

Development Center Opens March 1, Anticipates \$158,000 Operations Fund

The Tyler County Youth Development Center received "good news" from State Representative Allen Hightower on the last working day of 1983 with word that a \$158,000 Department of Human Resources Grant was anticipated and was "in the mail" ready for signature of the operating board subject to final negotiations expected this week.

Simpson authorized advertising for a Program Director and several houseparent positions (Page 6-B of the Booster) indicating the Youth Development Center has a lot of work to do before the March 1 opening date.

The grant was applied for a Rural Youth Shelter and Service Facility under the Runaway and Truant Demonstration Program.

According to Simpson, "Public and private efforts have been made over the past two years to develop a Youth Shelter and service program in Tyler County."

Children age 10-17 will be provided for at the home up to a capacity of eight.

The Youth Development Center still has to achieve Department of Human Resources licensing before the opening date of March 1.

The period of contract with the Department of Human Resources is eighteen months.

Personnel salaries and fringe benefits would total \$63,398 with fringe benefits of \$7,925. Personnel travel allowances will amount to

\$3,460. The grant also provides for \$7,440 in client medical and psychological services for the eligible recipients of the program.

The grant application calls for a Project Director which would plan and develop a total yearly salary of \$10,998 on a "half-time" basis with three houseparents earning \$1,125 per month each. A bookkeeper will also be hired and there is also

Food, janitorial supplies, educational supplies for the children, first aid and safety supplies are also provided for in the grant.

Clothing for the children and youth enrichment activities, along with utilities, phone maintenance and repair to the home, and insurance provisions have been made.

According to Tom Chapman, Program Specialist Child Protective Services Branch, Department of Human Resources, Austin,

"We really don't expect any problem with the grant. We'll be coming to Woodville next week to fine tune the grant and discuss staffing of the shelter...we feel like the project is sound.

Our aim is to be a quality provider of services for the kids."

Chapman said the grant would be contracted through the Nacogdoches Regional Department of Human Resources offices of Margaret Maxwell, DHR Regional Director. Tom Miltstead is expected to be the contract manager for the program here.

The grant was initiated directly with the State of Texas with the dollars for the programing disbursed regionally then locally.

Chapman said, "We've been hearing about the Woodville

program some time and we're glad you've finally been able to get up an application. We like to support local initiatives like you," she added.

State Representative Hightower visited the Youth Center early in 1983 and asked to be informed by DHR officials when the application was up for consideration then passed word to the local group when his office was notified that negotiations were authorized.

According to Chapman, "The State Representatives office was very interested and supportive of the program."

John Henry Faulk At Chamber



Featured speaker at the Annual Banquet of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce on Jan. 19 will be John Henry Faulk. He is known as Author/Toastmaster/Political Commentator/Constitutional Expert/Social Critic/Humorist/After Dinner Speaker/Columbian/Folklorist/Actor/Philosopher/Convention Speaker.

For thirty years he has been spinning tales true and imagined about the American people, how they live, and what they think about. With country wisdom and urban sophistication, he captures the beauty of plain people and eloquence of plain talk. He has appeared on TV's network classic "Hee Haw" for several years.

In 1956 John Henry Faulk was a popular radio and television personality host of his own radio program on WCBS in New York. And then he publicly challenged AWARE, Inc., an ultra-patriotic group engaged in systematically blacklisting entertainment

personalities for their alleged subversive associations. Angry and frightened by this unjust accusation, Faulk brought suit against AWARE, charging conspiracy to libel him and to destroy his career. Thus ensued one of the great civil rights cases

of this century. John Henry Faulk recounts the story of this harrowing time in his book FEAR ON TRIAL, the dramatic account of his six years on the "blacklist"—an exile that began with the AWARE bulletin and ended with his vindication and the largest libel judgment ever awarded by a jury. John Henry will be available for autographing copies of his book at the Banquet.

Jordan Assumes Pct. 4 Post

Tyler County Commissioner's Court meeting in special session Thursday, Dec. 29, accepted the resignation for health reasons of 55 year old Pct. 4 Commissioner Berton Adnell Odom. Odom's resignation concludes a 22 year career of public service in Tyler County, including four years as an employee of Commissioner Frenchy Hicks and Bo Jordan, 14 years as a sheriff's deputy and constable and five years as Commissioner of

"Yes, if he can get Chrysler on its feet, he might help the country."



