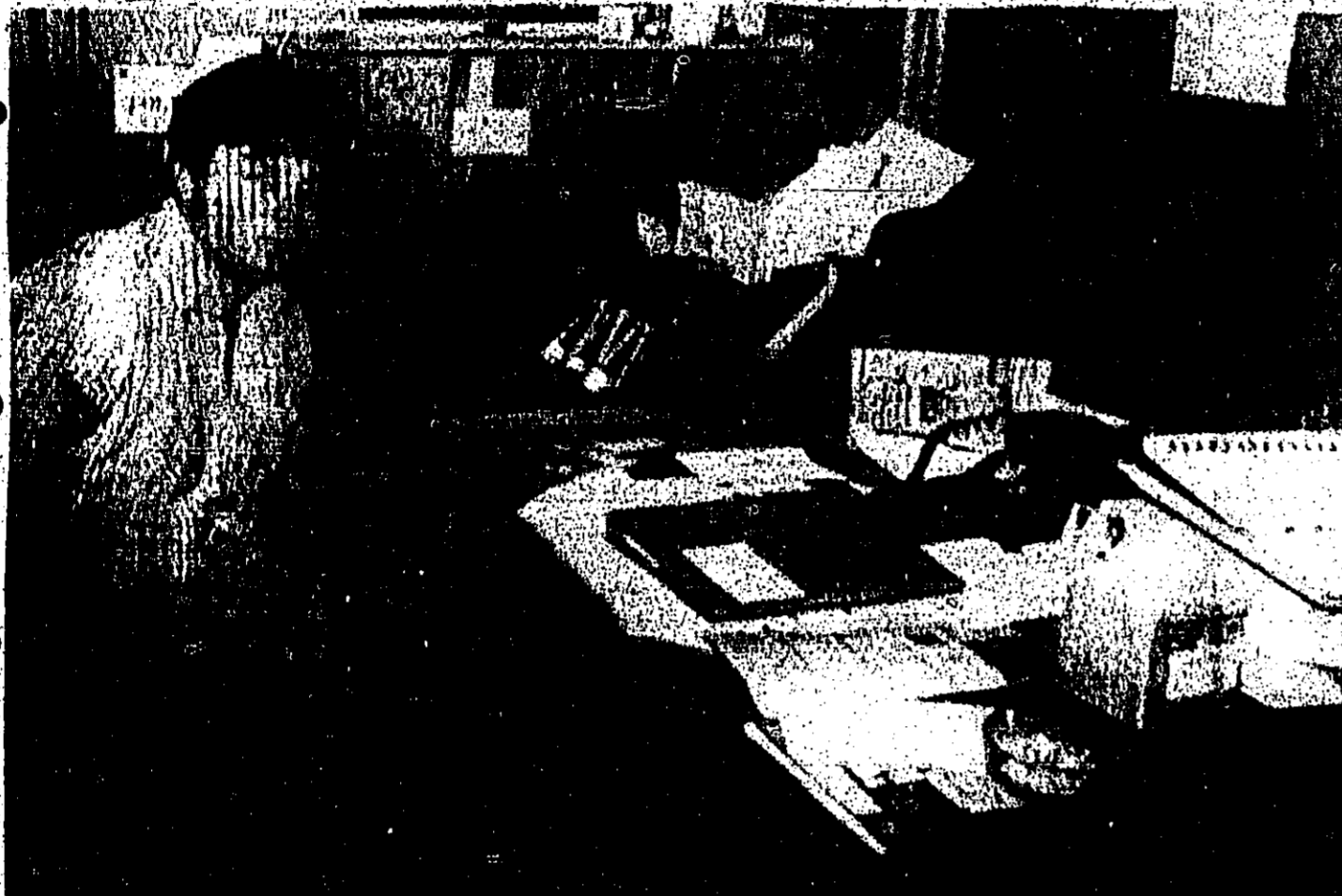

## Direct Furniture Hit

With a quick response Tuesday, of only five minutes, Woodville police officers responded to an armed robbery at The Mann-Direct Furniture Store located at North Magnolia in Woodville and began searching for a tall black suspect but were unable, despite the use of professional search dogs, to find the robber by press-time. Police are investigating the robbery.

