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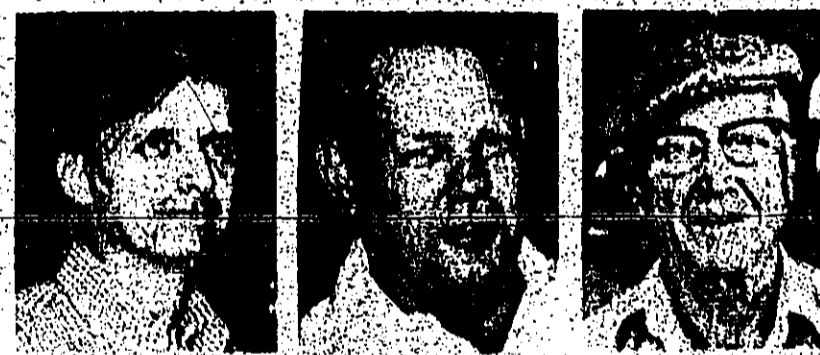

## Rare Bird Discovered Near Tyler-Polk Border

At least three of the rare endangered bird species, Red-Cockaded woodpeckers and one roosting or nesting tree has been identified in the Big Sandy Unit of the Big Thicket National Preserve in southern Polk County, says Orop Garcia, Park Ranger with the Big Thicket Preserve.  
"We are continuing to study the site and determine exactly how many

of these rare birds there are in this area." According to Garcia, the birds were first sighted by park naturalist John Apel and three other preserve employees on Friday, Feb. 18. The naturalists were trying to determine if, in fact, there were red-cockaded woodpeckers in the area. This is the first sighting of the birds in the Big Thicket Preserve.  
Red-cockaded woodpeckers have

been identified at other sites in Texas near the Wildwood Addition, in the Big Creek Scenic Area of Sam Houston National Forest, in San Jacinto County, and on the Alabama-Coushatta Indian Reservation in Polk County.

The Red-cockaded woodpecker, according to Big Thicket Preserve publications, is a small black and white woodpecker with very distinctive large white cheek patches. Males have a single streak of red feathers on each side of the head. It makes its home by pecking holes in living pine trees over forty years old, which are infected with a heartwood fungus. Most of the woodpecker's food consists of pine-bark beetles that live under the bark of pine trees. Modern forest management practices of growing pines in even aged stands and harvesting trees at 20 to 40 years of age, have eliminated the Red-cockaded woodpecker's highly specialized living environment and made these birds a species in danger of extinction.

## Salary Increase OK'd

Funds for the \$100-a-month salary increases recommended for District Clerk Patricia Brown, County Clerk Grace Bostick, County Treasurer Austin Fuller, Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Tolbert, County Attorney Joe Smith and County Auditor Ann Nichol by the Salary Grievance Committee which met last Friday will come from funds set aside "for use by the county in disasters" according to County Auditor Nichol.

The Salary Grievance Committee consisting of County Officials Tolbert, Bostick, Fuller, Brown, Smith and Lora Howler, plus Tyler County citizens Dr. James Jimette, Billy Nickman and Gerald Older, meeting for a second time, unanimously recommended that these county officials' salaries be increased an additional \$100 to match the 1983 salary increases of the County Commissioners, County Judge and Sheriff. The Grievance Committee had previously recommended the salary equity by a 9-1 vote with County Attorney Joe Smith voting against the recommendation. The recommendation of that meeting was declared null and void due to improper posting of

notice of the meeting. County Attorney Joe Smith however, voted in the meeting Friday "for" the recommendation saying, "We need to get back to the work at hand and put this behind us." Smith concluded, "I did not take part in filing this grievance."

