Hightower Busy In Austin

State Representative Allen Hightower, D-Huntsville, has filed at least eight bills and has co-sponsored or is carrying Senate bills which he says are of concern to the citizens of the 18th Legislative District which includes Tyler County.

HOUSE BILL 302
This bill, relating to prison inmates and employee trial expenses, has been referred to subcommittee in the committee on Criminal Jurisprudence. The bill would give tax relief to Walker County and other counties in Texas which have 100 more inmates as trial expenses for inmates or employees are concerned. Presently, Walker County and other counties with prison units are having to bear the full costs of these inmate and employee trials and appeals in the cases of Fry Brown and Ignacia Curvas (murder victims) the expenses have run into the half a million.

"Neighbors working together can reduce burglaries and other crimes. By watching each others homes, suspicious activities can be reported to law enforcement agencies. In town, the people in a block can work together by observing next door or across the street. This has been shown to be effective. When signs are posted that a Neighborhood Watch program is in operation it can be a deterrent to future neighborhood crime," officials said.

Immunization Clinics Will Continue

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations. The clinics will be conducted at 401 Elm St., Woodville, Texas. The next clinic will be held April 19, 1983. Clinic hours will be from 12 noon - 4 p.m. Future clinic dates will be announced. The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two (2) months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella (MMR), Diphtheria, Tetanus Pertussis (DTP) and Tetanus Diphtheria (TD). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available. The Tetanus diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults. Conservation Use Requirements Must Be Met

Kathy O'Love, ANCS County Executive Director, reminds farmers who are participating in payment in kind or other 1983 land diversion and acreage reduction programs that conservation use acres must be eligible crop land which meets certain requirements. Farm program participants agree to devote cropland taken out of production to approved conservation practices to protect the land from soil and water erosion. Mr. Love said conservation use acres must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm in which case the cropping requirement is for only one of the previous two years. The land may not be harvested, and grazing is not permitted between April 1 through September 31. Love said haying and grazing will be permitted only on winter wheat planted before the announcement of the payment-in-kind program. Under summer fallow rules, 5% acreage will have to be acreage that would have been planted in 1983, she said. Approved conservation uses include annual, biennial, or perennial grasses and legumes, volunteer stands other than weeds, small grains and crop residue from use of no till, or minimum till practices. "Farm program participants are required to establish such practices as soon as possible after the normal planting period for spring crops," Mrs. Love said. The 1983 program also permits a farmer to establish permanent conservation practices such as tree planting on land taken out of production. Permanent conservation practices may be cost-shared under the Agricultural Conservation Program. "We encourage farmers to seriously consider tree planting as a permanent practice to reduce annual soil loss on eroding cropland," she said. For further information call 283-2244.
