Jerry K. Johnson Will Face Wilson

Jerry K. Johnson, Nacogdoches businessman and rancher, today announced his candidacy for U.S. Congress, 2nd District of Texas in the May Democratic Primary. The seat is currently held by Charles Wilson, and covers 16 counties in East and Southeast Texas.

"My primary reason for running is to offer all East Texans the effective, responsive representation that they deserve," said Mr. Johnson. "And I mean by that a new, full-time, shirt-sleeve kind of congressman that proudly calls East Texas his home."

"Unlike the incumbent, I won't go into the Washington real estate and night club business," stated Johnson, "and forget where I come from or who I'm working for."

Noting that the incumbent is currently on yet another tax-paid trip to Afghanistan, Johnson said, "He has spent so much time traveling abroad on our pocketbook that East Texas isn't glamorous enough for him anymore."

Tyler County Community Blood Drive Starts Thursday

All Tyler County residents are cordially invited to participate in the Seventh Annual Community Blood Drive to be held in Woodville on Thursday and Friday, Jan. 26 and 27.

Donors will welcome in the Woodville First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Thursday. On Friday donors will be taken from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:30 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Two additional drawing stations will be set up for the donors' convenience. Keller Aluminum employees will donate at Calvary Baptist Church from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 26. Students, faculty and staff of the Woodville Independent School District will be invited to donate at the High School on Friday, Jan. 27. The School Drive will be held in Room 11 from 9 a.m. to 11:30

p.m. and 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Tyler County residents had their best drive ever in January 1983, when 266 persons donated. Residents have contributed over 850 pints of blood in the last 6 years to patients in area hospitals. This generosity is needed once again to help supply the blood needed at Tyler County Hospital and at 17 other hospitals in 6 1/2 counties serviced by The Blood Center.

Area blood needs to be a month of peak

blood usage. Supplies are low after the decrease in donors during the holiday season, and surgery schedules are extremely heavy. Elective surgery which was postponed during the Thanksgiving-Christmas period is planned for the beginning of the new year. This situation prevails every January throughout the country; it is almost impossible to borrow blood from other blood banks.

Besides our increased need we con-

tinued to be hurt by the recession; just as it has hurt the economy in general. For two years many companies which normally hold blood drives have laid off personnel and are working shorter hours with fewer people - if they haven't had to close their doors. The Blood Center does not have as many drives available as in the past and must ask for extra effort from every community, church, business, club, or school participating in a drive.

Besides helping to make blood available, a blood donor receives Blood Assurance for himself and his immediate family. Unlimited free blood used in hospitals serviced by The Blood Center is available immediately upon donation when needed for accidents or childbirth and after a 90 day waiting period for other conditions. Credits for the recruitment fee for each unit used will be sent to hospitals outside our area. The blood used for the following conditions, if they are

pre-existing, is excluded from coverage: hemophilia, leukemia, aplastic anemia, other hereditary or acquired blood disease, ulcers of the gastrointestinal tract, pulmonary tuberculosis, cancer, and congenital or acquired cardiovascular diseases. Residents who currently have Family Blood Assurance are not subject to the 90 day waiting period if they renew their Blood Assurance.

January is such a time of concern that it again has been designated National Blood

Donor Month by President Reagan. As we celebrate the New Year, let us care enough to share life-giving blood. Donate January 26 or 27 and help two or three patients with your one pint.

ASCS To Accept Applications

On January 16, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will begin accepting applications for the 1984 feed grain and wheat production adjustment programs. The programs were announced well in advance of the sign-up period to give farmers ample opportunity to make decisions on their 1984 grain crops, said ASCS official Kathy O'Loe.

But sign-up begins, she is explaining as many program details as possible so they will know the requirements as well as the benefits of these programs. The acreage reduction programs are voluntary. However, only participating farmers will be eligible for commodity loans and target price protection. Wheat program participants are also eligible for payment awards.

Mrs. O'Loe said program questions most frequently asked relate to acreage bases, acreage production and acreage participation in the program.

The wheat or feed grain acreage based on the regular farm is the acreage of the acres planted and considered planned for these crops in 1982 and 1983.

The official said the program wheat acreage may not exceed 90 percent of the farm's wheat base and the maximum permitted acreage of barley and oats, or corn and grain sorghum may not exceed 90 percent of the farm's applicable feed grain base. Farmers may choose to participate in the acreage reduction programs for any of the eligible crops. However, because corn and grain sorghum bases and barley and oats bases are combined, participation of these crops is combined, she said.

To participate in the wheat payment-in-kind program, farmers are required to enroll in the wheat acreage reduction program. Wheat PIK will be offered on an acreage of not less than 20 percent nor more than 100 percent of the wheat base. Farmers may choose any level within this range, according to O'Loe. Payments for wheat PIK will be based on the total PIK acres, times the farm's diversion yield, times 75 percent, rounded to whole bushels.

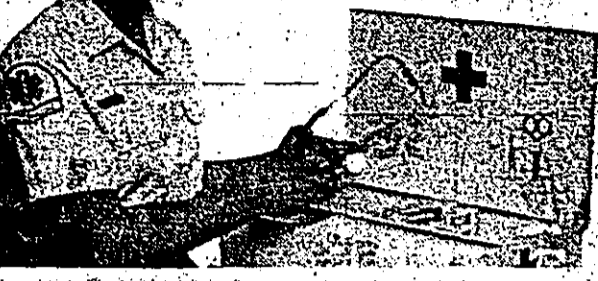
