

First National Bank Of Woodville Charter Approved

After completing a considerable obstacle course of Federal examination since application was filed on August 2, 1982, a charter was finally issued for The First National Bank of Woodville on Wednesday, Jan. 26.

According to prime mover of the initiative and its organizing Attorney John Kinney, "It's been a 23 year struggle to create a competitive banking situation in Woodville."

Local incorporators include Brian Bablin, D.D.S.; Joe H. Cash, City Judge; Stephen D. Evans, an insurance agent; Jeffrey Fortenberry, livestock auctioneer; J. Hunnity Kinney, retail clothing; John H. Kinney, organized by attorney Thomas C. Knapp; auto dealer and Stephanie O. Yearwood, housewife; all of Woodville.

Also included in the incorporators are Alexander S. Crawford of Beaumont; Virginia S. Harrison of Colman; James D. Martin, III of Houston; Robert Muller, Jr. of Austin; Robert G. Quinn of Beaumont and Kenneth O. Snider of Vidler.

According to Kinney, the new bank building, which will be located on South Highway 69 just north of the Dairy Queen, will be of a "modular type."

Kinney said the organizing group demonstrated "some brinkmanship" when they went ahead and made the purchase of the five acres of this property demonstrating their desire to see this project through.

According to Mary Lou White, head, representing the Federal Comptroller Corporate Division in Dallas, "The charter apparently had a difficult time getting approved once it headed for Washington. Normally these things are approved within 60 days but this one took considerably longer."

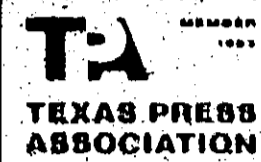

Reagan Asks \$400,000 For Hydro Design

The Reagan Administration's 1984 fiscal year budget presented to Congress Monday includes a request for \$400,000 for advanced engineering and design work on the Dam B Hydro-power plant, according to Bill Dawson, Chief of the Program Development Branch, Fort Worth District Office, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"That should fund part of the design studies; one year of the approximately one and one half years need ed to do the final design work on the hydro-power project," said Michael Roll, Chief of Hydro-power Studies Section, Fort Worth District Corps of Engineers in a Monday interview with the "Tyler County Booster."

According to Roll, "the construction could begin soon as 1985. The project should take about two years to build and might begin producing electricity in late 1986 or early 1987." Rockland Lake Not In Budget Request

The Lake Rockland Project is not in President Reagan's Corps of Engineers budget request to Congress for fiscal year 1984.

According to Wilson, the next phase of the \$600 million, 126,500 acre lake is a "preliminary design and planning phase" which in Lake Rockland's case would be a re-evaluation of the original Congressionally authorized 1945 Lake Rockland Project. This is estimated to take approximately four years and cost approximately \$1.4 million.

"Lake Rockland is something for the future", according to J.D. Nixon, General Manager of Lower Neches Valley Authority. "We haven't set a timetable for when it should develop, but are aligning ourselves with the timetable of the Corps of Engineers on it."

If an appropriation for Rockland is not added by Congress then the next opportunity for funding will come in the fiscal 1985 budget requests which would be made in January of 1984.

Heritage Group To Receive Home

Projects for which funding has been requested from Congress for fiscal 1984 in the Fort Worth district as advance engineering and design projects include Milliken Lake (near Navasota), \$200,000; Trinity River Project, \$218,000; and the Town Bluff (Dam B) Hydro-power Addition, \$400,000.

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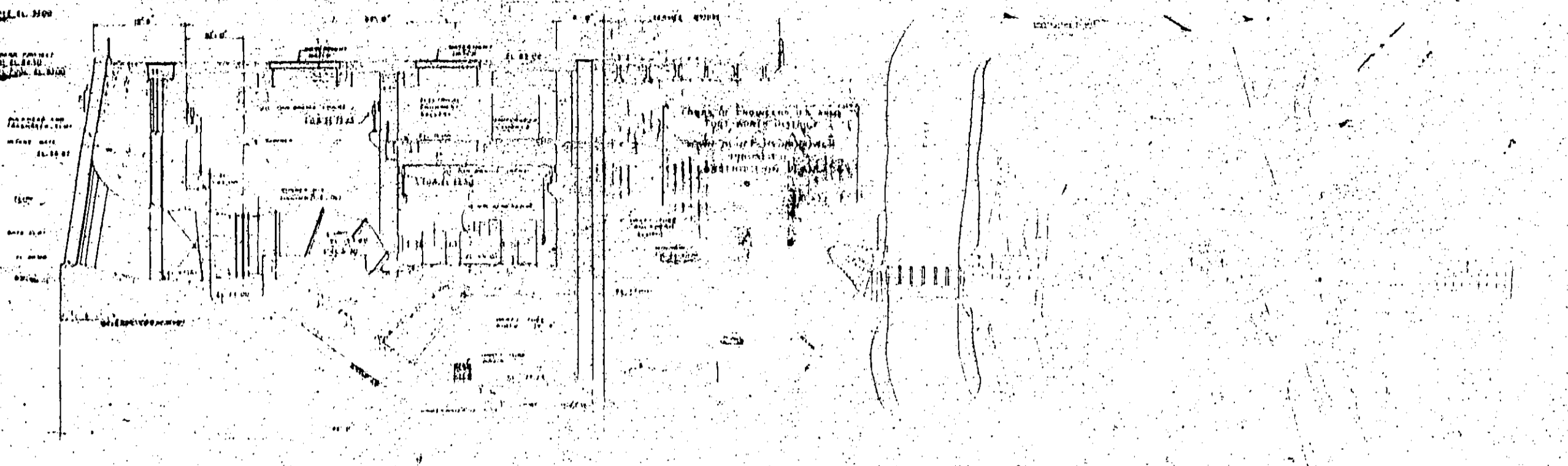