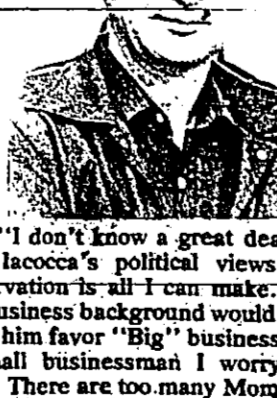

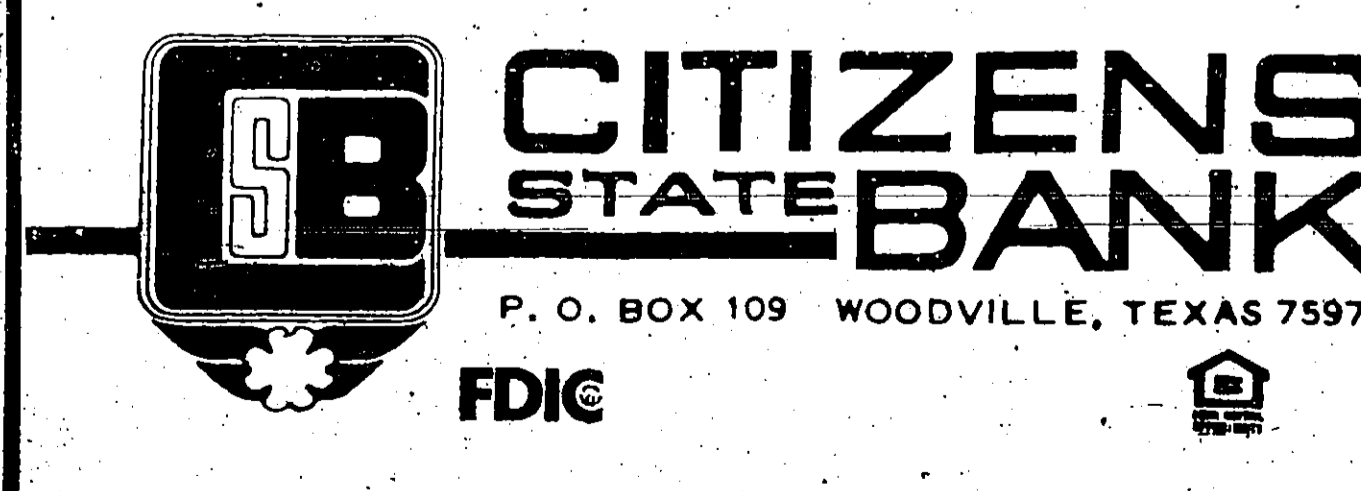

Over the years the T-Wheeler has been a bit of the curmudgeon. A polite expression of the Franklin Roosevelt years to describe a crusty, ill-tempered old man. Isn't that a laugh? The definition fits the T-Wheeler like a glove.

On the other hand, the beginning of a new year is sort of like that new pair of shoes you wore on the first day of school. You aren't kicking cans or scuffing them up because you know there would be hell to pay when you get home.

It would be kind of nice if we all looked at 1984 with the same reference. A lot of political rhetoric will get in the way. Most of which we have all heard before. From both sides of the political platform. But some here a long the line, some brave soul may yet come forth and not only point out some of the problem areas that have been with us for decades, or even as long as pen could scribe, and in the next breath offer a solution that all of us can recognize.

The Christmas season seems to be a popular time to highlight soup kitchens and people in need. Well, soup kitchens are there all year long for people to see. And needs people are there all year long who need help.

It isn't that the helpful resources aren't there in our view. It's just that we have tried to pave the way to their delivery with money, when a little marketing and distribution sense would have probably gotten the job done.

For instance, we have billions of dollars in dairy goods in warehouses all across this country. And we paid dairy farmers to milk the cows in the first place so they could fill up the warehouses. And from our personal experience we have finally come to the conclusion that no one in federal government or down here at home has come up with a simple way to get those products into needy hands.

Oh, we make a good show of it occasionally. We run a story in the newspaper that a truckload of butter and cheese will be in town on a certain date, and folks can come down and carry some home.

Our guess would be that the folks who probably really need that butter and cheese aren't regular subscribers to the newspaper. That seven dollars a month is being spent in more prac-

tical ways. And we would guess that the needy folks, if they knew the score, would wonder why billions of dollars are being spent for milk that can't be delivered to consumers. The government must know those dairy farmers pretty well to send them the checks every month. How come they don't know the needy folks so they could at least tell them where they could pick up the cheese?

Sure, a lot of folks think everyone should stand on their own two feet. Work hard, save your money and you won't need help. Well, it's also pretty true that the folks who talk like that are pretty secure themselves in the first place, and are probably more concerned about the taxes they pay than whether somebody is going hungry.

We know there are free loaders. There are people who steal pencils from the office and don't put a nickel in the parking meter. It just kind of depends on who's calling the kettle black.

But we have gone so long with using tax money to resolve problems instead of people to resolve problems that we have forgotten how effective a person-person cooperation can be.

We would guess several million people in this country are in pretty dire straits. No money for heat and rent or food. Many just can't compete in the kind of society we have designed for ourselves. And they are the folks who sincerely need our help. There are countless federal and state programs in place to assist folks who just can't get by. The food stamp and social security structure has made life a lot easier for millions of people.

