Painful Proud

Nine-year-old Jacob Jerome Mitchell is proud. But, the Doucette youngster couldn't hold his tears back Friday when he saw his dad and Woodville Volunteer firemen fighting desperately to save his one story frame house where he lives with his mother and father and seven brothers and sisters.

Jacob walked over the little hill in front of the house with his windbreaker jacket tied around his waist like most school kids do on balmy afternoons here. He had his books. School was out for Christmas vacation.

He kind of had to weave his way to the house stepping over hoses. People were running every which way. The firetrucks had just run out of water and they had to wait for more to be brought in.

Jacob stopped when he saw his home in flames, looked at his mom and said, "Where's daddy?"

Jacob's mom was holding her two twin daughters with the other kids standing around her and through her tears she guided her son's look toward the side of the house where Daniel Mitchell was dragging tools and a lawnmower and anything he could get from under the house. Everything else was too hot. The smoke could be seen billowing up from the south side of Woodville.

After looking at his mom, then at the house, Jacob couldn't hold it in any more. "You mean the presents too, Oh bid!"

A single tear revealed itself on his cheek. He was still holding on. Then it came. The boy flooded.

Jacob angrily slammed his books in the ground, turned his back on everything and started to walk away. Then he stopped and looked back toward the house and stuck his hands straightened into his pockets. His lips were pursed.

A friendly neighborhood dog came up and began to brush gently against Jacob's leg. He reached down and touched him.

Jacob seemed OK now. It looked as if he had regained his pride. It took about two minutes.

Only his Mother saw him this way. His dad, a Gulf States Utilities employee said, "Every darn thing I have is in that house."

New Phone Code Soon Jacob's Christmas Wish

Plans remain on schedule for the establishment of a new area code in Woodville according to Gene Thacker, community relations manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

The new area code, 409, will serve some 180 cities throughout East and Southeast Texas, beginning March 19, 1983. The 409 number, which will replace the current 713 area code here, was unveiled by Southwestern Bell officials last January.

Thacker said record growth, especially in the Houston metropolitan area, has created the need for the splitting of the existing 713 area code. Telephone company forecasts indicate that all numbers in the 713 code will be exhausted during 1983.

The new boundaries call for Houston, and some surrounding communities to remain in the 713 area code. All other cities in the existing 713 area code will move to the new 409 territory.

Thacker said the decision to change the area code to cities outside Houston was based on population, as well as volume of telephone numbers to be converted. While some 500,000 numbers will be changed to the new 409 area code, some 2 million customers will remain in 713.

Local telephone numbers, as well as long distance rates will not be affected by the conversion.

In order to ensure that telephone customers in the new 409 area code receive their calls after next year's change, Southwestern Bell has arranged for the automatic transfer of calls.

According to Thacker, a caller dialing 713, followed by a number located in the new 409 area code, will be automatically transferred to the 409 number for ninety days after the conversion. After the ninety-day period, a recorded announcement will instruct the caller to dial the new 409 number.

Thacker said the company announced the new area code last January to give customers time to plan for the change. He said the company wanted to give business customers an opportunity to prepare for the new number on stationery, business cards and advertising in 1983.

In addition, a telephone bill insert sent last February advised residential customers to notify friends and relatives of the new area code number.

Thacker said the company will use upcoming bill inserts to advise customers of the new 409 number.

For brother Sammy, who is 13, "I'd wish for him a gun that doesn't kick! Maybe a pellet gun... perfect for a 13 year old. What do you think?"

Jacob went on with his Santa Claus wish list for the rest of his brothers and sisters asking that for 6-year-old Mar, that he receive a "Big Wheel." He was told earlier in the week that one of the two special presents in the house was a "Big Wheel." He may never find out.

And, for the two-year-old twin girls, Amanda and Cassandra, Jacob said that what he would wish for them was... just to have their tricycles replaced. They don't have to be new... just something for them to ride around on.

For his Mom, he would wish for a new dress. And, for his hard-working Dad he would wish for him a brand new table with eight chairs.

Donations of food are already on the way, but there will be more needed later.

All of Jacob's wishes seem reasonable for a nine-year-old. All he really wanted for himself and the thing he seemed most concerned about besides the warmth and closeness and love that reveals itself in this family... is his marble collection.