## Concerned Citizens Chain Forming

Gray will advocate the formation of a citizens group which will allow any body in the nation to express his voice through any of a group of chapters of concerned citizens made up of open committees formed without chairman. Gray's innovative presentation will exemplify several ideas. In his area of expertise and then open the group discussion to include anything else the group wants to discuss. The group, Gray says, "will present our outward with its influence to ward our legislators." 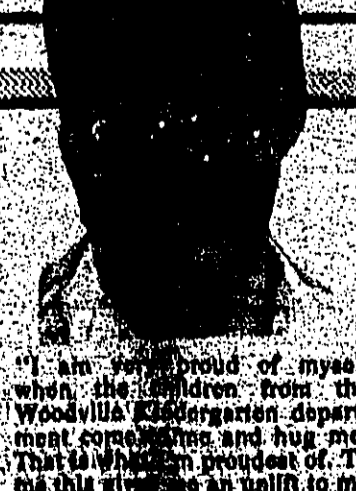

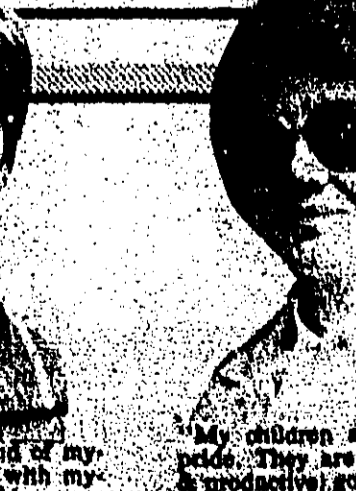

As with millions of other Americans, Alan Miller's T-Wheeler found himself glued to the television set during the week of the "Winds of War" program. Even some of our friends who just never watch television were caught in the act of watching Pug Henry past "pearls" in almost every major confrontation from Berlin to Pearl Harbor.

We couldn't help remembering where we were when a lot of those events unfolded on the television screen. Pearl Harbor Day, a senior in high school and watching several dozen kids turning in their books and heading off to war.

The troops that all of a sudden appeared, putting and aircraft guns to place where we all used to take our dates to watch the moon come up. Nothing dampened your expectations as quickly as an M-16 mapping on the air that was over forty five.

Of course for most of us on the West Coast, World War Two came a little earlier. Japanese ships used to sail to Bellingham bay looking for scrap metal and scrap of us had occasion to remember that later on.

