Editorial

No Pipedream

"The Tyler County Booster" wholeheartedly endorses the proposed U.S. Army Corps of Engineers hydropower addition to Dam B. We feel this is a project whose time has come and it is a project worthy of the support of county and area groups who have a real interest in the future economic growth of Tyler County. The Deep East Texas Council of Governments A-95 committee followed by its Board of Directors should later this month take the opportunity in reviewing the merits of this project to lend their endorsement. Over the next few months we would encourage also that the Lower Neches Valley Authority continue their support for the hydropower addition and take a strong official stand to include undertaking the financial underwriting as part of the local cost, should that be necessary. Tyler Countians need to let their elected representatives in both houses of Congress know of their interest in seeing this hydropower project built.

Both Lake Rockland and Dam B Hydropower Projects are not mere "pipedreams" but should be seriously considered and discussed as a likely part of the future physical and economic landscape of Tyler County.

The \$17,882,000 hydropower plant for Dam B is in particular a very real possibility for Congressional funding and could begin construction as early as January of 1985. Inexpensive electric power could then be sold to area utilities as early as mid 1986.

Lake Rockland is also a real possibility which at the earliest would begin construction in the 1990's. The two projects are linked in that the most efficient operation of the hydropower plant at Dam B, according to the Corps Dam B Hydropower Study released April 1982, will depend on the existence and operation of the Rockland-Lake and Dam.

For the short term, the \$17,882,000 Dam-B project would be a good economic stimulus for our area economy. In the long run, the Corps of Engineers estimates the Dam B Hydropower Plant will generate \$1.41 in "benefits" for every \$1 spent in construction and maintenance costs. The hydropower plant will not effect the amount of water released from Dam B. It will merely be using the water which flows through Dam B now, unused, to generate electric power.

The Tyler County Booster pledges to its Tyler County readers to continue its comprehensive examination of the Hydropower Addition to Dam B Project as well as its continuing examination of the now "active" Lake Rockland Project of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. There are still many issues to be discussed in relation to both of these projects. It is our hope that our Rockland Series of at least 52 articles will assist in generating an intelligent and informed public discussion of the issues surrounding both.

Council Stalls Cable Request

Woodville City Councilmen, on a motion by Gordon Anderson, decided to place the American Cablevision Company on "30 days probation" postponing approval of the proposed monthly increase of \$2. During that month long period, cable TV company officials said they would attempt to resolve consumer complaints of poor service and reception here.

American Cablevision representative Bob Carter of Bryan, told Council and approximately 18 persons attending the meeting. "We are having about six service calls per week. If people are having problems they are not telling us. I'm not saying we don't have problems, but it's necessary for the people to 'call' us if they have trouble."

In other business, Council approved an increase in city gas rate charged all customers of \$1.40 per thousand cubic feet. City Secretary Walt Davis indicated that the city gas supplier, Tennessee Gas had raised the city rate January 1 by \$1.40 and the city had been unable to pay the past two months city gas bills on time from revenue generated from the Woodville city gas system.

The City received permission from the Texas Department of Water Resources, according to Davis, to bypass the South Sower Plant for one week while making repairs on that plant. Also, according to Davis, the Texas Department of Water Resources

is interested in what the City of Woodville plans to do about bringing discharges from the South Sower Plant into compliance with state water pollution standards. If Woodville does not receive the Waste Water Construction Grant the city has already applied for, Davis said this might require a city bond election to finance the estimated \$2 million cost of replacing the South Sower Plant. City Attorney Josiah Whit suggested that the city could instead apply for a grant from the State Water Assistance Fund under which the city would issue revenue bonds which the state would then buy.

City fathers postponed adoption of a Dog Control Ordinance for a month pending a workshop to determine details of the ordinance. Election of two city councilmen and filling the unexpired term of Mayor Doug Tolbert was scheduled for April 2. Councilman John Allen was reappointed to the Board of Directors of the Sherman Retirement Fund.

A resolution approving a Leadership Training Seminar for city certification sponsored by Gulf States Utility and Texas A&M University was passed. The Seminar will be held March 9 at the Woodville Inn. Placing a street light between 407 and 409 West Live Oak was approved and final estimates of painting of the city water tank was postponed a month due to failure of the bill from the company to be received.

