## Council 'Gives' TV Cable \$1 Rate Increase

Woodville City Councilmen acted Monday night to allow a \$1 hike in monthly American Cablevision fees and agreed to file with the Texas Department of Water Resources and the Partners Home Administration for \$2,000,000 in funding for an additional sewer plant here.

In other action the council also elected to withhold payment of \$17,743 to contractors responsible for several liabilities still existing as a result of peeling work done on the City's water tower. Council heard reports of several residents cars claiming exterior paint damage along with other reportedly unpaid vendor invoices to the job. Council voted to defer that payment for the work until the other questions had been satisfactorily answered.

Councilmen Cleveland and Bedford voted eagerly Monday night for adoption of a resolution to change the election date for Aldermen here to a day other than Dogwood Day. Council agreed that much confusion seemed to exist with the community effort to produce the festival with the electricians having difficulty getting to the polls.

Woodville Jerry Brown questioned extensively the rate hike request as presented by American Cablevision President, Jim Adams. Brown suggested that the Cablevision company was using the City Council to finance their operation here.

Brown's allegation was that the cable firm was allowing the Woodville City Council and the taxpayers of Woodville to absorb the interest rate difficulties, his firm was having in obtaining money to establish and operate the entertainment facility here. Brown indicated it was Adam's problem to suffer the high interest rates in the cost of money, but that the taxpayers of Woodville shouldn't have to bear that cost. "Just better internal money management is all that's needed," Brown said.

"It's unfortunate that your firm in the gamble it took in locating here predicted incorrectly what the interest rates would be to operate, but why should we have to pay for your bad luck in the financial marketplace?"

Brown cited that most companies in the United States rely on a 4 percent profit margin. Adam's profit margin as a result of Monday's vote by the council brought it to 5.

"So he really got a 20 percent increase."

Cablevision representative Bob Carter reported to the council that there had been only a few minor complaints on the operation of the system and that all of these had been corrected. Adam had asked originally for a \$2 increase.

## Unfair Pay Question Tabled

Tyler County Commissioner's Court Monday night tabled a question of whether to raise the salary of the County Clerk, Patricia Brown, County Clerk Grace Bostick, County Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Tolbert and County Treasurer Austin Poller.

The Salary Grievance Committee was appointed after District Clerk Patricia Brown, County Clerk Grace Bostick, County Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Tolbert and County Treasurer Austin Poller filed a complaint about unequal 1983 budget pay increases granted by Commissioner's Court. Commissioner's Court had granted themselves, the County Judge and the Sheriff a \$200 per month pay increase, and all other major elected county officials a \$100 per month pay increase. The Grievance Committee recommended on a 5 to 1 vote that the salaries of the aggrieved parties be raised by the amount of \$100 per month, each, beginning March 1, 1983.

Commissioner Odum after "apologizing for a decision I didn't want to make" in approving the 1983 budget increases, proposed that the Commissioner's Court accept the 1983 budget as it is with a \$75 increase for all county employees but that all elected county officials salaries be rolled back to the 1982 budget levels.

Adam had asked originally for a \$2 increase.

## Since February 1st Community Service Hours Adding Up

A Community Service Restitution Program initiated by Tyler County Probation Officer Kenny Simpson here is beginning to pan out with some 164 hours of "good time" logged for two adult probationers, one serving on a Driving while Intoxicated charge and the other being held for theft.

According to Simpson the availability of Community Service Restitution work is available to any non-profit Tyler County organization who is willing to sign a contract for the services. The Tyler County Probation office here is the administrator of the project.

Simpson says, "The program helps the community and the offender as well."

The adult probation officer said that the non-violent offenders have been given the opportunity by County Judge Allen Struck to "work off" proactively their offense. The individuals used in the program are constantly checked for the quality of their work and are covered by Volunteer Liability Insurance which is paid for by the county in case "They hurt something or something hurts them."

So far Hennigan Park, the Tyler County South Development Center, Inc. and the Tyler County Courthouse have been the beneficiary of the program. Raking, hoeing, painting, cleaning and some minor construction work have been the job assignments issued so far.

"The work is done on a strictly voluntary basis, but they really don't have a good choice in the matter. It's either get with the program or remain in jail till the term is served. Most jump at the opportunity to get outside and work. According to Adult Probation Assistant Randy Odum, "The probationers will continue to serve on the remainder of their term even after the work is completed."

Simpson said he's anxious for the community to recognize the human value to the program both in a re-

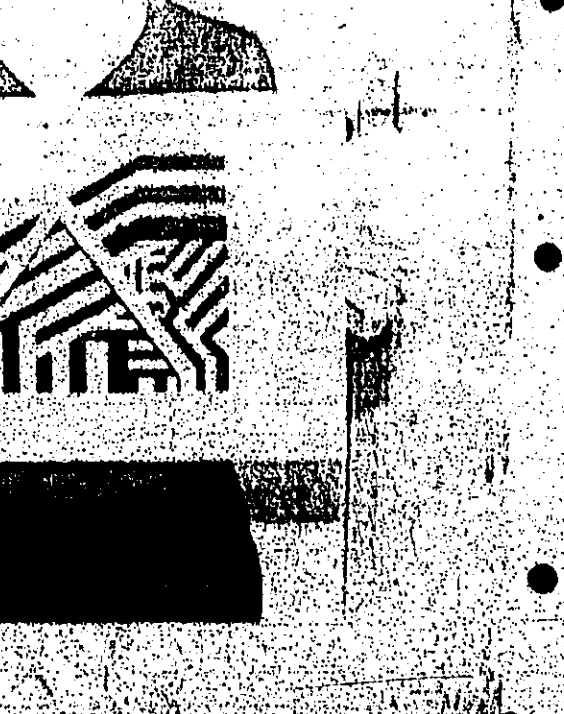
