Warren Board In Session

The newly reorganized Warren Independent School Board of Trustees met April 26 and took care of several routine business matters. The board authorized the signatures of Kenneth Gregory, Board President, and Harold Davis, Board Secretary/Treasurer, for school business transactions. Superintendent Hylhorchuk was appointed Lynch Road Representative for 1983-84. Jimmy Neuhaber was approved as School Auditor for 1983-84 as recommended by the Superintendent. The student transfer list for 1983-84 was also approved.

Superintendent Hylhorchuk presented the results of the Algebra Diagnostic Test taken by 61 eighth grade students. Twenty seven of these students qualified to take Algebra in the ninth grade. The greenhouse at Fred Elementary School which was donated to the school by the Deep East Texas Council of Governments several years ago was discussed. Since there is no further need for the greenhouse at Fred, the board instructed Superintendent Hylhorchuk to see if the High School Agriculture Department could use it. If not, and if the Deep East Texas Council of Governments has no further interest in it, the greenhouse will be put up for bids.

Board Member Marvin Fannin questioned the size of the Kindergarten classes and suggested that the two classes be split into three next year for first grade. Superintendent Hylhorchuk said that he would be able to report on this in May after discussing the matter with the Warren Elementary School Principal.

Fannin also requested that the possibility of teaching phonics in all first, second, and third grade classes be looked into. He felt that this was the best method of teaching reading and spelling and asked that opinions of teachers and other people be sought before the next Board Meeting and reported on. Board Member Walter McPherson said that he would like the number of students expelled for disciplinary reasons looked into. He suggested that the district look into having some sort of detention center that the expelled student would have to attend rather than be sent home. Superintendent Hylhorchuk stated that he had looked into the possibility of having Saturday classes for students with disciplinary problems. He said that the Silsbee School District used this method and that it was working very well. Marvin Fannin said that the District needs to be sure the parents of students with chronic absenteeism are notified.

The Board Meeting for May was changed from May 24 to May 23 and the meeting for June was changed from June 28 to June 21. There was no business reported following Executive Session.

Silsbee 'Smokey' Stover Gains 88th Bench Duty

Silsbee's Earl (Smokey) Stover, 56, has been appointed by Governor Mark White to fill the term of 88th District Judge Clyde Earl Smith after legislative courtesy of appointment by strong suggestion from the office of Senator Roy Blake.

Blake had been notifying the Senatorial courtesy as a means of moving Governor White to act on his suggestion, considered a courtesy in the State Government body to select Stover for the job.

Stover, who has been a practicing attorney in Silsbee for some 25 years after attending law school in Austin,

is married to Luanna (Gracie) Stover and the couple has two children. One son, Earl Stover III, is a practicing attorney in Silsbee and another son, Andrew Stover, is a graduating senior at the University of Texas at Austin.

Stover will serve out the unexpired term of Smith, the office of which will last for the next 18 months until the next election.

"I'm very honored and I hope that I'll be worthy of the trust that Governor White and Senator Blake have placed in me."

"I'll work hard. I'm going to work hard at the office."

According to Mr. Stover, White is very proud of him in filling the job.

Stover is the past President of the Silsbee Chamber of Commerce and is Chairman of the Board of the First United Methodist Church. As a past president of the Kiwanis Club of Silsbee, he has also served as a past chairman for that organization.

Stover was also a member of the North-Texas Law School, the University of Texas Law School. He has also held office as a past director of the State Bar of Texas Board of Directors.

