Hightower Won't Enter Congressional Debate

If it takes a Wilderness bill to stop the clearcutting of thousands of acres of national forest land then it's a good idea", said East Texas State Representative, Allen Hightower, in a Booster interview Monday. I'm a supporter of a Wilderness bill. I think we need one but I'm not going to get in

the middle of a squabble between Congressman Bryant and Congressman Wilson, on a national congress issue. I know the two Congressmen are negotiating at this time", continued Hightower, "the main issue is one of size of the Wilderness area and they can work that out themselves."

East Texas Congress-

man Charles Wilson has introduced a bill in Congress which would set aside 65,000 acres of national forest land as Wilderness Areas.

"I would settle for a bill that just stopped clearcutting in the national forests", continued Hightower. "The main issue is one of size of the Wilderness area and they can work that out themselves."
