Education Key Topic As White Visits Area Solons

"Of all the programs the state is called on to provide for the most important has to be education. Currently, we are not doing as good a job as we can here; we are not doing as good a job as we can," said Texas Governor Mark White in a speech before North and East Texas Association of County Judges and Commissioners Friday in Lufkin.

At the beginning of the address White stated that he was hopeful that the special session of the legislature dealing with

teacher pay raises could be "pushed back" to September of this year. Regarding the state of Texas, White stated that the Texas Department of Education was working with the federal Department of Labor and was "dedicated" to seeing that the state did not "self-destruct." On the threat of a federal quarantine of Texas dairy and beef cattle exportation because of the state's failure to comply with federal regulations, White stated, "I will not allow the cattle industry to be destroyed for the present the federal quarantine has been

enjoyed by legal action." Speaking about education White stated, "Our prison population is overflowing; we have 17,000 people in the Texas Department of Corrections. Now it's not this simple," he said, "but still 98 percent of these people are school dropouts. We have found out that if an inmate can get as much as two college credits his chance of repeating

as a criminal is reduced 50 percent. As kids if only some of these people in our prisons had had the right person at the right time. We learned discipline in schools as children, as many of these people have had no discipline at any stage of their lives. It shouldn't surprise us that they do not obey the rules as adults."

White after the address stated that he was not willing at this time to commit to adding a state program for water resource development to the special session agenda. He hoped that through an agreement with the federal government, he could be reached on this issue in time for the special session.

County Roads To Get \$23 Million In 83

County Commissioners' committee met in regular session Monday, June 13, to reauthorize the county's road program. The committee, which includes County Judge Allen Sturrock, who was in Austin and Commissioner Adell Odum, predicted that \$20 million in road construction would be underway by January 1984 and listened to complaints by County

representatives to DHTCOC, the county's not-reimbursing travel expenses. County Commissioner Pat M. Mays, Jr. presided as Commissioner's accepted a contract with the state to purchase Right-of-Way at the intersection

of Hwy 22 south and Hwy 190. Commissioners estimated that total work scheduled by the state highway department for beginning later this year would result in approximately \$20,000,000 in highway work beginning in January 1984.

According to Road Engineer H. P. R. Smith, of the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation the following projects are scheduled for Tyler County: (1) extension of Hwy 92 north of Hwy 190, 2.2 miles beginning in January 1984 and costing \$2.2 million; (2) widening of U.S. Hwy 69 North from Colman to 8 miles to FM 1014 beginning in August of 1983 and costing \$7 million; (3) widening of Hwy 92 from its intersection with Hwy 190 South 5 miles to FM 1746 beginning in December of 1983 and costing \$4,900,000; (4) Warren Overpass

beginning September of 1983 costing \$9,000,000. The total figure is \$21.1 million. Commissioners listened to a complaint by Rev. C. L. Butler, accompanied by the Rev.

Clyde D. Hutto, that the county had failed to reimburse him for \$28,000 for attending DHTCOC committee meetings as a minority representative. Commissioners decided to ask for a county attorney's opinion on the legality of reimbursing the expense from the county's general fund. Rev. Butler stated, "I understand that you are not trying to put me off on

this. Commissioners stated that they agreed that reimbursement was necessary. In other business the county accepted the monthly county probation report and extension office report. They postponed consideration of the Auditor's report till Friday and opened a bid of \$945 for a Royal 806 Electric Printing Typewriter for the station office.

Outside City Limit Services Rate Raised

The Woodville City Council met Monday to raise city service rates for those who live outside the city limits to an amount 50 percent higher than they are not paying. The council also appointed Donna Porter, the first woman to serve here, to an important post as City Representative for the Deep East Texas Council of Governments.

In other major action a committee of five members was appointed by Mayor Brian Babin to study annexation possibilities for future City growth. "I want folks to know I'm for it," Babin said, as he told the group that the appointment would be completed following a visit to the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce.

City Manager Walt Davis told the group that if the city were to expand its border all around by one-half mile, that some 225 people and 105 homes would be annexed into the City limits. Councilmen Radford and Anderson moved that the annexation study activities begin with the formation of the Committee.

The City Council ratified the fact that the City of Woodville would be lowering its gas rate to customers by 10 cents

per hundred cu. ft. for gas. The City had to effect an ordinance to allow the decrease in rates allowed by the Tennessee.

Several times in this column we have expressed some skepticism about the "no charge" policy of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) regarding the use of pine trees as windbreaks. We had always assumed that such a policy would be based on sound scientific data and not on the whimsy of a few politicians.

Now, however, we are beginning to feel that the "no charge" policy is based on a very shaky foundation. In a recent issue of the "Texas Observer," a columnist named "T. Wheeler" expressed his doubts about the wisdom of the "no charge" policy. He pointed out that the cost of pine trees is not negligible and that the benefits of windbreaks are often overstated.

It is true that pine trees can provide some protection against wind damage to crops and buildings. However, the benefits are often overstated. In many areas, the wind is not a major problem and the cost of pine trees is not justified. In other areas, the benefits are limited to a few years and the trees eventually die, leaving a mess.

It is also true that the "no charge" policy has led to a massive planting of pine trees in many areas.