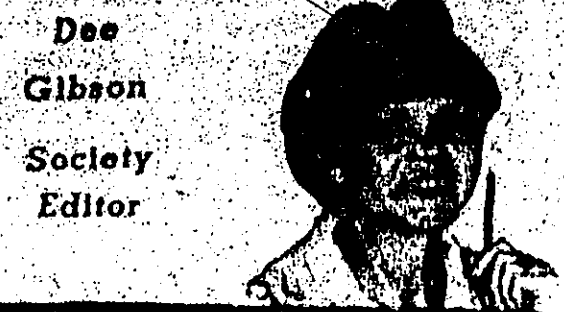

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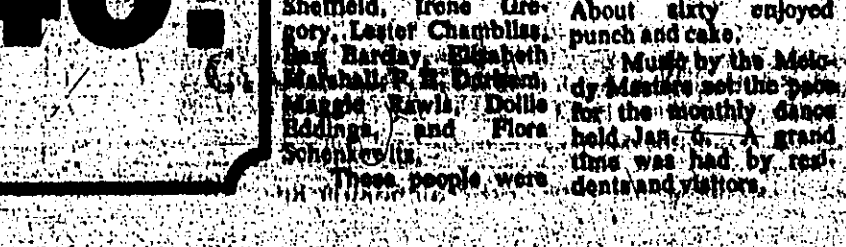
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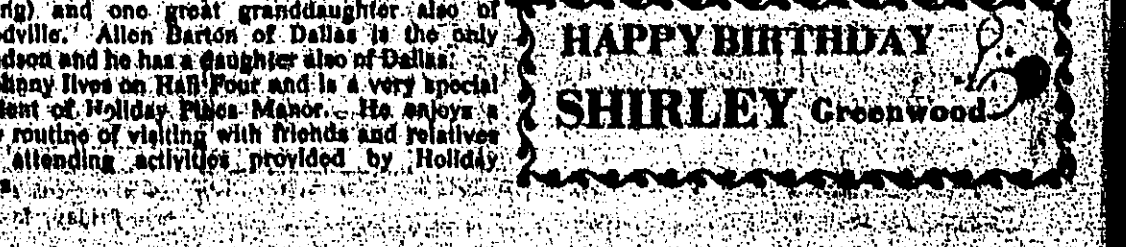

Texas politicians regarding their reputation for doing the unexpected this past week.

Phil Gramm, who rose unopposed as a Democrat for his congressional seat last November, got back to Washington, was castigated by his peers, kicked off the Budget Committee, came home, resigned and reflected as a Republican.

He was perhaps the leading bullseye championing the Reagan budget and tax measures two years ago, and despite his district's approving of his actions, the Democratic leadership in the Hill decided he wasn't playing ball and threw him off the team.

We'll have a special election on Feb. 12 to see if Gramm can win as a Republican, and we'll also have more than a few Democrats challenging him on the other side of the ballot.

If Gramm wins more than 50 per cent of the vote in February, he goes back to Washington as a Republican Congressman. If not, he's in a runoff with the leading Democrat.

That surprise that the State of Texas courts decide that the election on Feb. 12 is legal in the first place. There seems to be some question on that score.

Gramm says he was elected to "cut the budget and reduce taxes." That Democrats on the bill want to stall the tax cut and aren't paying much attention to budget cuts.

We'll have to say right here that neither the Democrats or the Republicans seem to be too committed to tax cuts or budget cuts.

But Gramm's competition looks pretty formidable from here.

By representative Dan Kubick had a shot at state-wide office the last time around, so he's got pretty good name recognition. And then there's John Henry Faulk, radio commentator, actor on Lee H. Wig, a highly quotable humorist from Madhusville and Austin. Both men say the money is coming in from all over the state and elsewhere, as Democrats are united in backing Gramm. It's only a case of which Democrat pulls enough votes to force Gramm into a runoff.

Gramm, who was on the faculty at Texas A&M before seeking federal office, probably knows his history and remembers what happened to some other folks who tried to switch parties.

Fredy Roosevelt of "Swah" softly and carry a big stick" fame formed the Bull Moose party back in 1912 because he didn't like the Republican contention Howard Taft. He was defeated by Woodrow Wilson the Democrat who later pretended to keep us out of World War I.

