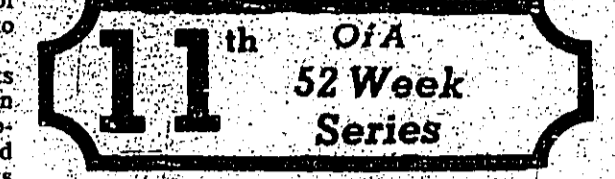

## Beware Of 'Bait And Switch'

AUSTIN—Unless a home-owner has a knowledge of textiles, or knows just where to go for expert advice, it can be extremely difficult to know how to purchase carpeting. You may have formed some basic ideas about hue or color, and may know whether you want shag or shered type of carpeting.

You may start watching carpet ads, and confusion can set in. Similar carpeting may be advertised at very different prices. Check to see if the listed price is for the carpeting only, or whether it includes cost of installation, a substantial item. And, does the installation estimate also include the price of padding to put under the carpet?

This sort of variation in pricing is not necessarily an indication of misrepresentation of total cost. Since some flooring firms contract out their installation work, so their only interest is in showing you the actual carpet cost. Others include it in a package. The usual guide to carpeting cost is in terms of dollars per square yard. And while some volume sellers market carpet by the linear foot, for the do-it-yourselfer, most flooring

specialists consider the per-square-yard estimate the best indication of expense. If you run across an offer of carpeting quoted by the cost per square foot, beware. This can be misleading. The same is true for advertising which boasts that you can have "three rooms carpeted for as little as \$X."

Obviously, it would be impossible to save three rooms containing a total of 90 square yards, for the same price as another three rooms containing a total of only 60 square yards.

According to complaints which have been received by the Consumer Protection Division, this sort of advertising has been used as a come-on for what is known as "bait and switch."

That means that after a consumer goes to see goods boasted at a special price, the salesman disparages the quality of the material, and tries to talk the person into accepting another grade of merchandise instead of the one advertised. "Bait and switch" is one of the deceptive trade practices which is prohibited under the Deceptive Trade-Consumer Protection Act.

### Invest In Employment Agencies With Caution

AUSTIN—The idea of making a lavish salary in an exotic locale by working abroad for a United States company can bring stars to the eyes of job seekers. The foreign exchange rates of U.S. dollars and new federal tax laws may make such a plan look like good economics, too.

There are employment agencies, counseling services and resume preparation firms which offer advice and help in applying for such jobs. Before you invest in these services, you should become well informed about the foreign employment market.

Beware of glowing promises about an untapped or hidden job market. Many companies are required by the law of the country in which they conduct business to keep their U.S. national employees at or under a fixed percentage in order to retain most of the jobs for the nationals of the host country. Other businesses enforce the same corporate policy themselves in order to retain a well-received corporate guest.

Many governments also require the hiring company to prove that the skills required for the position to be filled by a U.S. citizen are not available among the population of the host country.

According to a survey conducted by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, employees rarely receive a foreign assignment right after joining a company. Businesses with international operations usually select persons with proven track records of work experience from within the ranks of their own firms to transfer to foreign offices. Employees do not want to invest money for transportation, training, overseas pay and maintenance of the employee and his or her family in an unknown quantity.

The placement areas that were most often mentioned in the Chamber of Commerce's survey as being needed abroad were jobs involving management, engineering and marketing skills.

One factor that is sparking

the current interest in overseas employment is recent changes in the federal income tax law. A larger share of an employee's income from overseas work now can be excluded from federal taxation. Coupled with an increased housing exemption, the tax changes may reduce the cost to employers of maintaining a foreign-based employee. However, a U.S. citizen working abroad may have to pay income tax in the host country which may be as high or higher than the U.S. tax.

Employees working abroad for the U.S. government are hired through the civil service examination system. Applicants compete with people already employed by the U.S. government and with U.S. nationals residing in foreign areas.

Be sure to check references of any agency which offers to help find a job overseas by contacting the companies with whom the agency claims to have placed applicants, or if possible, the employees and McAllen.

Before signing a contract, note terms that may void the agency's obligation. Consult your attorney which are failure by the client to remain in contact with the counseling agency. Note too whether the fees will be charged for services such as applying for visas, changing your resume, or changing your services.

As with any kind of service contract, make sure you and the company have a clear understanding in writing of exactly what services are to be performed. Will the firm charge you for development of a resume only, or guarantee you interviews? Will their services terminate after a certain number of resumes have been distributed? Do they guarantee employment? If you have complaints about the services rendered by an employment counseling firm, contact our Consumer Protection Division office in Austin, Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Lubbock, El Paso and McAllen.

### The Speaker Reports

### CAPITOL UPDATE

U.S. SENATOR FOR TEXAS JOHN TOWER

One of the recent public debates on whether and how to reform the income tax system has come a great deal about this proposal in the House of Representatives. I would like to take a moment to discuss some of the issues involved in this proposal.

The flat-rate tax would be a simple and fair way to reform the income tax system. It would eliminate the complexity and confusion of the current system. It would also provide a significant source of revenue for the state. The flat-rate tax would be a major step towards a more equitable and efficient tax system.

However, there are many who oppose the flat-rate tax. They argue that it would be unfair to those who are currently in the lower income brackets. They also argue that it would be a major step towards a more progressive tax system. I believe that the flat-rate tax is a fair and reasonable proposal. It would provide a significant source of revenue for the state and would be a major step towards a more equitable and efficient tax system.