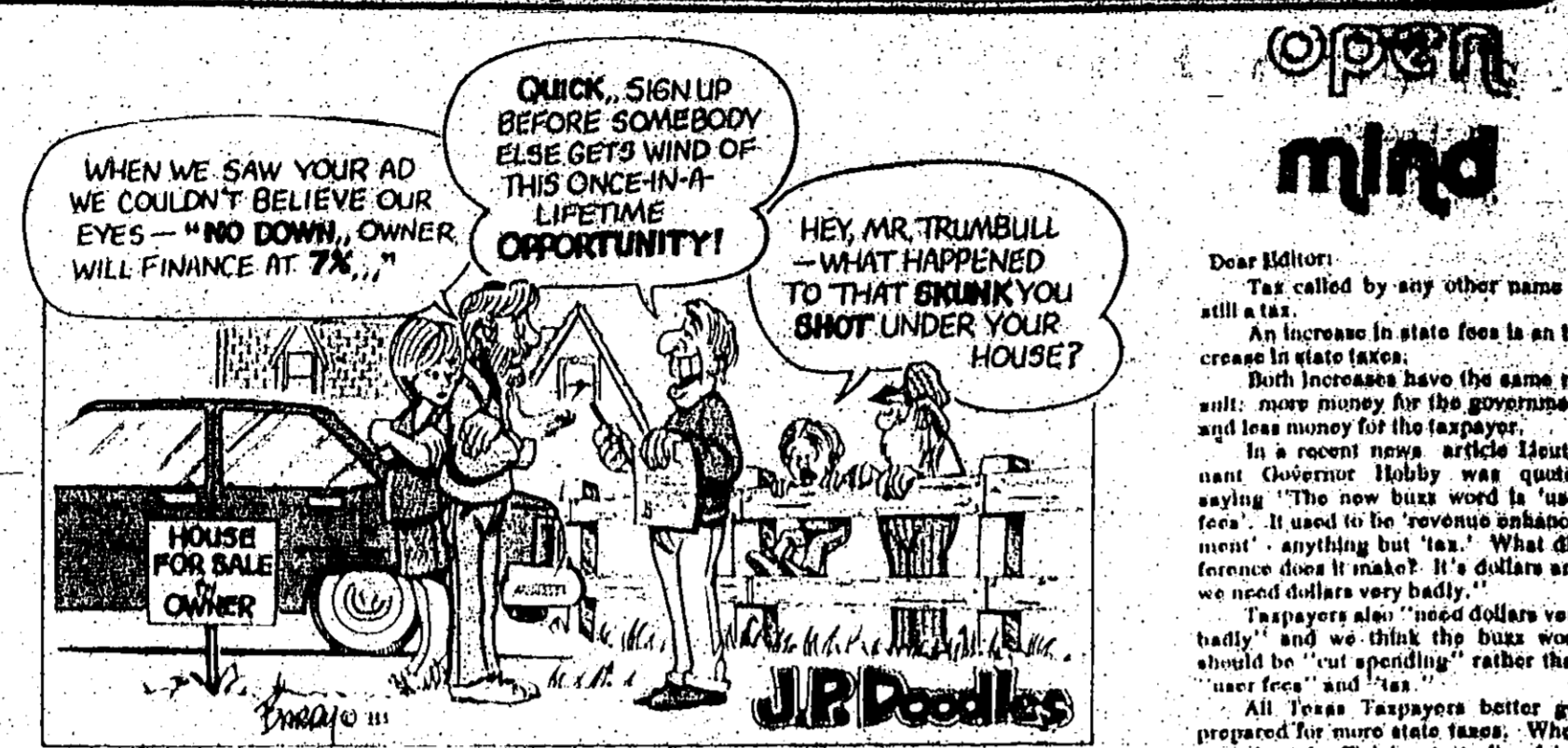
Along about March of 1942 all of the Japanese left disappeared from the classrooms. Literally overnight they were packed off with what they could carry in a suitcase to a "detention center".

Some Army general had decided that the kids we had gone to school with for years were actually saboteurs and plotted by the Japanese to do us harm. No matter that their grand parents for the most part had arrived in Washington state to build railroads and mine coal. And now were supposed to turn farmers and nurserymen.

All of a sudden they were out emmy in at least the general thought they were. And convinced the right people in Washington, D. C. that they should all be interned for the duration of the war which they were.

We always have had a problem with that decision, particularly since the thousands of prisoners who were interned, children living in the Hawaiian Islands did not suffer such ill treatment.

The Army had another gambit that certainly inspired confidence in those early ghoulish months of the war. As outrageous as it may sound today, most of us were not as concerned with an actual invasion of Japan near as we were that Japan near aircraft carriers might fly off shore and create other Pearl Harbor up and down the coast. Or that their submarines might harass our ship ping lanes.



## 'Nature Of Interest'

Interest by its very nature is counter productive. For example, if you have a profit from the operations of a company, you don't want to pay interest on the profit. If you do, you are paying interest on interest.

And if all of the above has been depleted, money is even borrowed for the purpose of paying interest. In this case, the interest is counter productive in that it takes away money that should have been used in the productive flow of the company. In this way, interest weakens the hand that feeds it.

There are two ways of investing in a company: one is by buying company stock and the other by purchasing corporate bonds. In the first instance, there is a responsibility assumed in the share of ownership. In the second case, the responsibility that should go along with ownership has been dodged. Corporate bonds are a lever that infects all industry. A bond is equity ownership, bonds delinquent ship.

Likewise, government bonds act as a lever setting into the very existence of our society. Government bonds are issued in the first place, because there were not enough taxes collected to meet the needs of the constituents. They represent a deferred tax placed upon future years and must line up on a future generation.