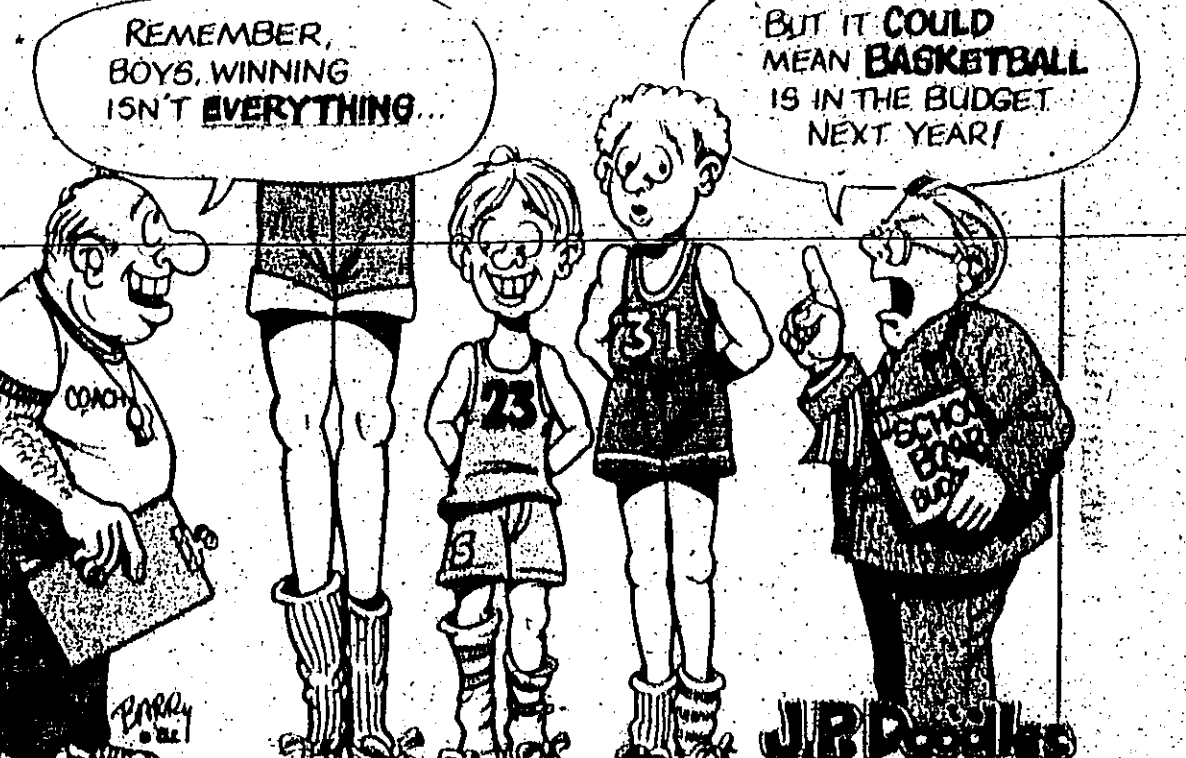

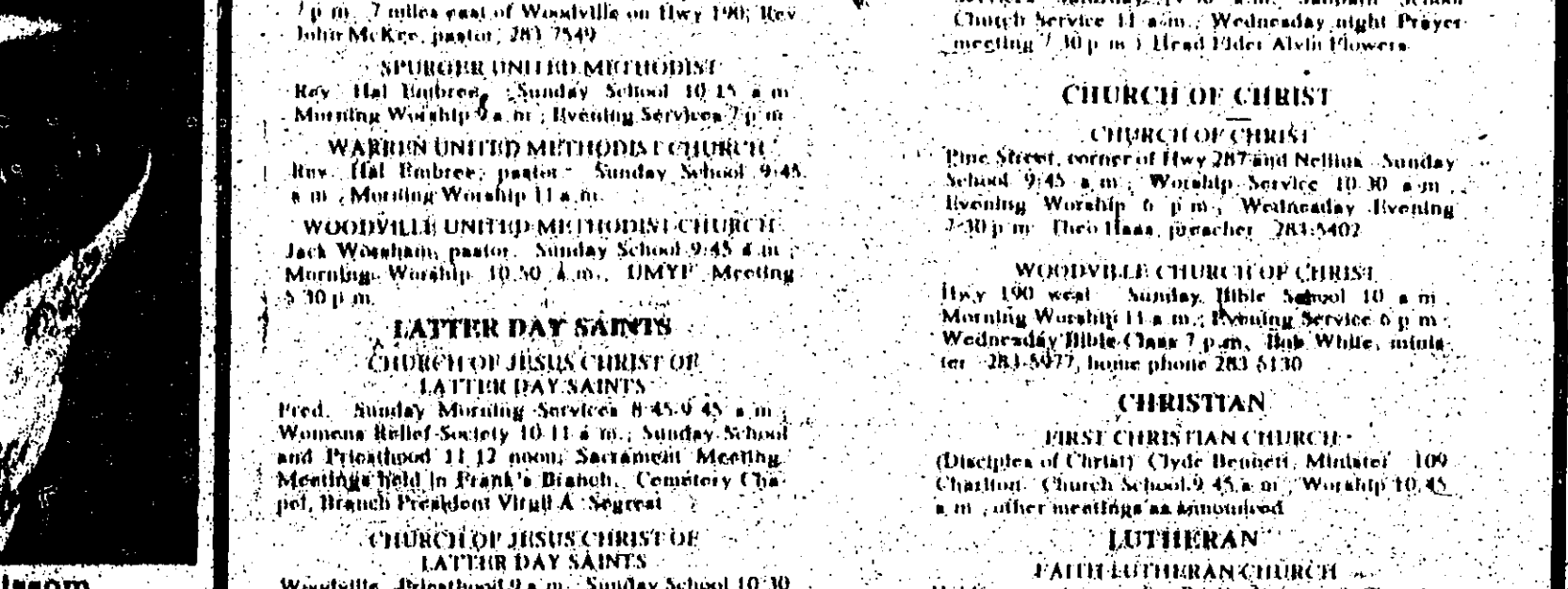

Small Business Loan Program Chartered

A corporation of public and private interests to help finance small business ventures in Deep East Texas was chartered Thursday, Jan. 13, 1983, at a formal ceremony held at the First National Bank Community Room in Jasper, Texas. Notification by the Small Business Administration's Regional Administrator, Ray Lopez, had been received by the Deep East Texas Regional Certified Development Corporation approving the recently formed corporation as a Certified Development Corporation. The certification will enable the DTRCDC to participate in the SBA's Section 8(a) loan program.

Your program starting today fosters the development of more rural employment, lower interest rates and support of small business development.

ability of a small business to tap into the long-term capital markets, the program permits an area to initiate its own economic development activities. The program is designed to attract and supplement, not supplant, private sector financing from conventional financial institutions. It is a partner-ship of the public and private sectors which provides the enthusiasm and direction necessary to make the financing work.

The CDCs identify feasible development projects and locate potential small business concerns that are in need of long-term asset financing. The CDC staff helps the small business prepare its loan application and supporting documents. These are then submitted to the local SBA office.

When the SBA approves the loan, it gives the CDC an authorization to sell the SBA debt to the Federal Financing Bank. The CDC uses this authority to secure private sector financing. The SBA guarantees cannot exceed 40 percent of the total loan proceeds or \$500,000 in any one small business. A private lending institution must agree to provide at least 50 percent of the loan proceeds and the small business itself agrees to a 10 percent interest.

The Deep East Texas Regional Certified Development Corporation has a membership comprised of elected public officials, public sector employees, attorneys, lenders, financial institutions, chambers of commerce and business organizations through the twelve county Deep East Texas Region. Low Income Eligible For Heating Help

Some low income Texas households may be eligible for help in paying their heating bills, according to the head of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Human Resources Commissioner Martin W. Johnston said the assistance with paying utility bills is available to low-income households who in January 1983 received local stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income, or need-based Veterans Administration benefits in January.

Potentially eligible veterans are those who receive payments under 38 U.S.C. 541, 542, or 543 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code or under Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1976.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one person household having less than \$114.49 gross income per month. The gross

must be subject to energy cost increases because of higher bills, or recent due to rising utility costs. Households are eligible if they live in privately owned or rented housing even if the cost of utilities is included in the rent payment or if food stamps, AFDC, and child care are received by the household parent or guardian.