Some proposals would keep some of the deductions most frequently used by middle-income Americans, or even create two or three different tax brackets so that those with higher incomes would continue to pay a greater percentage of their income in taxes.

But if we decide to keep some deductions and eliminate others, more questions need to be asked. Your letters to me indicate that an increased number of Texans are interested in the concept of the flat-rate tax, but that opinion is about evenly divided on its merits. Nor is there a consensus among either Democrats or Republicans. The Senate Finance Committee will begin hearings on the subject Sept. 27. It will follow the testimony with great interest, because I believe it will be most helpful in illuminating the advantages and disadvantages of the flat-rate tax. No major revision of our tax code should be made hastily, without full consideration of all the ramifications.

AUSTIN — Over one-third of adult Texans never finished high school, and a great percentage of this number never finished elementary school. To add to these statistics, some 65,000 students drop out of public schools each year.

It is depressing to me to know that so many Texans, for whatever reason, have not received the maximum free schooling we provide our youth. In this day of sophisticated technology, it is more necessary for adult citizens to have basic academic skills than ever.

To help with the problem, Texas has a program of free adult education that is available to those who have a desire to improve their learning skills. Last year, 154,920 undereducated Texans participated in this program. The statewide cost per adult student was \$89.52, which is infinitely less than the cost per student in public schools.

The vast majority of these adults who attend the program are really serious about getting an education. There are no discipline problems. The program offers a great deal of hope for adults who realize their own inadequacies and who want to do something about them. The training has helped many of the unemployed to find jobs. Many of those who are employed have been able to get better jobs with better salaries. Others have become qualified to enter "skill training" which results in better jobs.

Some become qualified to enter college upon satisfactory completion of the training program and passing the G.E.D. examination. After passing the examination, many become qualified and enter the armed forces.

A great benefit is not only derived by those who participate but also by other members of society as well. Society as a whole always benefits when people become employed and get off welfare, food stamps and other social programs.

The adult education program has helped many participants to do just that. The program also helps adults become better parents, which in turn helps slow the growth of second and third generation welfare recipients.

There are 48 Adult Education Cooperatives in the state which administer the program, and they have all achieved amazing success. We are currently spending only two-tenths of

budget on adult education, and this probably needs to be increased. For many years, most of us have assumed that with the provision of public schools, junior colleges, senior colleges and universities, the educational needs of citizens of our state have been met.

As evidenced by the large numbers of participants in the Adult Education Program, this is far from the truth. We are not devoting enough of our available resources to adequately serve

the needs of our citizens. The adult education program has helped many participants to do just that. The program also helps adults become better parents, which in turn helps slow the growth of second and third generation welfare recipients.

However, some careful merchants do strive to make their prices as low as possible. They do this by purchasing goods in large quantities, by negotiating with suppliers, and by offering discounts to their customers. These merchants are the ones who truly offer "guaranteed lowest in town" prices.

Consumers should be aware of these sales and should not be misled by them. They should always compare prices and should not be swayed by the "special early bird" or "emergency" sales. They should always remember that the best price is the one that is truly the lowest.

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Washington has become the center of activity for hundreds of special interest groups, each trying to safeguard its share of dwindling federal dollars.

It is understandable that lobbyists are gathering to protect their programs. However, on the issue of reducing government spending, sensible congressmen place national interests above the needs of any one interest group.

Depending on how you define the term, there are some 10,000 lobbyists who frequent the corridors of Capitol Hill. Some argue that cutting spending programs would be a mistake. Others tell congressmen that federal spending cuts are needed immediately. I'm determined to reduce spending fairly, no matter what the lobbyists say.

An elected official's responsibility is to represent the interests of the people. There are some 4,000 representatives of about 1,600 trade and professional organizations, 1,250 representatives of various corporations, and like numbers speaking on behalf of minorities, social welfare agencies, women, environmentalists, senior citizens, religious groups and a variety of other interests.

These single-issue or special interest groups amass millions of dollars annually using sophisticated, direct mail fund-raising techniques.

They admit to wielding their influence by demanding, not compromising, to survive and achieve their goals. They tell elected officials "we don't care about your overall voting record, the only thing that counts is how you vote on this issue."

What's disturbing about this outlook is that fewer Americans are defining themselves in broad and traditional categories. More and more are flocking to groups that exist for only one purpose. Not so many people see themselves as only as Republicans or Democrats, liberals or conservatives, internationalists or isolationists.

Sometimes it seems we may reach a time when environmentalists will speak only to environmentalists, businessmen only to businessmen, minorities only to minorities and on down the line. This is troubling because, after all, the success of our two-party system depends on our ability to forge the diverse elements of American society into two—rather than dozens—of opposing voices.

Unlike Europe, where governments are often deadlocked by unbending splinter parties, America's two-party system has operated on the tradition of bargain and compromise, successfully uniting special interests.

But the atmosphere of public debate has become so fragmented that it is becoming more and more difficult to determine the will of the majority while protecting the rights of smaller groups.

The clamoring of special interests seems to be weakening the bonds that hold us together as a nation.


It's time for us to revitalize our unity and sense of purpose as Americans. Daniel Webster could not have said it more concisely: "One country, one constitution, one destiny."