According to the store manager, Dusty Dennis, at 11 a.m. Tuesday, a tall, middle aged black man, wearing a white t-shirt and blue jeans, holding a small caliber revolver, walked in the back door of Mann's Direct Furniture Center located at North Magnolia Street in Woodville, and held him at gunpoint. Dennis claimed that the man stole "in the neighborhood of \$340 from the cash register along with \$90 from the manager's billfold."

According to store owner David Mann, the Woodville Police Department and the Tyler County Sheriff's Department mobilized to capture the suspect.

## Keller Sale Expected Oct. 31

Keller Industries of Woodville, with headquarters in Miami Florida, came closer to approval of a merger of that company with a group of private investors, according to Robert Conner, Senior Vice President.

The Board of Directors of Keller Industries, at their regular Quarterly Meeting on June 23, 1983, approved the terms and conditions of a cash merger with a private investment group including Citicorp Venture Capital Ltd. A definitive Merger Agreement has been executed.

All outstanding stock of Keller Industries, Inc. will be purchased by the surviving Corporation at \$24.25 a share, as previously announced, subject to the approval of the transaction by a majority of the stockholders at a Special Meeting to be called H.A. Keller, Chairman of the Board and President, has agreed to vote his 29.1% stock ownership of the Company in favor of the merger.

The date for the Special Stockholders Meeting will be announced following submission of preliminary proxy materials to the Securities and Exchange Commission. The Merger Agreement provides that the transaction must be consummated by no later than October 31, 1983.

The Board of Directors also declared the Company's one-hundred and thirteenth consecutive quarterly dividend. The dividend is for \$0.75 (seven and one-half cents) per share, payable on August 15, 1983, to the stockholders of Record on July 29, 1983.

## Hazard Re-opens Sonic

Prod. Hazard, former owner of Sonic, has bought 100 percent of the operating stock of the Woodville Sonic, Inc. Mary Hazard will manage the business under a complete new concept of drive-in services.

According to Hazard, "Woodville will remember Mary from the Dairy Queen or the Pick-Up House in which she made many friends. Mary has been in the food service management business for thirty one years and her experience and expertise will reflect in the quality of service and food that will be forthcoming from the Sonic."

Mary plans a delivery service free to senior citizens over 65 and shut-ins. A hot lunch take-up or delivery service will also be offered in the booster. The outside picnic table area will be expanded to three times its current size. Mary invites the Woodville teenagers to return and to watch the local signs for her holiday specials. A grand re-opening special price menu starts on the 15th of July.

## Rate Increase 'A Whopper'

Southwestern Bell has filed a rate request with the Public Utility Commission that calls for an increase of \$1.2 billion in local rates charged to Texas customers.

The company's request for local rates basically is divided into three parts:

An increase of \$502 million statewide to recover added costs of doing business, and to produce a reasonable return on state investment.

An increase of \$450 million in depreciation expense and other capital recovery charges that are more consistent with today's rapid technological changes.

Access charges of \$249 million to partially replace the subsidy provided by intrastate long distance revenues to local rates. Southwestern Bell will lose most long distance revenues at the end of 1983.

Another part of the subsidy for local rates will come from \$504 million in access charges to be paid by long distance carriers such as AT&T and MCI.

John Anderson, vice president-customer services, pointed out that about half of what ever increase is applied would go to pay federal, state and local taxes.

"To a large extent," Anderson said, "our rate application reflects the combined effects of many decisions made in Washington, by the courts, the Federal Communications Commission and the Justice Department. Those decisions are bringing about vast changes in the telecommunications industry."