Jacob was told Monday that if he looked real hard in the ashes of his home that he might find some of his marbles again... crystallized by the heat of the fire and even more beautiful than before.

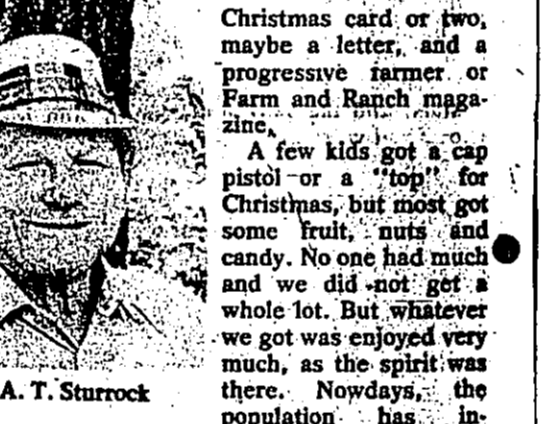


Christmas card or two, maybe a letter, and a progressive farmer or farm and ranch magazine.

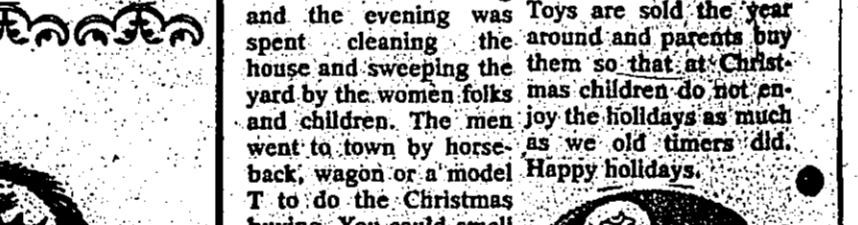

Out Of State Fishing License Requirements

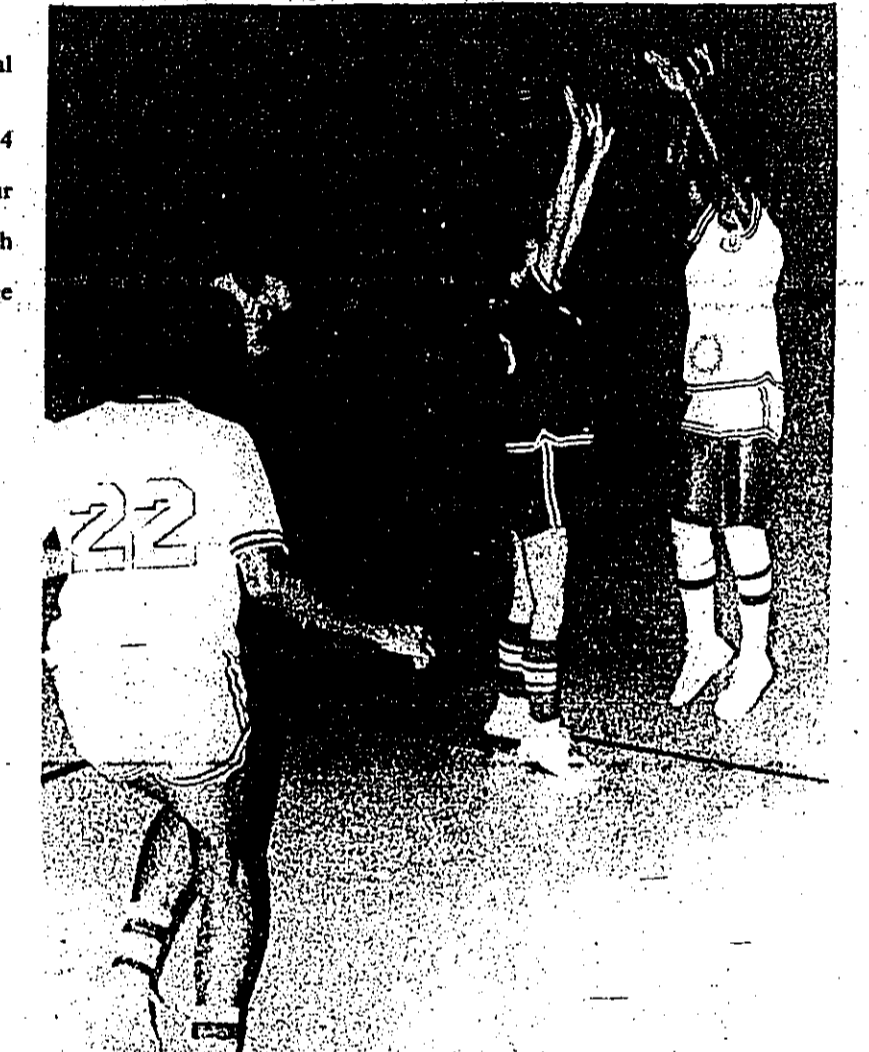

Great men have come and gone, yet He lives on. Herod could not kill Him, satan could not seduce Him, death could not destroy Him, the grave could not hold Him, and even demons obeyed Him. He fed hungry multitude with a little boy's lunch, broke up funerals, and gave back life to those that were dead.

He laid aside his purple robe for a peasant's gown. He was rich, yet for our sakes He became poor. Ask too low, poor? Ask His way, ask the wise men. He slept in another's manger, He cruised the lake in another's boat, He rode on a borrowed beast. He was buried in a rich man's tomb.

He conquered death, rose three days as Lord. He said He would ascend to Heaven, is now at the right hand of the throne of God, and will one day come in the clouds of Heaven with power and great glory for His own honor again. Blood bought one to be forever with Him according to promises; after which, He will judge the world in righteousness; when every knee shall bow to Him and every tongue shall confess Him as Lord.

It would be nice if I invited Joe to dinner. I remember how he helped me with the waiting during the drought last summer. Just a few weeks ago, he brought me a load of that good red oak firewood when my own wood supply was so low. It would be nice to ask Joe but what would the neighbors think? Old Joe with his scuffed shoes, his shock of oat-colored hair, his rough hands with the broken nails? What if my neighbors had their friends from Beaumont visiting them? What would they think?

No, it cannot be. Joe will understand and be satisfied, I'm sure. Haven't I always treated him well? As an equal, without a trace of superiority. If it weren't for me, he'd not have half as much work. I thought I was celebrating teaching us to share with those less fortunate than ourselves? Did He not give even His very life?