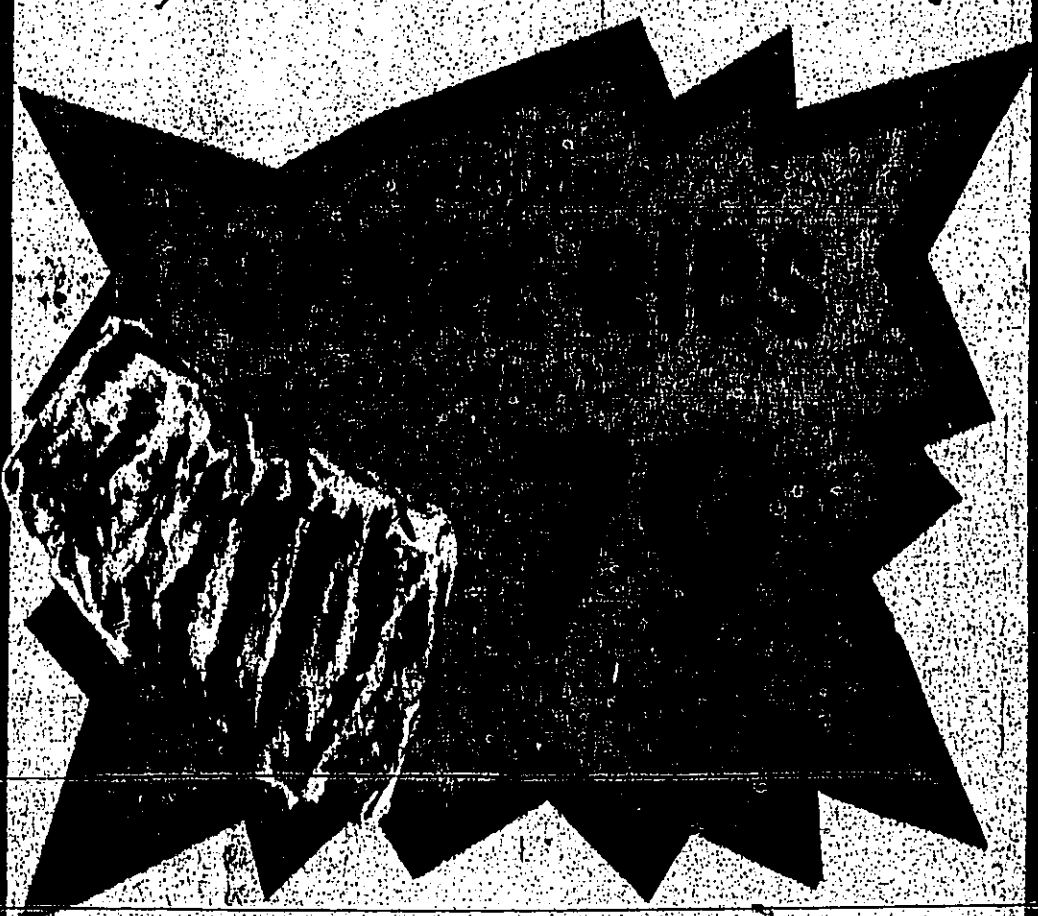

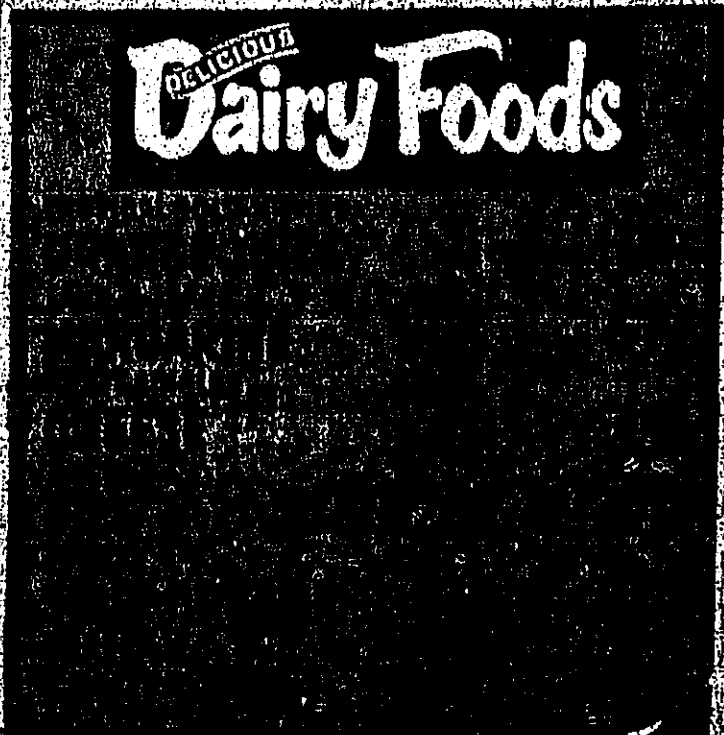