A greater evil than this first apparent as unpaid bonds compounds. Two often the future tax payer cannot afford to meet its current needs and hence pay off the bonds, made by joint generations, with more bonds. Thus, the compounding continues. ## Junior Dairy Judging Contest Winners

Tim McCarty, a 16-year-old from Chester was named as one of the top twenty high point individuals in the Junior Dairy Judging Contest at the 1983 Houston Livestock Show. Tim was awarded a \$500 calf purchase certificate sponsored by Valley Chandler. This will be used toward the purchase of a registered dairy heifer, which then becomes a part of the Show's renowned Calf Scribble Program.

Tim, a 4119A member, will feed, fit and groom the heifer during the coming year in preparation for a return to aiff competition in the 1984 Houston Livestock Show. All work with the heifer is carried out under the expert supervision of the winner's vocational agriculture teacher or county extension agent.

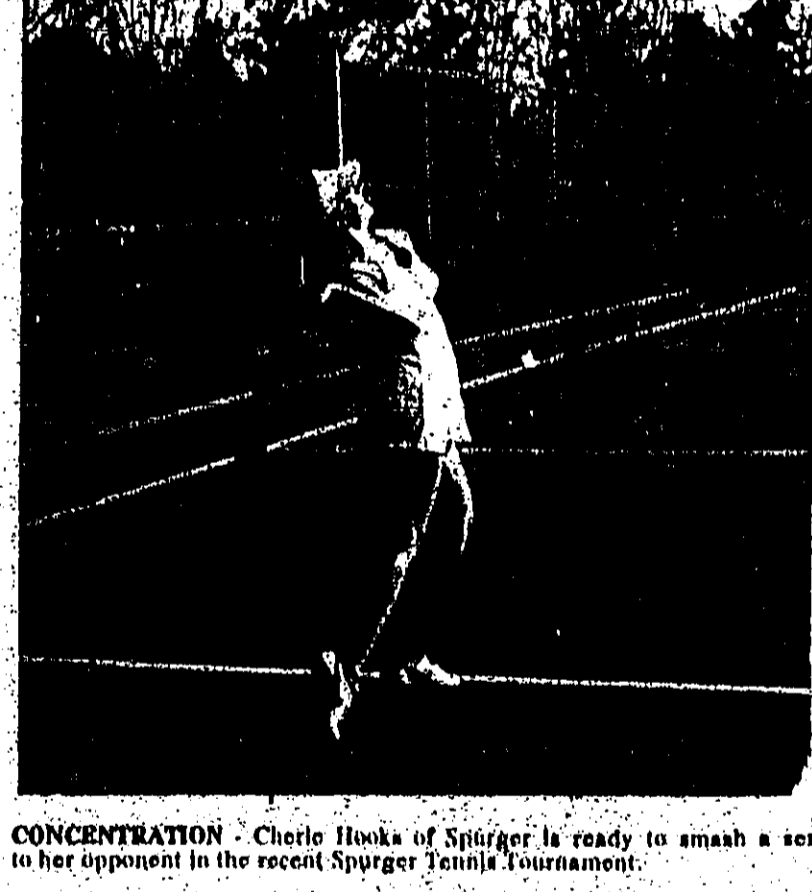
The judging contest is an integral part of the Houston Livestock Show. Students compete in teams of three, judging all classes of dairy animals, ranking them from first through fourth place.

The rankings prepared by the student teams are then compared with those of a well-known livestock expert. Awards are based on how closely the student rankings match those of the expert. Calf purchase certificates are awarded to the top twenty placing individuals in the contest.

The judging contest offers students the opportunity to apply the practical - knowledge acquired in exhaustive classroom learning and from actual experience in working with livestock projects. With their \$500 calf purchase certificate, these top twenty individuals find themselves with the basis for a future cattle herd and involved in an invaluable learning experience.