Crackdown on fraud

Has someone ever placed a long distance call and charged it to your phone number without your permission? Placing a call and charging it to another number is a third-number call. Charging that call without the third party's permission is fraud.

More than six million dollars was lost by Southwestern Bell in suspected fraudulent third-number long distance calls in 1981. We investigate these calls and assist law enforcement agencies in bringing cases against the individuals involved. But, just as consumers pay for shoplifters through higher costs for goods, it is the honest customers who help pay for the fraudulent call losses through higher rates.

Positive Authorization Needed Before Completing Calls

The company is now taking stronger action against fraud. We are changing the way we authorize third-number calls. Under the old system, operators placed a third-number long distance call before verifying the call with the third party.

Today, if you make such a call from a public phone, the operator will try to get authorization from the third party. Before your call is completed, the operator will call the number and ask if the charge will be accepted. This process takes about 35 seconds.

In 1983, operators may be required to get verified permission before completing long distance calls to a third number. It may take a few more seconds of inconvenience, but it means an eventual savings for customers as we tackle this multi-million dollar problem.

Changes in the Telephone Industry Begin Next Month

Beginning in January, the first of two major decisions affecting the telecommunications industry takes effect. (The second significant change—the settlement of a federal court case against AT&T—will be decided in future columns.)

On January 3, 1983, a Federal Communications Commission ruling designed to encourage competition in the telephone market place requires the establishment of a fully competitive subsidiary. 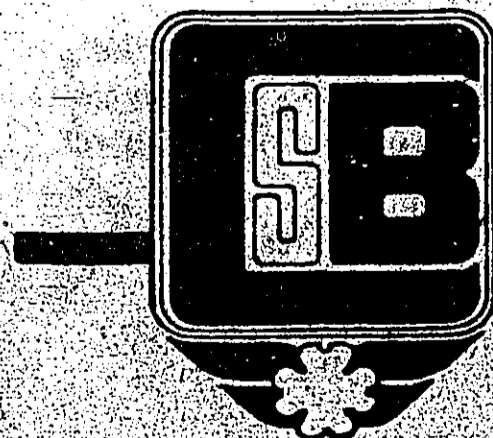
