

Funnel Path Leaves Families Homeless



Tornado Rips South County

"It's just a miracle no one was killed and so few were injured," says Tyler County Judge Allen Sturrock Tuesday. National and local Red Cross officials were estimating over two million in damages from a tornado wind storm which crossed the southern part of Tyler County late Saturday.

Sturrock mailed a letter to Texas Governor Mark White Tuesday requesting that Tyler County be declared a disaster area. The designation would make victims eligible for state and federal assistance in rebuilding the reported 50 houses and 22 mobile homes damaged or destroyed by the storm.

DWI Jail Rule Hits Jan. 1

A minimum jail term is mandatory for any person convicted two or more times for DWI under a stricter Texas law effective January 1, 1984.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director and chief man of the task force, which recommended tougher DWI legislation, said the new law should close the back door in the criminal justice system for repeat offenders.

"Deferred adjudication, which allowed repeat violators to wipe the slate clean after each DWI arrest, will be eliminated under this new statute," Adams pointed out. "Even if probation is given, a conviction record will be established for the offender and this record can be used in subsequent prosecution of any additional drunk driving

charges. Jail time is mandatory as a condition of probation beginning with the second DWI conviction.

The new law provides increased penalties for DWI convictions. A conviction on first offense DWI carries a fine of \$100 to \$2,000 with a jail term ranging from 72 hours to two years. A second offense conviction is punishable by jail (fine ranging from a minimum of 15 days up to two years with a fine of \$300 to \$2,000). Convictions for third and subsequent DWI offenses carry a fine of \$500 to \$2,000 and confinement in jail for a minimum of 30 days to two years or in the state penitentiary for 60 days to five years.

Minimum terms of confinement are increased by 60 days and the limits are raised by

\$500 if the DWI offense results in serious bodily injury to another person. If a drunk driver is found to be responsible for a traffic fatality, the law prescribes a mandatory term for the violator.

Adams said the re-

vised DWI statute will aid in the prohibition of drunk drivers.

Under the present law, a person is only presumed to be intoxicated if tested and a blood alcohol concentration of 10 percent or more," Adams said.

The new law established that a driver is definitely too drunk to drive at the 10 percent level.

The revised statute also contains provisions for automatic 90 day suspension of driving

Timber Acreage Essential

"If we take any large areas out of timber production in Texas it will cause us to be cutting more timber than we are producing. And, it would mean that the state of Texas would be depleting its future timber resources," says

Environmental Services Manager for Kirby Forest Industries John Robinson in a Booster interview Monday.

"You're not going to see expansion of the timber industry like you saw in the past and the biggest cause for this is the pine timber situa-

tion. I don't think it is widely known by the public what the effect of doing other things with timber lands will have on the timber industry."

"Based on information I gathered for the Texas Forest Service for a new paper mill in Newton County, Texas

right now is cutting about all the pine that is growing on a yearly basis. We just 'squeezed' by in there being enough timber to support a permit for the plant. I understand there is a Champion's plant on the drawing board for Kirbyville but

Lake Rockland Would... Add Wilderness Habitat Acres

The construction of the long postponed Rockland Lake and Dam Project would involve purchase and management of a presently undetermined amount of land to replace or "mitigate" the wildlife hab-

itat inundated by the 22 mile long 3 mile wide Rockland Reservoir. This property while "developed and accessible to the public" would be managed primarily for the wildlife species.

"A figure of seventy-

five percent of the reservoir pool storage is a rough rule of thumb for Rockland about 75,000 acres," according to the Lake Rockland Review Study released last year by the Fort Worth District Office, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

However, Corps of Engineers policy encourages use of land which would already have to be purchased surrounding the lake project and enhance-

ment of "habitat value" of property already owned by the Federal Government in the lake

area to decrease the size of the "wildlife mitigation lands" which would have to be purchased according to Corps, Neches Basin Project Engineer Leland Wilson.

"It is highly possible that we could compile more existing areas by