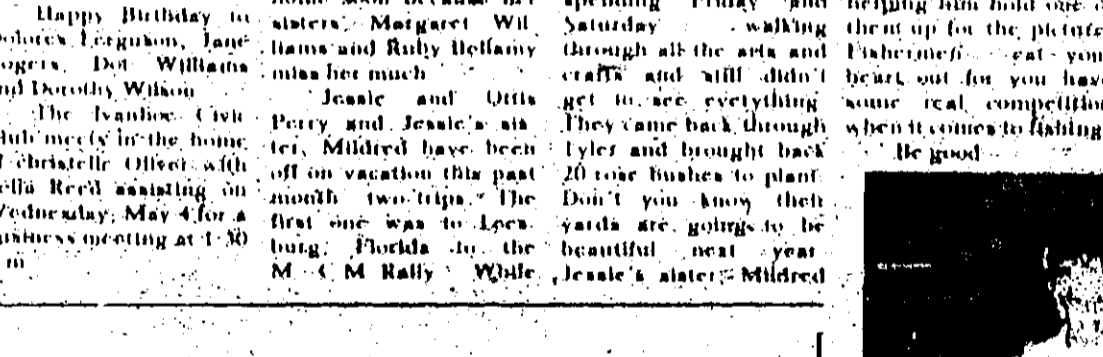

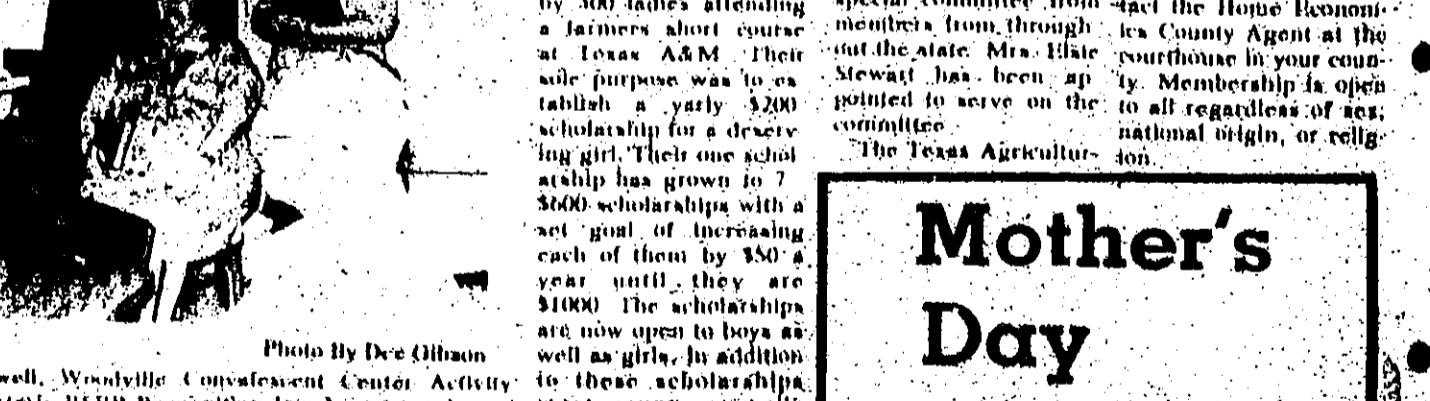

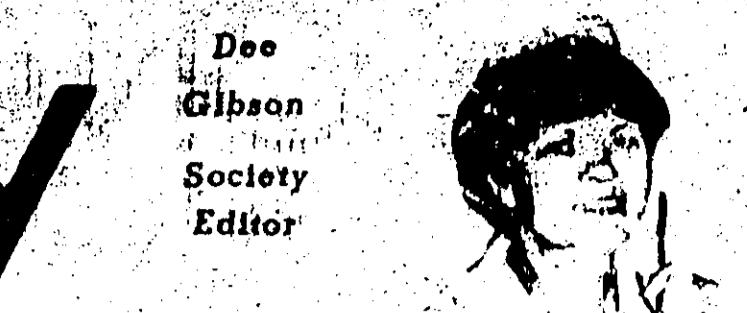

Lake Rockland Would Avert Flooding

The use of Lake Rockland's 1,020,100 acre-feet of flood-storage capacity will almost double the amount of water storage available in the Neches Basin for use in reducing the damages from flooding. Of the ten major reservoirs in the Neches Basin only Lake Rockland, approximately 2,303,200 acres of land, is currently used for flood control. In addition to supplying 605,300 acre-feet of water, the Corps of Engineers Project would build a dam on the northern border of Tyler County on the Neches River, 2 miles west of the town of Rockland, which would impound a 22-mile-long, 3-mile wide reservoir covering approximately 126,500 acres of land. The Corps of Engineers Project would reduce damage from flooding along the Neches from Rockland to Beaumont and it is estimated for just the plying water to municipal, industrial and agricultural consumers.