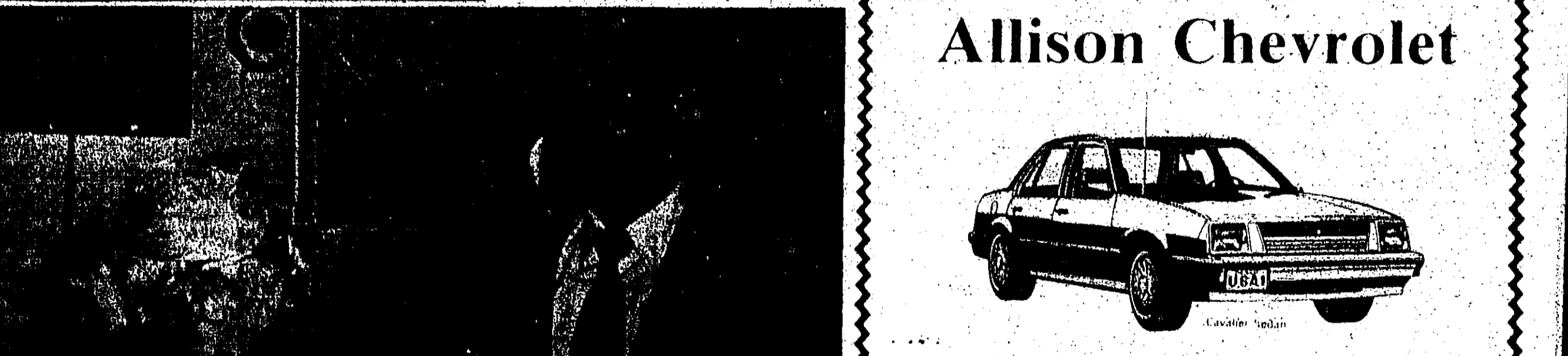

AIRPLANE CAN USE GASOLINE
MESSAGE: I own a Cessna 150, which uses 80 octane fuel similar to unleaded gasoline for automobiles. The Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) has submitted data to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) showing that automobile gasoline can be used safely and inexpensively in the Cessna 150. We need your help to remove the burden of what amounts to a bureaucratically imposed 70-cent-per-gallon surcharge for airplane fuel. Please get the FAA to certify the Cessna 150 to use lead-free gasoline. You'll be helping not only to reduce flying costs, but to keep thousands of fixed-base operators in business who use their airplanes for rental purposes. E. L. Cantor

MINUTE BUSINESS RESPONSE: FAA officials advise me that they have been working on a project basis with EAA to obtain approval for use of automobile gasoline in the Cessna 150. After extensive flight testing and engine inspection, certificates were issued in early August for the 150 to operate on 80 octane 150 unleaded gasoline.

ADDITIONAL ESTATE TAX REQUIRED

MESSAGE: I'm having a problem with the Internal Revenue Service regarding the Federal Estate Tax. As executor of an estate, I have requested an explanation from the IRS on the increase in taxes on real estate and an acknowledgment of the more than \$60,000 in taxes paid when the estate was liquidated last fall. I was thought to be all the tax due. Since there are many heirs involved, I need a detailed statement and explanation for requested additional taxes. I don't think they're warranted. J. D. Dallas

That is why I proposed legislation earlier this year to establish an independent inspector general for the Defense Department, with sweeping powers to weed out waste, fraud and mismanagement. My bill included protections for that relating to intelligence and national security.

The Senate tentatively approved, then rejected, my legislation in favor of a proposal to give the Secretary of Defense control over all activities of the inspector general.

The House of Representatives adopted legislation favoring a completely independent inspector general for the Defense Department, with no exceptions for security or intelligence matters.

When the House and Senate were in conference on defense at the end of the summer, this was one of the key differences the conferees had to iron out.

I decided that the areas recommended in my proposal justified the proper balance between the need to reduce waste and fraud, and the need to protect sensitive capabilities that are vital to our national security.

My proposal was included in the Defense Conference Bill for 1983, which the President recently signed into law.

The inspector general will be "in but not of" the Defense Department and will have full authority to audit, investigate and weed out waste and fraud.

Establishing this tough, independent inspector general is the most responsible and cost-efficient means to stop unnecessary spending and mismanagement in Defense Department programs.

At a time when opinions vary so greatly on how this country should invest its resources and meet its economic challenges, we cannot tolerate inefficiency and waste in an area so vital to our security.

I am confident that by adopting my proposal, Congress and the Administration have taken an important step in fulfilling their promises to cut the federal deficit and rein in government spending.