If tax bombs were spent on trying to corral the votes these constituencies provide, and instead were focused on those unnumbered, uncounted millions who have just plain fallen through the cracks because they can't be found on the voter rolls, we just might begin to heal the wounds that only show up at the compassionate time of Christmas.

But in a few months, the spell of Christmas and cold fronts will have passed, and spring will replace the rigors of winter. The destitute will have been forgotten in the euphoria of a rising economy. Just remember, those folks are still there, even if we've politically forgotten them.

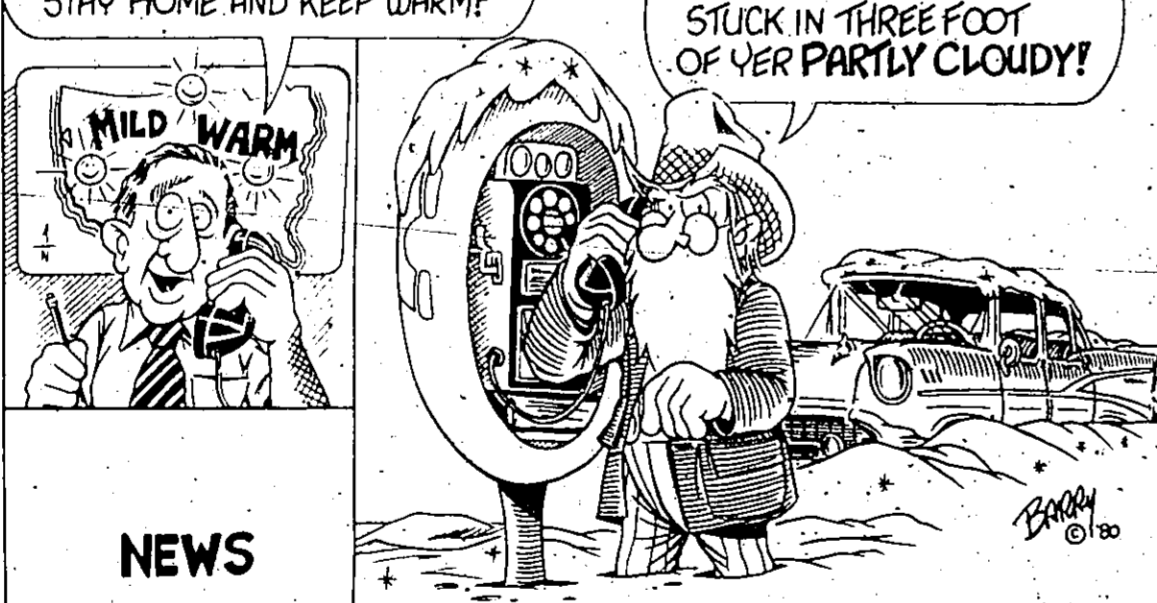

Pro Football

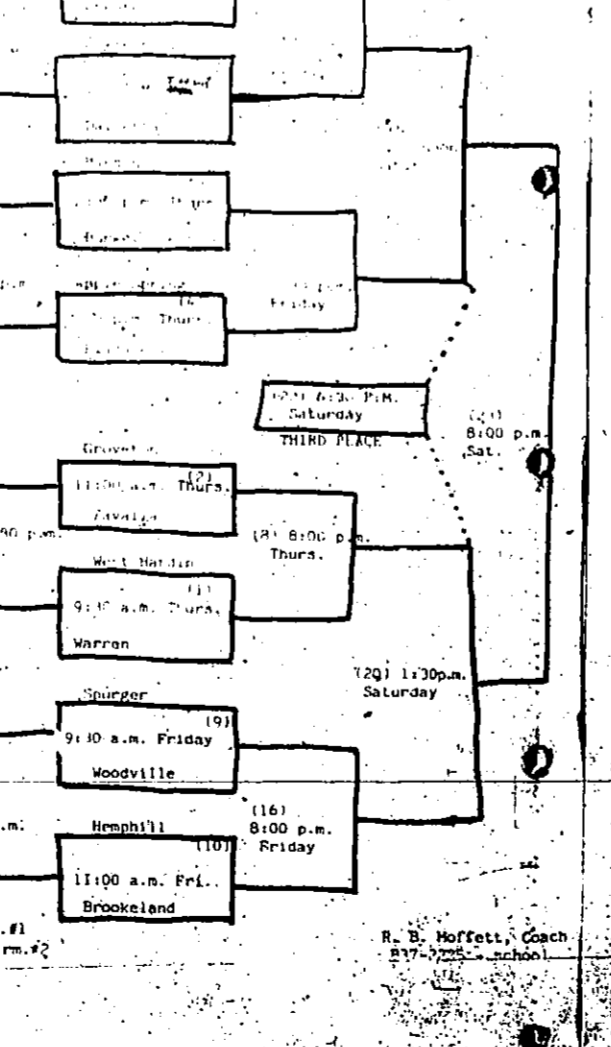