She is learning about better family nutrition, health, and income-generating activities such as vegetable gardening and poultry raising. Sabara and her family are protected against tuberculosis, diphtheria and other communicable diseases through immunization.

For M. Apolko Hah of Lesotho, it has been a struggle being the main provider for a family of four children and a husband crippled in an accident. M. Apolko spins mohair into high-quality yarn to provide her family with a cash income. She is one of more than 2,000 village women who have been trained through a project developed by CARE in 1978 to help people become more self-sufficient and to improve life of her family and living standards. CARE the village has changed supplies materials and since CARE's Rural technical assistance and Development Program that women who help the community members of a cooperative install public, five can build a work and washing stands, shop and training center. The pure water system is for spinning activities, a tremendous improvement in their lives in terms of health and convenience. Emma Maldonado of Mexico is heard of three. 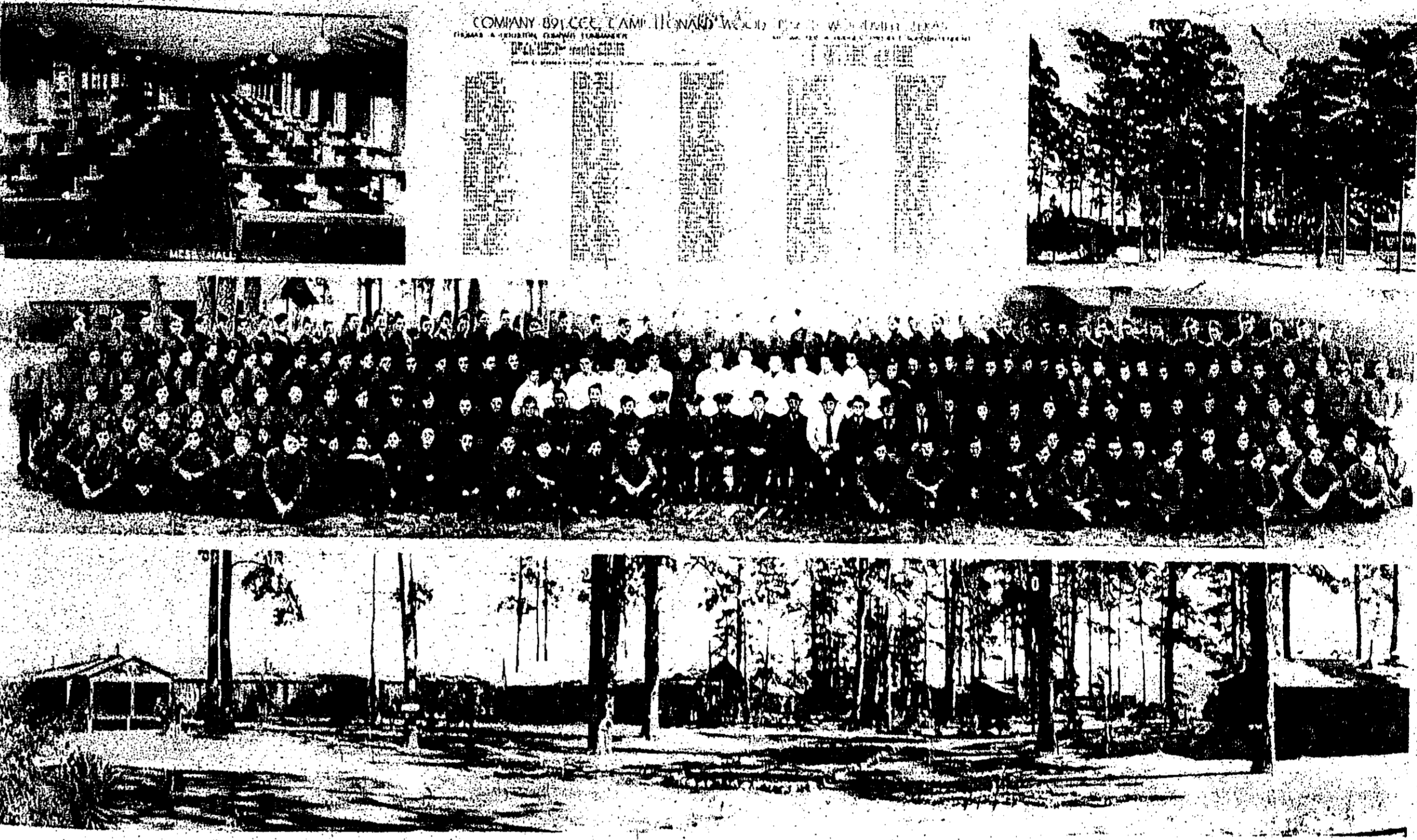