Southwestern Bell urgently needs this increase to assure that we will be a viable, stand-alone company able to provide quality telephone service in Texas when we spin-off from AT&T in January 1, 1984," Anderson said. To produce the \$1.2

billion increase, Southwestern Bell is proposing substantially higher monthly local rates. One-party residential flat rate service would range from \$27.45 in the smallest towns to \$30.35 in Houston. One-party business flat rates would range from \$34.05 to \$37.75 per month. The rates include an average access charge of \$4 per month for each line to provide the customer's portion of the long distance subsidy replacement.

Anderson emphasized that this access charge is an average. "When the rates are finally set, the business line access charge may well be higher, and the residential charge lower," he said.

Anderson pointed out that a parallel decision by the Federal Communications Commission to reduce the local subsidy from interstate long distance would add an average of

## Hearings Set On Bell

The Public Utility Commission of Texas has announced local hearing dates and times for receiving public comments on Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's \$1.7 billion rate request. The utility filed the request on June 24.

Comments at each of the seven local hearings will be heard by a commissioner and three PUC staff members. Staff members attending the hearings include a hearings examiner, a PUC attorney or engineer and a representative from the Consumer Affairs and Information Services section.

Local hearings are scheduled from July 6 through July 16 in Houston, Corpus Christi, Brownsville, Austin, Dallas, Lubbock and El Paso. Local city and county governments in each city and the Houston Independent School District provided assistance in scheduling and providing facilities for the hearings.

"I hope customers will take this opportunity to come out to the hearings and let us know what their opinions and concerns are about this request," says Chairman Erwin.

"Local hearings have proven to be effective in the past for getting the public's opinion and for having an effect on the case. We've not up

We are looking at a serious backlog of projects like Lake Rockland but the administration doesn't want to tell the local sponsors of these projects how much more they are going to have to pay for them than before, and Congress doesn't want to say it either," said Ken Carroll, Aids to Texas Senator John Fower Friday.

"In the current federal budget coming through Congress there are no funds for new starts on water projects. It's been this way for six years now but there is still no agreement on cost sharing formulas. We have a lot of proposals floating but no concrete answers yet," concluded Carroll.

Lake Rockland is the recently reactivated project of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers which, if built according to current estimates, could be supplying water to cities, industries and agriculture as early as the year 2008. In addition the proposed 3-mile-wide by 22-mile-long reservoir will produce hydroelectric power for use by area utilities, reduce flood damage along the Neches River from Rockland to Beaumont and provide recreation amenities to area visitors and residents.

Local sponsors for the Lake Rockland Project is the Lower Neches Valley Authority (LNVA).

LNVA originally paid five million and later added another ten million in local cost share to pay for four projects on the Neches River. Of those four projects, Sam Rayburn Dam and Dam B have already been constructed and Dam A and Lake Rockland are still proposed projects of the Corps of Engineers. Dam A is classified as "inactive" by the Corps of Engineers but Lake Rockland, after a two year study, was reactivated last December.

Current estimates of the cost for Lake Rockland stand at between \$722,000,000 and \$750,000,000.

Whether or not LNVA will have to pay additional funds as the local share of costs of building Rockland and possible amount of those costs remains unknown.

# "Get Your Family Together Workshop" July 16

An all-day Workshop for persons interested in compiling a family narrative will be conducted on Saturday, July 16, at the Holiday Inn in Lufkin.

titled "The Story of Your Family How to Start Getting It Together." The Workshop will be guided by East Texas writer Howard Peacock of Woodville, whose articles on personalities and family life appear in a variety of regional and national magazines. Among his articles are "Lost Family Links," "Lufkin's Trail," "Big Thicket and Boykin Springs from Lufkin," "Highways 93," "Trends in Genealogy," and "Home

wet" from the International edition of Faxon USA magazine. He has conducted workshops on East Texas lore for the University of Houston Continuing Education Program and the Houston Museum of Natural Science.

Beginning at 9:30 a.m., the Workshop will help participants actually begin compiling a step-by-step family story based on memories of people and events that capture the spirit and uniqueness of a family's life.

But a family story deals with the way people look and live, and with the diverse personalities that a family embraces.