Starting the next year, the winner will be closely supervised in all phases of the calf project. Extensive financial records must be kept and monthly progress reports are submitted both to the Show and to the sponsor. The culmination of the year's work is a special scramble competition in the show ring, when each winner sees how well he or she has done.

Each year, the Show awards more than 200 calf purchase certificates of a value in excess of \$115,000 to scramble and judging contest winners. Awards are based on how closely the student rankings match those of the expert. Calf purchase certificates are awarded to the top twenty placing individuals in the contest.

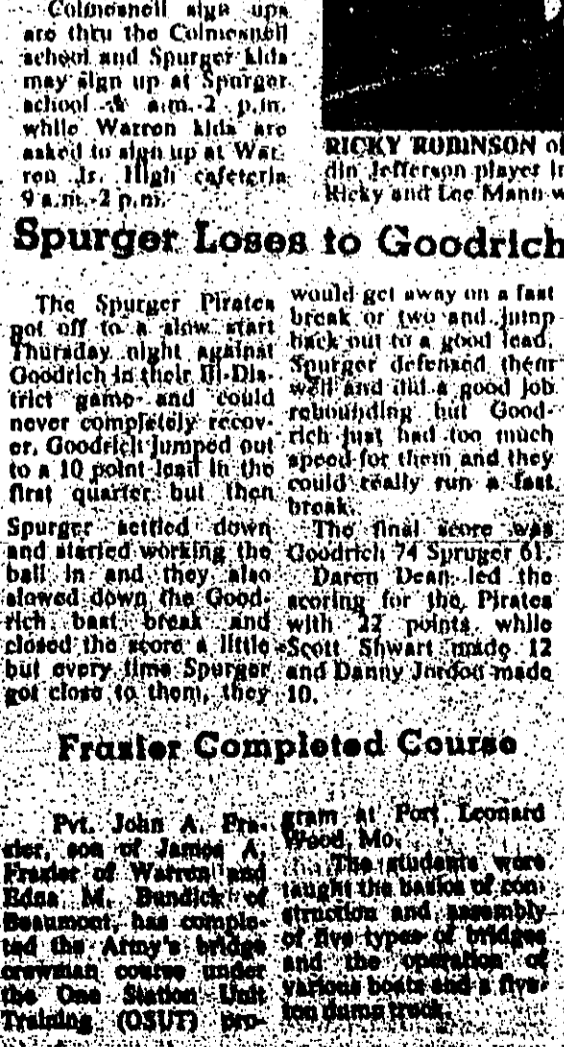

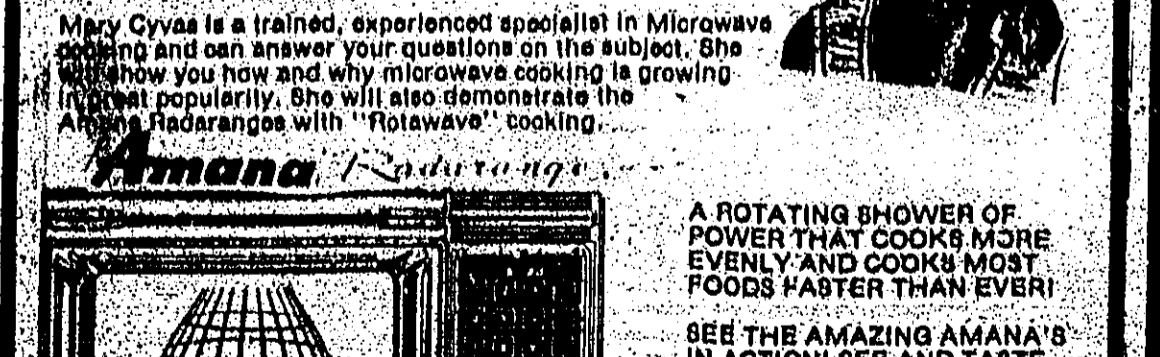

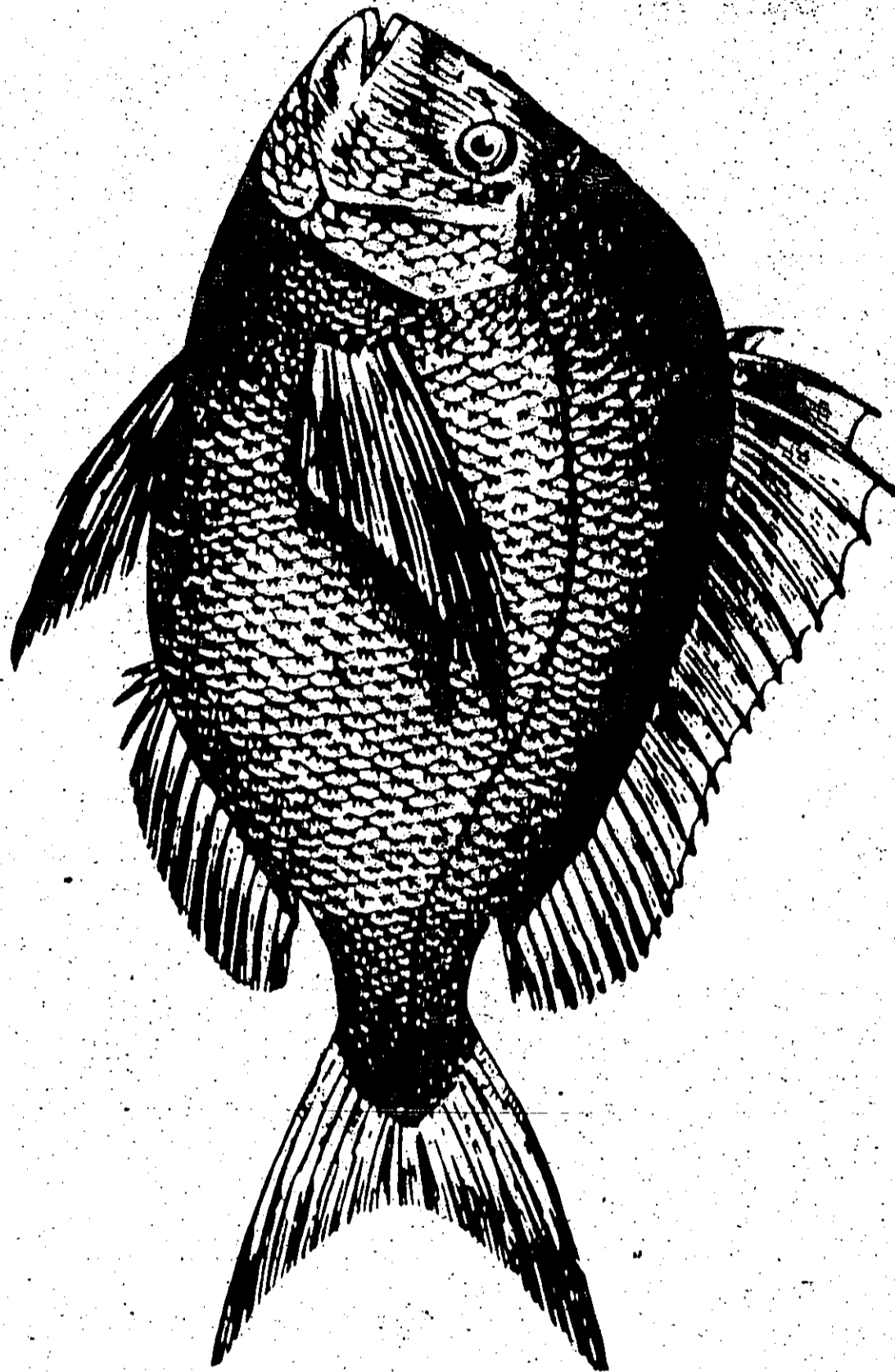
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