Beware Of Garage Sale Bargains

COLLEGE STATION - Parents who feel they cannot afford the \$30-40 cost of a new child safety seat may be tempted to search the garage sales and want ads looking for a bargain. "But a used child safety seat that is defective is no bargain," says Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension System, Texas A&M University System. "Parents need to shop very carefully to avoid buying a defective used seat which can endanger the life of their child if they are involved in an accident," she adds.

The first test of a child restraint device, says Shirer, is whether it has a label stating that it "meets or exceeds all federal safety standards."

Beginning in 1981, the federal standard governing child safety seats that meet the standard can be considered good ones.

Some car seats manufactured prior to 1981 meet those requirements, while others do not. "Many seats now on the used market were made before 1981, so parents should always look for that label," warns Shirer.

In addition to the federal safety label, Shirer recommends that parents look for the following defects in used child restraint devices:

- Check the harness to see if it is torn at any point. A torn belt system can be easily repaired on most safety seats with replacements ordered from the manufacturer.
- Also examine the padding to see if it is thin. If so, it should be replaced with new padding from the manufacturer.
- A child restraint system with these defects will not adequately protect a child until the belt system and padding are replaced. Parents not purchase a used seat with these problems unless they actually intend to repair them, notes Shirer.
- If the device has a metal frame, check to see if it rattles. Ask the owner if you may tighten the screws on the frame. If the frame is still loose after tightening, do not buy it.
- Also, check the seat bars. If they are twisted or bent, do not buy the seat, since full protection cannot be guaranteed.
- According to Shirer, the manufacturer's directions for using the safety seat should be provided by the owner. Most seats made after 1981 have a place on the seat to store instructions. For effective use of the seat, Shirer recommends that parents carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Finally, try the seat in your car before buying. Certain types of safety belts may cause installation problems. Bulky seat-belt buckles, for example, will not fit through the belt slots on some safety seats.

In 'Getting Along'

Kids Learn Skills

Friendliness, the willingness to give and take of life, grows naturally. And, like courtesy, friendliness is learned by experience.

When a child begins to walk, a good time to give him a start in learning the art of being friendly, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter.

At two years old, children are busy exploring, curious about people and things that they have not yet become self-conscious about themselves. This is the ideal time for them to meet other children in a play situation.

Even though children don't usually play with other children until they are about three, two-year-olds are not too young to learn the fun of a mutual exchange. Skills in getting along with others will increase with each exchange and will continue to grow with each new acquaintance made.

Friendliness is basically a love of other people, and enjoyment of their company, and a spontaneous desire to please them.

Beginning at two years, it is a good idea to take a toddler to some place where other children play, two or three times a week. Toddlers are acquainted with other children in their own way and at their own rate. Don't push them, but quietly encourage them to respond to any activities made.

Don't be overprotective either. Toddlers must learn some give and take, and that includes holding on to a toy when another child snatches it. A little roughness and noise are not fatal. Toddlers should have the chance

to learn to stand up for their rights.

These early play experiences help children learn to play side by side or in company with other children, and to share and exchange toys. At this age, communication is largely wordless. Most toddlers talk more to themselves than to others.

This early play behavior is known as "parallel play." Only after a long period of parallel play do young children begin to engage in cooperative play, which requires more language skill than most toddlers have at two years.
